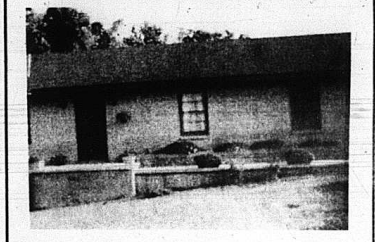

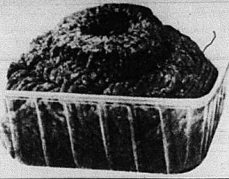

## Ambulance service sets new policy

From now on, critically ill patients will be transported to the nearest hospital for evaluation even if the family wishes the patient to go to another facility for hospitalization.

Such is a new policy initiated by the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service.

Service officials noted the need for hurried observation and examination by a doctor and an appropriate medical stabilization.

The policy was contained in a written notice from Tom Welch, chairman for the service; C.B. Owens, treasurer; Wayne Stewart, hospital administrator, and David Pensol, board member.

"The decision for this rests entirely with the ambulance attendant and not the medically untrained family," the report stated. "Therefore, any condition that could result in loss of life or limb of the patient should the ambulance continue will be covered by this policy."

The notice continued: "The patient will continue to have the right to be transported to any hospital once the doctor evaluates the patient and clears

## Robert Payne not guilty

A Rockcastle County Circuit Court jury deliberated for almost three hours last Wednesday before they acquitted Robert Earl Payne of murder.

Payne and his attorney, Carl Cloncz, contended during the two day trial that Payne was acting in self-defense when he killed Larry Randall Laswell, 22, of Mt. Vernon, last October.

Laswell died from two .38 caliber gunshot wounds to the chest, on Poplar Grove Road in the Willalla Community of Rockcastle County near the Pulaski County line.

Payne, 42, of Route 1, Brodhead, testified that Laswell had threatened to kill him on more than one occasion and that the day of the shooting Laswell blocked the road on him and had a gun and a ball bat in his car, at the time of the shooting.

Deputy Sheriff Delno McClure, as did other witnesses, testified that Laswell told him he was going to kill Payne.

## Boat dock to stay open

For the first time, the Lake Linville boat dock will remain open the year round, operator Jimmy Hale informed the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday.

Hale reported he will remain open even though "overall business is very slow," but he added he has hopes business will be better next year.

Hale reported to the council 341 boats were launched between Aug. 1 and Sept. 1 with a total of \$341 payable to the city.

Launches were down from the past month by 111 which is six less boats launched per day.

The council was also told a state biologist from the Fish and Wildlife Division has checked Lake Linville because of alga and grass that is beginning to be a problem in the water.

The biologist recommended the council purchase alga and grass-eating carp to take care of the problem.

The council approved the recommendation and purchased 325 grass carp at \$5.50 each to be placed in the lake at a total cost of \$1,787.50. A screen will be placed over the overflow channel to keep the fish in the lake.

The council was told it was unlikely the fish will be caught since their food source is alga and grass.

## Bizarre sex case ends with two sentenced

When Jack Morgan rented former Bank of Mt. Vernon Vice President Bill James' house on High Street in Mt. Vernon in 1985, little did people know that in September a Rockcastle County Grand Jury would indict Morgan for rape and sodomy.

Jack Morgan, alias George Jack Mudiech, pleaded guilty Friday in Rockcastle Circuit Court to rape and sodomy.

Circuit Judge Daniel Venters sentenced Morgan to four years in that penalitentiary.

According to Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs, the case began early in 1985 when Morgan rented the house on High Street.

Morgan became acquainted with several people in the Red Hill Area and "I guess gained their confidence," Boggs said.

Boggs explained that Morgan was living with a Katherine Torok in the High Street house. Torok pleaded guilty to sodomy, which she had been charged with from the same case and was sentenced to one year.

All the charges stemmed from incidents involving a girl from Red Hill who was under 16 years of age.

According to the indictment, Morgan and Torok engaged in deviant sexual intercourse with the young girl at the High Street house.

Boggs said that police were made aware of what was going on

after the child had been placed in a foster home. The detective said that the foster parents contacted employees at the State Human Resources Department who in turn contacted police.

According to Boggs, the child told her foster parents what Morgan and Torok had been doing to her.

"The child's mother and stepfather also went to the F.B.I. in London after they became aware of the rape and sodomy," Boggs said.

"There was more to the case than just the rape and sodomy," the detective said. Morgan and Torok were also trafficking in cocaine, he noted, which became a federal matter after they learned the two were carrying cocaine across state lines," Boggs said.

The two were apparently carrying cocaine between their Mt. Vernon home and a Ft. Wayne, Ind., house, according to Boggs who said that both Torok and Morgan were found guilty in Federal Court on the drug charges.

A first police arrested Torok, 28, and Morgan, 56, F.B.I. agents and local police searched the High Street house.

"We found some pretty incriminating evidence, including photographs of the sexual activities that had been taking place," Boggs said.

Both Morgan and Torok are in the Rockcastle County jail awaiting transfer back to Federal prison. Morgan is serving time in Rochester, Minn. and Torok is in a federal penitentiary in Morgantown, W. Va.

## Council agenda lengthy

It was a 20-item agenda that faced the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night, an agenda that had mostly faced the council previously.

The expected protest over recently enacted sewer rates did not materialize, and no petitions were given to the council. Former Councilman Oscar Bullock told the council the rates were a burden on the city, but the council offered no immediate solution.

The council was told the newly completed sewer plant would have to have an additional dechlorination unit to clear the effluent coming out of the plant. It was estimated the unit could cost as much as \$20,000 of which 55 percent could be funded from a grant. Engineers reported the Army Corps of Engineers and the Environmental Protection Agency had made the determination to add the unit.

An ordinance annexing a section of Chestnut Hills Subdivision was given a first reading by the council. There will be one more reading before the annexation ordinance is final.

The council was told Mary Ida Jones had paid her water bill, and she has agreed, if no further action was taken by the council in the future, she would not involve the city in a lawsuit. The council also agreed.

Mrs. Jones had claimed her deed allowed the city to cross her land with water lines and exempted her from paying a water bill. The council had disagreed.

The council had to re-evaluate a recent purchase of a city police car from Owens Chevrolet in Danville for \$11,960. The Owens bid was the lowest of three submitted last month, but the council

found the Owens bid was on a 1987 Chevrolet and the others bid on a 1988 auto.

Owens said the company was unable to furnish a 1987 car but would furnish a 1988 model for \$12,532, still the lowest of the three original bids. The council accepted the Owens bid.

The council approved payment of \$200 to CSX Railroad for annual rent on the former depot parking lot. Also, the council agreed to allow the VFW post at Lake Linville to add an extra parking area adjacent to the post.

Post personnel will do the necessary work, including graving.

A representative of USF&G Insurance Co., told the council his company has life insurance available to city employees at a group rate if at least five employees agree to take it. The council will study the proposition. Norton Insurance Agency is the company's agent here.

## Council names assistant chief

City Policeman Bill Mink was appointed assistant police chief at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

The appointment was made at the request of Police Chief Joe Howard who told the council someone was needed to make decisions when it was his day off or he was unavailable.

In a related police action, the council approved the transfer of city policeman Tyrone Gray Jr., from the police department to the sewer plant. Gray had asked for the transfer.

The council scheduled a called meeting for 7 p.m. Friday to discuss other business related to the police department.

I haven't written anything about this in this particular column because I have done so in the past and the ruling and what has happened since.

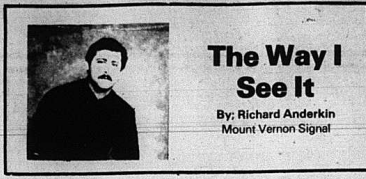
Unless you have been out of

# Rockets make Pirates walk the plank with 32-0 victory



## Larkey's best start at Rockcastle

Rockcastle County traveled to Berea Friday night with the hopes of a win and the best start for head coach Tom Larkey since coming to Rockcastle.

A large crowd from Rockcastle followed the Rockets to Berea and they were not disappointed as the Rockets crushed the Pirates 32-0 for their fourth win of the year.

The Rocket fan support, which outnumbered the Pirate fans, got their money's worth. The Rockets handed the Pirates of Berea their worst loss of the season. Coach Larkey commented that the support at the game was outstanding. "The team couldn't believe the crowd that came to see them play. "Just before we took the field, the team said 'let's win this one for all those people from Rockcastle Co. that are sitting over there,'" Larkey said.

The first quarter was a nightmare for the Rockets, according to Coach Larkey. Even though Berea was held scoreless, it seemed they had many chances. Rockcastle was penalized time and again in crucial situations. The worst of these came when Berea was forced to punt. The punt was blocked and recovered by Chad Williams at Berea's 35 yard line but an illegal participation penalty nullified the play and gave Berea a first down. A personal foul put Berea in good field position on the Rockets' 38 yard line as the first quarter ended.

Early in the second quarter, Rockcastle began moving the ball but a fumble by Berea put the Pirates' in good field position again on the Rockets' 25 yard line. However, beginning with the start of the second quarter, the tempo of the game changed. Senior Chris Larkey intercepted a Berea pass in the end zone and ran it back for the touchdown.

This interception TD return for 101 yards was the second for the Rockets in as many weeks as Micah Thompson did the same thing last week against McCreary Central.

The extra point was wide to the left but Rockcastle led 6-0 with 9:16 left in the second quarter.

On the next series, Berea was forced to punt. It was blocked by Bobby Hayes and Chad Williams recovered the ball on the Berea 7 yard line. On second down, Williams scored from the 7. The two-point conversion pass was incomplete and the Rockets led 12-0.

Berea, who had failed to gain a first down in the entire second quarter, was again forced to punt by a stingy Rocket defense. The Rocket offense took over and Chad Williams began to power his way through the line for gains of 12, 7, 8 and 3 yards before a pass went off the fingertips of Pete Harrison in the end zone at the end of the first half of play. But the Rockets took a 12-0 lead to the locker room at halftime.

The second half saw the same stingy Rocket defense and a greedy offense go to work. Berea was held to a single first down in the third quarter. Running back Mark Sowder and quarterback Chris Larkey provided most of the damage to the Berea defense as the two moved the ball down the field.

"The offensive line was executing their blocks like clockwork," says Coach Larkey. "In viewing the game film, I was extremely proud of our small linemen blocking the much larger defensive line of

Berea." With 56 seconds left in the third quarter, Leslie Scaif took the ball in for the score on a 13 yard run. The kick was no good but the Rockets were up 18-0. The Rockcastle defense did give up yardage beginning in the 4th quarter, but held on their 20 yard line. The Rocket offense took over on their own 20 and drove the ball down the field, behind the running of Sowder, Williams and Larkey.

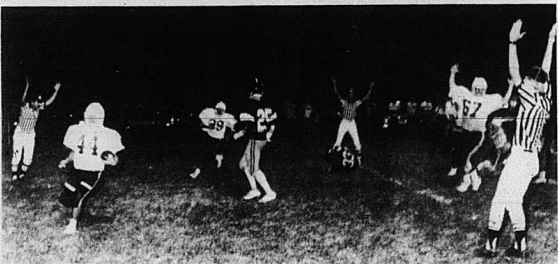
With 4:18 to go in the fourth, Williams scored from the 15 yard line. The extra point kick by Adam Coleman made the score 25-0.

On the next series, a fumble was picked up by Dane Cox for a gain of 25 yards. And, on the next play, with 24 seconds left, Chad Burdette sprinted into the end zone for a seven yard run and the TD. Coleman's kick was good for a score of 32-0.

On defense, Chad Hodges notched 7 solo tackles and 6 assists. Pete Harrison had 6 solos and 7 assists and Chad Williams, 7 solos and 4 assists.

Leading rushers were Chris Larkey, 9 carries for 97 yards. Chad Williams picked up 89 yards in 13 carries and Mark Sowder averaged 5 yards a carry for a total of 50 yards.

The Rockets will play at home Friday night, Sept. 18 against Lynn Camp. Game time is 8 p.m.

# "Mo-Par Fans" rev up their pride and joy at Clay City strip

They're called—the "Mopar fans," and every Saturday they rev up their pride-and-joy cars and head for Clay City to race for trophies on the drag strip.

One of the fans is Frankie Ashcraft of Mt. Vernon, who regularly wheels his 1973 Dodge Challenger to the track to try his luck.

He often comes home with a trophy and he has several to show his friends. His most recent trophy came last Saturday when he won the eliminator race at Clay City, his only win ever in an eliminator race. His time was 16.31 seconds, reaching 32 miles and hour in the quarter-mile race.

Although Ashcraft now drives his own car he has driven for others in the past. In fact, he has won about 25 trophies driving for others as well as himself.

Now a racing veteran of over three years, he remembers well when it all began and why.

"I thought it would be fun," he said. "I got into drag racing after I decided to give up riding up and down the streets. It just seemed to be more fun. Although it may not mean a lot of money, it is still my favorite pastime."

And apparently to several others who make up the Mopar fans, meaning they all drive Chrysler autos and use Mopar spare parts: All have won countless trophies for their efforts.

They include, according to Ashcraft, Paul Payne of Pine Hill, driving a 1970 Plymouth Barracuda; Jessie Doan who drives a Dodge Dart; Frankie Hensley driving a 1964 Plymouth; Melvin Cromer driving a 1969 Dodge Dart, and Lonnie Dillingham also driving a 1969 Dodge Dart.

"In the past, I have driven more for others than for myself," Ashcraft related. "And I still like to drive for others."

He works on his own car a V-8 with a 318 horsepower engine and a two-barrel carburetor to make sure it's ready for racing, and drives it to the strip. Most of the others haul their cars on trailers.

What can go wrong in a race? "Everything, but nothing special," he replied. "It could be a spin, a faulty carburetor, a bad transmission, or a plug breakdown. Just about anything that you're not expecting."

Ashcraft said he did not race for money. "Some of them do, but I don't. I don't have a sponsor."

What's the most fun about drag racing? "The best part is bustin' Chevys and Fords," he said with a grin. "Nerve-wracking? 'Not to me, and I've never had an accident,' he said. But his wife, Carol, does get a little nervous from time to time. "But I like to see him win," she said. "So I go along with him and watch with the others from the sidelines."

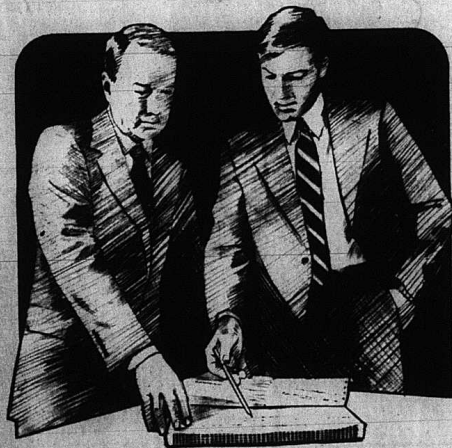

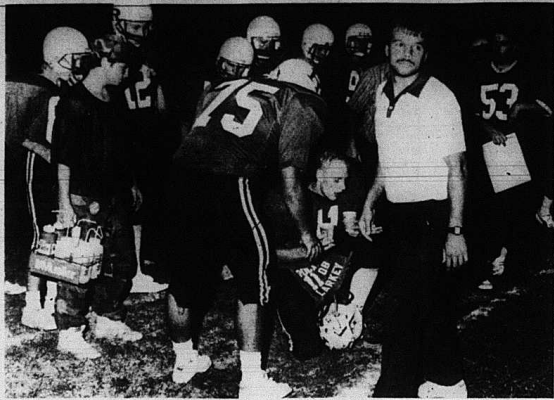

pay her \$2,500 to drop that suit. The board also voted to pay Mrs. Hamm's attorney fees in the amount of \$43,850.99. The board also voted to pay \$2,011.72 into the Kentucky Teacher Retirement System to coincide with the extra back pay.  
The local board also voted to adopt the hiring procedure for administrative positions as outlined in the court order from federal judge Eugene Siler.  
The board's new hiring procedure shall consist of a personnel committee appointed by the Superintendent. The committee will consist of five certified employees, when an administrative vacancy occurs. The vacancy is to be advertised locally and within the school system thirty days before the vacancy is filled. In the event of an emergency the thirty-day requirement may be waived at the discretion of the committee. Before the position is filled, the committee shall obtain applications, interview applicants and make suggestions to the superintendent. The majority seat on the committee shall rotate from vacancy to vacancy.

**Roads to Heaven?**

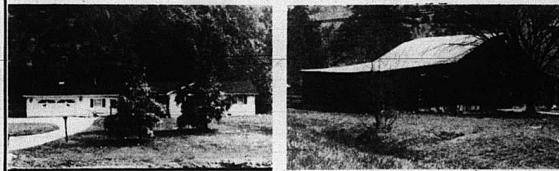

Jesus said in John 14:6, "I am the WAY, the TRUTH, and the LIFE: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me."
