Mt. Vernon site problems surface; schools will be checked for asbestos

A recent land survey that raises a question over the boundary of property adjacent to the Mt. Vernon Elementary School got the attention of the Rockcastle County Board of Education Tuesday night.

While surveying for the new Mt. Vernon Elementary School, Charles A. Mullins, land surveyor, detected a boundary discrepancy between the grade school property and the Snack Shack property, owned by Peggy Bowling and Russell Robbins. In short, it appears several feet of land on which the Snack Shack sits belongs to the school system and must be clarified by the state before the new building is constructed.

No action was taken concerning the discrepancy other than to authorize Superintendent Bige Towery to contact the Kentucky Department of Education's Buildings and Grounds Committee.

According to Towery they will review the situation and recommend the potential options.

Towery added that it is a law that local school boards must have approval of the Kentucky Department of Education before disposing of any property.

Asbestos is once again a concern of the school board because of a law passed recently.

The new law, called the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act, requires all school buildings to be inspected for all

asbestos containing materials during the next year by an accredited inspector.

The school board will have to employ a certified inspector to carry out the inspections. Towery said, "we do not anticipate any problem areas because of the work that has been done in the past." The board voted to designate transportation director Richard Bray, to coordinate activities concerning the asbestos inspections and any plans which must be made if asbestos is detected.

The board voted to have Bray attend a training course at the University of Kentucky in order to have someone on staff that is familiar with the asbestos situation and possible actions that must be taken.

In other action the board voted to renew the contract with Attorney Carl R. Clontz to represent the board on retainer at \$3,000 annually.

The board voted to employ Charles Cash, Jennifer Cox, and Koula Shivel as substitute teachers.

Venters federal judge finalist

Rockcastle/Pulaski Circuit Judge Daniel J. Venters has come a step closer to filling a vacant federal judgeship in Pikeville the result of a nominating commission hearing Saturday in Lexington.

The nine-member commission of the Federal Judicial Selection Commission of Kentucky chose Venters and two others to be presented to President Reagan who will choose one and send his name to the U.S. Senate for confirmation.

Also chosen was Joseph M. Hood, 45, of Russell, who has been a U.S. magistrate in Ashland for 12 years. He was a law clerk for a federal judge for three years before that time.

The third man was Karl S. Forester, 47, of Harlan, an at-

torney who has been in private practice for 21 years.

One person speculated this week that Venters would have a "good chance" to be named because of past experience.

At that time it will be up to U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell, Jim Bunning and Rep. Harold Rogers, and of course, Attorney General Edwin Meese to choose and I wouldn't be surprised if it isn't Dan Venters.

Another official close to the Rockcastle courts said he would "almost bet" that Venters will get the nod. "He's a good judge and I think he would make a good federal judge," he said.

If and when Venters was chosen, a circuit judge would be appointed to fill the Rockcastle/Pulaski circuit until

Brodhead will seek sewer plant grant

City to ask for \$300,000

Brodhead city officials were in London Wednesday for a pre-application conference on a grant to remedy problems at the city's sewer treatment plant.

The Brodhead City Council was told by James Cass, consultant for the city, that the city should ask for a \$210,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) and a \$90,000 loan through the Farmers Home Administration at a low interest rate.

Cass told the council the city's chances for the grant "looks better now than at any time recently."

He said the amounts asked for could be on the "high side," but that figure will be presented by the city.

Like Mt. Vernon earlier, Brodhead has been under pressure from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to remedy problems at the sewer plant for additional treatment, more tanks and more equipment.

Sewage from the plant sometimes runs into the Dix River especially during heavy rains, something the EPA finds unacceptable.

Cass said he had expected the city to be sued by the EPA at any time for not remedying the plant, but that the bigger towns, such as Middlesboro, have had the eye of

the EPA, leaving smaller towns until later.

"They start with the big towns and work down," Cass stated. "But now that we're beginning the process to remedy the plant I think the EPA will look on us favorably. We're back in 'the ballgame.'"

An earlier effort by the city to obtain a similar grant did not materialize.

In other action, the council voted \$5,000 to pay off a loan made some time ago by five residents for use by the fire department to help finance the new fire department building.

Councilman D.A. Robbins told the council the city had made that arrangement a long time ago and the city should live up to its bargain.

The council then voted unanimously to pay the \$4,000 loan, plus interest, and to give the remaining money to the department.

The council also voted to purchase a pump for one of its sewer lift stations at a cost of \$1,800 and to spend \$500 to remedy a drying bed block problem at the sewer plant.

Attorney Jerry Cox swore in the council including Mayor Billy Bussell and councilmen Johnny Wilcox, D.A. Robbins, Eddie Cash, and newcomer, Paul Owens.

Students' garbage survey

Getting a large majority of Rockcastle Countians to agree on any one issue is difficult, if not impossible.

However, according to a recent survey, conducted by the freshmen English class at Rockcastle County High School, there is one issue facing the county where there is a consensus of opinion. That issue is garbage.

According to the survey, 97 percent of the 360 households surveyed agree that Rockcastle County has a garbage problem.

An overwhelming 99 percent of those surveyed felt that something should be done about the current garbage disposal problem. The current method of disposing garbage along roadways by some residents, too,

gained the wrath of those participating in the survey when 98 percent felt that this was unhealthy and ugly.

Identifying the problem and finding ways to solve it are two different things and the survey indicated as much. Most residents, 71 percent, would prefer garbage collection on a weekly basis.

However, 56 percent opposed a uniform tax for each household on a county-wide pick-up system.

The price that residents are willing to pay was varied. 68 percent of those surveyed would not be opposed to a 25 cent per bag fee.

At a charge of 50 cents per bag, 57 percent indicated they would be opposed to such a plan.

When the survey asked a question about the county's current

Local transit expands service

A grant of \$32,260 from the federal and state governments public transportation division has been awarded to the Rockcastle County Senior Citizens Program to expand its existing service into rural areas of the county.

The general public may use the service according to Shirley Cummins, projects director for the senior citizen program.

Part of the grant money will be used to purchase a new van.

"Anyone of any age will be able to ride the buses to take care of business, shopping, errands or medical appointments," Mrs. Cummins said.

The service will be on a demand responsive basis, which means appointments must be scheduled one day in advance for pick-up. Persons who need the transportation will become familiar with which day the bus is to be in their area and make an appointment to ride for that day.

Rockcastle County Public Transit, the official name, will not operate outside the county, but will refer those who need to leave the county for non-emergency medical appointments, to other appropriate services.

"Our goal is to improve the transportation service for this area," Mrs. Cummins stated. "Clay County Transit and Jackson County Transit are currently taking persons from Rockcastle County to meet appointments in Lexington and other places," she said.

"We hope that persons of this area will take advantage of the new service. Anyone can ride the bus for less than they can drive their own vehicle. Senior citizens can do their shopping, banking, attend senior citizen centers and meet their medical appointments," she concluded.

There is a charge of \$1 a way for rural areas and 25 cents at each pick-up point in towns.

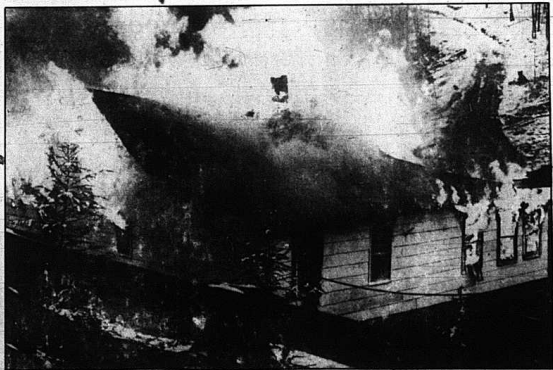

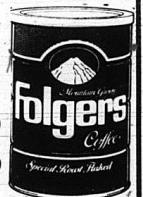

Garbage letter

Dear Editor: Rockcastle County is encountering a growing problem. The problem is trash. It's not going to stop and something is going to be done about it. The freshmen and sophomore classes at R.C.H.S. are studying the problem of trash and illegal dumping because of a program called Writing Across the Disciplines. It is funded by a grant from the state and encourages the students to do more writing in all subjects and to solve problems in their own community. One freshman English class sent out a survey to 360 households of freshmen and sophomores to see if the people know about the problem and what their neighbors opinion is. One of the first things that we found out from the survey was how many knew about the garbage problem and that something should be done. All except for about 3 percent were aware of the problem, though it was causing a problem, and that something should be done about it. This shows that people are aware of what is happening in their county.

The people were asked about how they feel when they see an illegal dump. About 86 percent were concerned about these dumps. When asked what should be done to people caught dumping illegally, just over half said they thought the offender should have to clean it up. I believe this, along with a heavy fine, would be a more suitable punishment.

One result that I didn't find very shocking was that about 62 percent said they didn't know that the county had a garbage plan not yet put into effect. This is not surprising since little is mentioned about the problem. When asked if they would oppose a uniform tax or fee for each household for a countywide pickup service, just a little over half said "no". And when asked if they would oppose a mandatory pick-up service that charged a fee of 25 cents per bag or container, 68 percent said "no". So this shows most people would rather pay by the container than pay a set rate. They said they would like to have their trash picked up once every week or two with a charge less than 50 cents per bag or container. Almost 81 percent said the county should pass and enforce this plan, and 72 percent believed it would work and eliminate illegal dumping if it was managed properly. This shows that the people are for a plan to clean up the bags and that they think it will do some good.

They were also asked if they would be willing to separate their trash and take it to a local recycling station. Just over half said "yes". However, when asked how they presently dispose of trash only 4 percent said they now take some to a recycling station. Most others said they burn the burnable while only a fourth said they took theirs to a pick-up station.

These results are interesting. They show that most people do give some thought to the problem and would like to see something done about it. Plus a good percentage said they would be willing to help the plan work. This is important because if the people want something to work, they are going to have to do their part.

In Peace Corp

Fields return to Honduras

When this issue of the Signal hit the street Wednesday night, Todd and Lynnell Fields may be back in their three room house, that is, if they caught the last bus from Sand Predo Sula.

Sand Predo Sula is the second largest city in Honduras, a Central American country of about 4.5 million people.

Todd and Lynnell are Peace Corp volunteers.

When they got married in 1984, little did they know that in December of 1987 they would be finishing a 15 month stint in a Central American country.

But, Todd said during a Monday interview, that he had always wanted to work for awhile in a foreign country and he finally talked Lynnell into it.

Todd and Lynnell did not go as smooth for them as for most Peace Corp volunteers.

Three days before they were suppose to leave on Feb. 9, 1986 for the Philippines, then President Marcos, upset with the United States government, canceled all American visas to his country.

So, Todd and Lynnell were back to square-one. Although they had been accepted into the Peace Corp, they had nowhere to go.

Three months later, they were notified that they were going to Honduras.

Before they could leave Todd had to take three months of state side training in his area of fish biology. He took that training in Oklahoma, while Lynnell continued to work as a dental hygienist until their September

1986 departure for Honduras.

Lynnell's Peace Corp job as a nurse, did not require state side training, but both Todd and Lynnell had to go through extensive language development while they lived with a Honduran family. During a three-month period, they also absorbed the Honduran culture.

The family that Todd and Lynnell lived with had only a two bedroom house, so the nine-member family slept in one room so Todd and Lynnell could have a bedroom of their own.

After the three months in Valle de Angeles, or Valley of the Angels in English, Todd and Lynnell were assigned to Pena Blanca, a village with about 2,500 people.

During the three months in Valle de Angeles, Todd and Lynnell learned enough Spanish to communicate with the people in their village, because unlike many foreign countries, English is not spoken.

Their modest two bedroom home has running water and electricity, but a stove, refrigerator, washer and dryer are not luxuries that Lynnell has.

Lynnell fixes most of the couple's meals on a hot plate, but considering that beans, rice, chicken and fresh fish are mostly what the couple eat, the preparation is not a difficult task.

Lynnell has learned to cook a lot with soybeans, abundant crop in Honduras and many times part of the lectures she gives to women's groups are on how to cook with soybeans.

In the very rich farmland soybeans are easy to grow and have

lot of protein. Lynnell says that Hondurans simply do not know how to use them.

Although the native Hondurans eat pork and beef, Todd and Lynnell could not be accused of

"It was the judgment of the Commission that the three named are the most qualified for the position," Robert Turley of the Kentucky Selection Commission, reported following the hearing.

The Pikeville position opened when Judge G. Wix Unthank, of Harlan, received permission to vacate the seat.

Unthank, 64, was appointed to the Post in 1980 but suffered a stroke 18 months ago.

The nominating commission met Saturday in Lexington and interviewed eight applicants for the judgeship, spending about half an hour with each.

Bruce Davis, the executive director of the Kentucky Bar Association, said 23 people applied for the post. The nominating commission met Dec. 23 and narrowed that list to nine.

Lexington attorney Richard Ward later withdrew his name, citing personal reasons.

Turley said the commission did extensive work in selecting its nominees.

"It's a matter of choosing the best-qualified person from among a number of qualified people," he stated.

The commission also took into account the applicants' willingness to move to Pikeville.

Several mountain bar associations, concerned that federal court sessions in Pikeville might end, passed resolutions asking the commission to nominate candidates from Eastern Kentucky to hold court there.

The three nominees said they were willing to move to Pikeville, Turley said.

The commission is a non-partisan body made up of three appointees each from Ford, McConnell and the state bar association.

The other five men interviewed were: James Wiley Craft, 42, commonwealth's attorney for Letcher County; Glev Gambill, 42, an Assistant U.S. Attorney in Louisville; Charles Lowe Jr., a circuit judge in Pike County; John David Preston, 37, commonwealth's attorney for Johnson, Lawrence and Martin counties; and Lexington attorney West Armstrong West, 47, a former assistant federal prosecutor.

As part of a recent survey done by an English Class at RCHS, the 360 households surveyed were asked to put their comments at the bottom of the page.

Some of those comments, both pro and con follow. Those surveyed were not asked to reveal their name, but many did anyway. We have decided to leave the names off because all those surveyed did not use their name.

"If the county would pick up my trash I would gladly pay a fee, but 50 cents a bag is too much. \$5.00 a month would be fair."

"Someone dumped two bags of garbage on our land and we did not like it."

"I think the Judge and Magistrates are doing the best they can with what they have to work with, lets just give them a little time."

"The first step to take care of the garbage problem should start at the court house, completely clean it out."

"Rockcastle has many problems, garbage is just one of them, it does not matter what the people want they will get what a few want them to have, that is the way it has always been in Rockcastle County."

"We have a garbage man from Jackson County we pay \$3.00 a month and they come right to our house and pick up the trash once a week, we get water from Jackson County and we may have to get Jackson County to pave the road we live on."

"The city of Livingston has its own private pick-up once a week, and we are well pleased with it, I would like to keep it instead of the county picking it up."

sanitary reasons. Todd explained that open sewers run in the street and many families keep pigs and chickens in their homes.

Another part of Lynnell's lectures concern personal hygiene and where the children sleep. She says that sanitation is a major problem with Honduran people.

The 1979 RCHS graduates seemed to have adapted well to living in this third world country. Lynnell admitted during the interview that she cried when she and Todd left Honduras for their three-week Christmas vacation in the states.

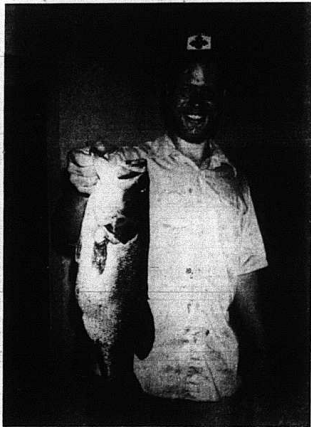

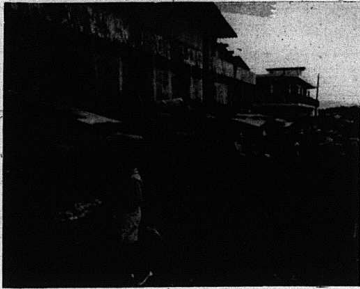

to rejoin the corps, something you can do for an extra year in the same country or for two more in another country, they still won't have to say good-bye until next Christmas when their official two years will be up.

Todd, a fish biologist in conjunction with the Honduran government, rides his bicycle each week to six different villages where he works.

Todd, who graduated from Eastern Kentucky University in 1985 with a degree in fisheries management, shows Honduran families how to raise fish for food and for profit.

Since the average income for a Honduran family is far less than \$300 a year, the profit idea appeals to many.

Although Todd says that he could probably swing a bulldozer to dig most fish ponds, he says he prefers that the people do the work themselves because they will come closer to maintaining it after they put the hard labor in on it.

When Todd is not doing his work, which takes up the normal five-day week, he and Lynnell are off to one of the villages in the Cortez Department. Cortez is one of 18 departments in the country.

At those villages, Lynnell works with women's groups. "All you do is go into a village and announce I am from the peace corp and things begin to happen."

The Gringos, a name used for Americans in Honduras, are too busy during the week to travel much and since most of the travel is done on their bicycle, they use the weekends for their trips to the surrounding villages.

Honduras is the worst poverty stricken country in Central America and Todd and Lynnell both admit that without the millions of dollars in American aid pumped into the country each year, things would be much, much worse.

It doesn't happen much in Pena Blanca, the village in which they live, but when Todd and Lynnell go to a bigger city, such as Siguatepeque, San Pedro Sula or Tegucigalpa, the capitol, people will stop whatever they are doing to look at the Gringos.

"Todd is so big, six-foot, four inches with an average weight of 200, that people just stop and stare when we walk into a busy market," Lynnell said. "Most Honduran men are very small and we are Americans. We definitely attract the looks," she said.

As many Americans in foreign countries do, we have had no problems with the local people," Todd said. "No one has ever offered to harm us in any way or told us to go home," he said.

When Todd and Lynnell go into the capitol, about an hour ride by bus, it is usually to get their physical check-up that is required by the Peace Corp every six months and to take in a movie and eat at a restaurant.

The three hour bus trip costs about seven Lempira, Spanish money, which is equivalent to \$3.50 in the United States. Todd and Lynnell are paid by the Peace Corp in Spanish money.

According to Todd, the major highway in Honduras is much like U.S. 25 running between Mt. Vernon and Berea. "There are many wrecks and many fatalities because of the poor road system," Todd said. "But when you don't own a car it doesn't make much difference. A lot of the wrecks are due to the condition of the public buses. I think every old school bus that has been pitted out of commission in the United States was put in Honduras for transportation to the smaller villages."

At the clinic where Lynnell works, about 65 people a day are treated. At times there is well over a 100 with people coming from

almost all of the 24 villages the clinic serves.

When Todd and Lynnell get some leisure time they usually spend it fishing in Lake Yojoa. A lake that was supplied with fish from the United States by the large fruit companies that run businesses in Honduras.

Where Todd and Lynnell live, about four hours from the fighting in Nicaragua, the mercury seldom drops below 60 degrees and the weather for fishing is always good, except when it rains. Honduras gets about 180 inches of rain a year.

The court voted to purchase 200 feet at \$2.65 a foot for a total of \$530 when the money becomes available.

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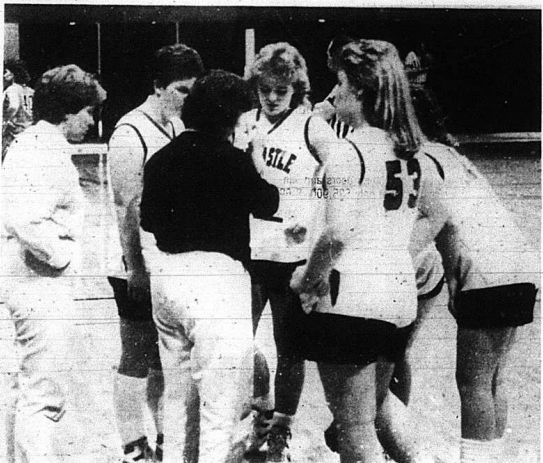

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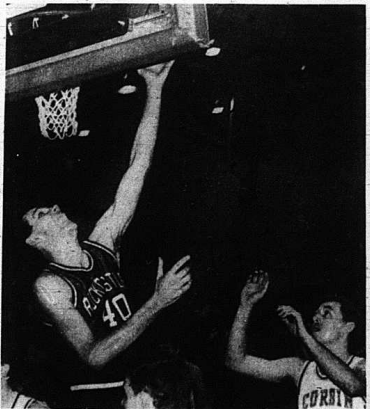
