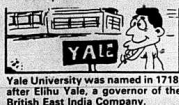

The girls play next at home on Thursday night against McCreary Central. On Monday, December 21, they play at Berea.

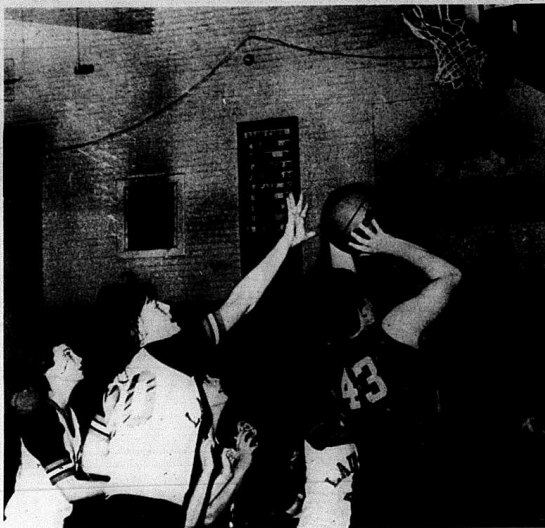
Boys' B-Team wins in overtime

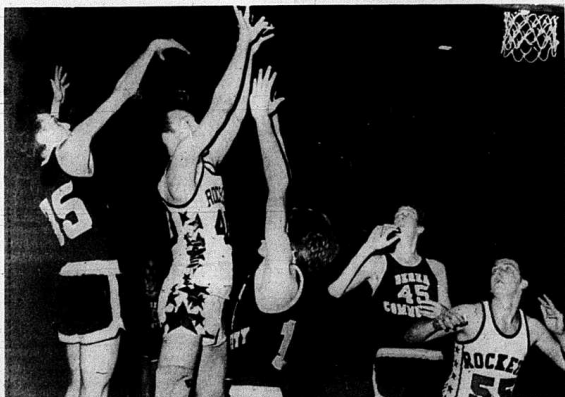

Burley crop up from 1986

The December estimate for 1987 pegs the burley crop at 308 million pounds, down 2 percent from last month's forecast, but 7 percent above the 1986 crop.

The estimated production is close to the basic quota of 310 million pounds and to the effective quota of nearly 326 million pounds.

"Individual growers can market up to 103 percent of their effective quota," said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell. The Commissioner added that many Kentucky producers had some carryover tobacco from the 1986 season, which they are now marketing on their 1987 marketing cards.

Early fields of burley were generally good, but the dry summer weather reduced yields in fields set later on. As dry weather continued through the fall, burley did not go in and out of case. Therefore, stripping had to be delayed and the burley color is lighter than usual.

Most of the burley going to market has been very low in moisture. Boswell said that naturally buyers like the idea of "not buying water," but they are concerned with condition and lack of color in the 1987 burley.

The rain and higher humidity of recent weeks of recent weeks has been helpful in preparing burley for market.

Land value slowly eroding as tobacco uncertainty grows

Part of the overall decline in Kentucky land values during the past few years may be due to increasing doubts about the future of burley tobacco.

"Land values in Kentucky have been propped up over the years by the value of the burley quota attached to the land. And as questions about the future of burley continue, the value of that quota tends to diminish," said Valerie Vantreese, agricultural economist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Burley has insulated Kentucky land values from dropping as much as they have in other states during the last five years of agricultural recession, she said. However, its ability to support land prices may be weakened by uncertainty about tobacco's future.

Burley quota has been cut several times over the few several years as governmental programs

have sought to keep supply in line with a dwindling demand caused in part by increasing imports of tobacco and sluggish domestic consumption, Vantreese said.

In 1986, about 9.4 percent of the value of land with quota came from the fact that it held a burley quota, Vantreese said. In 1985, that figure was 10.9 percent. The extra value associated with burley quota, however, differs widely across the state.

Burley quote accounts for about 14.1 percent of the value of land with quota in the Bluegrass/Northern Kentucky area; about 4.5 percent in Western Kentucky; about 5.6 percent in Central Kentucky and about 10 percent in Eastern Kentucky, according to a survey by Vantreese and other researchers at University of Kentucky.

Although farmers cannot now sell quota, Vantreese assessed quota values with research projects in 1985 and again in 1986.

"In 1985, the value of quota as reflected in the land market was \$3.22. In 1986, the median value reported by farmers surveyed was \$2," Vantreese said.

The burley question should be important to all Kentucky farmers, since about more than three-fourths of them own some burley quota. Using the \$2 a pound figure, the average value to Kentucky farmers with quota base is about \$8,714, Vantreese said.

Second trial to be scheduled in wreck case

Rockcastle District Judge William Cain has ruled in favor of a motion for a new trial in a case involving a local man, former state trooper and a county constable.

Cain ruled that Leonard "Rouge" Hammond was entitled to a new trial because of an error in the first trial concerning the blood alcohol test done on Hammond after the wreck.

In the first trial district court jurors found Hammond guilty of driving under the influence of intoxicants on Feb. 8, 1986.

Hammond was charged by police after he allegedly pulled into the path of Kentucky State Trooper Darrell Presley at the intersection of old Ky. 461 and U.S. 150, Hammond, Presley and local constable Randall Stevens, who was a passenger in Presley's vehicle were injured.

Stevens has filed separate lawsuits against Presley and Hammond as a result of the accident.

New Mt. Vernon Post Office put on the shelf

Could be 3 years away



A Friday morning fire completely destroyed the Charles (Buck) Hurd residence at the Renfro Interchange. The family lost all their belongings in the fire. The house is reportedly owned by Paul McNew.

The construction of a new post office at Mt. Vernon is two to three years away, a spokesman for the U.S. Postal Service confirmed Tuesday.

Some reports locally had the new post office, located at Richmond and Lewis Streets, constructed in the spring.

"Funding for the purchase of the (Henderson) property was authorized, but the Postal Service did not fund the design and construction of the building," according to Gilbert Canfield, attorney for land acquisition for the Postal Service in Louisville.

However, purchase of the property at Mt. Vernon has been finalized and payment made, Canfield added.

In recent days, the Postal Service has warned that unless Congress refines a deficit-cutting bill, mail deliveries will be cut back, Saturday mail terminated, operating hours at post offices will be reduced and construction projects postponed or cancelled.

Canfield said this cut-back would not affect the Mt. Vernon Post Office since construction was not contemplated soon.

"We have budget problems from time to time," Canfield said, "and there have been freezes on money. But we work them out."

He said some projects have been postponed, but again, repeated it does not affect Mt. Vernon.

Two Kentucky projects are on the list for postponement, including a \$7.3 million mail processing annex in London. The annex would replace a hand-sorting mail operation with a mechanized plant, said Bob Roberts, who is

based in Corbin and supervises 144 post offices in southeastern Kentucky.

An annex site near the south London exit of Interstate 75 has been bought, and postal officials were hoping the plant would be ready in May 1989, Roberts said.

The other project in Kentucky to be postponed is a mail center in Bowling Green.

The Postal Service is protesting a provision in a budget bill passed by the Senate. The bill would require the semi-independent agency to pay \$1.7 billion over the next two years in health and retirement costs now absorbed by the federal government.

Resident protests use of city park land for new T-Ball field

Plans for a T-ball field on city property on old Brodhead Road drew a protest from a nearby resident at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

Ed Hunt, who lives nearby, asked the council to use a \$30,000 grant (if it's approved) and \$30,000 in matching funds for a T-ball field at another location.

The council voted to continue to solicit grant money for Mt. Vernon park, which would mean a T-ball field would be developed.

The vote was three councilmen for the idea and two abstentions. Councilman Jerry Pensel did not

attend the meeting.

Voting to solicit the funds were councilmen Larry Burdette, Billy Ray Doan, and Jackie Renner. Renner voted yes "with reservations," namely, if that was the only area available for the T-ball field. Abstaining were councilmen Tom Welch and Joe Martin. Martin lives near the proposed field.

Incidentally, a similar application for a grant was turned down last year by the Kentucky Land and Water Conservation Fund (LAWCF) officials. It remains to be seen if the project will score higher this coming year.

Money for the \$30,000 in matching funds would come from

contributions from businesses and residents, not from city funds.

Hunt told the council he did not think the three-acre park was the place for a T-ball field, and that perhaps the money could be used for some other project or for a T-ball field at another location.

Hunt related the Park area was part of Lake Linville land purchase and was imminent domain for use in case of flooding.

"I also think it will be a public nuisance," Hunt declared. He added there will be no police control, and noted that police can't control the city aid Lake Linville, so he couldn't see how they

could control the park without added policemen.

"I don't think there is a sufficient force to police the area," Hunt said.

City Clerk Kay Rader noted there is not a lot of noise at the T-ball field at Brodhead where Mt. Vernon youngsters play.

Mayor Elizabeth Baker told Hunt the reason the park was chosen was because it was already city-owned and that youngsters in Mt. Vernon have no T-ball field of their own. T-ball participants are between the ages of five and eight.

A public hearing on recreational needs of the city will be held at 2 p.m. today (Thursday)

at city hall. The LWCF has \$4,000 in grant funds that are available to the city based on \$4,000 in matching funds from the city. That grant, if approved, could also be used to at least get a T-ball field underway.

In other action, the council approved a request from Clifford Collins to extend the KU tower with an antenna to be used to contact his employees by radio.

The tower is on U.S. 25 south and belongs to Kentucky Utilities. The council was told the extended antenna would help the city fire department in making contact with firemen. Collins will pay the difference in the city's bill for use of the tower.

The second and final reading of an ordinance prohibiting water skiing on Lake Linville was approved by the council by a 5-0 vote and will be published in the Signal as required.

The council voted to cover the city's parking meters through the Christmas season and to allow employees to be off on Christmas Eve.

On hand for the council session were three of the new councilmen who will take seats on Jan. 11. They were Tommy Russell, Earl Nichols and Wayne Adams.

Mayor Baker thanked the councilmen who made their last appearance, (Joe Martin, Jackie

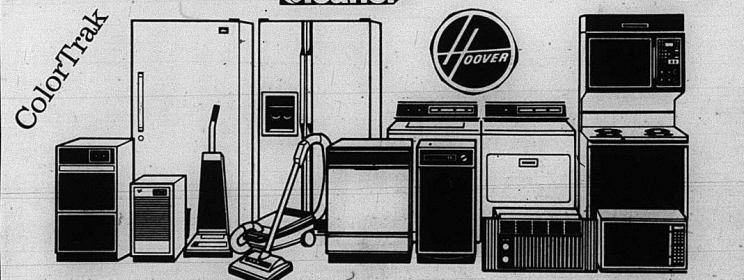

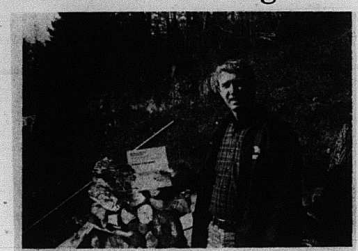

Certificate of Recognition

C. Paul Cash, a Rockcastle County timberland owner, was recently presented with a certificate of recognition from the Courier Journal and Louisville Times "Tom Wallace Farm Forest Contest" by Kenneth Thompson, Service Forester with the Kentucky Division of Forestry.

The Farm Forestry Contest, sponsored each year by the two Louisville newspapers, seeks to promote good forest management by recognizing those Kentucky and Southern Indiana woodland owners who are doing outstanding jobs in managing small woodland tracts. The contestants are nominated by foresters annually to be judged for \$1,000 in prize money for the top three winners. Besides cash prizes, all county nominees receive recognition certificates and district winners receive specially designed plaques.

C. Paul Cash was presented with the certificate for having carried out a woodland management program with definite objectives and having carried out definite plans for fire protection, protection from grazing by livestock, and forest insect and disease protection. Woodland management accomplishments such as timberland improvement, tree planting, products harvested, erosion control, wildlife enhancement, and recreational development are also items considered in judging the nominations.

Mr. Cash began his woodland management program in 1985 when he contacted the Kentucky Division of Forestry about some advice on harvesting his timber, since several loggers had offered to buy his timber. A service forester examined the tract to determine the varieties of the trees present, their ages, condition and quality. Mr. Cash was advised to conduct a selective harvest where only selectively marked trees are sold. Using the Kentucky Division of Forestry's timber marking services, Mr. Cash sold this selectively marked timber for more than he was offered for the entire boundary before, and yet improved his woodland for another harvest in the future.

Since then, Mr. Cash has thinned and pruned a small white pine plantation, planted a Christmas tree plantation, and improved his woodland by cutting firewood with the assistance of a forester from the Kentucky Division of Forestry. Many of these practices have improved timber production. Recreation use of the woodland also has been increased since the old logging roads have been cleaned up to serve as hiking trails.

It all began with a forest management plan from the Kentucky Division of Forestry, a service which is free to Kentucky woodland owners. Why not join the ranks of those like C. Paul Cash who are getting the most

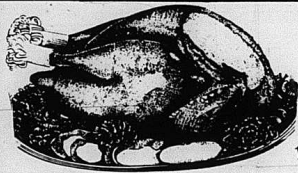

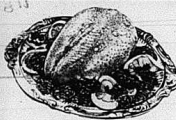

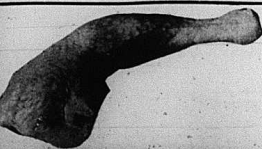

HOLIDAY WEIGHT WATCHING TIPS

Holiday parties and celebrations offer lots of opportunities to eat and drink - that's why it's so easy to view them as a time when sensible eating habits don't apply. But all too often large holiday dinners, office parties and gourmet gift baskets can result in extra pounds. The good news is they don't have to. The following tips can help you and your guests stay slim during the holidays:

If you're a guest:
--Attend cocktail parties and dinners dressed in flattering knits or other slenderizing attire. If the garment just fits or is figure-revealing, chances are you'll be more conscious of how much you eat, since overeating will "show" immediately. A snug waist or tight belt helps, too.
--Don't go to parties with an empty stomach. Eat light



throughout the day and have a low-calorie snack such as yogurt before leaving home to help curb your appetite.

--Arrive "fashionably late" to dinner parties. This way you'll be less tempted to sample too many hors d'oeuvres during the cocktail hour.

--Limit consumption of alcohol to no more than one drink. Remember that alcohol is not only high in calories, but it may also weaken your resolve to eat discriminately. If you know you want wine with dinner, save on calories by sticking to low-calorie, non-alcoholic drinks such as tomato juice, club soda or mineral water beforehand.

--No need to totally deprive yourself of holiday desserts. If the homemade pumpkin pie or the warm apple strudel are your absolute favorites, allow yourself one or two bites. Remember the

third or fourth bites don't taste any better than the first two.

If you're a host or hostess:
--When planning holiday menus, choose a few favorite dishes rather than overwhelming guests by preparing all your specialties.

Keep in mind that you can please guests with good tasting, expertly prepared foods that are low in fat and calories. Consider serving lean cuts of meat, fish or poultry. Fresh vegetables seasoned with lemon juice and freshly ground pepper can be as tasty and far less caloric than those served with heavy creams or

--As the host of a holiday meal or party, be considerate of your guests. Don't insist that they take a second helping, especially if you know they're watching their weight.

--While the abundance of parties and dinners may make it difficult to lose weight during the holidays, a little planning with moderation in mind will help maintain weight.

CHRISTMASSY SPINACH MOLDS

2 (10 oz) packages frozen chopped spinach
1 cup chopped onion
6 eggs, slightly beaten
1 1/2 cups milk
3 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
1/4 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
teaspoon savory
1 tablespoon vinegar
8 tomato slices, but 1/2 inch thick

Cook spinach according to directions on package; drain thoroughly. With kitchen shears cut spinach into smaller pieces. Chop onion into very fine pieces. Combine beaten eggs and milk; mix well. Combine spinach, onion, egg-milk mixture, butter, salt, pepper, savory and vinegar. Divide the mixture evenly between 8 well-greased 5-ounce custard cups. Place cups in shallow utility pan in 1-inch of hot water. Bake in oven at 350 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes or until a silver knife comes out clean when inserted in center of mold.
Place tomato slices on foil sprayed with a non-stick

vegetable spray. Sprinkle tomato slices with salt, pepper and pimentos cheese. Put in oven the last 5 minutes the spinach molds are baking. Loosen spinach from custard cup by running a thin spatula around edge. Pat tomato slices on serving dish. Invert custard cup over tomato to unmold spinach. Garnish with pimento strip or chopped red sweet pepper.

The 4-H American Heritage Conference makes this plus much more possible for high school freshmen or sophomores. This year's conference will be held two weeks in April.

The week long conference is held at the National 4-H Center in Washington, D.C. The conference helps youth from all across Kentucky gain a greater understanding and appreciation of American Heritage and our national government.

Any freshman or sophomore in high school who hasn't participated before would be eligible to attend. Each delegate will need to complete a 4-H government project, attend an orientation meeting with parents and should plan to continue their participation in 4-H after returning.

The cost of the conference last year was \$340. Applications and fees will be due February 2nd. For more information, contact the Cooperative Extension Service at 256-2403.

This program is jammed packed with fun and educational experiences.

Your extension service

The Extension Service today delivers unbiased new technology and information in four program areas: Home Economics, Agriculture, Youth Development (4-H) and community development. Our mission is to extend education in agriculture, community improvement, and leadership to the principles of helping people help themselves!

The Rockcastle County Cooperative Extension Service is a unique cooperative agreement between the USDA, the University of Kentucky and Rockcastle County.

Presently three agents, as University of Kentucky employees, advise and administer the Extension programs in the county. These programs are planned and often conducted by the people of the county. Tom Mills is the County Extension Agent for Agriculture, Cheryl Witt is the County Extension Agent for Home Economics and John McQuary is the County Extension Agent for 4-H. All three agents have responsibilities in 4-H and Community Development as well. The Expanded Food and Nutrition Program is a federally funded program also supervised by the Home Economics Agent.

The agents are located in the Cooperative Extension Service Office in the Agricultural Services Building in Mt. Vernon. The telephone number is 256-2403. All programs and services provided by the Extension Service are available to all persons without regard to race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, and handicap.

During 1987, the Agricultural Extension program included dairy herd improvement records with four local dairies. Two farms are in the planning stages of free stall barns. Shortcourses, newsletters and beef manage-

ment projects have been conducted to assist the beef producer. The Beef association has grown to 25 members and continues to grow. The annual beef derby is a very exciting and intense demonstration. Other demonstrations were on corn yields. Demonstrations on johnsongrass control and forages have also been held. Recommendations were given to farmers on forage varieties, weed control, and soil fertility. Information was also provided to farmers in pepper, strawberry and sorghum production, as well as other commercial vegetables.

4-H is the largest youth organization in Rockcastle County. From July, 1986 to June, 1987 2,217 youth participated in organized 4-H clubs, camps, activities and school enrichment projects. This means 76 percent of the school age youth in Rockcastle County participated in some way in the 4-H program. Activities include 4-H camp, variety shows, speech contest, demonstration contest, fashion shows, fair exhibits, 4-H week, American Heritage conference, land and vegetable judging and community pride. All of these activities have shown increases in participation during the past year. Horse and dairy judging teams have both went to state competition. 4-H project groups are held for electric, foods, clothing, woodcraft and dairy projects. Class room projects are conducted by local teachers. Over 233 volunteer leaders are involved in the 4-H program.

The Home Economics program includes the Extension Rockcastle County conference. As of July 1, 1987, membership was 177 persons which represents 108 club members, and 69 county-wide members. There are current-

The Kentucky State Police agency has been a prime force in the movement, co-sponsoring Project Graduation training workshops with the Kentucky

Department of Education, State Police Commissioner Morgan Elkins and McDonald spoke at the conference.

Beware of fires Tips for safe use of portable kerosene heaters

Winter is staring us in the face again, so are heating bills. For the millions of people who use portable heaters, the cost can be reduced.

Portable electric heaters cost between \$20 and \$250 and use about 10 to 15 cents worth of electricity per hour.

In 1985, portable electric heaters caused 3,700 residential fires, resulting in 160 deaths. The main reason? Placing the heater too close to combustibles, putting articles of clothing near the heater to dry, and using extension cords that were too light.

Portable kerosene heaters cost between \$80 and \$300 and use from 2 to 10 cents worth of fuel per hour and produce up

to four times the heat output of electric heaters.

In 1985, kerosene heaters caused 2,800 residential fires, resulting in 140 deaths. The one major reason was sudden flare-ups, probably caused by using kerosene contaminated with gasoline or other flammable liquid.

To protect home and family, follow these safety tips: Use a heater that doesn't tip over easily and one that automatically shuts off when it does tip over.

Use uncontaminated kerosene. If the heater does flare up, turn it off at once. Don't move it because it will flare up more. If the heater can't be turned off, call the

fire department and leave the house immediately. Close all doors behind you.

Kerosene heaters also emit two noxious gases! Nitrogen dioxide and carbon monoxide. When in use, keep room doors open for good ventilation so that these gases won't build up to dangerous levels.

These less expensive heating appliances can be very practical if used properly. Have a safe winter.

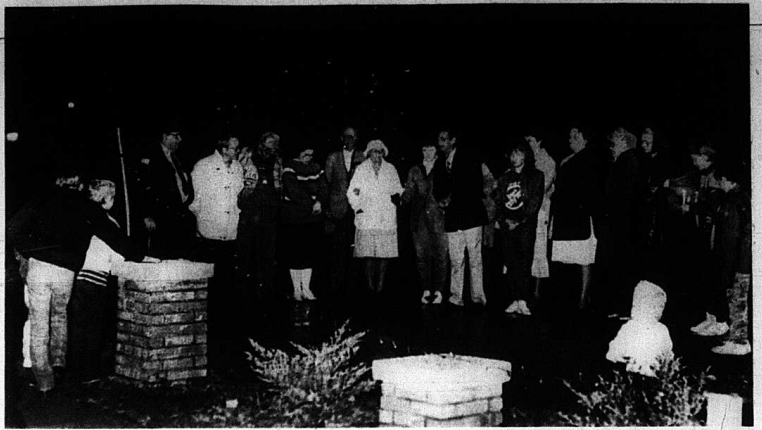

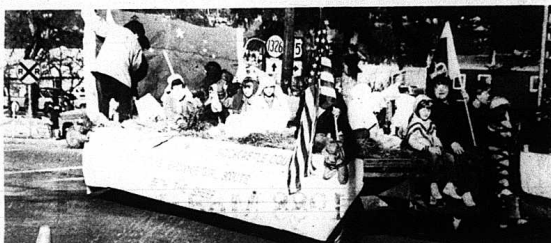

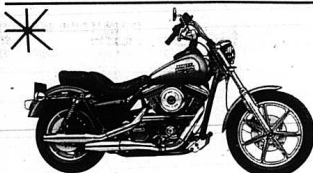
