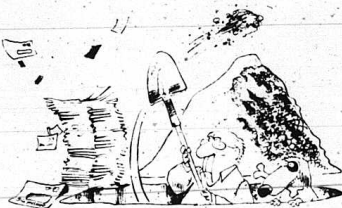



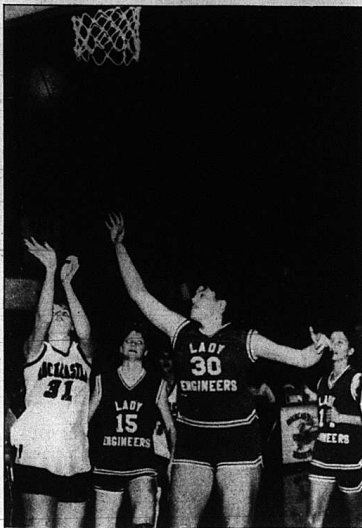

With only two returning starters from last year's squad Bullock said, "Several of our girls did not fully understand that getting a rebound or setting a good pick is just as important as scoring a basket."

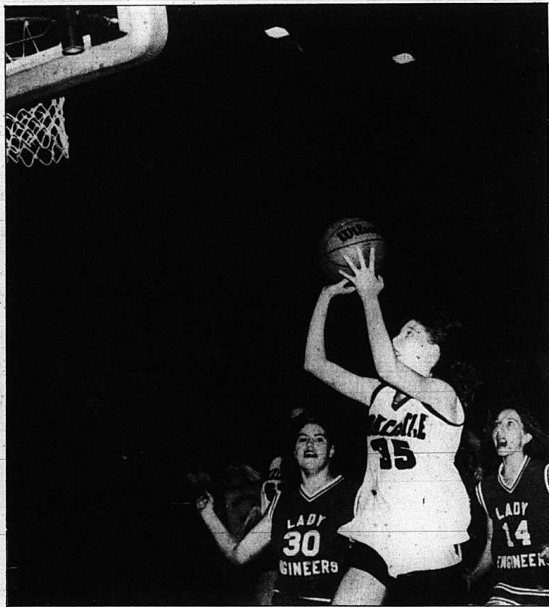

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

A view of a state lottery

When I first ran for office, I was a supporter of the lottery. In the eight years I have been in the House of Delegates, I have literally been bombarded with literature from both proponents and opponents of the lottery system.

In addition, I have attended many committee hearings to listen to testimony on the different lottery bills that have been brought before the General Assembly. I have read and listened carefully to the arguments of both sides.

It soon became apparent to me that I would have to conduct my own independent analysis of all of the information being presented. Let me share with you the analysis which convinced me that a state-run lottery is a big mistake. Remember that I started out as a strong supporter, and believe me when I say that I do not easily come around 180 degrees on important issues.

In fact, it was arguments and data presented by the proponents that finally convinced me that the lottery does not do what they say it will, and that its costs exceed its

benefits.

The proponents claim the lottery will yield the state of Virginia approximately \$400 million per year. (They admit it will take two to three years to get to that level.) They also admit 45 percent of each dollar collected will go to prizes, 5 percent to the ticket sellers, and an additional 5 percent to administration, advertising and overhead.

This leaves the state with a net income of 45 cents on each dollar collected. And this means that the state will have to sell \$888

million worth of lottery tickets to net the \$400 million which the proponents claim will be raised. There are 1.6 million families in Virginia, and even the proponents admit that if just half of these families regularly played the lottery, it would be an extraordinarily high participation. However, let us use this figure

Why roaches are why pests best controlled in winter

If you've been waging a losing or at best no-win battle against cockroaches, try blitzing them this winter with an all-out pesticide and sanitation attack.

This strategy, timing a major control effort when the pest is less of a problem than during the summer, is suggested by R.A. Scheibner, Extension entomologist in the University of Kentucky's College of Agriculture.

Here he tells why cockroaches are so wily, crafty and difficult to eradicate, and why winter is a good time to control the pests.

There is no love lost between cockroaches and people. But we carelessly or unwittingly provide food, water and shelter for the pests so they bring dangers that go along with living near us. For foraging at night, cockroaches avoid some of the risky encounters with people who want to destroy them. During the day they stay snugly out of sight by hiding in the several miles of dark cracks and crevices in the average home.

If cockroaches get so numerous that they cannot find daytime hiding places and are forced to rest in the open, this means you may be playing host to thousands of the pests.

As a good host you undoubtedly have provided plenty of food for a burgeoning cockroach population. The household pests eat just about anything people eat minus a few things like sewage, soap, grease and lard.

While they feed on our food they also "potty" on it and give it a roachy flavor due to their oily body secretions. Because they move readily between food and food, their feet track germs onto our food. Being unable to tolerate cockroaches is not being overly finicky!

Besides eating, drinking and playing hide-and-seek with people, cockroaches also like to socialize among themselves, especially in the activity of increasing their numbers. They have a lot of capacity for doing this.

The German cockroach, the most common type infesting homes, produces four to five egg capsules in its life-time of about a year. Each capsule contains 30 to 40 eggs which hatch and develop to egg-laying adults in about two months. Longer time is needed during cool temperatures.

On the average, German cockroaches have 3 to 4 generations per year. A single pair can parent about 400,000 more roaches into your home in a year's time if all the young survive. If you start with 10 breeding pairs of roaches and you don't do anything to control them, you could wind up with 4 million a year!

That's a real population explosion!

"Hitting a man when he is down" is not considered good sportsman-like conduct. But when your opponent is roaches, forget about being fair. They're not. They'll play "down and dir-



ty" every time you give them a chance.

All summer long cockroaches multiply at their most rapid rate, and reach their peak population in the fall. As temperatures get cooler, reproduction slows down, but they do not stop at winter low temperatures.

This is a good time to take advantage of the situation. It's easier to kill cockroaches at a faster rate than they can reproduce during the winter.

Even if you may not accomplish complete eradication, you can drastically reduce the population so that the build-up is not apt to be so overwhelming next summer when the pests go back into full reproduction.

Cockroach control involves more than squirting around with a good insecticide. Sanitation is of first importance, and will bring about more effective and lasting control than the use of insecticides alone.

Insecticides may be next to use less if they are not applied right and if good sanitation is not also practiced. Your county Extension agent has a publication, "Cockroach Control," that will help you to do the job effectively.

COUPONS: Cost-Cutter or Household Clutter?

For some people, coupons means household clutter. For others, it means extra cash.

Coupons are the most commonly used economizing measure in the grocery store.

More than 80 percent of coupons are used for grocery items. Coffee, detergents, dog food, and cereals are products most discounted with coupons.

Manufacturers use coupons for several reasons. One may be to introduce a new product as a way of encouraging a first purchase, or to increase a slow-selling product.

Coupons may be the deciding factor with brand products with little price difference. But couponing is not for everyone. Here are some clues as to whether or not couponing is your kind of thing.

"Couponing can be time-consuming. Consider the effort in locating, clipping, organizing and refunding coupons. Avoid coupon users can save up to 40 percent on their grocery bill, but your time may be more valuable than the money you save.

"Don't defeat the purpose. Coupons are only cost-cutters if you are a regular user of the product. Purchasing unneeded items is really no bargain at all. Coupons should be used to work for you, not against you.

"Swapping with friends can make couponing social and more enjoyable. Thus, the value of couponing is not limited to just saving money.

*Take advantage of double couponing. Stores will double the amount that the coupon is worth, thus doubling your savings.

*Use coupons to buy items already on sale. It's not only cost-cutting, but smart shopping.

*Save and use products. Proof-of-purchase seals to obtain a manufacturer's rebate. This offers a possible triple savings.

*Organize your coupons. A shoe-box filing system is most practical, and fits easily in most

shopping carts. More importantly, it saves time. Categorize them into groups so the products are similar to each other. Good categories might be canned goods, milk and dairy products, cereals and bread products, pet products, frozen foods and the like.

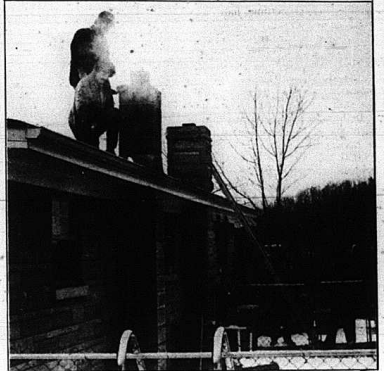

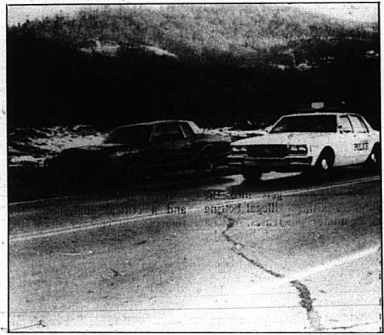

Rockcastle gets \$8,942 for their share of Forest Service receipts

The federal government has sent a total of \$481,592.92 for fiscal year 1987 to Kentucky for distribution to 21 eastern counties which contain the Daniel Boone National Forest within their boundaries according to Forest Supervisor Richard H. Wengert, Winchester.

Rockcastle received \$8,942.14 for 12,336 National Forest Acres. The total for the 21 counties is an increase of \$18,098.81 over the payment for fiscal year 1986 which totaled \$463,494.11. These funds represent 25 percent of the total receipts collected by the U.S. Forest Service from its management of the Forest.

Receipts come from recreation fees, timber sales, mineral leases, livestock grazing and other land use charges on the 664,375 acres of the Daniel Boone National Forest.

The amount each county receives is determined by the number of national forest acres located within the county and the total amount of receipts on the Forest.

States with national forests are required by law to use their share of the receipts for public schools and roads. In Kentucky, the payment to counties is equally divided to support local schools and road programs.

This payment to counties is only one of many benefits derived from the use of national forest lands. Additional benefits include recreation opportunities, habitat for game and non-game species of wildlife, roads and trails, raw material for the wood-using and minerals industries, and employment of local residents. Aesthetics, wilderness, high quality water and forest fire and insect and disease protection are also important.

Fifty years ago, the Cumberland National Forest, later renamed the Daniel Boone National Forest, was established by President Franklin D. Roosevelt when he signed a proclamation on Feb. 23, 1937.

Throughout the ensuing years, U.S. Forest Service employees have spent considerable time, effort and money and have cooperated with local, state and other federal agencies, plus numerous organizations and private individuals to restore and improve its productivity and make it more attractive and useful to visitors.

Recreation areas, roads and trails were constructed, wildlife habitat was improved and growth and damming of gullies. Meanwhile, a forest fire control program was established to protect both the Forest's natural and man-made resources.

Persons desiring to learn more about the Daniel Boone National Forest can do so by reading the latest issue of the Forest newspaper. It describes past activities, those that will be carried out during the current fiscal year and project proposals to be carried out in future years. It also contains a number of short articles describing the workings of the U.S. Forest Service and the Daniel Boone National Forest.

SUMMER JOB OPPORTUNITIES

Employment begins June 1st and generally ends around mid-August. Employees are required to attend pre-camp orientation and workshops.

POSITIONS AVAILABLE:

Camp Manager - Must be a high school graduate; at least 18 years of age. Camping, counseling or camp staff experience valuable; administrative and/or personnel skills preferred. Communication skills, cooperative attitude and ability to work with youth and adults essential.

Responsibilities would include supervising and evaluating staff, maintaining fiscal and statistical camp reports, coordinate facility usage for programs; protect facilities and health and safety of campers; and responsible to 4-H Program Specialist for 4-H Camping.

TEACHING STAFF

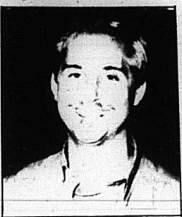

The general assembly will convene at noon EST on January 5.

"These toll-free lines are a tremendous asset to the legislators and, the general public," Rep. Ford said. "Kentuckians have shown a keen interest in the work of the General Assembly and we have found the toll-free lines to be useful in keeping us abreast of the public's view."

ACP sign-up will end February 15

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office is reminding farmers 1988 ACP sign-up period ends Feb. 15, according to D.G. Albright, chairman of the Rockcastle County ASCS Committee.

Albright stated that practices available to the farmers of this county include seedings, no-till, water conservation and forestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices, available for this period is available in the county office.

Seeding practices, both new seedings and renovations must be a current sample in the County Extension Office before signing for cost-sharing.

Rockcastle County is now under the variable cost-sharing method. Requests are evaluated on the basis of the actual cost of completing the practice.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASCS Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

Participants receiving approvals of ACP-245's are urged to carefully read the ACP-245 request form and to do the work according to the instructions contained therein. Special attention should be given to the extent ap-

to do a further analysis. If half of the 1.6 million families do, in fact, regularly play the lottery, these families will have to bet an average of more than \$110 per year to raise the \$888 million gross needed by the state to net the \$400 million proponents claim will be netted from the \$25.53, \$5 or even \$10 per week the proponents were telling me would be bet and would not hurt anyone. When I further realized the \$1,100 figure was merely an average, I then calculated what would happen if half of the families were betting half as much as that amount. The result: If this were so, then the other half of the families would have to be betting half again as much, or nearly \$1,700 per year in order to maintain the average of \$1,100 per year.

In fact, it is easy to see that there are many people who would be betting \$2,000, \$3,000 or even \$5,000 per year in order to achieve the figures the proponents are claiming. To me this was an astonishing and frightening analysis. And remember, all of my assumptions are conservative and give the proponents the benefit of the doubt on all of their claims.

If, in fact, only 25 percent of the families in Virginia play regularly, then the average amounts bet will double to more than \$2,200 per year per family. I still asked myself at the time of the analysis whether it would be worth it to raise the money this way. To help me make a comparison, I looked at the figures yielded by 1 cent of the state sales tax.

Each one cent of the state sales tax nets the state approximately \$45 million per year. Is it really worth putting in a state lottery to raise \$400 million per year which will not even reduce the state sales tax by even 1 cent? To help answer this question, I did some further analysis. I listened to the remarks of a former Connecticut attorney general who had also been a supporter of the lottery and came to change his mind. I learned that when the state gets into the numbers business, illegal betting of the numbers increases. At first I could not understand this -- why would anyone bet illegally if the state was in the business of doing it legally?

This is what happens: The bookmakers go into the communities where the betting on the numbers is high, then they go to

the players and say, "Look, I'll pay off on the same number that the state pays off on every day, and I'll pay you a premium of 10 percent over what the state pays. I can report it to the authorities, and there you do not have to pay taxes and you also get the extra 10 percent.

The argument is enticing and persuasive. The incessant advertising by the state that betting on the numbers is legal and OK lays the foundation for the illegal bookmakers to come in and make a pitch. Then, people begin to play the illegal numbers more and more, rationalizing that the state says it's okay and the bookmaker pays better.

So people begin to bet their incomes in the huge amounts I have indicated and this money comes out of the family budget. Soon some of these people become compulsive gamblers. The state is then required to set up a social service treatment center for compulsive gamblers much the same way the state has to look after alcoholics. These programs are expensive, costing millions of dollars per year.

In addition, some of the bettors who experience these large losses then turn to burglary, robbery, and other crimes because they need money for food and rent. This increased crime rate requires increased budgets for police and crime prevention. This costs more millions of dollars per year. After a while, the states who have lotteries find that the novelty wears off and people do not bet as frequently. The state, in a desperate move to buy up ticket sales, has to increase its advertising budget. Thus, the overhead increases and the revenue to the states decreases.

The New England states were among the first states to have lotteries in recent times, and sales have fallen off so dramatically that several of the states have had to combine lotteries to stop competing with one another and to get a sufficient number of sales. Even after combining their lotteries they have had to increase their advertising, and sales are still behind expectations. If one does a fair accounting and a critical analysis of the figures, and charges all of the negative costs (only some of which I have described here) against the income, then it becomes apparent the lottery is a loser. I believe that if we get the true costs to the people on the true odds of the lottery, then they will reject it.

State Law KRS 159-010 now requires 60 days written notice and counseling prior to an unmarried child between the ages of 16 and 18 withdrawing from school.

This simply says that if your child intends to withdraw from school between ages 16 and 18 you must provide written notice to the school, attend one hour counseling service with your child, and reach an agreement with the principal for your child to withdraw. All this must be completed before withdrawal. No withdrawal will be permitted before the 60 day period is up.

Failure to comply with KRS 159-010 will result in the parent(s) legal guardian or other custodian becoming involved in court action subject to the penalties found in KRS 159-990.

The Rockcastle County School System will comply with and enforce all laws concerning the betterment of education for our students.

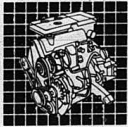
