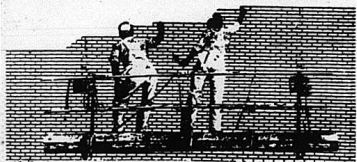

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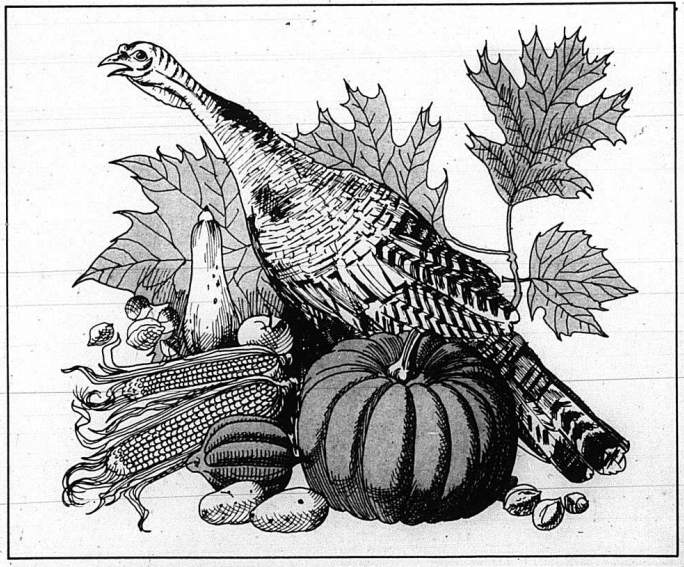
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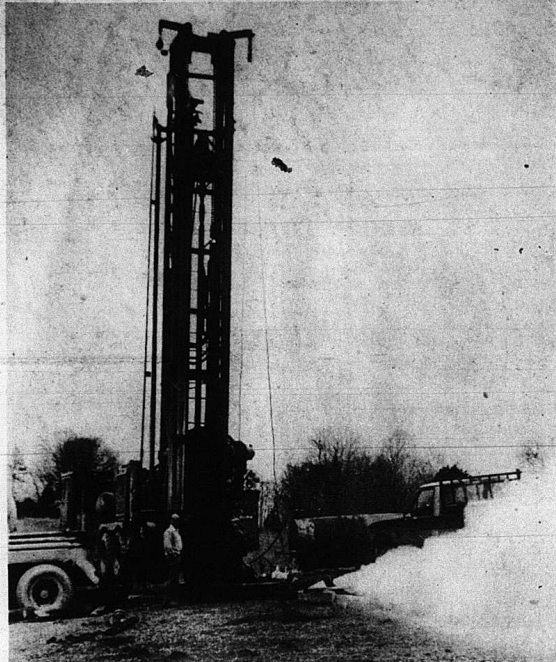

I'm sure I have) we will just thank God for it anyway o.k.?

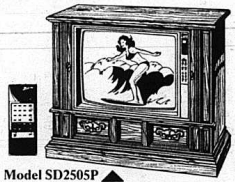

**Homemakers quilt to be given away at Christmas drawing**

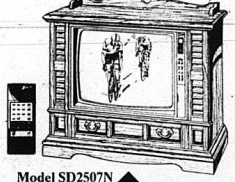

## County set for snows, state says

State Transportation road crews are prepared for the 1987-88 winter maintenance program so that when snow begins to fall in Rockcastle County the roads can be cleared quickly and efficiently.

"This year, again, we want effective snow removal so motorists will be able to travel safely when adverse weather exists," said Gov. Martha Layne Collins.

To help motorists plan their winter driving, the Transportation Cabinet has announced which roads will be cleared first. The transportation crew will clear I-75, U.S. 25, U.S. 150, U.S. 421, Ky. 70, Ky. 461 and Ky. 1505 first. The next roads to be cleared will be priority B and then priority C.

The roads are cleared as soon as precipitation becomes significant. Crews set out salt and plows to clear the top priority roads first. The priority system is based on the traffic carried by the road.

Priority A roads include interstates, parkways, urban expressways and other state roads with exceptionally large volumes of traffic. Priority B roads are state primary roads, bypasses and roads with slightly less traffic than Priority A roads. State secondary roads, rural secondary roads and other routes with equal traffic fall into Priority C category.

Remaining state roads are cleared after these categories have been treated.

Motorists can plan their trips more safely by using Priority A roads whenever possible during bad weather.

## Development center planned

A center to offer training programs and coordinate industrial, agricultural, tourism and educational improvements in the 27-county 5th Congressional District has been proposed by U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers.

The center is part of a package to build a fine arts center at Somerset Community College estimated to cost \$9.8 million for the 80,000 square foot building. The fine arts section would have a 1,000-seat theatre, classrooms and a student center.

A hoped-for \$4 million would come from the federal government and \$4.8 million from the state. Pulaski County and Somerset have already pledged \$1 million.

The development center would offer a range of training programs from helping local officials entice industry to showing service station workers and waitresses how to relate to tourists.

Rogers did not give a timetable for construction.

## Mrs. Lambdin pleads guilty

Marsha Lambdin, 29, of East Bernstadt, has pleaded guilty in Laurel Circuit Court to reckless homicide in the shooting death of her husband, Tommy Lambdin, 39, formerly of Mt. Vernon. Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Danny Evans recommended the maximum sentence of five years, without probation. She will be sentenced Jan. 23.

Lambdin was killed Mar. 30, 1987 following a domestic argument at the couple's home.

## Price up as burley sales open

Burley tobacco markets opened Monday with London leading the way in price paid to growers. A total of 649,914 pounds was sold at London for an average of \$1.61-35 a pound. That was 2.66 cents higher than the statewide

average of \$1.58.69, about a penny above last year's opening day figure. Although burley opened slightly higher not everyone was sure it would last, with most saying that buyers were showing more interest in carry over leaf from last year than in this year's crop.

Prices at other area markets showed: Danville, 633,195 pounds sold averaging \$1.59.22; Lexington, 2,354,565 pounds averaging \$1.57.84; Somerset, 497,415 pounds, averaging \$1.58.98.

There was no report available from Richmond.

## Fire destroys Pine Hill house

A fire believed to be arson, destroyed a vacant house at Pine Hill about 1:30 a.m. Tuesday, temporarily disrupting telephone and electric service in the area. The house figured in the news recently when an auto failed to negotiate a curve on U.S. 25 and crashed into it.

Assistant fire chief Bud Cox said the house was engulfed in flames when firemen arrives. It was formerly owned by Dale Renner, and reportedly now owned by Sylvester Kirby.

The flames knocked out Continental Telephone Company's long distance lines, Cox said. Several families were without electricity for a time.

## Branch bank ceremony held

Rockcastle County's first branch bank will open in Mt. Vernon next spring, possibly in April.

Ground-breaking ceremonies were held last Friday for the 2,000 square foot branch bank with Citizens Bank Board of Directors using the shovels.

The new branch will be located on U.S. 150 across from Kentucky Stone Co. Quarry and adjacent to the Mt. Vernon Car Wash.

J.C. Newland and Son construction company of Brodhead was awarded the bid for the new facility which will cost in excess of \$225,000, according to Keith Smith, vice president of the bank.

The new branch will be full service with accommodations for four tellers, a loan office, two drive-in lanes and safety deposit boxes.

President Bobby Proctor said Monday that the branch is being built to better serve the bank's customers from other areas of the county that have so faithfully patronized the bank in the past even though it was an inconvenience.

"Of course we hope to gain new business from the move as well," he said.

Proctor said that it was the hopes of the board to open the new branch by April 15.

## Recent fire damage figured in millions

The recent rainfall doused the many wildfires that occurred in the Daniel Boone National Forest and brought welcome relief to hundreds of weary firefighters and forest officials, but only after the fires did \$5,400,000 to natural resources between Oct. 22 and Nov. 9 in the forest.

In addition, the cost of fighting these fires amounted to over \$3,000,000 of taxpayers money. If rain had not fallen when it did, both the natural resource damage and firefighting costs would have been considerably higher.

In the Southeastern Kentucky Forestry district, 277 fires burned 29,794 acres from Oct. 1 to Nov. 10, according to the Kentucky Department of Natural Resources.

Since Oct. 1, over 113,000 acres of Kentucky forests have

been damaged by 1,431 fires with damage estimated at \$9.6 million, with the cost of fighting the fires at \$1 million.

Even while some of the fires were still burning, a rehabilitation team, composed of two soil scientists, a hydrologist or watershed specialist and a silviculturist or tree specialist began the task of surveying the burned over areas to assess the damage and recommend corrective measures.

The fires, the majority of which were caused by the criminal actions of arsonists, have caused varying effects on the trees and other natural resources associated with them.

Most of the seedlings and saplings in the burned over areas were killed. The bark on many of the larger trees was scorched. It will eventually loosen and fall off, ex-

## Red tape stalls effort to put fish into Lake Linville

Grass-eating carp, a fish supposed to remedy a grass and algae problem in Lake Linville, won't be put into the lake until spring, or maybe never.

The fish have been put on the "back burner" until spring because state and federal officials haven't seen a definite plan on how to keep the fish in the lake.

A proposed cover for the spillway, or some other method to keep the fish in the lake has not been engineered, state officials have emphasized.

The Kentucky Division of Water, the Department of Fish and Wildlife and the U.S. and Kentucky departments of transportation have all become involved in the proposal, and all have told the city there has to be a plan which all of them can review.

Engineering on such a project has been estimated at about \$10,000, or higher, a bill that would have to be paid by the city.

At a meeting in September, the city council agreed to purchase 325 grass-eating carp at \$5.50 each to be placed in the lake to eat the grass that was clogging boat motors, and tangling fishing lines, and would eventually cover the lake.

"We have talked with every

department we know of and we get the same answer, that someone else will have to make the decision," said Matt Powell Jr., superintendent of the city water works.

Powell said he had discussed the project with Jack Crawford of Crawford & Crawford, engineers, of Burnside, which has a water project under way for the city.

Powell said Crawford agreed the engineering and design would have to be done then submitted to the various government bureaus for consideration. He gave a ballpark figure of about \$10,000.

Powell explained that the state and federal departments must approve the plan in order to prevent a possible future problem. With a screen over the spillway and over the valve that allows water to flow continually into Renfro Creek, trash and leaves could block the flow. Then if heavy rains occurred, the lake could overflow on to the boat dock road and pour into the Renfro Valley entertainment area.

"Actually, no one seems to know what will work, but something has to be decided before the fish are put into the lake," Powell related. "The dam is the I-75 roadway and is owned by the federal and state govern-

## Legal Services for Low-Income Citizens

Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky, Inc. (Legal Aid) is a federally funded, non-profit corporation providing legal services to low income clients. The Somerset office serves residents in the counties of Lincoln, McCreary, Pulaski, Rockcastle and Wayne.

To be eligible for the legal services offered by a Legal Aid office, a person must reside in one of the counties served by the office in which assistance is sought and must have income at or below the federal poverty guidelines, and lastly, be unable to obtain legal services from any other source.

In the area of administrative law, which includes such diverse topics as AFDC, food stamps, Medicaid, Social Security, SSI and Veterans Benefits, the office has two paralegals who are trained to provide legal representation for these cases.

In an effort to better meet the needs of low income people in the counties surrounding Pulaski County, one of our paralegals will visit the Rockcastle County Courthouse, Circuit Clerk's office, on the 3rd Thursday of each month from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The purpose of these visits will be to talk to prospective clients concerning their administrative problems.

## Congress Should Not Be "Negotiating" American Foreign Policy

In the United States of America, there can only be one Secretary of State. We cannot have individuals negotiating on behalf of our nation any time they see fit. Yet that is precisely what happened this past week when the Speaker of the House of Representatives met in private with the head of the Communist Sandinista government—in defiance of President Reagan and our Central American policy.

When Speaker Wright met with Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega, he gave Ortega a platform for wreaking havoc on what until now has been our united efforts to bring about negotiations between the Sandinistas and the Contras, the freedom-fighters whom we have supported for many years with military and humanitarian aid. Ortega immediately took advantage of the Speaker's meeting and called on the Contras to lay down their arms prior to any negotiations beginning. This new demand now threatens the peace process, because it takes away from the negotiations the only leverage the Contras have to force real changes in the Nicaraguan government.

The Constitution is very clear in its enunciation of how American foreign policy ought to be handled. The President and his Secretary of State must be the primary handlers of our foreign relations. Congress has its proper advisory role, but when individuals insert themselves into government negotiations, they threaten the ability of our nation to carry out a credible and consistent foreign policy.

Congress itself spoke out early in our history about the role of outsiders in foreign policy. In the 1790's, Congress passed the Logan Act, which specifically outlaws any individual from acting as a representative of the United States government in foreign relations. What the Speaker did in meeting with President Ortega comes dangerously close to oversteering the bounds which limit all of us in international relations.

Whether it is Central America, the Middle East or nuclear arms, we can only negotiate successfully when we speak with one voice to other nations. Think how impossible it would be if all 535 congressmen and senators decided they could say anything they wanted on behalf of the American government. Foreign relations is a tricky enough business without having to contend with congressional interference.

## Killed on his way to be Baptized

Sometimes people ask: "What happens to a man who has believed in Christ, repented of his sins, and is on his way to be baptized when an accident occurs and he is killed - will he be lost?"

First of all, let's be reminded that this is a hypothetical case. I personally have never heard of such a thing happening. But, if it happened every day, it wouldn't change what the Lord said about baptism being essential to salvation. Mark 16:16 still says the same thing "...he that believeth and is baptized shall be saved..."

However, those who teach salvation by "faith alone" find themselves in just as bad a dilemma. Suppose a man, listening to one of their preachers is just about to believe and a rafter from the ceiling falls on him and kills him. Will he be saved? Does this accident nullify the passage that says, "He that believeth not is condemned already" [John 3:18]?

Other religious groups teach that faith and repentance are essential in the plan of salvation. Suppose a man believes in Christ and is just about to repent of his sins when he dies of a heart attack. Does his death, at such a time, dispense with the necessity of repentance? Jesus still says in Luke 13: "except ye repent...ye shall perish."

The real problem in the minds of many people is a lack of regard for the commands of Christ. The same Lord who demanded faith and repentance also commanded baptism as a prerequisite to salvation. We cannot provide an escape route for our own doctrines or feelings by using hypocrites in the church, the thief on the cross of hypothetical cases such as those just mentioned.

All we can teach with God's approval is what His Word reveals. If God, in His mercy, extends clemency in such cases - SHOULD THEY EVER OCCUR - that will be fine with us. But, since we do not know the mind of God except as He has revealed Himself in the Bible, we cannot safely assume something that is not revealed. Adding to or taking from God's holy word will bring the wrath of God upon us (Rev. 22:18-19). Let's not presume to draw conclusions based upon what we CANNOT KNOW; rather let's humbly submit to the commands that we DO know.

### LAST RITES FOR HOLIDAY TURKEY

You did it! Preparing the holiday meal for your entire family was no easy task, but even Aunt Sally had to agree that yours was the juiciest turkey ever. Now that the plates are clean and the guests gone, you plopp down on the couch to rest. (Whew!) Wait! Where's the turkey?

For safety's sake don't leave your turkey or any other food sitting at room temperature for longer than two hours. Take a few minutes before you rest to store it and the other foods properly in the refrigerator or freezer. Foods left on a counter top in the oven are havens for bacterial growth that can spoil leftovers from even the best of meals.

Use your leftovers as creative food budget stretchers for a next-day meal that's more than reheated plates of the same thing or just sandwiches of cold turkey slices. The following are a few ideas you might consider.

**Fruited Turkey Potato Salad**  
2 large red potatoes  
2 tablespoons low calorie salad dressing

result and make such areas more difficult to stabilize in the future. A situation faced by forest firefighters in Kentucky and other sections of the country is the presence of houses in and near forested areas. This poses a serious problem. They are forced to concentrate on saving homes instead of their main job of protecting the forest.

In addition, fire fighting becomes extremely hazardous when forces attempt to save scattered structures as infernos sweep through the forest, instead of adhering to time proven tactics of falling back and constructing firelines.

Home owners living in and adjacent to wooded areas can take several measures to protect their lives and property. These include removing small trees and brush; pruning branches of larger trees to prevent ground fires from spreading to tree tops; piling and burning the cut trees, brush and pruned branches in openings, but only during periods when it is safe to burn; and clearing a 6-foot wide trail around the property by removing all burnable material and exposing the mineral soil. This will slow down running ground fires.

In addition, they should know how to reach local firefighting agencies in case of fire, have fire tools and an emergency water supply available during the fire season, and know a safe retreat route in case of fire.

ments, so we have to abide by their decisions. They're going to have to see some kind of a plan."

Powell also pointed out the dam is considered "high risk" by the Kentucky Department of Natural Resources, and if water backed up it could put a strain on the dam.

Albert Jones of the Fish and Wildlife Department visited the lake last week and decided to hold off on the fish until spring.

"Grassy areas are in an area about 10 feet out in the lake from the shoreline. This season's drought has reduced the lake level past that point and the grass has died and dried up.

"There won't be any more grass accumulating until spring, but supposedly it will be back again then," Powell stated. "It will be up to the city council to determine what will have to be done in the spring, or if and when the lake fills up again."



1 cup (6 ounces) diced cooked turkey

Cook onion, celery and green pepper in oil in large skillet until tender, about five minutes. Add tomatoes, salt, chili powder and

pepper. Cover and boil gently for 15 minutes.

Mix dry milk and flour. Add water slowly, stirring until smooth. Add milk mixture to tomato sauce. Cook and stir over medium heat until thickened. Cook two minutes longer. Add turkey, cover and heat slowly until hot, stirring occasionally. Stir cheese into mixture until melted. Serve over hot buttered rice or noodles. Makes six servings.

**Turkey Enchilada Stack**  
2 cups cooked shredded turkey  
2 cups low calorie sour cream (recipe follows)

1-1/2 cups shredded cheddar cheese, divided  
1/2 cup chopped green onion  
1/4 cup chopped green chilies (from a 4-ounce can)  
Salt, to taste

1/2 teaspoon ground cumin  
2 tablespoons vegetable oil  
12 corn or flour tortillas  
1 (10 ounce) can enchilada sauce  
Combine cooked turkey, sour cream, 1 cup of the chilies, salt and cumin. Blend together and set aside.

In a medium skillet, heat oil over high heat. Cook tortillas one at a time for 10 seconds in hot oil. Remove from oil with tongs; drain well on paper toweling. Pour enchilada sauce into a pie plate. Dip one side of tortilla into the sauce then place it, sauce side down on a baking sheet.

Sprinkle 1/2 cup of the filling over the tortilla. Repeat procedure with remaining tortillas, sauce and filling, stacking one tortilla on top of another and ending with a tortilla.

Pour any remaining enchilada sauce over top of stack, then sprinkle with remaining 1/2 cup of cheese. Bake at 400° F. for 20 minutes. When tortilla has finished baking, cut it into wedges and serve on individual plates. Garnish with tomatoes, lettuce, chili peppers and guacamole, if desired. Makes six to eight servings.

**Low Calorie Sour Cream-Com-**

bine 3 tablespoons milk or butter-milk and 1 tablespoon lemon juice in container of electric blender. With blender on low speed, gradually add 1 cup low fat cottage cheese. Cover and process on high for two minutes. If necessary, thin with additional milk. Makes one cup. Store excess in refrigerator.
