

County set for snows. state says

State Transportation road crews are prepared for the 1987-88 winter maintenance pro-gram so that when snow begins to fall in Rockcastle County the roads can be cleared quickly and efficiently

efficiently. "This year, again, we want ef-fective snow removal so motorists will be able to travel safely when adverse weather ex-ists," said Gov. Martha Layne Collins

To help motorists plan their winter driving, the Transporta-tion Cabinet has announced which roads will be cleared first. The transportation crew will clear 1-75, U.S. 25, U.S. 150, U.S. 421, Ky. 70, Ky. 461 and Ky. 1505 first. The next roads to be cleared will be priority B and

then priority C. The roads are cleared as soon as precipitation becomes signifi-cant. Crews set out with salt or plows to clear the top priority roads first. The priority system is based on the traffic carried by the road

Priority A roads include in-Priority A roads include in-terstates, parkways, urban ex-pressways and other state roads with exceptionally large volumes of traffic. Priority B roads are state primary roads, bypasses and roads with slightly less traffic than Priority A roads, State secondary roads, rural secondary roads and other routes with equal traffic fall into Priority C category. category

Remaining state roads are cleared after these categories have been treated.

Motorists can plan their trips more safely by using Priority A roads whenever possible during bad weather.

Forest fire damage figured in millions

The recent rainfall doused the many wildfires that occurred in the Daniel Boone National Forst and brought welcome relief to hundreds of weary firefighters and forest officials, but only after the fires did \$5,400,000 to natural resources between Oct. 22 and Nov. 9 in the forest

In addition, the cost of fighting these fires amounted to over \$3,000,000 of taxpayers money. If rain had not fallen when it did, both the natural resource damage and firefighting costs would have been considerably higher.

In the Southeastern Kentucky Forestry district, 277 fires burned 29,794 acres from Oct. 1 to Nov. 10, according to the Kentucky Department of Natural

Since Oct. 1, over 113,000 acres of Kentucky forests have

with the cost of fighting the fires at \$1 million. Even while some of the fires were still burning, a rehabilita-tion team, composed of two soil scientists, a hydrologist or watershed specialist and a silviculturist or tree specialist began the task of surveying the burned over areas to assess the damage and recond corrective measures.

The fires, the majority of which were caused by the criminal actions of arsonists, have caused varying effects on the trees and other natural

the trees and other natural resources associated with them. Most of the seedlings and sapl-ings in the burned over areas were killed. The bark on many of the

larger trees was scorched. It will eventually loosen and fall off, ex-

posing the trees to possible disease and insect infestation. The lower or butt portion of many of these trees will be scarred and their value as sawtimber

will be reduced. The wildfires also affected dif-ferent kinds of birds and other animals. Food supplies, such as acorns, nuts and fruit bearing shrubs, were destroyed by the flames. A number of furred and feathered creatures perished in the more fast moving and hotter burning fires. Even deer, that can usually outrun the advancing flames, have been known to sucand running back into the burn-ing areas. Some snags or hollow trees, purposely left during timber harvest operations, caught fire, burned and fell to the ground. Many of these snags

were occupied by cavity nesting birds and animals. Watersheds - drainage basins or areas from which streams get their water supply - were damag-ed somewhat due to the destruc-tion of litter and duffan ac-cumulation of leaves and decom-nocine sceretation.

The amount of loss of soil pro-ductivity depends on the intensity with-which each individual fire

with-which each individual fire burns. Bulldozers were used to con-struct fire lines on some of the larger fires. Killed on his way to be Baptized

Sometimes people ask: "What happens to a man who has believed in Christ, repented of his sins, and is on his way to be baptized when an accident occurs and he is killed - will he

be lost?" First of all, let's be reminded that this is a hypothetical case. I personally have never heard of such a thing happen-ing. But, if it happened every day, it wouldn't change what the Lord said about baptism being essential to salvation. Mark 16:16 still says the same thing "...he that believeth and is baptized shall be saved..." However, those who teach salvation by "faith alone" find themselves in just as bad a dilemna. Suppose a man, listening to one of their preachers is just about to believe and arafter from the ceiling falls on him and kills him. Will be essaved? Does this accident nullify the passage that

he be saved? Does this accident nullify the passage that says, "He that believeth not is condemned already" [John 3:181?

says. The thit convertient not solve that fails that and repentance are essential in the plan of salvation. Suppose a man believes in Christ and is just about to repent of his sins when he dies of a heart attack. Does his death, at such a time, dispense with the necessity of repentance? Jesus still says in Luke 13:3 "except ye repent...ye shall perish." The real problem in the minds of many people is a lack of regard for the commands of Christ. The same Lord who demanded faith and repentance also commanded baptism as a prerequisite to salvation. We cannot provide an escape route for our own doctrines of feelings by using hypocrites in the church, the thief on the cross of hypothetical cases such as those just mentioned.

in the church, the thief on the cross of hypothetical cases such as those just mentioned. All we can teach with God's approval is what His Word reveals. If God, in His mercy, extends clemency in such cases - SHOULD THEY EVER OCCUR - that will be fine with us. But, since we do not know the mind of God except as He has revealed Himself in the Bible, we cannot safely assume something that is not revealed. Adding to or taking from God's holy word will bring the wrath of God upon us [Rev. 22:18-19]. Let's not presume to draw conclusions based upon what we CANNOT KNOW; rather let's humbly submit to the commands that we DO know. submit to the commands that we DO know

A situation faced by forest firefighters in Kentucky and other sections of the country is the presence of houses in and near forested areas. This poses a sectious problem. They are forced to concentrate on saving homes instead of their main job of pro-tecting the forest.

In addition, fire fighting becomes extremely hazardous when forces attempt to save scat-tered structures as infernos sweep through the forest, instead of adhering to time proven tactics of falling back and constructing

firelines. Home owners living in and adjacent to wooded areas can take several measures to protect their

several measures to protect their lives and property. These include removing small trees and brush; pruning bran-ches of larger trees to prevent ground fires from spreading to tree tops; piling and burning the cut trees brush and pruned brancut trees, brush and pruned branches in openings, but only during periods when it is safe to burn; and clearing a 6-foot wide trail around the property by removing around the property by removing all burnable material and expos-ing the mineral soil. This will sow down running ground fires. In addition, they should know how to reach local firefighting agencies in case of fire, have fire tools and an emergency water supply available during the fire season, and know a safe retreat route in case of fire.
