In addition to the tournament games, Martin said, "There are several events that we have planned that will make this year's tournament more enjoyable for all those in attendance."

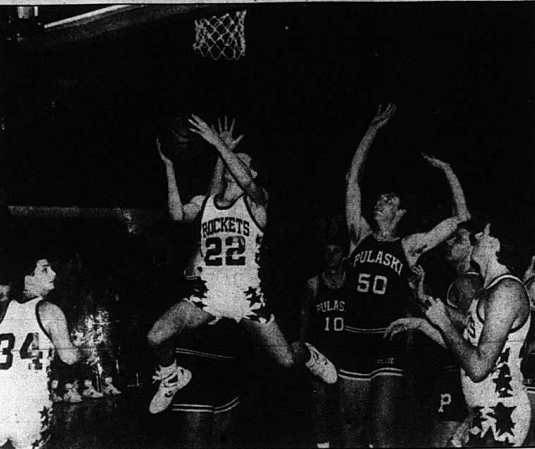

If there was an omen before Tuesday's contest with Pulaski it came when the public address system went dead just before the host Rockets were to be introduced, thus denying them some of the pre-game excitement.

At any rate the game got underway, at least for Pulaski. The Rockets offense was as dead as the public address system for the first six minutes of the first quarter. The hot shooting Pulaski team was aided by some poor defense on the Rocket's behalf. With 2:35 left in the first quarter the home team was down 17-5. A three point play by Darren Allen seemed to get the Rockets rolling. The Rockets then went on to outscore Pulaski 8-4 and trailed 21-13 at the end of the quarter.

As the Rockets defense picked up so did Pulaski's shooting percentage go down. The second quarter was not a thing of beauty for either team. But the Rockets lost no ground as both teams scored 10 points. The Rockets could have gained some ground but were unable to handle the Pulaski press.

The third quarter started with a bang as Jon Bullens canned two three-pointers in a row. 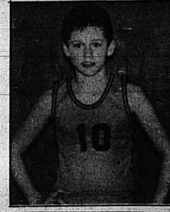

Wrecks due to weather; six treated

Slick, icy roads early Sunday morning resulted in three automobile accidents in southern Rockcastle County, one involving an ambulance hurrying to the scene of one of the wrecks.

Douglas Wooten, 34, and his passengers, Elizabeth Wooten, 30, Chester Wooten, 10 and Jose Clark, 10, all of Livingston were taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital following an accident which occurred 8.4 miles south of Mt. Vernon on Ky. 1955 about 7:25 a.m.

According to the Kentucky State Police Post at London, Wooten lost control of his car on the ice, struck an embankment, travelled back across the road and came to rest. Trooper Allen Lewis worked the accident.

While in response to the Wooten accident, the ambulance driven by Jimmy Houk of the Rockcastle Ambulance Service was also involved in a one vehicle accident. According to the accident report Houk encountered icy conditions 3.8 miles south on U.S. 25, lost control of the ambulance, skidded off the road, then struck a utility pole. Houk and his passenger Carolyn McKinney, 42, also an employee of the ambulance service, were taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital.

In yet another weather related accident, Jason Schumway of Tiffany, Ohio, struck a parked tractor-trailer on I-75, 9.4 miles south of Mt. Vernon. According to the report filed by Trooper George Tompkinson, Schumway was southbound on I-75 in his 1986 Nissan when he saw an accident about to happen. He then lost control of his automobile and hit a truck owned by Ryder Truck. The parked truck was unoccupied and Schumway was uninjured.

Ky. 461 section contract let

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded a contract to reconstruct 3.7 miles of Ky. 461, the Somerset - Mt. Vernon Road in Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties.

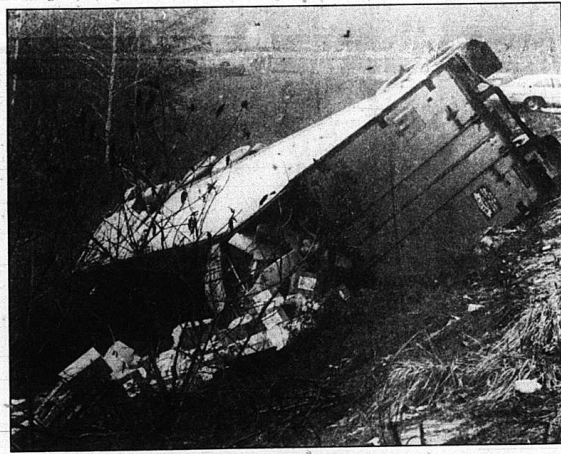
Melco - Greer, Inc. of London received a \$5,915,353 contract to reconstruct Ky. 461 from 1.5 miles north of Buck Creek to one-half mile north of the Rockcastle County line.

The project is part of the state's six-year construction for Pulaski and Rockcastle counties.

The section of the highway from the end of the above section to the end of the new section at Wabd remains to be contracted.



Local ambulance drivers Jimmy Houk and Carolyn McKinney were only slightly injured Sunday morning when Houk lost control of the ambulance just south of Burr on U.S. 25 due to icy roads. A truck driver lost his 18-wheeler in White Star curve earlier in the morning. The icy conditions caused several accidents throughout the county.



Cable TV officials agree to discount

A meeting between Mt. Vernon Mayor Elizabeth Baker and officials of Southern Cablevision over a price increase for cable service has resulted in a reduction in rate for senior citizens but little else.

Mayor Baker, who called the meeting, told the company the city believes the rate increase is too high and that she felt the com-

pany would lose customers as a result.

She warned the company its franchise from the city will expire in 1993 and the city will probably collect revenue from the franchise, that is, if the city decided to renew the franchise at all. She reminded the company's cost of cablevision in Corbin, home office for the company, is \$10.

"I told the company it had gone backward by raising the base rate from \$11 to 14.95," she said. "I told them they had not surveyed any customers to determine if they wanted extra channels."

Mayor Baker reported the company promised it would make a survey of customers this

Third man arrested in Bradley shooting; two others post bond

A third man, reportedly involved in the shooting death of James David Bradley, 19, of Mt. Vernon, on Dec. 26, turned himself over to authorities in Mt. Vernon last Wednesday.

Billy Gene Hubbard, 28, of Mt. Vernon was charged with murder after he turned himself over to Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs.

Hubbard, Terry Miller and Gary Griffin have all been charged with Bradley's murder. All three men pleaded not guilty in Rockcastle District Court Tuesday and the case was waived to the Grand Jury.

According to court records on file in Circuit Clerk Denver Miller's office, police believe that Griffin actually shot and killed Bradley the night of Dec. 26, following a card game.

According to the records, Hubbard was charged with murder because he was present when Griffin shot Bradley and he helped Griffin dispose of Bradley's body, which was found in a garbage dump at Popular

Gap by local hunters. According to the criminal complaint filed by Detective Boggs, Hubbard apparently helped conceal the identity of Bradley by attempting to destroy all personal identification of the victim at the time he was murdered.

The criminal complaint filed against Miller states that Miller admitted to having assisted Griffin, by driving Griffin's car for him. According to the complaint, Griffin's car is where Gary Griffin apparently shot Bradley twice with a .30 caliber pistol.

According to the records, Miller told police that he and Hubbard were present the night Griffin shot Bradley. Miller who asked to be transferred to Laurel County jail because he feared for his own safety, led police to the burned automobile in which Bradley died and he also showed police where Bradley's wallet and rifle were located.

Both Miller and Griffin posted bond. Hubbard is being held in the Rockcastle County jail.

New building planned at local industrial park

Kentucky Highlands is going to gamble on the industrial future of Rockcastle County.

No, it is not the state lottery, but the preparation for a new factory in the Rockcastle Industrial Park, should a company show an interest.

According to local hospital Administrator Wayne Stewart, who is chairman of the Highlands board, at least half of all the industry that locates in Kentucky do so in existing buildings or in industrial parks where the land is already been landscaped and the

preliminary work for a building has been completed.

"When most factories get ready to make a move, they are ready, and they don't like to have to start from the ground up," said Jerry Ruckets, vice president of Highlands and co-ordinator of the latest project for the industrial park.

The gamble comes into play because no factory has actually dusted the local industry that they would like to locate in Rockcastle County.

The Park, which is located on U.S. 150 near the Ky. 461 by-pass already has two factories, Mt. Vernon Plastics and Rockcastle Manufacturing. Those two plants employ around 530 people.

Kentucky Highlands built both buildings in which these two fac-

Consultants are John Rumble of the Country Music Foundation, Nashville; Bill Cooke, museum curator for the Ken-

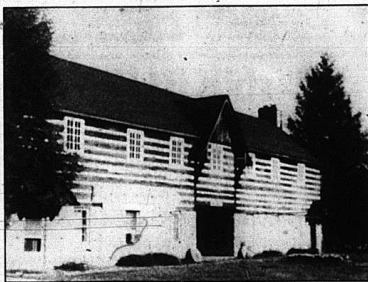
tucky Horse Park, and Charles K. Wolfe, author of "Kentucky Country."

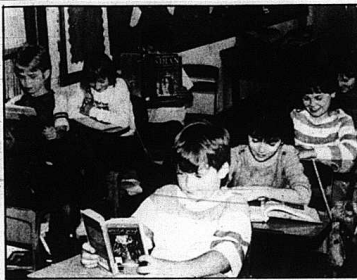

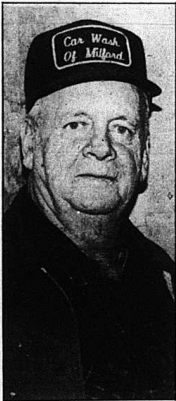

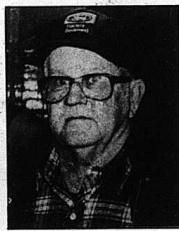

The Evils of Gambling

Since our Governor in Kentucky is seeking to instigate a state lottery, the moral implications of gambling need to be reappraised. If the Legislature approves, and a state lottery is placed on the ballot, it may be the closest thing to a "sure bet" one is likely to find unless its passage is opposed by enough God-fearing people.

Gambling is a growing evil in American society, running the gamut from pitching pennies and matching for cokes, to the weekly poker game, to bingo, to the races, to gambling casinos. Studies by federal researchers have found that 60% of all adults indulge in some kind of gambling. It is estimated that above \$50 billion is the annual take - it is big business!

Webster says that gambling is: (1) "to play a game for money or other stake; (2) to hazard or wager; (3) to stake or wager in gaming." It is the wagering of material goods for the purpose of multiplying them. It is taking a chance at the expense of others.

Some say that everything in life is a gamble; to cross the street, to farm, enter business, invest, etc. There is a certain risk in life's activities but risk does not mean that the activity is gambling. In these areas, we are largely in control and are not wagering at the expense of others. The farmer plants on the basic law of sowing and reaping. Gambling is wrong because it is against the righteous principles of God. The word "gamble" is not in the Bible, but the evils of gambling are clearly condemned there. The honest soul, interested in pleasing God, must examine the evidence and carefully weigh it to come to a righteous judgment. Here are some reasons why gambling is evil:

It is covetousness - akin to idolatry (Col. 3:5). Covetousness is "fixing the desire on, to lust after," hence, inordinate desire. Another has what the gambler wants, so he wagers a portion of its worth to have it. He has no intention of giving value in return. This is why so many buy chances on raffled items. Some justify such, saying it is for a good cause, but would not otherwise give to the same cause. They are prompted by covetousness.

It destroys respect for God's law of labor and exchange (Eph. 4:28). The law requires that one earn what he gets by work, whether mental or physical. It is trade for value received. Gambling makes parasites, such as live off the labor of others. The gambler produces nothing and adds nothing of value in return for his winnings. God decreed: "If any will not work, neither shall he eat" (2 Thess. 3:10). Gambling is based on the idea of getting something for nothing, but everything costs someone something unless it is a gift of grace (See also Gen. 3:19).

Gambling is against God's law of love. "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself (Matt. 22:39; Rom. 13:8-10). And what about the "Golden Rule" of doing unto others what you would have them do unto you (Matt. 7:12)? It is not love to try to take one's possessions without a fair return because love helps and gives. Love looks to the welfare of others while gambling looks to the welfare of the gambler without regard for others. The "Golden Rule" would stop all gambling if men would only follow it.

Gambling produces the wrong kind of fruit. Christ said we can judge a tree by its fruits (Matt. 7:15-20). Its tendency is to enslave (1 Cor. 6:12). It often becomes a compulsion as does drinking and the use of drugs. It also involves one with evil associates. (1 Cor. 15:33). Gambling attracts evil men just as the canton attracts the vulture. Many other evil fruits are connected with it: fraud, embezzlement, bribery, stealing, drinking, suicide, murder, poverty, cheating, divorce, desertion and neglect of children.

Gambling is sin! The Christian can have no fellowship with it. Wisdom based on the Word of God directs us not to participate in schemes of chance, or take unnecessary risks in hopes of gaining something for nothing. Gambling is such an evil that the line should be drawn against it by everyone.

FRUIT JUICE OR NOT????

The new fruit juice drinks on the market are plentiful, but consumers should know that not all fruit juices are created equal.

Some of these beverages are truly made of 100 percent fruit juice, with no added sugar or water. Others are only part juice, some as little as 10 percent, with sugar and water the main ingredients.

Many people think they are buying juice, when they are really buying diluted juice.

Only products that contain 100 percent fruit juice can be labeled "juice". Otherwise, beverages containing less than that are labeled as fruit "drinks" or "cocktail".

The wording on these labels can be confusing as they are often

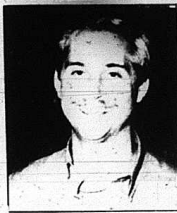

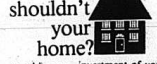

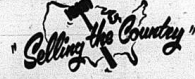

40 look like bees. Put on a baking sheet. Dip a toothpick in cocoa powder, then press gently across top of bees to make stripes. Stick in almonds for wings. Chill in refrigerator for 30 minutes. Makes 28.

Ants On A Log
Celery
Peanut Butter or cheese spread

1 red medium apple, cored and sliced
Peanut butter

Spread one side of each apple slice with peanut butter. Place three or four tiny marshmallows on top of the peanut butter on one apple slice. Top with another apple slice, peanut butter side down. Squeeze gently. Eat right away. Make 8 to 10.

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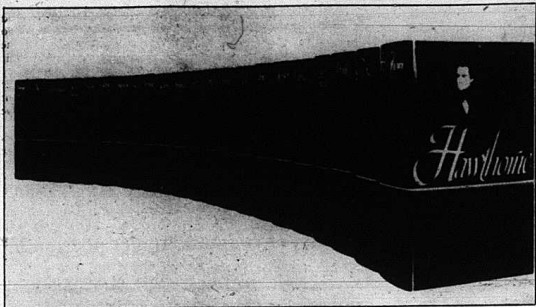

LOCAL LIBRARY AWARDED 60-VOLUME SET OF CLASSIC AMERICAN LITERATURE

The Rockcastle County Public Library has been awarded a 60-volume set of The Library of America, the series that American Heritage magazine called "The most ambitious effort ever undertaken to put the best of American literature into the hands of the general reader."

The Rockcastle County Library is receiving the award after submitting an application to The Library of America and obtaining a pledge of \$500 from The Bank of Mt. Vernon. The Rockcastle County Library is one of more than 1000 across the country that have already acquired this important collection of American literature with funds from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and matching funds pledged in their local communities. Each \$500 raised locally is being matched by \$500 from the Mellon Foundation grant as part of a national program to help libraries acquire the Library of America series.

The Rockcastle County Library will receive the 36 volumes already published in the Library of America, over 46,000

pages of the best writing our country has produced. Thereafter, the remaining 24 volumes will be sent in regular shipments over the next five years for an average total of five volumes a year. 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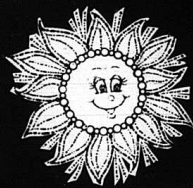


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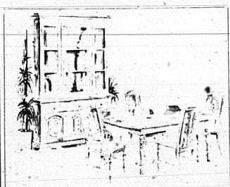
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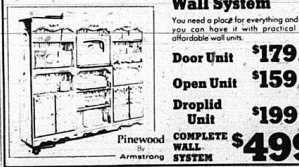
