Burdette, Norton are commended

Rockcastle County High School has been notified that Leslie Norton and Tracy C. Burdette have been designated Commended Students in the 1988 National Merit Scholarship Program and will receive a Letter of Commendation in recognition of outstanding academic promise. The principal, Ronnie Cash, announced today that these seniors placed in the top 50,000 of more than one million participants in the 33rd annual Merit Program.

A spokesman for National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) of Evanston, Illinois, which conducts the competition,

pointed out that being designated a Commended Student in the Merit Program is an accomplishment of which both the student and the high school may be especially proud. High performance in this rigorous competition is indicative of exceptional scholastic ability, which schools play an important role in developing. It is hoped that recognition of these young men and women will add to their motivation to pursue higher education and to become productive adult citizens in a society that values talents such as theirs.

Participants entered the cur-

rent Merit Program by taking the PSAT/NMSQT in October 1986, when most of them were juniors. Although their qualifying test scores are high, the 35,000 young people throughout the nation who are Commended Students scored slightly below the level required for Semifinalist standing in their respective states. Only the 15,000 Semifinalists, whose names were announced on September 16, will continue in the competition for some 6,000 Merit Scholarships to be awarded in the Spring of 1988.

The teams competing in the game on Oct. 1 were Lincoln, Laurel, Garrard, and R.C.H.S. It

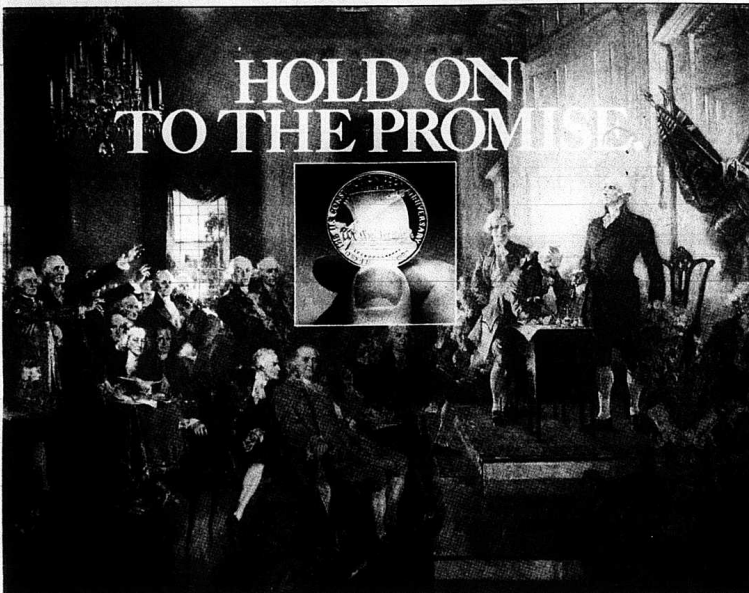
took place at Garrard County High School in Lancaster.

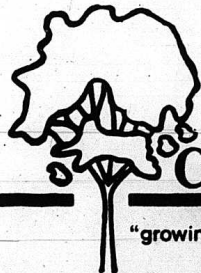

Scholarship assistance provided by ARC group

Fifth District, Congressman Harold Rogers and U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell have announced that the Appalachian Regional Commission has approved a \$50,000 grant to help provide scholarship assistance to worthy students in eastern Kentucky.

The lawmakers said the money will be made available to Appalachian school districts in the region, who will be required to compete for the funding through the Kentucky Department of Education. Each local school district will be required to match the funding, which will allow the entire program to award 75 scholarships of \$1,000 each. The scholarships can be used to pay for trade school, professional school, community or four-year college tuition, or other institutions which train young people for jobs.

"Each school district in our region will be able to compete for this funding," said Rogers and McConnell. "This program will allow at least 15 districts the opportunity to offer five \$1,000 scholarships to worthy students. This is a pilot program which hopefully can be continued in the future."

There are huntable populations of resident and migratory woodcock and snipe in Kentucky, according to Jeff Sole, upland game program coordinator for the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, and the season should be fair to good in most areas.

While woodcock and snipe populations peak in Kentucky during the hunting season, these birds breed in the state from February to April. The woodcock is well known for its spring mating and courtship ritual, and in addition to being considered a game bird is valued highly by bird watchers for its most entertaining and unique courtship antics.

2. They have protective gear and they're prepared to get hit. Basketball players have no kind of protective uniforms and they're not supposed to get hit, but they do, don't they? It's rough competition.

Mothers lighten up or daddy's, which ever one it is. I know you have allowed your child to own and ride a bicycle, and I know some time or other they've had wrecks. It is scary sometimes but the Youth Football League may be missing your boy's best talent if you don't allow him to try the sport of football! Also sports might keep him out of some trouble in the future and might cause him to want to finish high school.

to our children. With all of children's exposure to TV, milk cartons, and other public billboards, some kids may have come to believe they are members of an endangered species. What does all the publicity mean to the children themselves?

In a recent study of 3th graders in the midwest 49 percent thought having someone grab them was their biggest concern; 59 percent were afraid to be friendly with strangers; and 44 percent thought it likely or very likely that they

would be abducted.

Have we gone too far in publicizing the problem and created unwarranted fears in our children? Certainly the problem is real and children need to avoid unnecessarily dangerous situations.

However, a look at the facts may be a little reassuring to children; 90 percent of the 1.5 million reported missing children are teenagers who have voluntarily run away from home. These runaways of course need help,

but it is really a different issue than being kidnapped. About 90 percent of the remaining cases involve non custodial parents taking them to live with them. Again, this is a problem, but usually they are living with a

parent who loves and provides for them. Only about 1 percent of missing children are really abducted, or about 4000 to 7000 per year in this country.

I do not mean to minimize the problem of missing children. It

just seems that we should put things in perspective for our children. They are still many times more likely to die from not wearing seat belts or being careless in traffic than at the hands of a kidnapper.

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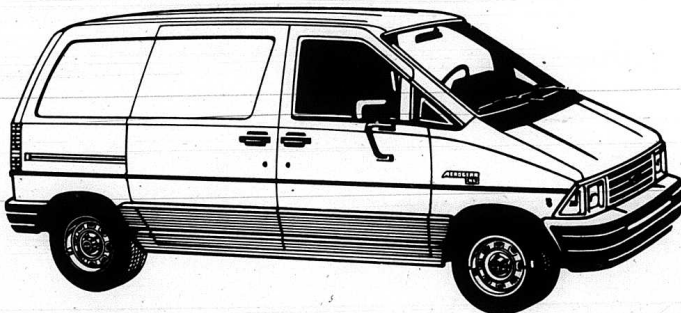

The lots are on a blacktopped street and are part of a total of 37 in the subdivision, the remainder of which will not be sold.

For those who think they have big water bills, consider a bill the council was told about at the meeting.

A representative of Ms. Karen Vafamond asked the council to make some kind of financial arrangements on her \$372 one-month water bill.

Ms. Vafamond, who had a water line leak between her

Country music fans of Loretta Lynn, Ricky Skaggs and Tom T. Hall will have an opportunity to hear them free when their train stops at London and Berea on Monday, Oct. 19.

Court gets garbage letters

Twenty-six letters from freshmen students at Rockcastle County High School have been sent to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and Judge Executive Hubert Thacker asking the court to order their class to discuss, as one letter stated, "our terrible problem" with garbage.

The letters were handed first to Magistrate Jack Bradley in whose district the high school is located, and then to the court at its regular session Tuesday.

The magistrates and Judge Thacker did not discuss the letters during the meeting.

When questioned about the letters, Bradley said he was surprised to get them, and he guessed at least someone would visit the class during November. He said he was willing.

It had been rumored in recent days that the letters were being composed in Mrs. Nancy Mullins' class, so it did not come as a surprise when the letters finally surfaced.

The 26 letters were similar in composition and all were an invitation. A typical letter said:

"We would like for you to come and talk to our class about our solid waste plan. We are concerned about illegal dumping. If you don't mind, we will video tape you and show it to other

classes."

Bradley did not comment on the video taping.

Currently, the county's solid waste management plan, passed several months ago by the court, is not being implemented. Persons disposing of garbage take it to a garbage station at Burr and at Renfro Valley. Livingston has its house-to-house garbage pick-up. Reportedly, there have been other garbage pick-ups in the county.

The county plan, drawn up at a cost of \$13,000 by the Cumberland Valley Area

Jail work halted over door problem

The renovation and expansion at the Rockcastle County Jail has reached a snag, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court was told at its regular meeting Tuesday.

McKnight and Associates of London halted construction and informed the court that two doors in the present jail that were to have been used in the new section do not fit the door facings that have been purchased and already installed.

The contractor estimated the two new doors will cost \$3,910.

McKnight also suggested adding some other items to the planned work that were not in the original contract. They included:

Removal and replacement of insulation on steam pipes at a cost of \$1,115; installation of a different type ceiling in the storage room to make it more secure at a cost of \$471; change shower heads at \$300 and repair conduits and install an intercom system at \$1,980.

Totally, the additional cost to the county would be \$7,222 added to the \$86,690 project.

The court, unhappy with the turn of events, voted to call in the contractor; a representative of

the Corrections Cabinet, likely Brad Black, and a representative of the Lexington architect firm of Chrisman, Miller and Woodrum. However, the architect firm is no longer employed by the county. The firm was not consulted further after they presented the jail plans to the court. The county still owes the firm \$1,100.

One magistrate called the additional cost of the doors a "rip off," and said, he believed the state or the contractor should be responsible.

"Let's just call them all-in at a special meeting and get to the bottom of it all," the magistrate said.

The jail project calls for additional jail cells, a drunk tank and a visiting and recreation area, all required by the Corrections Cabinet. The cabinet told the court earlier to remedy the jail or "close it and transport prisoners to other facilities."

Jailer Billy Kirby told the court he hoped work could begin again soon since the county is losing money by not being able to house prisoners, especially federal prisoners.

The court did not set a date for a called meeting during its Tuesday session.

Health care highlights meeting

Services offered by the Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center at Mt. Vernon were summarized at a community meeting Tuesday night at the Rockcastle County Library.

About 50 persons attended the meeting which was highlighted by talks from various persons who are associated with the several projects.

Some of the projects are listed below.

Outpatient--For those who are troubled, depressed, or anxious, for people having problems coping with situations in their lives, for those whose marriages are less than they want them to be, for emotionally disturbed, and for the more seriously ill patient who is stabilized on medication, our outpatient clinic in Mt. Vernon is located on East Main Street.

Inpatient--For short term therapy we utilize the services of the inpatient unit at the

Southeastern Ky. Baptist Hospital in Corbin. For long term therapy, clients are referred to Eastern State Hospital in Lexington. Contact Beverly Richards or Elizabeth Baker for information.

Partial Hospitalization--For the person who is in need of fairly intensive mental health services but is not in need of full-time hospitalization, our Partial Hospitalization Program is available. Clients are carefully screened into the program on the basis of their needs and ability to benefit from this type of treatment. Meets daily and provides group and individual therapy, music and recreation therapy, and chemotherapy. Contact Beverly Richards or Jill Walls for information.

Emergency--During regular office hours telephone or walk-in emergency service is available at our local office. An emergency telephone answering system is in

effect after regular office hours. The emergency number is (606) 528-7010 and may be called collect. The number may also be obtained by calling the regular Center phone number after office hours.

Alcohol and Drugs--Provides assistance to people unable to control the use of alcohol and drugs. Available to any individual of any age experiencing problems. Services include crisis intervention, individual therapy, group therapy, and inpatient services (Corbin). Contact David Henderson for information.

Consultation and Education--Removing the stigma from mental illness and emotional disturbance is a primary goal of the Consultation and Education program. Emphasis is given to prevention and early treatment. In attempting to prevent serious mental health problems from developing and, when they do

Dear Editor,
This scenario is rather lengthy but is all relevant to my complaint. I have in my possession two "Bad or Cold" checks in the amount of \$1,500, each that were written and signed by Howard Gosser, general manager of WRVK of Mt. Vernon. These checks were payments on supplies used, services rendered from my studio and musicians used for a recording session that party involved used in December of 1986.

After six months of trying to collect what was owed from the party involved it was obvious that he had no intention of paying me or even making a check good he gave me as payment. In June of this year I drove to Mt. Vernon (450 miles) to see what I could do about the "Bad" check. I spoke to James Lambert, County Clerk for Rockcastle County. He informed me that the "Bad" check was a felony and that I could present it to the Grand Jury for indictment on the party involved when the next Grand Jury was in session. Mr. Lambert suggested that I talk to the party involved and tell him that it was a felony and should make the check good. I did talk with the party involved and he asked me if I would give him two weeks to pay me in full and not before the next Grand Jury. He eventually agreed and two weeks later I received the second worthless check from him.

In August, I called—Mr. Lambert once again and explained to him what had happened since the last time I saw him. He once again told me that I had a felony charge against the party involved and should present them to the Grand Jury for indictment. I told him that I wanted to proceed with that action and he told me to contact Benny Hamm, who was the felony prosecutor for Rockcastle County. I contacted Mr. Hamm's office and was told to be present at the Rockcastle County Courthouse at 9 a.m. on Aug. 28, 1987 to appear before the Grand Jury. I drove to Mt. Vernon again on the 28th as told and presented my two worthless checks to Mr. Hamm before the court session started and requested that a warrant be issued against them to the Grand Jury for a felony against the party involved. Mr. Hamm took me into an office and asked me, "What is your case?" I stated that the worthless checks were, my case. He then said, "I told you what your case is, you tell me what you have." I then told Mr. Hamm that I was not an attorney and could not quote laws to him but that I had been advised by James Lambert and the people in his own office that a warrant should be a felony in Kentucky and that I needed to present them to the Grand Jury for indictment against the party involved today.

I also stated that I knew that in my home state of Alabama that a "Bad" check is a felony. He then looked up at me and said, "You're not in Alabama," and literally laughed in my face. He then said, "Someone in my office said that someone from Alabama was coming up here." I then told Mr. Hamm if he was telling me that anyone in Kentucky could write worthless checks and it was not illegal. Mr. Hamm said, "Because you did not receive the checks at the time the services were rendered that is why you are in Kentucky and that was the way it was." I then asked Mr. Hamm if the checks I had in my possession which were worthless and were for \$1,500 each constituted any criminal violation in Kentucky. He said, "No, because I do is try to get your money in Civil Court and that's all. You do not have a felony violation." He then made some derogatory remarks concerning the Gospel recording session that was involved and the preacher that had recorded the album.

I was quite disturbed at this point knowing that the checks I had were illegal. It was obvious that Mr. Hamm was ignoring the law and was not interested in doing anything to help me do because I was not an attorney and could not quote the laws to him. I then left to see Mr. Lambert again but he was out of town. I then saw another attorney in Mt. Vernon by the name of Jim Clontz who relayed the whole story to him and he stated that I did have a felony charge on the party involved and read to me

two laws to substantiate my case. He said he did not understand why Mr. Hamm did not allow me to present them to the Grand Jury but that he would talk with him and see what the problem was.

I then left Mr. Vernon and drove to the Capitol to file my complaint with the Attorney General and Mr. Hamm's gross dereliction of duty and unprofessional behavior. I was advised by the Attorney General's office, after my complaint to write to the Bar Association also. It is sad to know that an attorney and sworn elected official would ignore the law for a friend or for any reason. When does the victim get justice? This kind of dealing in our judicial system must be stopped. Mr. Benny Hamm displayed a gross dereliction of duty as a County Prosecutor for Rockcastle. I feel that he should not hold such an honorable office as County Prosecutor anymore because he makes a mockery of that position.

"As an elected official in my hometown, I pray that no one ever comes to the state of Alabama and is treated with the disrespect that I was by Mr. Benny Hamm. I have never witnessed such disregard for mankind and the laws of our land."

The last Fiscal Court wasted thousands of dollars on preliminary work for a county landfill. Feeling pressure and an upcoming county election, the old

O.K. so the problem was left with the present fiscal court. So what, they are elected officials and they assumed the county's problem when they took office.

They have been in office almost two years now, and they haven't done anything about the situation except make it worse in my opinion.

The fiscal court led us to believe that as soon as their new budget went into effect, garbage service would resume. Well their new budget went into effect July 1, 1987. Unless I am badly mistaken I haven't seen any kind of service provided by the county. I guess the court just thought that no one would notice their lack of action.

Garbage collection is becoming a serious problem, no doubt. But if something isn't done very soon it is going to be an ever bigger problem. Like the possibility of fines by the state of up to \$1,000 a day or the cut off of all future grant money, that would absolutely devastate the county.

I know that this problem can't be solved over night, but the court should at least make it look like they are trying to do something. After all, that is what they are paid for. And believe me they are paid well for what they do and the time it takes to do it.

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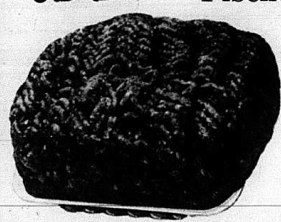

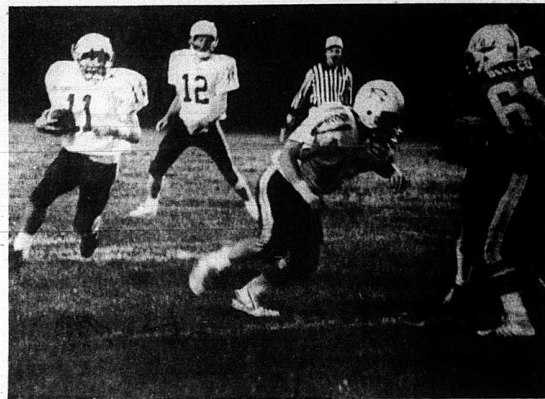
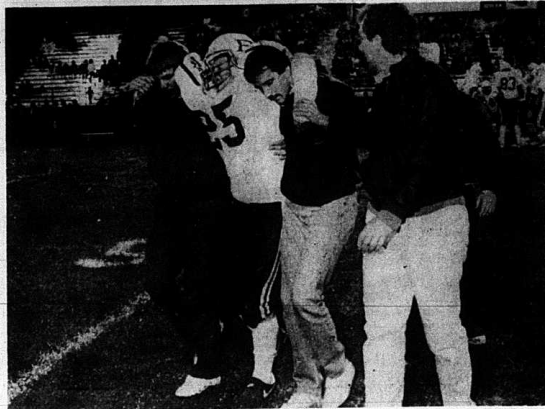

Evidently the Redskins wanted it worse although both teams played hard. With three games behind them this year, the experience had taught them not to take anything for granted.

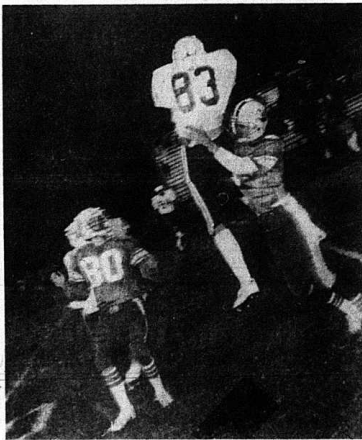

The 'Rock' falls at Bell County 20-0

The Rockcastle County Rockets got their first loss of the season Friday night at Bell County, 20 - 0.

Rockcastle played an extremely good game and with a few breaks they could have possibly won. The Rockets held Bell scoreless in the first quarter, but gave up one touchdown with five minutes to go in the second quarter. The third quarter proved to be the turning point in the game. Bell County scored twice in the third quarter, but was scoreless in the fourth.

"I fell like the big play of the game came in the third quarter with our team training 6-0" said coach Tom Larkey. Chuck Shields intercepted a pass from his own 30 yard line which he returned to the Bell County 2 yard line before being dragged down. They play was nullified by a penalty and the Rockets had to take over on their own 20 yard line. "I believe we could have scored from the 2 yard line and turned the game around," said Larkey. Larkey was well pleased with his players performance. "They fought as hard as they could fight. Our team was much smaller and we were the underdogs," he said.

To start the game, Rockcastle kicked to Bell County. The tackle was made by Pete Harrison and a fumble was recovered by Chuck Shields, but the ball was given to Bell County.

After a first down, Bell passed 30 yards which took the Bobcats to Rockcastle's 33 yard line. On the next play, Kevin Rowe recovered a Bobcat fumble. The Rockets were forced to punt but held Bell County in downs at the Rockcastle County 30 yard line. In a 4th down and 1 yard to go situation, Rockcastle went for the first down and made it from their own 39 yard line. Rockcastle was held and Adam Coleman's 48 yard punt into the end zone gave Bell County the ball on the 20 yard line. The first quarter ended with no score.

On their next possession a pass intercepted by Chris Larkey stopped Bell County's drive at mid-field.

In a 4th and one situation from their own 36, the Rockets lined up to punt but the shift threw Bell County offside, giving Rockcastle the first down. A pass from Larkey to Harrison was short of a first down, so Coleman punted 35 yards to Bell's 7 yard line. After Bell picked up a first down, a pass to tight end Harvey Miracle was good for a 70 yard touchdown. The two-point conversion was no good and Bell County led 6-0.

Chris Larkey returned the Bell kick to the 42 yard line but the Rockets were held and forced to punt.

A quarterback sack by Ralph Hines resulted in a loss of eight yards which forced the Bobcats to punt and gave Rockcastle time for one play before the half ended.

The 3rd quarter began with a Larkey fumble recovered by Bell County but Chuck Shields returned the favor by intercepting a Bell County pass on the 30 yard line and returning it to Bell's two yard line. A penalty nullified the play and brought the ball back to the Rockcastle 26 yard line. From there, Bell County intercepted a pass and with the help of a penalty got the ball to the Rockcastle 15 yard line. Bell's touchdown and 2-point conversion with 8:49 remaining put Bell further ahead 14-0.

Then a 48-yard pass from Chris Larkey to Chad Williams and a 15 yard run by Larkey took the ball to the 7 yard line. Williams was injured on the pass play with a bruised thigh and never re-entered the game.

Fourth and goal on the 5 yard line, a pass from Chris Larkey to Pete Harrison was intercepted on the goal line by Bell's Harvey Miracle who returned the ball to the 18 yard line before being run down by Larkey. Two plays later, with 2:02 left in the third quarter, Bell scored again. The two-point conversion attempt was no good, and Bell led 20-0.

In the 4th quarter, Pete Harrison recovered a Bell County

fumble and the Rockets drove the ball to the Bell 10 yard line. The pass to Chuck Shields on 4th down was complete to the 1-yard line but lacked a foot for the first down.

The remainder of the fourth quarter was a constant battle between the two teams. When the clock ran out, Bell County was on top 20-0.

Rockcastle plays host to Wayne County Friday night. Wayne County is coming off a 64-16 thrashing of Lynn Camp and has the state's leading rusher in one of their backs, Scott Blanchard. Before last week, Blanchard had rushed for 969 yards, 200 of which came against powerful Corbin.

Coach Larkey is optimistic about Rockcastle's chances of beating Wayne County. He says that his team plays no attention to other team's records and who they've beaten. The Rockets go into the game to win.

Hopes have not faded at R.C.H.S. for a district berth. If Rockcastle could win their three remaining district games, Whitley, Cawood and Knox Central, they would still go to the playoffs.

Woodcock and Snipe season

Woodcock and common snipe season in Kentucky will open Oct. 1 and run through Dec. 4. The daily bag limit on woodcock is five birds per day, while the daily bag limit for snipe remains at eight birds per day. Possession limits are double the daily bag limits.

Woodcock and snipe are two of the state's lesser known game birds, yet both species are native to almost every county in commonwealth. During the approximately two-month season, woodcock and snipe from the north migrate into the state through the Atlantic and Mississippi Flyways, adding to the numbers of birds that can be hunted.

The majority of woodcock and snipe harvested each year are bagged by sportsmen hunting other types of small game during overlapping squirrel, rabbit, quail and grouse seasons. Woodcock feed primarily on earthworms, which means they prefer upland forests, stream bottoms, wooded creek beds and other places that stay damp or wet throughout the year. The snipe is a bird of wet meadows, marshes and bogs. It feeds mostly on insects, small crustaceans, earthworms and snails.

Woodcock and snipe are most easily identified by their long slender bills, which helps them dig through mud, sediment and leaves in search of worms and other insects. The woodcock's body is slightly larger than a quail and has brown and gray feathers that camouflage the bird well against the forest floor. When flushed, the woodcock often makes a faint chirping noise and flies in a erratic pattern through the trees and brush to escape danger.

Because woodcock and snipe are usually found in damp, brushy areas, there are few openland shots for the hunter. Light weight, 70 yard, stream shotguns loaded with an ounce of number 8 or 9 shot are recommended when jump shooting these elusive game birds. A trained dog will further aid the hunter in locating and retrieving birds in thick undergrowth.

Woodcock surveys conducted in some of the states north and northeast of Kentucky recently showed that there has been relatively little change in the breeding population over the past year. Generally speaking, woodcock and snipe populations had decreased over the past few years in those areas.

According to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service report, the eastern region average has increased 3.8 percent from 1986. The population of snipe is down below normal. The central region showed a slight breeding population decrease of 1.4 percent, but is regarded as slightly above

PREPARE A SNACK**

More and more work places are providing convenient "extras" for employees like a coffee maker, refrigerator and microwave oven. This adds flexibility and almost unlimited possibilities for lunch and coffee break foods that can be heated and enjoyed away from home. Whether you are an employee away from home or your place of work is home, you will enjoy this collection of lunchtime ideas that are easy to tote if necessary and quick to heat.

Quick Potato Lunch

- 1 large baking potato (8 oz.)
- Salt and pepper
- 2 Tablespoons shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup small curd cottage cheese
- Snipped fresh chives, if desired

Scrub potato; prick several times with fork. Place in microwave oven on paper towel. Microwave (high) 6 to 7 minutes or until potato is just about tender. Turn



ing potato over once. Let stand a few minutes. Cut potato (almost) through lengthwise; open potato and place on serving plate. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and Cheddar cheese. Spoon cottage cheese onto potato; sprinkle with chives. Make 1 serving/320 calories each.

Tips:When packing this for an office lunch, place cheeses and chives in a plastic storage container and refrigerate until ready to cook. To reduce calories, use low-fat cottage cheese.

"Tastes Like More" Pretzels
1 package (12 oz.) mini pretzels
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
1/4 cup Parmesan cheese
Place pretzels in large microwave-safe bowl; set aside. Combine butter and garlic powder in 1-cup glass measure. Microwave (high), uncovered, 30 to 45 seconds or until melted; stir to combine. Drizzle mixture over pretzels; mix lightly. Sprinkle with cheese; mix lightly

again.
Microwave (high), uncovered, 3 to 4 minutes or until mixture starts to toast, stirring once or twice. Cool. Store in tightly-capped container. Makes about 8 cups/115 calories per half cup.

PB Energy Snacks

- 3/4 cup peanut butter
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup quick-cooking rolled oats
- 1/2 cup instant non-fat dry milk granules
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1/2 cup (3 oz) miniature semi-sweet chocolate pieces
- Cornflakes or crisp rice cereal

Combine peanut butter and water in 2-quart glass mix'n pour bowl. Microwave (high), uncovered, 45 to 60 seconds or until hot. Blend in vanilla. Add oats, dry milk and honey; mix well. Cover and refrigerate until chilled, about 45 minutes.

Stir in chocolate pieces. Shape rounded teaspoonful of mixture into balls by rolling between hands. Roll each ball in cornflakes, pressing cereal into balls. Place on waxed paper-lined dish or plate. Store in refrigerator. Makes about 60 snacks/35 calories each.

Pepperoni Pizza Muffins

- 1 English muffin, split
- 2 tablespoons pasteurized processed cheese spread
- 1 tablespoon pizza sauce
- 6 slices pepperoni
- 2 ripe olives, sliced

Place muffin halves, cut-side-up on paper towel. Spread with cheese spread. Top with pizza sauce, pepperoni and olives (if toting, place waxed paper on top of one half place other half over it with fillings together). When ready to heat, just separate halves and remove waxed paper. Microwave (high), uncovered, 30 to 45 seconds or until cheese is bubbly. Makes 1 serving/275 calories each.

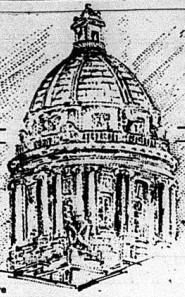

We have examined the statement of assets, liabilities, and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, as of June 30, 1986, and the related statement of cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in cash balance for the year then ended. We also examined the Sheriff's settlements - 1985 taxes for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1986. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards, the Single Audit Act of 1984, and the provisions of the Ohio Circular Audit of State and Local Governments and accordingly including such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As recommended by the State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 68.210, the accompanying financial statements are prepared on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. This cash basis system does not require the maintenance of a general fixed asset group or general long-term debt group of accounts. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the assets, liabilities, and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County as of June 30, 1986, and the related statement of cash receipts and disbursements and the Sheriff's 1985 taxes charged, collected, and distributed during the year then ended, in conformity with the accounting system described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The accompanying additional information, provided on Schedules A through E, including the schedule of federal financial assistance programs, is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but is presented as additional information. This information has been subjected to tests and other audit procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

As required by the Single Audit Act of 1984, we have reported on the county's financial statements (page 1), its system of internal accounting and administrative controls (page 27), and the county's compliance with laws and regulations (page 30). The following comments and recommendations were disclosed during our examination of the financial statements and our study and evaluation of the county's system of internal controls and its compliance with laws and regulations.

Prior Year Comments and Recommendations

In the prior year audit report, we reported several areas of non-compliance. Those that have not been corrected are commented on in the current year audit findings. The noncorrected findings are as follows:

- 1) An administrative code was not adopted.
- 2) County funds had deficit balances.
- 3) The former Sheriff, William Taylor, did not:
 - a) Settle all refunds due and amounts owed to the taxing districts.
 - b) Remit \$450 of advertising fees to the county.
 - c) Remit \$456 to the school board for interest earned on the investment of school taxes.

Current Year Comments and Recommendations

Internal Accounting and Administrative Controls of All County Programs:

- 1) **The Fiscal Court Should Adopt an Administrative Code**
The county does not operate under an administrative code. KRS 67.710 requires the County Judge/Executive to prepare and submit an administrative code to the fiscal court, and KRS 69.005 requires the fiscal court to adopt an administrative code. We again recommend compliance with these statutes.
- 2) **The County Should Obtain a Pledge of Securities on Funds Deposited**
KRS 66.480(1)(d) requires a pledge of securities from depository banks for all funds on deposit in excess of the legally insured amount (\$100,000). We recommend compliance with this statute.

Compliance With Laws and Regulations - All Other County Programs:

- 1) **County Funds Should Not Have a Deficit Balance**
At June 30, 1986, the General Fund and Jail Renovation Fund had deficit balances of \$6,789 and \$5,000 respectively. To expend more money than is collected in a year is a violation of KRS 68.110. We recommend compliance with this statute.

- 2) **The Fiscal Court Should Approve All Claims**
Claims totaling \$2,784 were paid from the Jail Fund without prior approval from the fiscal court. KRS 441.225(2) and OAG 82.424 require fiscal court approval for Jail Fund payments. We recommend compliance with this statute.

Other Comments and Recommendations:

- 1) **The Former Sheriff, William Taylor, Should Settle With Taxing Districts For All Taxes Owed And Refunds Due**
As reflected in the schedule below, the Sheriff owes taxes to taxing districts and is due (refunds) from them for 1982, 1983, 1984, and 1985 tax collections. The 1984 taxes due the school district increased by \$734 on October 2, 1985, because the school district refunded the Sheriff this amount. As this refund was deposited into the fee account instead of the tax account, it was not reflected in the prior audit.

We recommend the Sheriff settle these taxes.

- 2) **The Former Sheriff, William Taylor, Should Pay Advertising Costs to County**
As reported in our prior year audit, the former Sheriff owed \$450 to the county for advertising costs. We could find no evidence of this liability having been paid. We recommend the Sheriff remit these fees to the county.

- 3) **The Former Sheriff, William Taylor, Should Pay Interest to the School Board**
As reported in our prior year audit, the Sheriff owes interest to the school board in the amount of \$456. We recommend the former Sheriff credit this amount against the refund of taxes due from the school board as shown above in the amount of \$1,258 leaving a refund due the former Sheriff from the school board in the amount of \$802.

- 4) **The Former Sheriff, William Taylor, Should Eliminate Deficit Balance**
Based on available records, the Sheriff had a \$2,450 deficit in his official tax account as of June 30, 1986. We recommend the Sheriff to take the necessary steps to eliminate this deficit.

We are confident the above findings and recommendations will be useful to you in managing the operations of the county in a manner consistent with effective accounting and compliance controls.

CORN VARIETY PLOT HARVEST-OCTOBER 13

Finding a corn variety with high yields and plant characteristics which meets each farmer's desires would be a never ending job without the help of corn variety test. Since most farms only grow one or two varieties each year, it would be impossible to on-farm test each new corn and comparisons from different seasons would not be accurate.

Corn variety plots are side by side comparisons. On Oct. 13

Steve Trebilo will harvest 13 varieties from Pioneer and Funks seed line. Farmers may see the yields, moisture content and plant characteristics. This can help choose a quick dry down corn for picking or high grain stay green corn for silage. The side by side comparison may help decide which variety you would like to try next year.

Harvest will be from 10 - 1 p.m. Come by early to see the corn standing or in the afternoon to see yield comparisons.
