The name and numbering program could take years to complete and very little detailed information has been reported by the Postal Service.



THOSE WHO NEED TO RENOVATE ' PASTURES SHOULD DO IT WITHIN THE NEXT MONTH

More Kentucky pastures need renovation this year than usual because of the past two years' extreme drought. Garry Lacefield, Extension forages specialist at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, said two years of drought, especially the more severe one of last year, has taken its toll of many state pastures. Farmers ought to be thinking now about adding legumes such next month.

Last year's drought damaged much of the clover that was in the fields. It also prevented those who planted new clover from getting started.

He suggests that farmers be "ready to go" with the reseeding forts by the middle of February and replant as soon as weather conditions permit. idea of a child having a worm of any kind freaks out many moms. Actually this condition is not caused by a worm at all, but the name refers to any one of a variety of infections caused by a fungus. These organisms, related

ringworm.

The condition can be confused with eczema, another skin disease. The doctor needs to see a child to try and determine which condition may exist, as the treatments are different. It is not necessary to shave the scalp to get rid of ringworm, as was once thought. The condition is not highly contagious either, and children should not be ex-cluded from school once treat-ment is started. The spores of the fungus do spread by air and by direct contact. We probably have the spores of such fungi on us many times, but what makes it start to grow and ringworm is not known. and make

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
