

# Last of Ridgerunners dies

Doc Hopkins, the last member of the Cumberland Ridgerunners, a popular country music trio of the 1930s, with a Rockeastice connection, died Dec. 29, 1987 in Chicago. He was 87.

The Cumberland Ridgerunners, which also included Hartfrord Taylor and Karl Davis of Mt. Vernon, were popular radio country music personalities for many years on WLS in Chicago. And for a time were managed by John Lair. However, their only appearances at Renfro Valley were as special guests.

The trio was three of the students at Redbud School in Renfro Valley, as was John Lair. Their teacher was W.A.B. Davis for which the community of Wadd is named.

Although Davis and Taylor were natives of Mt. Vernon, Jan. 26, 1900 in Harlan County, the Son of James and Cindy Hopkins.

Doctor Howard Hopkins, his full naire, was the seventh Son, hence the name Doctor, for ac-

cording to mountain tradition a seventh son is supposed to have healing powers.

When Hopkins was a small

When Hopkins was a small boy, the family moved from Harlan to near Mt. Vernon where he grew up, as he often said, just like any other country boy.

At an early age he was considered the best guitar player in the county and entertained at community gatherings with his guitar playing and singing. In fact, the boys' parents usually knew where to find them, in



barn or

Davis' barn or at Taylor's blacksmith shop picking away on the mandolin played by Davis, and the other guitar by Taylor. Before he was 21, Hopkins Itad seen service in the Army and Marine Corps and served with the American Espeditionary Force (AEF) in France during World War I.

He and the three boys then organized a string band known as the Krazy Kats and became popular in Central and Eastern Kentucky. Soon they were playing frequently over radio station WHAS in Louisville. In 1930, through the influence of entertainer Bradley Kincaid and John Lair, the boys joined WLS in Chicago where Hopkins remained for 32 years. 

# Rockcastle gets \$8,942 for their share of Forest Service receipts

The federal government has
sent a total of \$481,592.92 for
fiscal year 1987 to Kentucky for
distribution to 21 eastern counties which contain the Daniel
Boone National Forest within
their boundaries according to
Forest Supervisor Richard H.
Wengert, Winchester.
Rockcastle received \$8,942.14
for 12,336 National Forest Acres.
The total for the 21 counties is
an increase of \$18,098.81 over
the payment for fiscal year 1986
which totaled \$463494.11. These
total receipts collected by the
U-S. Forest Service from its
management of the Forest.
Receipts come from recreation
fees, timber sales, mineral leases,
investock grazing and other land
use charges on the 664,375 acres
of the Daniel Boone National
Forest.
The amount each county

The amount each county receives is determined by the number of national forest acres located within the county and the total amount of receipts on the Forest.

States with national forests are required by law to use their share of the receipts for public schools and roads. In Kentueky, the payment to counties is equally divided to support local schools and road programs.

This payment to counties is only one of many benefits derived from the use of national forest lands. Additional benefits include recreation conportunities. States with national forests are

lands. Additional benefits include recreation opportunities, habitat for game and non-game species of wildlife, roads and trails, raw material for the wood-using and minerals industries, and employment of local residents. Asethetics, wilderness, high quality water and forest fire and insect and disease protection are also important.

Fifty years ago, the Cumberland National Forest, later renamed the Daniel Boone National Forest, later renamed the Daniel Boone National Forest, was established by President Franklin D. Roosevelt when he signed a proclamation on Feb. 23, 1937.

Throughout the ensuing years, U.S. Forest Service employees have spent considerable time, effort and money and have cooperated with local ystate and other federal agencies, plus numerous organizations and private individuals to restore and improve its productivity and make it more attractive and useful to visitors.

So people begin to bet their in-comes in the huge amounts I have indicated and this money comes out of the family budget. Soon owne of these people become compulsive gamblers. The state is then required to set up a social service treatment center for com-pulsive gamblers, much the same pulsive gamblers much the same way the state has to look after alcoholics. These programs are expensive, costing millions of dollars per year.

In addition, some of the bettors who experience these large losses

who experience these large losses then turn to burglary, robbery, and other crimes because they need money for food and rent. The increased crime rate requires increased budgets for police and crime prevention. This costs more millions of dollars per year.

After a while, the states who have lotteries find that the novel-ty wears off and people do not be as frequently. The state, in, a desperate move to buoy up ticket sales, has to increase its adversified increases and the revenue to the states decreases.

The New England states were among the first states to have lotteries in recent times, and sales have fallen off so dramatically that several of the states have had to combine lotteries to stop competing with none another and to get a sufficient number of sales. Even after combining their lotteries they have had to increase their advertisition, and sales are their advertising, and sales are still behind expectations.

If one does a fair accounting and a critical analysis of the figures, and charges all of the negative, costs (only some of which I have described here) which I have described here; against the income, then it becomes apparent the lottery is a loser. State Law KRS 159:010 now requires 60 days written notice and counseling prior to an unmarried child between the ages of 16 and 18 withdrawing from school.

This simply says that if your child intends to withdraw from school between ages 16 and 18 you must provide written notice of the school, attend one hour counseling service with your child, and reach an agreement with the principal for-your child to withdraw. All this must be completed before withdrawal. No withdrawall will be permitted before the 60 day period is up.

Failure to comply with KRA 159:010 will result in the parent(s) legal guardian or other custodian becoming involved in court action subject to the penalties found in KRS 159:990.
