evenly, you should condition them before storing. Cool the dried apples or other food to room temperature, then put into a large closed jar, can or plastic container. Open the container and stir them once or twice a day for a week. This should make the whole batch equally dry.

Heat treat (pasteurize) sun-dried foods to get rid of insects or insect eggs. (You won't need to do this if fruits have been sulfured). Spread dried foods on trays in oven, heat 10 to 15 minutes at 175 degrees F. or 30 minutes at 150 degrees F. Then spread out to cool on clean mesh strainers. Package when food reaches room temperature.

Storing Dried Foods

Use moisture-vapor-proof containers with tight-fitting lids. You could store small quantities in plastic sandwich bags, placing them all in a larger container with a tight closure. Once you open a package of dried food, keep it in the refrigerator, or you may have trouble with insects.

Nutritive Value
Dried fruit, just as it is, makes an excellent and nutritious snack. Properly dried reconstituted fruits and vegetables supply useful amounts of necessary fiber in your diet. They return to almost their original size, form and appearance.

Because of their high natural-sugar content, dried fruits are rich-in-food-energy. Many are also rich in iron and other minerals. Dried beans and peas are high in protein.

Drying does, however, destroy most of the vitamin C in vegetables and in unsulfured fruits. Much of the vitamin A is also destroyed, especially in sun-dried foods. Sulfuring does protect against the loss of vitamin C and A in fruits.

leaves will translocate to the root system killing the whole plant. Approximately 10-14 days after application the results will be seen.

For large areas, farm sprayers may be needed. However, on small groups or single plants out in the field, small hand sprayers are fine. Mixing 2 1/2 ounces of Round up per gallon of water then applying complete coverage of the foliage along with 4-6 hours without rain is all that's needed.

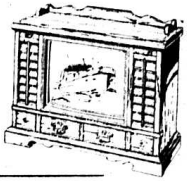

Farm & Home News

Multiflora roses were once promoted to be the living fence as well as an ideal wildlife cover. Many farmers are finding that fields infested with this plant rapidly becomes a wildlife habitat as gateways grow closed by the living fence. Exeration, maybe, but when left uncontrolled, multiflora roses will creep out from fence rows taking acres of farm land out of production.

Controlling multiflora roses seems to be the big problem. When cut off by grubbing, bush hogging or a mowing machine, they come back. The key is in killing the root system. Chemicals are now available to control this problem with little danger of affecting other crops.

During late summer is an ideal time to control this noxious weed. The key to success is to apply chemicals to actively growing leaves. In our area, this means applying treatments before japanese beetles have stripped the plant.

Chemicals like Round Up or

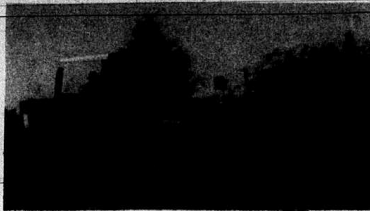
Cross Bow when applied to the treated areas. Mixture for Crossbow are 1 1/2 ounces per gallon of water, however, continuous agitation is required.

Farmers wishing to control this weed are better equipped with new chemicals than in year's past.

17 file for city council seats

Seventeen candidates will be seeking 14 seats on the county's three city councils at the Nov. 3 general election.

When the deadline passed Thursday, there were only two candidates for the District 3 seat on the Rockcastle County Board of Education. Incumbent board member, Dr. Billy George Griffith is opposed by Earl Cummins.

Dr. Griffith was appointed to the seat by the board when Dr. Rudolph Burdette moved outside

the district and resigned.

At Mt. Vernon, seven candidates are seeking six seats on the city council. They are, incumbents, Larry Burdette and Billy Ray Doan, and newcomers, Earl R. Nichols, Charles "Tommy" Bussell, Mrs. Clarice Kirby, Greg Hurley and Wayne Adams.

Nichols is a retired service station owner. Adams is a former corrections officer at LaGrange. Doan is a butcher at Food Fair. Bussell is employed at the Berea Water Works. Mrs. Kirby is employed at Rockcastle Mfg.

Burdette is in the advertising business and Hurley is self-employed.

Four councilmen declined to run for re-election—Tom Welch, Jerry Pensol, Jackie Renner and Joe Martin.

Three incumbents are candidates for the Brodhead City Council. They are, D.A. Robbins, Eddie Cash and Johnny Wilcox. One newcomer also seeking a council seat is Paul D. Owens.

Robbins is a retired school ad-

Attorneys iron out final settlement in Sue Hamm case

Because the Rockcastle County School Board and former Superintendent Charles B. Parsons did not hire local guidance counselor Sue Hamm for the principalship at Mt. Vernon Elementary School in 1985, it is going to cost the board an estimated \$122,616.

During a called meeting last week, the board met for over 4 hours in executive session and voted to have their attorney offer the following settlement to Mrs. Hamm.

That she be placed at Brodhead Elementary School as assistant principal; that she be paid \$16,738 back pay for the Mt. Vernon job that she did not get; that she receive \$2,500 for dropping the political harassment part of her suit against the board and that the board pay her attorney's fee of \$45,000.

Also the board is going to pick-up \$25,000 of attorney Mary Noble's fees. Mrs. Noble was Parsons' lawyer. This is the portion not paid by the board's insurance.

The board will also be obligated to hire a replacement for Mrs. Hamm as guidance counselor which will cost them an estimated \$30,567. The board also agreed to pay an additional \$2,811 into the Kentucky Teachers Retirement System for Mrs. Hamm because of the extra back pay she will receive.

The board took this action after Federal Judge Stewart Newblatt ruled that Mrs. Hamm had been sexually discriminated against by the local system.

In making his remarks to the board, Tuesday night during the regular monthly meeting, Superintendent Jice Fowery said these figures were only a rough estimate and they might be a little less, depending on the board's insurance company. But he said the board needed to be ready to pay these expenses when the Judge issues the final order in the case. But both sides have agreed on this settlement.

Board member Kenneth Adams, who voted against allow-

Planned care center stalled

A planned Comprehensive Care Center on city-owned property on old Brodhead Road has apparently stalled over details of the agreement, at least temporarily.

The Mt. Vernon City Council at a called meeting was told the Federal Housing Authority has asked for a 60-day lease on the property instead of the council's proposal of 35 years with an option for renewal.

The council said "no" to the 60 years and re-stated its original proposal. The lease calls for payment of one dollar a year and the center will be responsible for sidewalks, street and sewer. The council also stressed once again, if the center changes locations the property will revert to the city.

The building would be about 4,500 square feet and cost an estimated \$200,000, according to Roland Mullins, executive director of the Cumberland River Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center at Corbin, which is the organization planning the building.

Currently, the local center

operates in trailers on east Main Street in Mt. Vernon. Included is an out-patient office, work adult habilitation program, and partial hospitalization. The pre-school

Tourism important to area Congressman Rogers says

Roark told those present the area has great potential and he will be available to help in any way he can in promotion projects.

The new association is named Southern Kentucky Tourism Development Association. Mrs. Ann Henderson of Mt. Vernon is the county's representative on the association.

Rep. Rogers also discussed a favorite program, "Forward in

the Fifth", that encourages youngsters to stay in school and graduate.

The representative said many people are involved in the effort and stressed the importance of the Grade Equivalence Degree (GED). "He said the area is leading in the number of GED graduates and encouraged those who do not have degrees from high school to pursue the program.

He said tobacco looks good this year and will hopefully sell well. He said there is strong sentiment in Washington against tobacco, but said the battle is still going on.

He agreed the so-called Sodbuster Bill has been a rip-off and he hopes it will be changed by Congress to protect "our people."

They That Passed By

One of the wonders of the crucifixion day was that people passed the crucified One by. Mark says, "And they that passed by railed at him, wagging their heads" (15:29). But before we hasten to sit in the Judge's chair, let us remember that the majority are still passing Him by today. We suggest three groups:

Those Who Want A Cross Without the Christ. It is possible to hold in reverence a symbol without the Savior. Some may clasp in their hand a miniature cross made of wood or gold, but that emblem will never atone for sin. It is Christ who redeems our souls with His precious blood through belief in and obedience to His word [Eph. 1:7; 1 Pet. 1:22-23]. A crucifix worn around the neck or clutched in one's hand will not atone for sin.

Those Who Want Christ Without The Cross. They want a conqueror, not a dying Lamb. They would cry, "Come down from the cross." Many desire a good example, or a great teacher, or a triumphant king. However, they would bypass the cross. Jesus said, "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross and follow me" [Matt. 16:24]. Bearing our cross identifies us with Jesus. 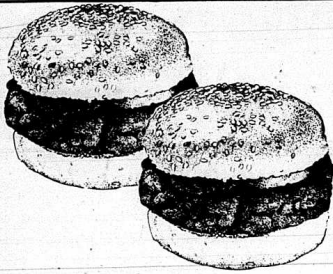

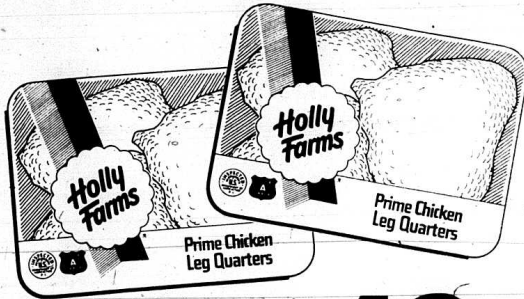

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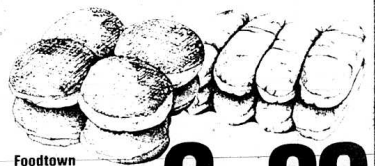
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Parents ask board to raise students' grades

Parents Dee and Janice Bond, Roberta McGuire and Barbara Rader asked the board why their three daughters' grades were not changing from F's to A's, as were other students earlier this summer.

Laurel Co. sells trash franchises

Five garbage collection franchises, worth an estimated \$300,000 annually to Laurel County, were sold by the Laurel Fiscal Court last week.

The five franchises were for five districts designated by the court. The franchises are based on a \$7 monthly fee for residential pickup.

The three girls apparently received P's for the six weeks for missing a Baccalaureate Service last May. The students were also not allowed to sing with the chorus at graduation, according to the parents.

All the parents in attendance contended that their children had legitimate excuses for missing Baccalaureate.

Superintendent Bige Towery told the board that although he felt the student grades should be handled at the school level, he had talked to Mrs. Wilcox and she had told him the circumstances from the two instances were completely different.

Towery told the board that Mrs. Wilcox was willing to enter into litigation if necessary and Bond told the board that he was prepared to do what it took

Fiscal court gives McCollum bid for voting booth at RES

The court did vote to place a dumpster at the courthouse for trash and garbage collection. Bie Garbage will collect the trash once a week for \$40 a month.

The court also gave a citizens group permission to apply through Cumberland Valley Area Development District for a grant to extend water service down Scaffold Cane Road to Macedonia and Clear Creek. The 4 1/2 mile water line would furnish water to about 40 or more customers.

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

Rockets blast Adair off gridiron for 2nd win 34-20

Rockets play at home Friday night

The Rockcastle Rockets traveled to Adair County last Friday night and brought home their second straight win of the season by defeating Adair County, 34-20.

The Rockets defense began the game looking a bit sluggish. The power running of Adair County's fullback seemed to more than the Rockets could handle. However, a few adjustments were made and any scoring threat came up short. Once the Rockets offense took over, they moved the ball effectively.

Behind the running of junior Mark Sowder and a 16-yard pass from quarterback Chris Larkey to Chuck Shields the Rockets scored on a 4-yard run from Sowder. Adam Coleman kicked the extra point and the Rockets led 7-0 with 5:11 remaining in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, the ball changed hands several times until midway through the quarter when the Rockets' offense began another scoring drive. On a 4th and 9 situation on the Adair 35 yard line, Sowder took the snap from Larkey and picked up 20 yards. Two plays later, Larkey

sneaked in for a second touchdown. Coleman's kick was good and the score at halftime was 14-0.

The Rockets received the kickoff to open the second half and Chris Larkey returned it up the right side for an 87-yard TD. Coleman's kick failed and the score was 20-0.

With only six offensive plays in the third quarter but with long gains, the Rockets scored twice. The first was set up by a 24-yard run by Kevin Rowe, then two good gains from Mark Sowder and then Chad Williams dove in for the score from the one-yard line. The two-point conversion fell short and the Rockets led was 26-0.

Adair County's offense got going in the third quarter, with the help of a few penalties, they moved the ball inside the 5-yard line. Their fullback scored on a 1-yard run and the two-point conversion was good, making the score 26-8.

The fourth quarter was highlighted by a 65-yard run by Williams that took the ball to the 6-yard line. On the next play, Williams powered his way into

the end zone and the score was 34-8 after Kevin Rowe went in for the two-point conversion.

Coach Larkey began substituting quite frequently with about 8 minutes to go in the game. "I felt that we had the game pretty well under control. In order to lessen the chances of getting anyone hurt, I began pulling the varsity out of the game," said Larkey.

Adair County had no problem scoring against the freshmen. Following their second touchdown, they tried an on-side-kick and recovered the ball and scored again.

"I probably would not have put the freshmen into the game if I had known Adair County was going to leave their varsity in. Allowing the two touchdowns did not bother me, but I was concerned about the safety of the freshmen playing against the varsity," said Larkey.

Rockcastle had a total of 283 yards rushing and 16 passing. Most of these rushing yards came from Sowder who carried the ball 20 times for 103 yards. Williams

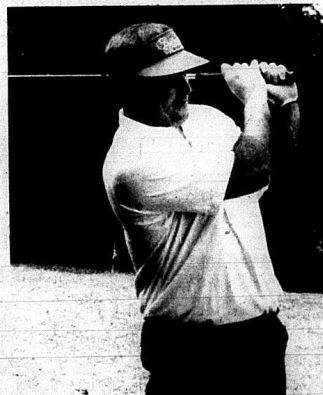
"That is the beauty of match play, you can make a 9 and forget about it, it is just one hole," he said.

Jim Clontz shot 3 under par on 11 holes Sunday.



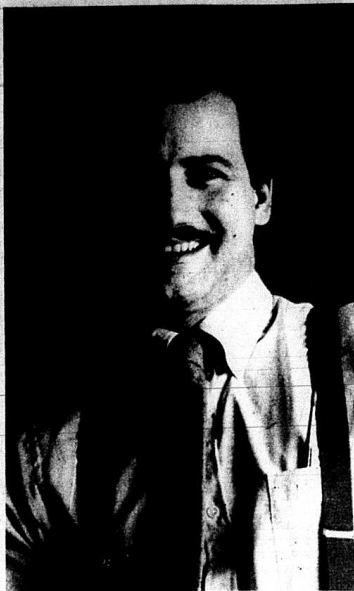

"The people who will appreciate this painting most are those who moved away and are deeply involved in the modern world, but can not forget their younger past at the foot of the Appalachian mountains," McFerron went on.

McFerron said that the print is as much as a landmark in comparison to his first limited edition print, "Mt. Vernon L & N Depot," because he is promoting this print nationally through

Brock-Kalvar, an advertising agency in Louisville.

Only 250 prints were made of the Mt. Vernon Depot. Those prints now sell for \$225. The first prints sold for only \$25.

"I remember when I painted the depot" he continued. "I had to borrow the money to get them printed at the bank. I had to sell 40 or so of them to break even."

McFerron sold 88 prints one day during the May Festival craft show on the lawn of the Rockcastle County Courthouse in 1979.

McFerron has also painted such Rockcastle County landmarks as the Livingston L & N Depot, the Old Mt. Vernon Court House and the Renfro

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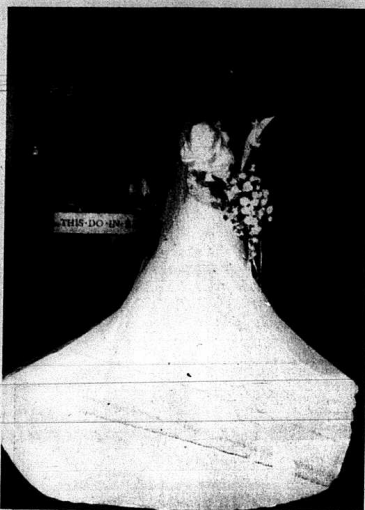

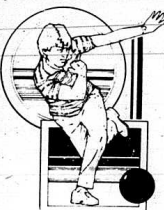
