






The new fruit juice drinks on the market are plentiful, but con-sumers should know that not all

sumers singula know that not an fruit juices are created equal.

Some of these beverages are truly made of 100 percent fruit juice, with no added sugar or water. Others are only part juice, some as little as 10 percent, with sugar and water the main ingredients

dients. Many people think they are really buying juice, when they are really buying diluted juice. Only products that contain 100 percent, fruit juice can be labeled "juice". Otherwise, beverages containing less than that are labeled as fruit. "drinks" or "cocktail". The wording as "The Wording as "Th

But, don't be fooled by this play on words. These natural drinks may contain more fruit flavor than actual fruit juice.

Some beverage labels provide the percentage of actual fruit juice contained. Others may not, but you can get a clue by reading leis to fingredients. Since ingredients must be listed in descending order by weight, drinks that list water and sugar before juices have more water and added sweeteners than juice. Thus, you get what you pay for.

For more nutrition for your collar, make, your—own juice-beverages. If you dilute 100 percent fruit juice with an equal amount of water, you would have a drink that is 50 percent juice. That's more than the 120 percent fruit juice with an equal amount of water, you would have the supermarket products offer, and is plenty cheaper.

If more sweetness is desired, regular sugar or an artificial sweetner can be added for pennies.

If it's the fizz of soda you want

sweetener can be nies.

If it's the fizz of soda you want without the added sugar, mix equal parts of seltzer, club soda or sparkling water with juice.


