Multiflora roses were once promoted to be the living fence as well as an ideal wildlife cover. Many farmers are finding that fields infested with this plant rapidly becomes a wildlife habitat as gateways grow closed by the living fence. Exteration, maybe, but when left uncontrolled, multiflora roses will creep out from fence rows taking acres of farm land out of production.

Controlling multiflora roses seems to be the big problem. When cut off by grubbing, bush hogging or a mowing machine, they come back. The key is in killing the root system. Chemicals are now available to control this problem with little danger of affecting other crops.

During late summer is an ideal time to control this noxious weed. The key to success is to apply chemicals to actively growing

KENTUCKY HOUSING CORPORATION BOARD MAKES ANNOUNCEMENT

A new permanent program called the Senior Homeownership Program was announced this week by the Kentucky Housing Corporation Board of Directors. The program enables borrowers aged 62 and above to purchase a home at a low, fixed interest rate for a term of twenty-five (25) years.

According to Executive Director F. Lynn Lualien, "The Senior Homeownership Program was approved by our Board of Directors in August of 1986 as a pilot program. During the first year, more than fifty senior citizens became new homeowners through the program. Due to the success and growing interest from our senior population, the Kentucky Housing Corporation will continue to provide housing

leaves. In our area, this means applying treatments before Japanese beetles have stripped the plant.

Chemicals like Round Up or Cross Bow when applied to the leaves will translocate to the root system killing the whole plant. Approximately 10-14 days after application the results will be seen.

For large areas, farm sprayers

may be needed. However, on small groups or single plants out in the field, small hand sprayers are fine. Mixing 2½ ounces of Round Up per gallon of water then applying complete coverage of the foliage along with 4-6 hours without rain is all that's needed.

Crossbow has the advantage of killing only broad leaf plants without killing the grass in treated areas. Mixture for Crossbow are 1½-2 ounces per gallon of water, however, continuous agitation is required.

Farmers wishing to control this weed are better equipped with new chemicals than in year's past.

Brodhead Methodist Church; a landmark

In 1896, Thomas S. Frith, gave the land on West St., in Brodhead for building a Methodist Church and Cemetery. On Thursday, May 28, 1897, at 6 p.m. the Brodhead Willing Workers Homemakers visited the forsaken building.

"As I entered this old building, memories of my childhood rush-

ed into my mind.

It wasn't the church of my choice, but the Brodhead inhabitants, attended the revivals and programs at all three churches, in our small town, which were, Baptist, Christian and Methodist.

They were our meeting places to see and visit our friends and acquaintances, as well as hear gospel sermons.

As a teenager, I knelt at this Methodist Church altar with my best friend Corinne Frith. I sang duets with Sally Brooks. I played the piano for some of the Christmas Programs. I sat in the

same antique benches that had weathered the wear of generations.

The only thing that wasn't familiar was the balcony with Sunday School rooms below it.

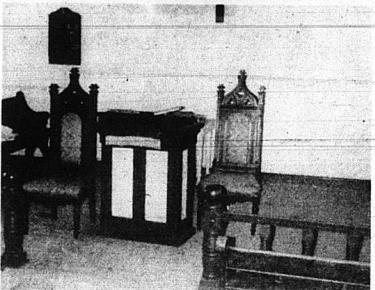

A Record book lay in full view on the elevated stand on the pulpit; a Communion service, covered with a cloth was on a small table, and two pulpit chairs stood tall nearby.

As the ladies walked up and down the aisle, a crunching sound could be heard now and then. They had stepped on dead bats. They had probably taken refuge in the building and flown in through broken windows.

As we left this landmark, I imagined I could hear Thomas S. Frith praying loudly, as he knelt at the altar and hear a congregation singing "Amazing Grace, how sweet the sound!"

Will this landmark be torn

down soon? It could be! I hope not.

be a goal of his for test scores to be raised at the upper level grades.

Presently the students scoring the highest on the Kentucky Essential Skills Test which is given each year, to the first, second, third and fourth graders. However, grades remain above the national average most generally through the eighth grade but when it comes to high school the results are a little different.

For example, students at the high school in the ninth grade, scored only one time with the national average. That score was a 50 in spelling. The rest of the areas tested, reading, math, writing, and library research reference, all scored below the national average. The lowest score came in the ninth grade, a 43.

In the tenth grade the lowest score recorded was also in reading, that of a 44. The highest score of 55 came in writing.

The tenth graders also scored above the national average in math and spelling. The total score for 10th graders at the Rockcastle County High School was 46, four points below the national level.

In the 11th grade at the high school, students scored only once above the national average and one other time with the national average. In writing students had scored 52, while in spelling they had a score of 50.

The lowest score of all the scores at the upper grade level was a 41 scored by the senior class and that was received in reading.

But the ninth grade had the lowest composite score of a 46, 4 points below the national average.

On a brighter side, students in the first grade in Rockcastle County School system, scored a 63 in math, 13 points above the national average in math.

In the second grade, they scored a 65, 15 points above the national average.

The highest score for the grade schools was in the sixth grade where students scored an amazing 69, 19 points above the national average in math.

As a whole, no class in the grade school scored less than the national average, total composite scores for students in the second grade were 51, students in the third grade were 57, and students in the fourth grade were 55.

The high point of the scores in the grade school came in the sixth grades where students had a total battery score of 62. Twelve points above the national average.

The high score in the grade schools was a 69 in the sixth grade in math where 189 students were tested.

In the fifth grade students had a total score average score of 53 while in the seventh grade the total average score was 57 and the total average score was 55 in the eighth grade.

Overall test scores were higher in the area of math than any other category in the grade school or the high school.

Indictments reported by grand jury

Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down 11 indictments last week for crimes ranging from murder to bribery of a police officer.

George Robert Cox, 34, of Sand Springs, was charged in the death of his brother, another Rockcastle County man, Wilburn (Hoss) Cox, who he allegedly set on fire near their home on July 15th.

"Hoss" Cox died at the University of Kentucky Medical Center approximately two weeks ago. Cox had been charged with assault, he is presently free on bond awaiting a Sept. 11 arraignment in Circuit Court.

Ohio man freed in district court

Payne was charged with the Oct. 13, 1986 shooting of Larry Randall Laswell, 22, of Mt. Vernon. The shooting occurred on Poplar Grove Road near the Pulaski County line in the Willailla community. Laswell died from two .38 caliber gunshot wounds to the chest.

Students score lower on scholastic test

Students in the first through the eighth grades in Rockcastle County School score higher than the students in the ninth through the 12 grades.

At last week's Rockcastle County Board of Education Meeting, Superintendent Bige Towery reported to the board that scores in the first through the eighth grade were higher than in the ninth through the 12th.

Although the state ranking had not been released, Towery reported to the board that he expects the school system to rank lower than they did a year ago from the test scores that he has received.

Students in the first through the eighth grade scored an average of 54.3 in reading and the national average is 50. In math the highest score was recorded and that was 60.13. In writing students scored an average of 55.25.

However in the ninth thru 12 grades, scores were not as high. For example, students in math, at the high school, scored only 48.50, in writing it was a little better with a score of 51.75.

The lowest score at the high school was recorded in reading, that was 45.00.

Towery told board members and parents Tuesday night that it was a national trend for scores to go down as children got older. He told the board that it was going to be

Petitions passed to reduce rates for sewer service

Petitions asking the Mt. Vernon City Council to lower the recently enacted sewer rate increase are being circulated in the city, according to several persons who have been asked to sign.

At least, about 42 persons have signed the petitions, one petitioner reported.

"I don't want my name used," the petitioner said. "I doubt it will do any good, but I'll do it anyway. These rates are hard on folks who have a fixed income like a lot of elderly people."

Some residents have reported residential sewer bills as much as \$50 and over.

The sewer rate is \$8.98 for the first 2000 gallons of water used, and an additional \$2.49 for each additional 1000 gallons. The water rate is \$4.50 for 2000 gallons as it has been for many years.

The combined sewer/water base rate is \$13.48 as compared to the past \$6.75 base rate.

Incidentally, the base water/sewer rate at Brodhead is \$13.65 for 2000 gallons or 75 percent of the water bill and has been that amount for a considerable time. At Crab Orchard, the base rate is \$10.87 for the first 1000 gallons of water used and \$1.87 for each additional 1000 gallons over the base rate.

For those who have asked: The first indications that a change in the sewer service would have to be made was in 1976.

At that time, the Kentucky Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) told the then council that effluent (run off) from the 20-year-old sewer plant was contaminating Town Branch which runs into Roundstone and on to the Rockcastle River and Lake Cumberland.

EPA mandated the city remedy the plant or face a heavy fine and a cut-off of all grant money from that day and in the future.

Engineers were hired and the project bid to satisfy the EPA. The low bid was \$1,924,407.

That familiar, down-home voice that greeted listeners to WRVK in Renfro Valley for the past 21 years has "retired."

At least that's what the owner of the voice, Pete Stamper, calls it when anyone asks about his reasons for leaving the station. And, there have been many calls and letters asking, whatever happened to Pete Stamper?

Pete's very much alive and well. After all, he's not really old enough to retire from a life of entertainment. In recent weeks he has been in fulltime public relations for the Renfro Valley Bandcamps, making tapes of the shows, performing on the bandcamps and making personal appearances.

Pete admits he felt sad about leaving all his radio listeners, but

decided it was time to move on to other things.

Speaking of other things, this summer, Pete was one of the headliners for two weeks at the Dollywood Music Festival at Pigeon Forge, Tenn. He traveled to Campbellsville to help judge the True Value Hardware County Music talent show. On July 17, Pete entertained about 3,000 fans at the Kentucky State Championship old time fiddler's contest at Leitchfield. A trip to Nashville and the Carter Family Festival in Virginia were on his agenda. Currently, he is promoting the Renfro Valley Bandcamp and Country Music Gathering scheduled on Oct. 9 through 11, and will be on Ponderin' Kentucky radio show to discuss his past travels with Dolly Parton when he opened her shows and acted as her road manager.

Over the years he had been on Red Foley's Ozark Jubilee and with Porter Wagoner. Pete was picked to fill the comedy spot on the first country music show to play the famed Fontainebleau Hotel in Miami Beach, Fla.

Pete came to Renfro Valley in 1950 for the first time with his boyhood buddy, Clarence Ray Williams. They did a kind of Homer and Jethro act and were billed as Clarence and Waldo. But the Army intervened, and he went to Korea for a year.

Early in 1952, Clarence and Waldo became members of the bandcamp. In 1954, Clarence left

the act to go into the ministry. Pete went to Springfield, Mo. with Red Foley. Incidentally, on Sept. 5 Clarence will be back for the homecoming weekend at Renfro Valley, the first time they have been together in 33 years.

Lair hired Pete to work for WRVK in 1965. Pete's plans were to work only for six months. The six months took care of the six months he took off in 1975 to tour with Dolly Parton.

In 1954, Pete married Minnie Lee Taylor of Brodhead. They have three children: Jeff, the oldest, at home; Tracy, who is with Appalachian Computer Service in Berea, and son, Britt, who is in the Navy Air Force on an aircraft carrier in the European area. Pete's mother, Mrs. Alta Eli, lives in his hometown of Dawson Springs.

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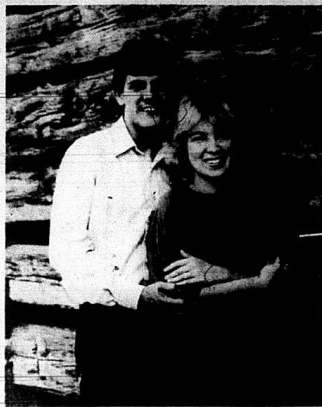

MOLASSES TIME IN ROCKCASTLE COUNTY

With fall weather comes sorghum making. Both will be up on before we know it. Making sorghum molasses has become a family ritual for some and a profitable business for others. This year, 'Lasses makin' is about three weeks ahead of normal.

Nutritionally speaking, molasses will stand above many other sweeteners. Two tablespoons has 85 calories, compared to 90 in 2 tablespoons of white sugar. It contains 274 milligrams of calcium, almost as much as in a glass of whole milk. Molasses has 6-10 mg. of iron, a fourth to fifth of the RDA of this mineral. It also is high in potassium, as four bananas, or six oranges.

Molasses can be used in a variety of ways. Add it to baked beans, barbecue sauce, an ice cream topping, or make peanut butter and molasses sandwiches. It can be substituted for honey or corn syrup measure for measure in recipes, but expect the flavor to be richer and more intense. Molasses can also be substituted for sugar for part of a recipe using 1/4 cup less liquid for each cup of molasses. Cakes and cookies made with molasses are moister and will improve after storing a few days.

MOLASSES COOKIES

1 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup sorghum molasses
1 cup fat (melted)
2 eggs (well beaten)
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon soda
3/4 teaspoon ginger
1/4 cup hot water
Flour to make soft dough (about 4 cups)
1 teaspoon vanilla
Mix the sugar, molasses, melted fat and eggs. Quickly mix soda with hot water and stir into molasses mixture. Add dry ingredients well sifted and vanilla.



Chill, roll, cut and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F). Chopped nuts may be sprinkled over the top before baking.

1 cup molasses
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup melted fat
1 egg (well beaten)
1 cup boiling water
1 1/2 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon ginger

 1/2 teaspoon allspice
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 1/2 cups flour
 Mix molasses, sugar, melted fat and well-beaten egg and beat until smooth. Add spices, salt and flour, sift into molasses mixture and stir until flour is just dampened. Quickly mix soda with hot water and pour into mixture. Beat until smooth. Pour into muffin tins or a shallow pan and bake in a moderate oven, about 25 minutes for muffin tins and 35 for shallow pan.

INDIAN PUDDING

4 cups scalded milk
 1/2 cups corn meal
 2 Tablespoons butter
 1 cup molasses
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon ginger
 2 eggs, well beaten
 Add meal gradually to scalded milk, stirring constantly, and cook in double boiler 20 minutes. Add the other ingredients and turn into pudding dish. Bake 1 hour in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) Serve with cream. (One cup of raisins makes a nice addition to the pudding).

MOLASSES BROWN BREAD

1 cup all-purpose flour
 1 teaspoon baking soda
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1 egg
 1 cup bran cereal
 1/2 cup seedless raisins
 1/2 cup molasses, dark or sorghum
 1/2 cup hot water
 Stir first three ingredients together. In a separate mixing bowl, beat egg until foamy. Mix cereal, raisins, shortening and molasses with egg. Add hot water, stirring until shortening has melted. Add the dry ingredients, mixing only until combined. Bake in a greased loaf pan at 350 degrees F for 45 minutes. Test the center of bread with a toothpick or knife to make sure it is done.

SHOO FLY PIE

1-3/4 cups flour
 1/2 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
 1/8 teaspoon salt
 1/4 cup margarine
 1 teaspoon baking soda
 1 cup boiling water
 1/2 cup molasses
 Preheat oven to 350°F. Line a 9" pie pan with pie pastry. Combine flour with brown sugar and salt. Cut in the margarine until the mixture resembles corn meal. Reserve 1 cup for the topping, and pour remainder into the pie shell. Add baking soda to the hot water, stir in the molasses and pour over the crumbs in the pie shell. Sprinkle reserved crumbs on top, and bake 40 to 50 minutes or until crust is browned and filling has puffed up. Serve warm.
 Yield: 8 servings

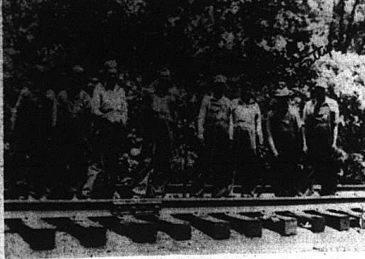

Former students and friends called him Mr. Bob. The high school annual referred to him as "teacher of many; friend to all."

Rockets crush Raiders 41-16 for third straight victory

McCreary Central started football as a varsity team this season and, after the Rockets got through with them Friday night, they may wish they had waited to schedule the Rockets as the Raiders from Whitley City were handed a 41-16 loss.

The win gives Rockcastle a 3-0 record for the season. McCreary Central, a district team, falls to 1-2.

The Rockets won the toss and elected to receive. On the kick return, Chris Larkey took the ball 20 yards to the Rockets 38 yard line. A 13-year-run by Chad Burdette and a 9-yard run by Chad Williams took the ball to the Raider's 38 yard line and then, on a keeper around left end, Larkey ran for the first touchdown of the game. Adam Coleman kicked the extra point to make the score 7-0.

A foreign exchange student at RCHS, who only received his eligibility to play the afternoon of the game, Martin Zukowski, kicked the ball to the Raiders' 10-yard line where a McCreary Central player fell to his knee and the Rockets had them backed up on their first series. McCreary Central was forced to punt and on the Rockets' first play from scrimmage, Larkey kept the ball on an option play around left end for a 48-yard TD. Coleman's kick was good again and the Rockets led 14-0 with 6:31 left in the first quarter.

McCreary began moving the ball with their possession. With the help of a 25 yard run and a 15 yard penalty against the Raiders, the Rockets moved to the Rockets' 16 yard line. However, the Rockets' defense held and they had to settle for 26-yard field goal, making it 14-3. The Rockets' offense couldn't get it moving on their possession and Larkey wound up getting caught in the end zone for a safety for the Raiders, making the score 14-5 as the first quarter ended.

In the second quarter, Rockcastle started another drive after Mark Sowder made a 20 yard gain and Dane Cox added 7 more. From the one yard line, Chad Williams punched his

way into the end zone. Coleman's kick was good to make the score 21-5 which gave the lead to the Rockets at half-time.

McCreary Central came back the second half throwing the ball. On a 43-yard-pass and another for 15 yards, McCreary Central had the ball on the Rockets' 8 yard line. This time, they didn't settle for a field goal as the quarterback sneaked over for the score from the 4 yard line on a third down. The Raiders' two-point conversion made the score 21-13. The Raiders' next score came following a Rocket fumble which put them in scoring range. However, the Rockets held on downs and the Raiders had to score with a 25-yard field goal, making the score 21-16.

Midway through the third quarter, following Williams' return of the kick-off to the 30-yard line and a 15 yard penalty against the Raiders, a switch in the backfield put Adam Coleman at quarterback and Larkey at tailback. Larkey was put to work with sweeps to the right and left. After picking up three first downs and having the ball on the McCreary Central 5 yard line, the Rockets were facing a fourth down situation. After discussing a field goal, Coach Larkey opted to go for the TD. "Nine times out of ten a field goal would have been my choice," Larkey said. "Coleman had already kicked three straight extra points but I had an instinct and the confidence in the team that they could make the TD." This time, his instincts and good faith were right. Chris Larkey took the pitch around right end for the score. Larkey said of Chris, "I know he has the speed and determination to pick up a crucial 5 yards, especially in a situation like this. Our backs were right out there with him, clearing a path for him." Coleman added the extra point to make the score 28-16.

The Rockets' next

possession came after an interception by Kevin Rowe on the Rockets' 49 yard line and, on the next offensive series, he ran for 41 yards to the McCreary Central 10 yard line.

After a 5 yard gain by Coleman and a 3 yard gain by Williams, Larkey scored again only to see a penalty nullify the score. Dane Cox immediately ran the ball to the 8 yard line on a reverse and, once again, Larkey was called upon. Larkey swept his right side for his fourth TD of the night and Coleman /kicked his 5th straight extra point of the game, putting the Rockets on top 35-16.

With four minutes left in the game, the Rocket JV's saw action. McCreary Central drove the ball to the Rocket's 5 yard line but came up short of a score when Micah Thompson intercepted a pass in the end zone and ran it all the way back for the score. Thompson's run was for 101 yards, a school record for RCHS. The two point conversion was not good but the Rockets went on to win the game 41-16. "I was very excited about Thompson's run," Coach Larkey said. "I love to see the JV's get to play in varsity games and when they come up with big plays like the one he made, it really puts the icing on the cake."

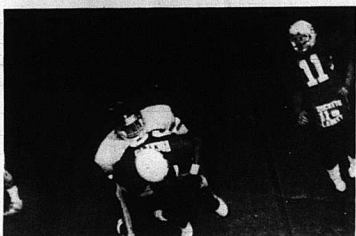

Brodhead council hears request for water service

A Brodhead area resident asked the Brodhead City Council Monday night to help obtain a loan or grant to furnish water to about eight residents on Hickory Grove Road.

Money Ed Cummins told the council the residents needed water badly and would like to try for a grant or loan from some government agency to help finance the project.

The length of the line is estimated at about 3,000 feet, but no recent cost estimate has been made.

Mayor Billy Bussell told Cummins and Mrs. Cummins, who accompanied him, that the city would be glad to help in any way possible, but doubted that the city could afford to do the project. He said he would seek the advice of James Cass, city consultant, on possibly loans and grants

available. The council instructed City Clerk Lajoie Graves to contact a representative of U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers to see if any funds might be available soon.

Last year, Mrs. Cummins came to the council to ask for water service to the area. At that time the council had a survey made that found the amount for the line to be about \$40,000, as best the councilmen could remember. They agreed another estimate would have to be made.

The area in question is outside the city limits and between lines owned by the city and those owned by the Western Rockcastle Water District.

During the meeting of the council, it was reported about 15 lots located in Hillview Subdivision (Profitright property) would be sold at auction. A tentative date is Oct. 10. The lots are on a recently blacktopped road.

Brush Creek Rd. to be resurfaced

The state will widen, place guardrail and resurface one-half mile of Ky. 1004, Brush Creek Road in Rockcastle County, Gov. Martha Layne Collins has announced.

"A strong transportation network is essential for safety, and is attained through consistent upgrading and repair," said Collins.

According to state Transportation Secretary C. Leslie Dawson, the project is estimated to cost \$97,000 and is being financed with Rural Secondary funds. Dawson noted that the project will be done by state forces and worked in the schedule as soon as time will permit.

Telephone customers can now choose long distance

Most Continental Telephone customers in Laurel, Knox, Pulaski, Clay and Rockcastle counties will have equal access to three long distance companies by Dec. 12.

Customers eligible for the new service will be receiving mail ballots for choosing a primary long distance company. They can choose from U.S. Sprint, AT&T and MCI.

Both Contel and the long distance companies prefer that customers make their choices and mail in their ballots as soon as possible. This will ensure that customers get the company of their choice and avoid being randomly assigned to a company.

With Equal Access, callers can dial "1" (or "O"), plus the area code and number, and call over the long distance carrier of their

choice. Today, dialing "1" (or "O") plus the area code will still be with AT&T. Lengthy access codes must be dialed to gain a connection with any other long distance company where available.

Continental party-line, coin or charge-a-call phones will not be part of the equal access process. Long distance calls for these exceptions will continue to be handled as they are now.

Contel is providing equal access so its customers may take advantage of competition in the long distance business. After a federal court ordered Bell Telephone companies to provide equal access, Contel arranged for several long distance companies to provide comparable prices -- and competitive pricing -- for Contel customers.

"It is important for Contel customers to choose a long distance company right away," said Bill Dezarn, superintendent -- telephone services for this area. Customers who don't send a ballot will be assigned to one of the participating long distance companies. Assignment is at random, based on how many people signed up with participating long distance companies. "If 20 percent of those who do not make a choice will be assigned to Company A, and 75 percent to Company B, and so on," Dezarn said.

Customers who don't make a choice will be notified of the long distance company they are assigned to. They will also get a second ballot -- the chance to choose a different long distance company -- at no charge. Customers who still make no choice will remain with the assigned company until they tell Contel otherwise.

Contel has no monthly charge for equal access and no charge to sign up for the first time, as long as it is done before Oct. 13, 1987. Equal access works on both rotary and touchtone phones, and no in-store visit is required for hookup.

Bill Dezarn said, "This is the first time Contel customers have had a chance to shop around among several long distance companies for the rates and services they prefer."
