

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

Fields return to Honduras

when this issue of the Signal hit the street Wednesday night. Todd and Lynnell Fields may be back in their three room house, that is, if they caught the last bus from Sand Predo Sula. Sand Predo Sula is the second largest city in Honduras, a Central American Country of about 4.5 million people.

Todd and Lynnell are Peace Corp volunteerts.

When they got married in 1984, little did they know that in December of 1987 they would be finishing a 15 month stint in a Central American country.

But, Todd said during a Monday interview, that he had always wanted to work for awhile in a foreign country and he finally alked "synell into it.

But, things did not go as smooth for them as for most Peace Corp volunteers.

Three days before they were suppose to leave on Feb. 9, 1986 for the Philippines, then President Marcos, upset with the United States government, canceled all American visas to his country.

So, Todd and Lynnell were back to square-one. Although they had been accepted into the Peach Corp, they had nowhere to go.

Three months later, they were notified that they were going to Hudurn. He was a support of the s

1986 departure for Honduras.
Lynnell's Peace Corp job as a
nurse, did not require state de
training, but both Todd and Lynnell had to go through extensive
language development while they
lived with a Honduran family.
During a three month period,
when as well as learning Spanish,
they also absorbed the Honduran
culture.

they also absorbed the Honduran culture.
The family that Todd and Lynnell lived with had only a two bedroom house, so the ninemember family slept in one room so Todd and Lynnell could have a bedroom of their own.
After the three months in Valle de Angels in English, Todd and Lynnell were assigned to Pena Blanca, a village with about 2,500 people.

people.

During the three months in Valle de Angeles, Todd and Lynnell learned enough Spanish to communicate with the people in their village, because unlike many foreign countries, English is not spoken

foreign countries, English is not spoken.

Their modest two bedroom home has running water and electricity, but a stove, refrigerator, washer and dryer are not luxuries that Lynnell fixes most of the couple's majes on a hot plate, but considering that beans, rice, inches nad fresh fish are mostly what the couple eat, the preparation is not a difficult task.

7 Todd, a fish biologists in conjunction with the Honduran government, rides his bicycle each week to six different villages where he works.

Todd, who graduated from Eastern Kentucky University in 1985 with a degree in fisheries management, shows Honduran families how to raise fish for food and for profit.

Since the average income for a Honduran family is far less than \$300 a year, the profit idea ap-

a year, the profit idea appeals to many.

Although Todo says that he could probably swing a bulldozer to dig most fish ponds, he says he prefers that the people do the work themselves because they will come closer to maintaining it after they put the hard labor in on it

on it.

When Todd is not doing his work, which takes up the normal five-day week, he and Lynnell are off to one of the villages in the Cortes Department. Cortes is one of 18 departments in the country. At those villages, Lynnell works, with women's groups. "All you do is go into a village and apnounce I am from the peace corp and things begin to happen."

The Gringos, a name used for hameleast in honduras, are too busy during the week to travel is done on their bicycle, they use the weekends for their trips to the surrounding villages. Honduras is the worst poverty strickén country in Central America and Todd, and Lynnell both admit that without the millions of dollars in American aid pumped into the country each year, things would be much, much worse.

It doesn't happen much in Pena Blanca, the village in which they live, but when Todd and Lynnell got a bigger city, such as Signateprace, Sand are to Salaka experience.

Lynnell go to a bigger city, such as Siguatepeza, Sand Predo Sula or Tegucigalpa, the capitol, people will stop whatever they are doing to look at the Gringos.

"Todda's so big, "six-foot, four inches with an average weight of 260, that people just stop and stare when we walk into a busy market," Lynnell said. "Most Honduran men are very small. Honduran men are very small and we are Americans. We definitely attract the looks," she

'As many Americans "As many Americans in foreign countries do, we have had no problems with the local people," Todd said. "No one has ever offered to harm us in any way or told us to go home," he

When Todd and Lynnell go in to the capitol, about an hour ride by bus, it is usually to get their physical check-up that is required by the Peace Corp every six mon-ths and to take in a movie and eat
