

#### Car-Train crash kills local woman

A 26-year-old Mt. Vernon woman was killed and two Richmond men were seriously injured when their car was struck by a train at a crossing in Richmond last Saturday night.

The dead woman was identified as Elizabeth Anne Barron Sherman of West Main Streat, according to Rockeastle deputy coroner Roy Martin.

Jerry Kelly, 30, and Ronny T. Winkler, 27, were both taken to the University of Kentucky Medical Center. Kelly was listed in serious condition and Winkler fair.

According to Randy Isaacs of the Richmond Police Departthe Richmond Police Department, the accident occurred at 8 p.m. Saturday when the car's' driver, who has not been determined, tried to go through lowered gates at the Four Mile Avenue railroad crossing.

#### ACP sign-up begins after new year

The first 1988 agricultural conservation program (ACP) sign-up-priod has been set for Jan-1 through Feb. 15, according to an announcement by the Rockcastle ASCS office.

According to Benton Bullock, chairman of the county ASCS committee, practices available to the farmers of this county include seedings, no-clill, water conserva-

seedings, no-till, water conserva-tion and forestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices available for this period is available in the county office.

Seeding practices, both new seedings and renovations must first have a current soil sample in the County Extension Office before signing for Cost-Sharing. Rockcastle County is now under the variable cost-sharing method. Requests are evaluated at the end of the sign-up period according to soil erosion by the District Soil Conservationist. ACP practices which result in the highest saving of soil may receive up to 75 percent of the actual cost

of completing the practice.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASCS Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.
Participants receiving approvals of ACP-245's are urged to carefully read the ACP-245 request form and to do the work according to the instructions contained therein. Special attention should be given to the extent approved block of the approved ACP-245' as this could differ [Cont. to 13]



Children in some countries were taught that the Christ Child would bring gifts to them if they behaved. In England, youngsters ware the world, and youngsters ware the wist of Father Time; in Spain, Balthazar; in Italy, Befara; in Denmark, Jules-Nissen, and in Germany, Belsnickel. Americans liked the idea, a sudden buying spree saved the economy, and more than 60 years later the Christmas season is still the most important time for

Reindeer was born. A lew year-Reindeer was born. A lew year-later, cowboy singer Gene Autry made Rudolph a permanent fix-utre in American Christimas lowe. Another Christimas song not only became one of the all-time hits, but also added a new mean-ing to the holiday. When Irving Berlin and Bing Crosby combin-ed to give us "White Christmas," they established the idea that Christmas was more than just a holiday, it symbolized hopes and dreams, family ties and the beau-ty of sharing and loving. 



For men the HDL Cholesterol


