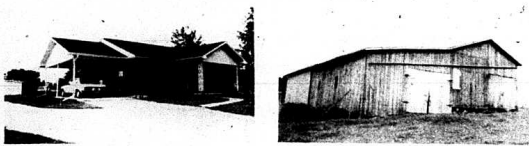

### Corn and soybean prices expected high

Corn and soybean prospects are expected to be excellent in the 1987 crop year, according to the Kentucky Agricultural Statistics Service.

Projections indicate that the state average corn yield per acre will be a record-high 105 bushels. Soybeans, at 34 bushels per acre, will equal the previous record high.

Corn for grain production in Kentucky is forecast at 120.8 million bushels, down 14 percent from 1986. Acreage harvested for grain is expected to be 24 percent below last year's level due primarily to government programs.

"Timely rains in most areas of the state and earlier than normal planting season have combined to produce an excellent corn crop. The 105-bushel average tops 92 bushels last year and the previous record of 103 bushels in 1982," said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell.

Kentucky soybean production is forecast at 34.7 million bushels, 7 percent below 1986. Acreage harvested for beans will be down 13 percent from last year, but is expected to be offset by a two-bushel per acre increase in average yield to 34 bushels per acre.

"This equals the previous high set in 1985," Boswell said. "This crop has excellent potential, but the final yields will be influenced by moisture levels in August."

After two years of falling production, burley tobacco growers in Kentucky are expected to harvest 315.4 million pounds in 1987, a 10 percent increase from the 287 million pounds produced in 1986. A 4 percent increase in acreage and an average yield of 2,175 pounds per acre account for the increase.

All hay production in Kentucky is expected to total 4.52 million tons, 26 percent above last year. Alfalfa yield is expected to be 3.5 tons and other hay 1.9 tons per acre. All acres harvested for hay are up 20 percent from 1986.

Sorghum for grain production in Kentucky is expected to be down a third from last year due to acreage reduction.

The number of farms in Kentucky in 1987 is estimated at 99,000, the same level as in 1986. This is the lowest on record, but still keeps the Commonwealth ranked fourth nationally.

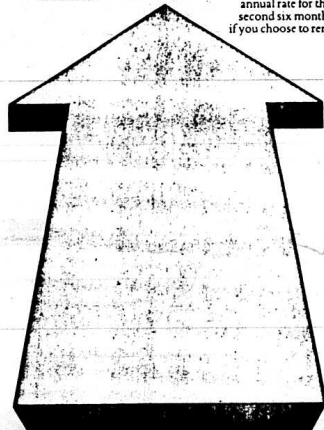

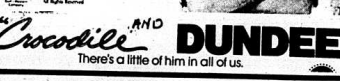

## LEAP to be funded again

Livingston Economic Alternatives in Progress (LEAP) has been included in the Appalachian Community Fund grant cycle. The group was one of 19 chosen from 60 non-profit organizations that applies. No dollar amount was reported.

The community fund was formed last year for the purpose of providing funding to grassroots organizations working to change the root causes of poverty and other social problems.

LEAP is a community based organization whose goals lie in creating economic self-sufficiency in the Livingston area of Rockcastle County.

A 1985 study from the Kentucky Cabinet for Human Resources found the rate of unemployment in Rockcastle county to be 12.4 percent while the labor market area, which includes six surrounding counties, had an unemployment rate of 10.5 percent, nearly 2 percent

lower than Rockcastle County. It is the goal of LEAP to create local, year-round employment opportunities for community residents. This would help to create a locally circulating economy in the Livingston area. Currently, two projects are being sponsored by LEAP.

The first is the sorghum project, designed to create an alternative crop to tobacco for local farmers. Because of decreased quota (the amount of tobacco a farmer is allowed to sell), warehouse overstock and inflation, the cost of producing tobacco is overcoming the price it brings on the open market.

The University of Kentucky is currently researching alternate crops possibilities for tobacco farmers in the Southern Appalachian region. Possible alternative crops include watermelon, bell peppers, sweet corn, and sorghum.

According to research done by the Kentucky Department of

Economic Development, 25 percent of employable Rockcastle county women are unemployed. Another 15.8 percent of these women are underemployed, working only 14 to 26 weeks a year.

Of the employed women, most hold low paying factory jobs with yearly wages near the poverty level for a family of four.

LEAP's second project, Opportunities for Women, is working with community women to help them gain the leadership and management skills necessary for higher paying jobs through the production and marketing of Golden Kentucky Products. Golden Kentucky produces specialty food items made with sorghum grown by local farmers.

As the women increase their skills, they are working towards eventual ownership of Golden Kentucky Products and economic self-sufficiency.

This year's goal for LEAP is to improve the sorghum production process and expand production capabilities.

LEAP Board of Directors are: Faye Baker, chairman; Juanita Medley, Ina Taylor, James Taylor and Denise Carpenter, Tammy Gardner is project coordinator.

Membership in LEAP is \$5 per person and \$7.50 a couple. For additional information telephone 453-9800.

by Earl Cummins. Cummins was narrowly defeated by Dr. Burdette in the last election.

As of Wednesday morning, only nine candidates had filed for council seats in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston.

## State to focus on garbage plan

The state Division of Waste Management reported this week a representative would be in Rockcastle County in October, or earlier, to discuss the county's stalled garbage plan.

Letters will go out to mayors and County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker in about two weeks setting a time and date for a joint meeting with department field personnel.

The report came on the heels of a meeting of the Environmental Quality Commission last week in Frankfort that said an inspection of 28 counties shows many are "not just paying attention" to what they promised to do in garbage disposal plans that have been submitted.

The report said the counties are not enforcing anti-littering laws, are not requiring residential garbage collections, cleaning open dumps or closing central dump spots. J. Alex Barber said at a meeting of the Environmental Quality Commission this week.

Although Rockcastle was not included in the 28 counties, it is only because a survey of the county has not been made.

Rockcastle's plan was approved by the fiscal court, several months ago but nothing has been done since, and after costly dumpsters were removed.

Garbage is now disposed at two sites in the county at a per bag cost. One site is at Burr and the other, at Renfro Valley.

Counties have failed to comply with the plans for economic and political reasons, said Patricia Zweig, manager of the division's program-development branch.

The counties need money and technical help as well as the will to back political opposition, she said. Ms. Zweig noted that state officials were studying legislation that would offer counties additional aid.

The failures were documented in the inspection of 28 counties, which were among the first to submit the solid waste plans due in June 1986. Inspectors found that only five were closely following those plans.

Barber said that 19 counties were "moving toward compliance" with their plans and that four were "simply not moving too well."

Ms. Zweig said the five counties that were doing a good job were Bell, Laurel, Marion, Pike and Trimble. Barber said Bell County officials endured "horrendous" public criticism, but now had trash picked up regularly from more than 95 percent of county residents.

The four counties that have done little to comply with their plans are Breckinridge, Clinton, Jessamine and Martin, Ms. Zweig said. She could not immediately provide a list of the other 19 counties that had been inspected.

Barber also said two counties -- Floyd and Letcher -- had not submitted plans. He said state of

## In closed session

# Board discusses fall-out from case

The Rockcastle County Board of Education, former board chairman Dr. Rudolph Burdette, and former Superintendent Charles B. Parsons, met for over four hours in executive session Friday night to discuss the board's next step following their loss in federal court last week.

Last week a Michigan federal judge ruled that the school board and Parsons sexually discriminated against Sue Hamm when they did not hire her for a 1985 principals opening at Mt. Vernon Elementary School.

Judge Stewart Newblatt ruled that the board was liable for a violation of Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act for failing to promote Mrs. Hamm, who has been employed by the local school system since 1969.

The board met with their lawyer, Robert Chenoweth of Frankfort, and Parsons's lawyer, Mary Noble of Lexington, during the closed session.

"We authorized the lawyers to try and reach some kind of agreement with Mrs. Hamm's attorney and get back to us," said board chairman George Poynter.

Poynter would not elaborate on what the board might be offering, but he did say that as of now, no appeal of the ruling was in process.

According to Doug Hamm, Mrs. Hamm's husband, who is also employed as Supervisor of Instruction by the county system, his wife would like to be placed at

Brodhead Elementary School as assistant principal. But, Hamm did not say if his wife had given her lawyer, Mrs. Jennifer Coffman of Lexington, any other alternatives.

Presently Brodhead Elementary does not have an assistant principal, but the size of the staff and number of students actually warrants one.

As of Wednesday there was no word as to a settlement, but Superintendent Bige Towery said that he felt like the board would probably meet again concerning the matter in the next few days.

"After the lawyers meet, we will then get back together and see what we should do then," Towery said. He would not comment on whether or not the board had authorized their attorney's to offer Mrs. Hamm an assistant principalship at Brodhead.

Mrs. Hamm has also asked for back pay from the 1985 hiring. Her lawyer asked for about \$7,000 a year for the difference in her salary now and John Hale's salary at Mt. Vernon.

## That piddin' business

# Now a success for Phillip Payne

His dad called it a "piddin' business," but after his first furniture show in Pikeville, Phillip Payne of Negro Creek said his dad had a "change of heart."

Rustic Willow Furniture Company is the present business, and Phillip and his wife, Kathy, are fresh from the International Gift and Craft Fair, which he attended in New York City a few weeks back.

What Phillip makes is known as Gypsy, willow, Appalachian or Choctaw furniture. But Phillip, who has been building and selling it for the past six years, calls it "Rustic willow-twig furniture."

The furniture is made from willow trees that grow along streams and in swamp areas.

Last Friday, behind a barn on his father's farm Phillip explained about his business and how he got started into his craft. "I was working with Joshua Cooley, a local country band, as a sound and light man," he said. "I had time on my hands during the day because the band performed mostly at night."

Phillip explained that he saw a picture of this type furniture in a magazine and decided to try his hand.

Phillip, 33, had always been a carpenter since he graduated from Brodhead High School in 1974, but he said, "the first piece was rickety, but the piece in the magazine had to be rickety too because I built it just like the picture," he said.

Phillip said that he improved on the design to make his furniture stronger. He explained that last year one type of willow

can be used because it is a very pliable wood.

"The hardest part of building his unique furniture is finding the right material," he said. Currently, Phillip travels many miles into Putkai, Laurel and Madison Counties to find what he needs.

"My boys can spot a willow tree 500 yards away," Phillip said. Heath, is 4, and Courtney, 5, go with him often.

Phillip quit Joshua Cooley about three years ago to work on his craft full-time. "The best part of it is that I can work outdoors and I don't have to answer to anybody except the government," he said.

Phillip's great-grandfather, Mark Morris, made this same type of furniture on his farm at Red Hill during the depression. Phillip said that when he started making the furniture he had no idea that his great-grandfather had did the same thing, but his grand-

mother remembered it. "It may be that it is a little hereditary," he added.

Each piece of willow used in the furniture is personally selected and hand-cut by Phillip, a primitive-camping enthusiast, who generally uses his throwing tomahawk and a butcher knife to cut the willow limbs.

Depending on the size of the twigs, nails ranging from number 3 to 16 are used to hold the furniture together.

Payne puts Polurethane on all of the pieces he sells. "If you take moderate care of it this furniture will last forever," he said.

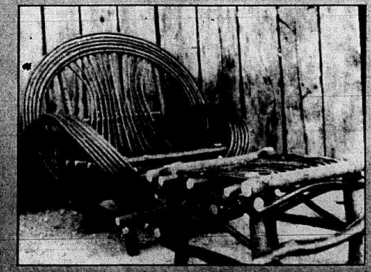
Phillip noted that he sold the first piece of furniture he ever made to Debbie Carpenter at Renfro Valley. Things have been down hill ever since," he said.

# Opinions

Dear Editor,  
Six years ago, to realize a lifelong dream, my husband and I bought property and built a house overlooking Lake Linville. We met with the Mt. Vernon City Council and were given permission to have a small boat dock to which we could secure our boat. We were very grateful for this privilege and immensely enjoyed the relaxation it afforded us.

Last year a policeman was sent by the Council to our house with this message: "You have one week to get rid of your boat

dock." No explanation was given as to why their decision was being reversed nor were we given an opportunity to discuss it with them before the deadline to dismantle the dock. My husband went to City Hall where the clerk showed him an ordinance which granted permission for a boat to those who owned lakefront property when the lake was built and denied this privilege to those who purchased the same property later. This is clearly a discriminatory ordinance which would not stand legal scrutiny. A

law that does not equal rights for all citizens is a very poor law and should not even be considered, much less enacted, in this county.

We are by no means the only ones who have borne the brunt of poor management of the lake. For example, crude mid-spelled signs are posted at the entrance to Hysinger Hollow forbidding fishing and boating. 10-h.p. engines from entering. This area is off limits to nearly all fishermen. The object, apparently, is to restrict high-speed boats from the lake. This has not been accomplished by having the signs read: "No wake beyond this point" or "Idle Speed Only", without restricting motor size, thus giving access to all fishermen.

Young people who once enjoyed a refreshing swim in the lake now find this recreation to be against the law. Skiers will soon be banned entirely. Campers looking for a place with swimming facilities must go to another county to find it. Families who used to enjoy an outing or picnic on their pontoon boats in Hysinger Hollow are now subject to a fine for so doing.

The boat dock operator has lost a major portion of his livelihood. Merchants in the county have lost revenue formerly realized from the sale of bait, fishing tackle, picnic supplies, gasoline, etc. Tourists who once used the lake now spend their money in some other county. Other "tonny-come-lately" lake residents like us are denied lake privileges that are granted to our neighbors. In fact, with the exception of satisfying the whims of one or more county council members, I know of no one who has benefited from these restrictive ordinances.

Neither have I known of one valid reason having been given for them by a council member. One recent respondent to an excellent editorial in the "As I See It" column said, "They're for the safety of the people of Mt. Vernon. It is regrettably true that due to carelessness and/or faulty equipment - people can drown in the lake. It is also true that - for the same reasons - people are killed every day on the highways. We should do everything possible to protect safety measures but we do not curtail all highway traffic to insure them! You use a flyswatter to kill a fly, Mr. Councilman, not a bulldozer!"

The lake was bought and is maintained by taxpayers and water customers and they should certainly be allowed to enjoy it. I

and many others have had enough of this "look, but don't touch" policy.



Officials had revoked \$7,000 grants that each county could have received for preparing the plans and were considering seeking \$1,000-a-day fines against the two.

Also attending the meeting was Harlan County Judge-Executive Delzenna Belcher. Although state officials have not officially inspected Harlan County, Belcher was invited to attend the Environmental Quality Commission meeting. Harlan recently won a cleanup contest with Bell County.

Belcher said the county had succeeded through an aggressive education campaign. But state progress would come easily. She said the county had spent about \$250,000 in the last 18 months to upgrade its landfill and now had to begin looking for a new dump site.

Although trash is collected from most residents, Belcher estimated that disposing of it cost the county \$250,000 more each year than it collected. She also expressed frustration that counties had to go to court to collect unpaid garbage-collector fees rather than add them to property-tax or utility bills.

been ordered from a family in New York City. Phillip and Kathy got enough orders during the show at New York City keep him busy until November. The dining chair, which Phillip says will be used as an accent piece, retails for about \$115.

"I know it seems expensive but it is the law of supply and demand," he said. "There is not much of this furniture around, it is high quality and there is somewhat of a demand for it."

The show in New York, which was held in the Jacob K. Javits Convention Center was mainly for wholesalers, who buy from people like Phillip, and then sell to gift shops and other outlets. Phillip has one contract for seven dozen walking canes for a gift shop in the Grand Canyon. Phillip's walking canes sell for about \$15.

Although the New York show was for wholesalers, Phillip sells most of his furniture at retail shows such as the one his wife Kathy went to for him in Pikeville. Phillip was still working with Joshua Cooley and Kathy took some of his furniture to Pikeville.

"A person told me that my wife was on the phone. I thought something was wrong because she never tried to call me on the road unless it was real important," he said. "It was definitely real important. Kathy told me she sold \$700 worth and she had taken orders for \$500 more."

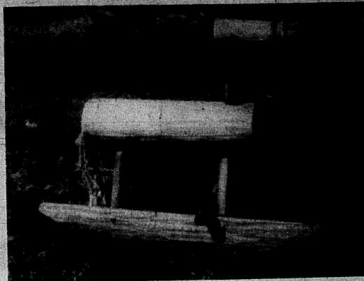
Phillip is considered a Kentucky Craftsman by the Kentucky Cabinet for the Arts. His work was judged by the Cabinet, and he is now listed as one of the State's Craftsmen.

He says he has built everything from small twig chairs for Cabbage Patch dolls, to full-sized baby cradle rockers, to chairs made of 4 inch poplar logs that are morticed and pinned together. He also makes his walking canes from odd shaped limbs, and he makes baskets, hearts and wreaths from old barbed wire.

His furniture ranges from about \$15 for the walking canes to as much as \$700 for larger items such as a bed. He said he hopes one day to be accepted as a member of the Kentucky Guild for Artists and Craftsmen.

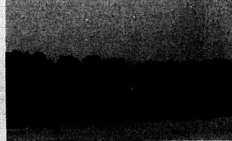

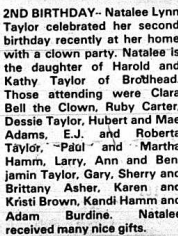

Both teams played even throughout the fourth quarter until the last play of the game when the Wildcats made their only touchdown of the night on a sixty yard run. Evarts controlled the ball on the ground much of the night but never managed to get inside Rockcastle's 35 until the last play.

Following the Rockcastle 21-6 victory over Evarts, coach Larkey said his boys "played hard, caused Evarts to fumble, and took advantage of all the mistakes made by the Wildcats." Evarts had six fumbles.

"We ran our option very effectively," Larkey said.
