KU CUSTOMERS' RATES REDUCED AGAIN

Effective January 1, all retail customers of Kentucky Utilities Company will be paying less for their electric service. This is the second phase of a two-part reduction that lowers the average residential customer's monthly bill by a total of about \$1.51.

The new rates reflect the effects of the Federal Tax Reform Act of 1986. Phase one of the reduction became effective last March when the average residential bill went down about 99 cents. Beginning in 1988, the cost goes down an additional 52 cents. "We know our customers

welcome any lowering of the cost of their electric service," commented John T. Newton, president of KU. "Certainly, it pleases us to be able to continue giving reliable service and to provide it at very favorable rates. We're committed to continuing that record."

Since 1984, a residential customer's bill for 750 kilowatt hours of electricity has dropped 12 percent -- from \$42.88 to \$37.67 with the new rates -- for a savings of \$5.21.

Contel converts to equal access long distance service

Eighty-eight percent of Continental Telephone of Kentucky customers in Laurel, Pulaski, Clay, Knox and Rockcastle counties selected and were converted to equal access long distance service Dec. 12.

The 12 percent who did not make a selection are being assigned at random to the three long distance companies participating in the equal access offering: AT&T, U.S. Sprint, or MCI.

The notification of assignment is being mailed Jan. 26. It will include a "second-chance" ballot which gives assigned customers another two weeks to select the company they want to provide their long distance service. Their long distance service continues as usual in the meantime. Those who still do not make a selection will be connected to their assigned carrier by March 12.

Bill Dezarn, Contel's superintendent-telephone services for the area, said it is important for Contel customers to choose a long distance company. "Those who didn't respond to the first ballot back in September are being assigned at random to one of the participating companies. They will remain assigned to that company unless they vote the "second-chance" ballot to make a choice.

"Making a choice on the first or second ballot is free of charge. After a choice is made, changing companies will incur a \$5 service charge. Customers who make no choice on either ballot remain with their assigned company; they also will incur the service charge if they want to change to another company after June 9, 1988, Dezarn said. "There is no monthly charge for equal access and it works on both rotary and touch tone phones. No installer visit is required for hookup," he said.

With equal access, callers can dial "11" (or "00") plus the area code and number, and call over the long distance carrier of their choice. Prior to equal access, dialing "11" (or "00") connected callers only with AT&T. Without equal access, lengthy access codes must be dialed to gain a connection with any other long distance company. Customers who elect to have no primary long distance carrier will have to decide which carrier they want to use each time they make a long distance call, then use a lengthy access code to make connections with that carrier.

Equal access is applied to all telephones where it offers an exception for party-line and coin customers. Long distance calls for these types of service will continue to be handled as they are now.

Both Contel and the long distance companies prefer that customers make their choices and mail their ballots. "This will ensure that customers get the company of their choice and avoid the service charge incurred in changing companies," Dezarn said.

"Contel is providing equal access to its customers and take advantage of competition in long distance telephone service. Under a federal court-ordered Bell Telephone companies to provide equal access. Contel arranged for several long distance companies to provide comparable connections-and competitive pricing -- for Contel customers."

Dezarn said, "This is the first time Contel customers have had a chance to shop around among several long distance companies for the rates and services they prefer. Each company offers advantages and features which must be weighed in along with the customer's long distance calling needs and patterns. Contel recommends that customers call equal access long distance companies directly for details needed to make a choice. Only the customer is in a position to decide what's needed, so Contel can make no recommendation about which long distance company to choose."

EKU Scholars

Three students from Rockcastle County are attending Eastern Kentucky University as recipients of EKU's Regent's and Presidential Scholarships.

This year EKU has expanded its scholarship program to help make higher education more accessible for outstanding Kentucky high school students.

Students with high school grade point averages of 3.75 on a 4.0 scale and ACT (American College Test) scores of 25 or higher are eligible to apply for Regent's Scholarships at EKU.

Regent Scholarships are full tuition and activity fee awards. And Kentucky high school valedictorians and salutatorians may be awarded EKU Presidential Scholarships. Other Presidential Scholarship awards may be made to students based in rank in their graduating class.

Presidential Scholarships at EKU have an annual value of \$500 and may be renewed for up to four years.

Last year EKU awarded approximately 25 Regents Scholarships and 40 Presidential Scholarships to university officials said.

This figure changes from year to year, officials said, and the hope is to expand it dramatically. "We often hear that many of our students are talented students do not continue their education in Kentucky," said EKU President Hanly Funderburk.

"We would like to help correct that. Toward this goal EKU has expanded its academic scholarship program this fall to help recognize the achievements of outstanding high school seniors and future university-level scholars."

He said the program also should help attract top scholars to EKU.

Under the new scholarship program, National Merit Finalists and Semifinalists will automatically be eligible for EKU Honor Award. This scholarship will provide its recipients with full tuition and activity support, plus additional stipends which may defray other educational expenses.

The expanded program will automatically provide Regents Scholarships to Governor's Scholarship Program participants, members of the Academic All-State Team, and students with ACT composite scores of 29 or higher.

Many other scholarships and awards administered through the EKU Foundation, are available to qualified students.

DEPENDENTS NEED SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS

People in the Richmond area who have children or other dependents they plan to claim on their 1987 Federal income tax returns should apply for Social Security number must be shown for each dependent age 5 or over, Bob Anderson, Social Security Manager in Richmond, said recently.

If a child or other dependent does not have a number, then one should be applied for without delay. It is easy to apply, Anderson said. All a person has to do is complete an application and provide evidence of date of birth, identity, and U.S. citizenship or lawful alien status. A person 18 or older who has never had a Social Security number must apply in person. A parent applying on behalf of a child must provide evidence of his or her identity.

For a person born in the U.S., a birth certificate can provide evidence of both date of birth and identity. For a person applying at school, medical, day care, or similar documents can be used to establish identity.

Only original documents or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used. Photocopies and notarized copies are not acceptable. The documents will be returned.

All it takes to start the application process is a phone call to the Richmond Social Security office, Anderson said. The telephone number is 256-5109. The people there will be glad to answer any questions.

THE MEDICINE CHEST

Ferrous fumarate, ferrous sulfate, ferrous gluconate, iron-poly saccharide—all these are big names for iron supplements. Iron supplements are used when the body does not have enough iron to produce the amount of normal red blood cells needed to keep you in good health. Although most people get enough iron from their diet, some must take additional amounts to meet

their needs. Your doctor can determine if you need an iron supplement and recommend the best one for you.

Before using an iron supplement, tell your doctor or pharmacist if you are allergic to any medicines, are taking any other medicines, or have any other medical problems.

Iron is best taken on an empty stomach with water or juice about one hour before meals or 2 hours after meals. However, iron may be taken with food to lessen the chance of stomach upset. If you do this, certain foods should

not be taken at the same time. These include dairy products, eggs, tea, coffee, and whole-grain products.

Do not take large amounts of iron for longer than six months without checking with your doctor. People differ in their need for iron and some can gradually become poisoned over a period of time. Also unabsorbed iron can mask the presence of blood in the stool, which may delay discovery of a serious condition.

As few as three or four iron tablets can cause serious poisoning in a small child. So remember, keep this and all other medicines out of the reach of children.

Farmers and taxes

Kentucky cattle producers and dairymen may end up paying an additional \$28.5 million in taxes this year due to a wrinkle in the 1986 Federal Tax Reform Act that discourages them from deducting certain expenses.

"The federal tax law no longer allows farmers to deduct all of the yearly expenses associated with some yet-to-produce assets such as replacement heifers, if they want to use accelerated depreciation schedules later," said Fred Benson, University of Kentucky Extension agricultural economist.

Farmers who choose now to deduct their preproduction expenses as current expenses—as most have done in the past—will lose tax advantages later, Benson said, because the depreciation schedule for doing so is at a much slower rate.

In addition, he said, farmers who elect to continue to deduct such preproduction expenses for their cattle must also use the longer and slower rate of depreciation for all assets—not just the cattle.

Under the new tax law, farmers who want to use the accelerated depreciation schedule will be allowed to deduct no expenses associated with raising a replace-

ment heifer until she has calved, he said.

The new law provides that the animal can be depreciated over several years at an accelerated rate, but depreciation does not begin until the animal has dropped the first calf. Thus, farmers must hold their expenses back and not consider them to be business expenses until the animal can appear on a depreciation schedule, Benson said.

Benson calculated what the implications of the new law may have on dairy and beef farmers in the state and estimates that if 75 percent of Kentucky beef and dairy farmers elect to capitalize their preproduction expenses they will pay an additional \$28.5 million for federal, state and social security taxes in 1987.

Benson said that the law may be changed by Congress in a technical corrections bill; however, unless that happens, Kentucky beef and dairy farmers will be paying substantially more in taxes.

Farmers other than dairy and beef farmers will be affected by the loss of preproduction expense deduction, Benson said. Other types of farmers affected by the loss include horse farmers and orchardists who have recently planted additional trees.

1988 earnings base - rate to increase

The annual earnings base—the maximum amount of earnings that counts for Social Security—will increase to \$45,000 for 1988, up from \$43,800 for 1987. In addition, the 1988 tax rate for employees and their employers will increase to 7.51 percent, up from the 1987 rate of 7.15 percent. Bob Anderson, Social Security manager in Richmond, said recently.

The increase in the wage base is based on the change in average earnings levels from 1986 to 1987. The tax rate increase was already a part of the Social Security law. The effective tax rate for self-employed people will rise from -12.3 percent to 13.02 percent for 1988.

The increase in the tax rate will amount to \$7.20 a month for a person earning \$2,000 a month.

Other Social Security figures are scheduled to increase in 1988 as well, Anderson said. The annual exempt amount used in the annual earnings test will increase. The annual earnings test in the

measure used to determine whether a person who works will receive benefits during the year.

The 1988 annual exempt amount for people 65 through 69 will be \$8,400, up from the 1987 amount of \$8,160. The 1988 exempt amount for people under 65 all of 1988 will be \$6,120 up from the 1987 amount of \$6,000.

A person whose earnings do not exceed the annual exempt amount will receive all benefits for the year. A person's benefit is reduced by \$1 for each \$2 of earnings above the exempt amount. The annual earnings test does not apply once a person reaches 70.

The amount of earnings needed to earn a quarter of coverage—the measure of Social Security work credit—will be \$470 in 1988, up from \$460 for 1987. In 1988, a worker will earn four quarters of coverage if his or her annual earnings are \$1,880 or more.

Germany and having to be away from his family for nine months.

"These experiences are very gratifying personally and they could help me get a job in the future," he said.

Martin's hometown of Pinneberg is a bit different than Mt. Vernon. The population of Pinneberg is about 40,000. It is located only 20 minutes from downtown Hamburg, which has a population of 1.2 million.

Even though he lives near a large metropolitan area, Martin is still familiar with farming. Martin adds, "the farms in Germany are normally much smaller than in the United States because land is so difficult to come by there."

Martin's father runs a Ford automobile dealership and his mother works in the office. By the way, the Ford cars are designed and built in Germany.

His only brother, Stefan, studies economics at the University of Hamburg. When asked of his future plans, Martin says much of this will be determined when at the end of his gymnasium, our equivalent of high school, he must pass a test called the abitur, which will determine his getting accepted into a university.

Unlike in the United States where practically everyone is afforded the opportunity to attend college, German universities are difficult to gain admission.

When asked to compare education in Germany with education he had experienced here, Martin said, "the students in America say and do things we would never think of in Germany."

"I think part of this stems from the fact that there is more pressure on the German students because they must do extremely well in order to gain admission into a university," he said.

Martin also said there was no paddling in the German schools. Another difference between a German and American school is the curriculum, especially in the area of foreign languages.

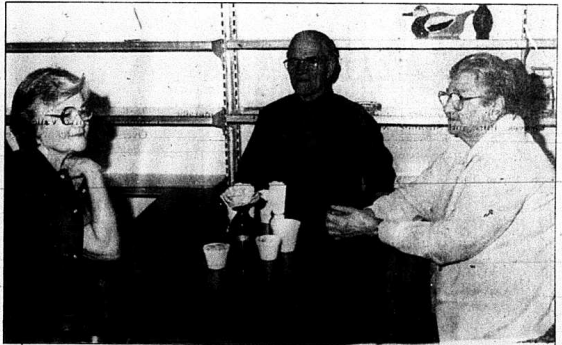

Finally, Martin discussed what he has gained thus far from his experiences in Kentucky. In his humorous manner, he replied, "a few extra pounds, since football season ended, and a better insight into the people of the United

States."

Martin's host family, Jack and lone Parsons, are indeed fortunate to have such a delightful young man spending the school year with them. Although only a short time was spent with Martin, he was a very open, humorous, and personable 17-year-old from West Germany.

So the next time you think of Germany you could think of the division of Germany, of Presi-

dent Reagan's deployment of Pershing II missiles, or you could think of what Martin Zukowsky and his friends will be thinking about: Going to school, the next ballgame, and Saturday night.

Note: if you have ever studied a foreign language you can really appreciate someone who is fluent in a language other than their native language. So, for this article's sake, the interview was conducted in English.

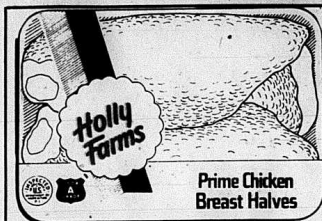

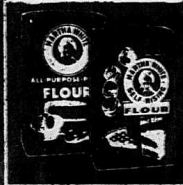

Five charged in grand jury indictments

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down several indictments last week including a five count indictment against a Mt. Vernon man.

Ottie Kirby, 26, of Route 1, Mt. Vernon, was charged with two counts of wanton endangerment in the first degree, criminal mischief in the second degree, assault in the fourth degree, and public intoxication.

All five counts stemmed from a Nov. 8 incident in which Kirby is accused of swinging an ax at and aiming a .22 caliber pistol at Charles Prickett of Route 3, Berea.

Kirby is also accused of hitting Prickett with his fists and carving on and hitting Prickett's automobile with an ax, as well as being accused of being drunk in public.

William Howard Jr., 20, of Route 3, Mt. Vernon, was indicted on a first degree wanton and endangerment charge after he allegedly shot at Bo Shelton and Robert May of Conway on Nov. 18.

Steve Milburn, 27, of Route 2, Livingston, was indicted for second degree assault for an altercation that occurred at Druther's Restaurant in Mt. Vernon on Dec. 2.

Bradley found in dump

A Rockcastle County man found dead Saturday in a roadside garbage dump died of a single gunshot wound in the back, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell.

Dowell said that David Lee "Whitey" Bradley, 19, of Livingston, apparently was "leaned over running" when he was shot.

The bullet left Bradley's chest and became lodged in his jawbone, Dowell said.

State police detective Ernie Boggs of the Kentucky State Police London Post said Bradley probably was shot to death and then left at the garbage site on the banks of Crooked Creek at Poplar Gap. Boggs said he thought Bradley was shot about 3 a.m. Saturday.

"He was last seen alive at a friend's home, where he was playing cards," Boggs said.

Bradley's mother, Doris Jean Renner, and his wife, Alene

Bradley, became worried about him when he did not show up for Christmas dinner Friday, Boggs said. The women began looking for Bradley on Saturday morning.

Local hunters, driving by the dumpsite, found Bradley's partially clothed body about 12:30 p.m., according to Boggs.

Boggs said Tuesday there is a suspect in the case and he is expected to make an arrest soon.

Bradley was to have been sentenced Jan. 22 in Rockcastle Circuit Court for a Jan. 17, 1986 break-in at Cox Hardware in Mt. Vernon. Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham had recommended a sentence of 6 months in the county jail after Bradley pleaded guilty to criminal trespassing in the first degree.

Bradley was also to have gone on trial in Rockcastle Circuit Court on Feb. 8 for wanton en-

Gadd shot nine times

Timothy Gadd, 36, of Mt. Vernon was listed in fair condition Tuesday at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington, after he was shot nine times in the chest and arms, Sunday morning.

Gary D. Napier, 34 of Cobb Creek Road in Garrard County, was charged with first-degree assault and lodged in the Lincoln County Jail, said state police detective Jerry Speck of the Richmond post.

The shooting occurred at 1:15

a.m. on Harmon's Lick Road in Garrard County, 14 miles east of Lancaster, Speck said.

The two men, who were described as acquaintances, had a "small altercation" that stemmed from a grudge, Speck said.

Gadd was shot as he sat in the back seat of a 1981 Chevrolet Citation. Two other people were sitting in the front seat of the car at the time of the shooting, but neither was injured, Speck said.

Speck declined to identify the owner of the car.

Crime stoppers eye county

Crime Stoppers will seek the help of residents in a double murder that occurred in Rockcastle County last year.

On Oct. 11, 1986, a car was found burned in a remote area of Rockcastle County, south of Mt. Vernon near the Pine Hill Community.

Two bodies were discovered in the car. Both had been shot and badly burned.

They were later identified as Mt. Vernon residents, 25-year-old Jackie McHargue and 40-year-old Emma Ingolia.

Police feel that they were shot in another location and transported to the murder scene off Mullins Station Road by Rockcastle Creek, where the car was set on fire.

They had been reported missing about a week before their bodies were found. The case re-

mains unsolved.

State Police investigators are seeking help from the residents in the area who may have knowledge of this brutal homicide, especially those who may be afraid of retaliation from the murderer(s), and are asking that anyone with information to please call Crime Stoppers in Lexington, and remain anonymous.

Crime Stoppers is offering a \$1,000 cash reward this week for information leading to the arrest of these person(s). Please call Crime Stoppers - collect - at (606)253-2020 between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays.

Crime Stoppers will also pay a cash reward between \$50 and \$1,000 for information which leads to an arrest on any other felony crime. Callers remain anonymous and do not have to testify in court.

Turley reported the commis-

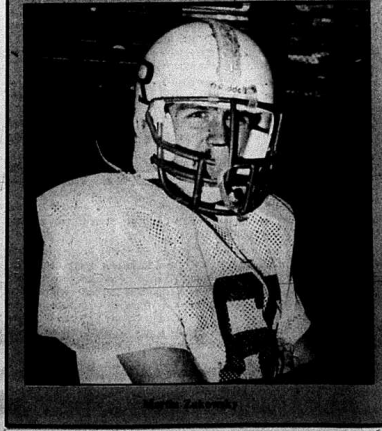
sion planned to nominate three to five for the judgeship immediately after the interviews. The panel could take 30 days to make its selection if it so chose.

A Weekly Report from Fifth District Congressman Hal Rogers

End of Session Brings Good News To Fifth District

While we have been working in Washington to reduce spending and pare down the huge federal deficit, there are still important needs for our district which must be met. As we passed our overall appropriations bill for 1988, I was pleased to see that our Fifth District projects all received important funding, while at the same time we reduced overall government spending to help meet our lower budget target.

As for our projects, I was delighted to help secure \$31 million in funding for the Cumberland Gap Tunnel. This project is essential to the economic growth of the entire southeastern corner of our district and state, and this money will help us begin actual tunneling through the mountain at Middleboro. This was another a big victory for us.

For those who live along the Upper Cumberland River, there was also good news. We appropriated another \$8.5 million to help finish up the U.S. 25-E floodwall-bypass at Pineville. In addition, I secured \$5 million to begin flood control work in Harlan County, and another \$1.15 million to raise the levees at Barbourville. For the thousands who live in the Upper Cumberland watershed, this flood control protection is a life-and-death matter.

In our battle to increase economic development and jobs through greater tourism, we received another \$3.5 million to help develop the Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area, along the Kentucky-Virginia border in McClary County. We need to spend more on this park, which I think can become a great national attraction. We will seek other funds and an end to local cost-sharing when Congress returns in January.

For tobacco growers, we kept intact funding for several efforts I have begun to help us find supplemental crops to help broaden our crop base. We will see more money going to the University of Kentucky to finish a marketing study so that we can reduce the risks for farmers who want to do fruits and vegetables in their operation. We will also provide important help to our farmer co-ops already up and running.

In the area of economic development, I was pleased to secure a planning grant to help us in our proposed Southern Kentucky Rural Economic Development Center project. This facility, to be centrally-located at Somerset Community College, will help us unite the efforts of the various volunteer groups in our region who are helping us recruit new industry, expand tourism and improve education.

The coal industry provides lots of jobs and vitality to our area. I was pleased to help successfully work for more funding for clean coal research. This new technology promises to greatly expand our demand for coal, while allowing us to use coal with greater efficiency and less environmental impact. I helped gather 60 members of Congress who petitioned the Appropriations Committee to increase the funding for clean coal. We succeeded in getting nearly \$600 million approved for this program, which will ultimately mean more coal being used nationwide.

While no session of Congress is totally successful, I believe we have achieved a great deal during 1987. And when Congress re-convenes in January, we will continue our efforts to create a better way of life for our region.

Is the garbage plan in dump?

As I looked at last year's December SIGNALS, I realized that our Rockcastle Fiscal Court had actually gone backwards in their efforts to implement a county-wide garbage plan.

At least this time last year county residents had the green dumpsters in which to throw their garbage. But in February, the county, which was facing a financial crisis voted to remove them. We were told to be patient, the much talked about garbage plan for the entire county was in the works.

Personally, I think that local residents have been quite patient with the fiscal court. It has been almost a year and the court is no closer to a county-wide garbage collection than they were a year ago.

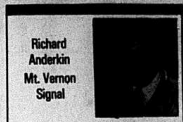
This is basic progress in Rockcastle County, don't you think.

Members of the court will tell you that they don't have any money with which to work, that their hands are tied and they are doing the best they can. Also they say things are going well with garbage.

Quite simply, if this is the best they can do, they might consider dissolving the court and saving the county the \$84,000 a year they collect in salaries.

The worse part of not having a garbage plan is the fact that as of this writing there are over 50 illegal trash dumps in the county. According to our local health inspector, a few new ones pop up each month and the situation will certainly not get any better until the court does something.

Some court members will argue that it is not their place to provide free garbage service to the county, that it is simply not feasible for a county this size, especially with all of the recent cuts in revenues that the federal government has made. But only a handful of residents really expect free garbage service. Most re-



sidents simply want a plan to dispose of their garbage and most are willing to pay for it.

The garbage plan drawn up for the county by the Cumberland

Valley Area Development District (CVADD) calls for a fee to be paid by the residents. But the court has done nothing at all to start implementing the plan.

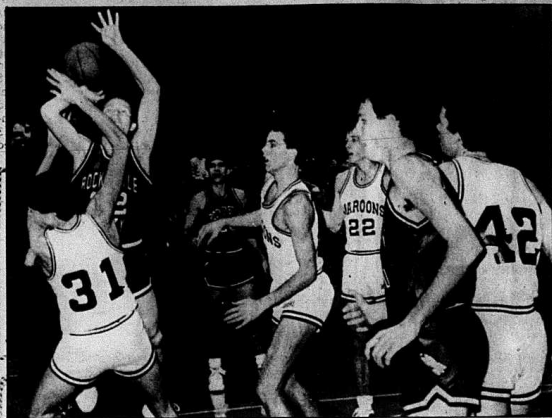

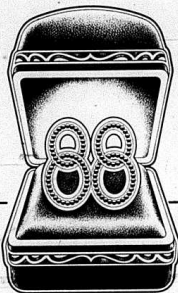
Pulaski's defensive pressure and poor shooting by the Rockets

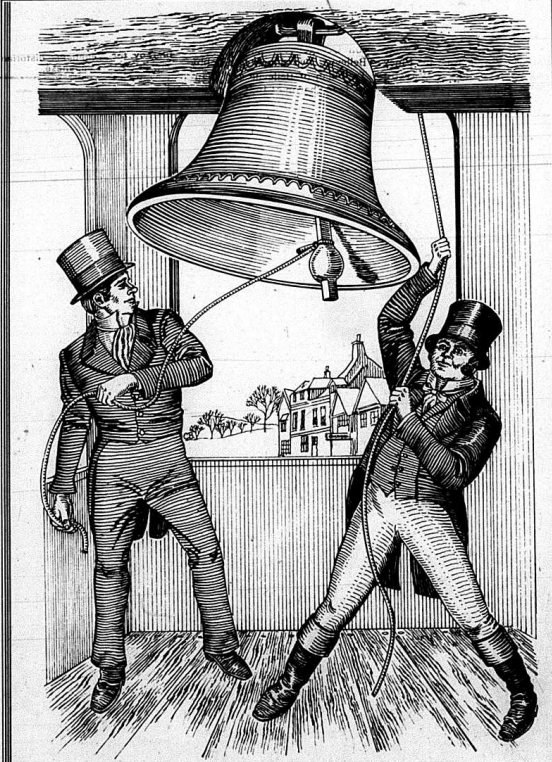
