allow the agency to trade "only lands that are suitable for elimination" from the national forest system.

Gary Reece, who wants the McCammon Creek tract for strip mining, has said he will donate the gorge area to Jackson County for inclusion in a park now being developed. The details of that deal have not been worked out.

Even if the county gets the land, opponents of the trade question the idea of the federal government's trading a scenic area for a treeless strip-mine site. Other proposed land trades would transfer valuable resources from public to private hands, said Tom FitzGerald, attorney for the Kentucky Resources Council. The Frankfort based environmental group may appeal the agency's decision.


"My concern is that in the Forest Service's desire to solidify its land acquisitions around the main stems of the various rivers, which is a laudable goal, you don't trade off other valuable resources to get there," FitzGerald said.

Pershing Hayes, of Tyner in Jackson County, also is considering an appeal. Hayes, a former member of the state Fish and Wildlife Commission, has led opposition to the trade.

He said the trade violates Forest Service regulations that

Legal Services for Low-Income Citizens

Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky, Inc. (Legal Aid) is a federally funded, non-profit corporation providing legal services to low income clients. The Somerset office serves residents in the counties of Lincoln, McCreary, Pulaski, Rockcastle and Wayne.

To be eligible for the legal services offered by a Legal Aid office, a person must reside in one of the counties served by the office in which assistance is sought and must have income at or below the federal poverty guidelines, and lastly, be unable to obtain legal services from any other source.

In the area of administrative law, which includes such diverse topics as AFDC, food stamps, Medicaid, Social Security, SSI and Veterans Benefits, the office has two paralegals who are trained to provide legal representation for these cases.

In an effort to better meet the needs of low income people in the counties surrounding Pulaski County, one of our paralegals will visit the Rockcastle County Courthouse, Circuit Clerk's office, on the 3rd Thursday of each month from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The purpose of these visits will be to talk to prospective clients concerning their administrative problems.

Folks gave Johnny a helping hand

Last week Johnny Hardin, a 33-year-old patient with muscular dystrophy, died in the Skilled Nursing Facility of the Rockcastle County Hospital.

But, what happened after that is a real story of Thanksgiving.

Johnny Hardin did not have any family to step in and take care of his burial. No one.

Johnny, who had had MD since birth did not have any means of his own but last Friday, Johnny Hardin was laid to rest in Providence Cemetery, with a proper burial for a man that had suffered so much in this life.

Johnny Hardin was not from Rockcastle County, he was a native of Owenton. He had been in the Skilled Nursing Facility since February, 1984.

"When he died several local people came to his side and offered things that Johnny could not provide.

Billy Dowell and Roy Martin provided a free funeral service. Carl Caldwell, an employee of the hospital, gave the burial lot in Providence Cemetery, and many other people, including numerous employees of the hospital, gave money for flowers, clothes and even a tombstone. Some private individuals who had nothing to

do with the hospital, or even knew Johnny Hardin, donated money to have his grave dug.

"By late in the afternoon on the day that Johnny died six people had called and offered a burial lot," said Serena Stratton, Social Services Director at the hospital.

"It was amazing how many people volunteered to help, people that did not know Johnny, but knew of his situation," she said. "We have a lot of good hearted people in this community and this was just one indication of what most people will do for the less fortunate," she concluded.

New policeman hired; Police cars bought

In another action, the council approved two street lights to be erected on Greenway Drive.

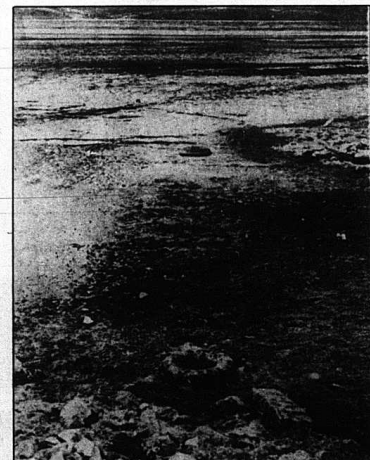
Biggerstaff of the London state police post.

These services include part-time skilled nursing care, treatment by speech and physical therapists, medical social services, part-time home health aide services, homemaker services, and medical supplies and equipment (wheelchairs, hospital beds, air pressure mattresses and etc.)

Services are covered by medical insurance such as medicare, medicaid or various private insurances. Our current staff consists of three RN's, one LPN, one

physical therapist, one speech and language pathologist, four home health aides, and three clerks. If you have any questions concerning eligibility for these services call us at 256-2242 or stop by the Rockcastle Health Center and someone will assist you.

The staff at Rockcastle County Home Health wish to extend our thanks for the care you give. Caring for a seriously ill, homebound or frail family member is a hard and at times, frustrating job. 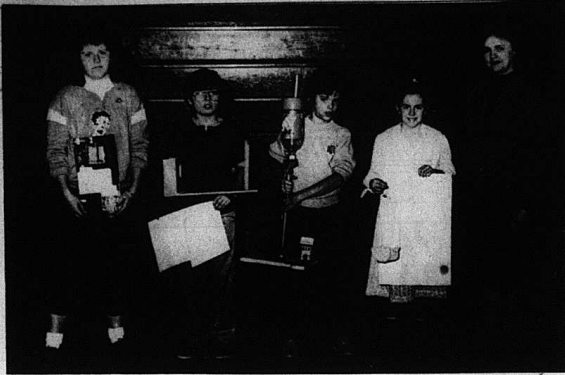

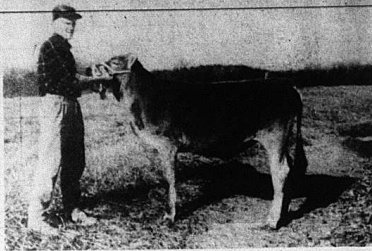

QUICK ENTREES FOR BUSY DAYS

With the anticipation and excitement of the approaching holiday season, we are often too busy to cook. When we do take the time, it is often to prepare dishes for guests or for a special celebra-



tion. To help smooth your way and keep the season joyous, use your microwave to prepare these temporary dishes. They can be quickly prepared with familiar ingredients combined in special ways. Even with limited preparation time, many of the recipes are

suitable for family enjoyment as well as for family enjoyment.

You'll also find some good uses for leftover turkey and other precooked meats. No one will ever guess that these recipes feature leftovers.

When preparing food quickly, it is sometimes important to utilize other cooking sources besides the microwave oven. For example, when a pasta does not cook right in the sauce, we often recommend cooking it conventionally while preparing another part of the dish in the microwave oven.

Turn to these good tasting, easy-to-assemble dishes when time is at a premium, both during the holidays and throughout the coming year.

Beefy Taco Bake

- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 envelope [1.25 oz] taco seasoning mix
- 1 can [16 oz] whole tomatoes, undrained
- 1 can [16 oz] cut green beans, drained
- 1 can [2.8 oz] french-fried onion rings
- 1 package [8.5 oz] cornbread muffin mix
- 1/2 cup [2 oz] shredded Cheddar cheese
- Paprika
- Combining green pepper and water in 2-quart microwave-safe casserole. Cover with casserole lid.

Microwave [high] 1 1/2 to 2 minutes or until just about tender. Crumble ground beef into casserole. Microwave [high], uncovered, 5 to 6 minutes or until no longer pink, stirring once. Stir to break meat into small pieces; drain. Add seasoning mix, tomatoes, green beans and half the onion rings; mix lightly. Cover. Microwave [high] 5 to 6 minutes or until heated through, stirring once. Meanwhile, prepare muffin mix as directed on package. Stir in package. Spoon batter into ring shape around outer edge of meat mixture.

Microwave [high], uncovered, 7 to 8 minutes or until cornbread is no longer doughy, rotating dish once. Sprinkle with remaining onion rings and paprika. Let stand about 5 minutes before serving. Makes about 6 servings with 550 calories each.

A cheesy vegetable combination is tucked into rolled fish

fillets for this nutritious entree: Flavorful Fish and Veggie Rolls

- 1 package [10 oz] frozen broccoli, cauliflower and carrots in cheese sauce
- 1 lb. fish fillets
- Salt
- Snip corner of pouch of frozen vegetables. Microwave [high] 6 to 7 minutes or until hot. Divide fillets or cut into 4 servings. Roll each and place in four 5 or 6-oz. microwave-safe custard dishes, line sides with fish. Sprinkle lightly with salt. Spoon equal quantities of vegetable mixture into opening in center of each fish roll. Microwave [high], uncovered, 3 to 4 minutes or until fish flakes apart easily, rearranging dishes once. Makes about 4 servings with 155 calories each.

Sausage-Bean Casserole

- 1 package [12 oz] pork sausage
- 1 green pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 can [16 oz] lima beans, drained
- 1 can [16 oz] whole tomatoes, undrained
- 1/2 cup quick-cooking rice
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon molasses
- 1 teaspoon prepared mustard

Crumble sausage into 2-quart microwave safe casserole. Add green pepper. Microwave [high], uncovered, 6 to 7 minutes or until sausage is no longer pink, stirring once. Drain. Stir in remaining ingredients. Cover with casserole lid. Microwave [high] 8 to 10 minutes or until boiling hot, stirring once. Makes about 6 servings, 400 calories each.

PESTICIDES

Beginning Jan. 1, the purchase of Methyl Bromide (tobacco bag gas) will require a pesticide card. A recent EPA ruling has placed all tobacco bag gas on the restricted use list.

In order to get a pesticide card, farmers will be required to watch about a 60-minute program on pesticide safety.

The meetings will be held on Dec. 7, at 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. and Dec. 8 at 10 a.m., 1 p.m. and 7 p.m., in the basement of the Agricultural Service Center, formerly Western Auto Building on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon.

Farmers should make plans to attend one of these meetings so they can receive a pesticide card.

SUMMER YIELDS

Kentucky farmers who use winter cover crops can expect greater yields in their summer corn - especially if they choose the proper cover crop.

Wilbur Frye, a research agronomist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, has been studying various annual legume varieties throughout the south to see which is the most productive. The results are in, and he will report on them at the national meeting of the American Society of Agronomy next week in Atlanta.

"Our experiments showed that two annual legumes outperformed all the rest in the south," he said. "Hairly vetch proved more effective in northern areas, including Kentucky, while crimson clover (not red clover which is a perennial variety) was the best in the more southern regions such as Georgia and Alabama."

By "best" he meant more dry

matter was produced which produced more mulch on the surface which served to help conserve limited water supplies in the hot, summer months.

The greater dry matter also resulted in greater atmospheric nitrogen being added to the soil, a characteristic of legumes in general but especially notable in the case of hairy vetch and crimson clover.

"Even though it's true that these cover crops add significant nitrogen to the soil, I really can't justify them just for that reason," Frye said. "It would be cheaper to buy the nitrogen and fertilize the field than go to the expense of growing the cover crop."


But he added, "Yet our experiments showed that it is cost effective to grow a cover crop."

How? "What makes it economically justifiable is that the cover crop results in a greater increase in grain yield than would occur if the cover crop weren't there," he said. "Our experiments show that just adding nitrogen doesn't get the increase in yield that you get if there is a cover crop."

Why? "Because of water conservation," Frye said. "We have shown clearly that we get moisture conservation during the summer months when there is a mulch cover to the corn. Less water runoff results when the rare rains do occur, and there is less evaporation from soil moisture."

By using hairy vetch, he said, a Kentucky farmer can decrease the use of fertilizer nitrogen by about one-third and still obtain optimum grain yields.

"Clearly, higher grain yields where a legume cover crop is used can be attributed to water efficiency as well as the nitrogen provided by the legume," Frye said.
