After taking an early lead the Lady Rockets went on to lose to neighboring Jackson County Thursday night 59-45.

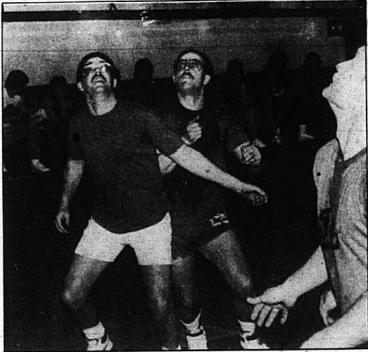

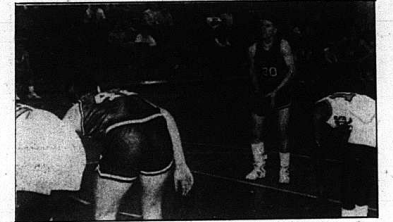
ROCKETS WIN IN OVERTIME AT WHITLEY

was not identified.
State forestry officials were surprised at the 67 fires reported last weekend, about a month before the usual spring fire season. However, rainfall doused most of the fires by Tuesday.

Townley Bergmann, a forestry official, said "It's an indication that we could get some fairly serious problems if there is little rainfall in February. It all depends on rainfall."

Bergmann reported fires destroyed 1,332 acres Friday through Sunday mostly in

Eastern Kentucky. He said most of the fires were caused by careless burning of trash.
The spring forest fire season is March 1 through May 15 and Bergmann asked residents to be especially careful during that time.

tinuing program to inform the board about the inner working of the school system Food Service director E.J. Smith presented the board with an overview of the entire food service division. Smith had some staggering statistics

about the food service program foremost of which was the number of meals served daily in the school system. An average daily total of 2,793 meals, breakfast and lunch, \$65,000 to \$70,000 dollars in revenue on a monthly basis, 46 full or part time employees and 65 percent of the students in the county receive either a free or reduced lunch.

Smith has been food service director for 14 years. He reported to the board that there was a surplus in the food department and they were soundly in the black, in fact they had some monies invested in certificates of deposit. He also was very complimentary of all employees stating "The job they do is phenomenal, without them we certainly could not do the things we do."

In other business the board voted to approve a contract with Eastern Kentucky University for internship school psychologist Kenna Rawlins. The psychologist is a component of the Early Childhood Education Program as specified by Public Law 99-457. Dr. G.W. Griffith was approved as medical consultant and advisor, from Jan. 1, 1988 to June 30, 1988, for a fee of \$125.

The board approved Griffin, Greer and Company to do the fiscal year 1988 audit.

Towery was in favor of Griffin because they had done a good job in the past. The board agreed that putting the audit up for bid may not be a good idea because the low bid may not be the best quali-

permanent cover," said Craig Inganger, University of Kentucky Extension agricultural economist.

The intention, he said, is to improve water quality by encouraging the planting of such filter strips.

According to USDA guidelines, such filter strips to be eligible can not be less than 66 feet wide nor more than 99 feet wide, Inganger said.

Changes also have been made that may make planting trees on CRP land more enticing. USDA has lowered the erosion criterion for land that could be planted to trees from the previous three times the tolerable loss level to only two times that level, the economist said.

In addition, under new guidelines, only one third of the field to be planted to trees has to be erodible above the tolerance level, he said.

CRP is only for designated highly erodible cropland that was farmed two of the four years between 1981 - 1985, Inganger said.

The Church's Purpose

What is the purpose of the Lord's church? Is it to eradicate poverty, disease, social injustice, illiteracy from among men? Is it to bring about a cessation of war and conflict? Is it to ampen for a temptation free society for Christians to live in?

If the church had as one of its great goals the eradication of DISEASE, the Lord could easily have equipped it to accomplish that goal. Could not the same power that enabled one blind man to see have enabled all blind men to see; that enabled one lame man to walk have enabled all lame men to walk; that cured many people of varied diseases have cured all people of all diseases? And could not this same power have been given to the church in all generations?

If the church had as one of its great goals the eradication of POVERTY, the Lord could have easily equipped it to accomplish this purpose. After all, He fed the 5,000 with five loaves and two fishes. He similarly led 4,000 on another occasion. Could not He who did these marvelous works have enabled His church in all generations to feed, clothe, and shelter the impoverished masses of the whole world through miraculous power?

If the Lord had wanted His church to become a lobbyist group to apply political pressure toward a TEMPTATION AND PERSECUTION FREE SOCIETY in which to live, He would have given instructions in that direction. He did not even lead His church into a direct effort to destroy SLAVERY but taught the Christian slave to be a better slave and the Christian master to treat his slaves as he would have his heavenly Master treat him (Col. 3:22-4:1).

The church's purpose is to SAVE SOULS AND PREPARE PEOPLE FOR ETERNITY. Postal Service starts road name changes

The long numbering and naming process for future mail delivery in Rockcastle County has apparently started.

Such was indicated Tuesday at a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

Barbara Russell, postmaster at Brodhead, asked the court if the court planned to name the numbered state roads in the county or leave it to the state Department of Transportation. The court voted unanimously to let the state take care of the chore.

The Postal Service wants the highways and roads named instead of numbered to avoid future confusion between house numbers and road numbers. As an example, 1420 Ky. 4040 could be confusing.

Ms. Russell told the court Route 3, Berea, no longer exists for the Postal Service. It is Mt. Vernon-Berea Road. Littly Rocky Hill Road is now Clyde Barnett Road.

To date houses have not been given numbers awaiting the final changes in road names.

The name and numbering program could take years to complete and very little detailed information has been reported by the Postal Service.

Eventually all houses in the county will apparently be numbered and routes will be discontinued. However, on state highway department maps, state roads in the county will remain the same for highway department use.

Fire department insurance up

In a short meeting, the Brodhead City Council voted Monday night to increase the insurance coverage carried by the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department.

Fire Chief David Ott asked the council to continue to pay the annual insurance premium of about \$850, up from about \$700 last year.

The department's liability coverage under the policy is \$500,000. Its errors and omissions coverage is \$1,000,000.

In other action, the council voted to pay \$10,000 on its \$31,277 loan from Citizens Bank to cut down on interest payments. The city borrowed the money to purchase and develop the Proffitt property in west Brodhead.

The council was told the city's application for a grant and loan to upgrade the city sewer system could be approved any day.

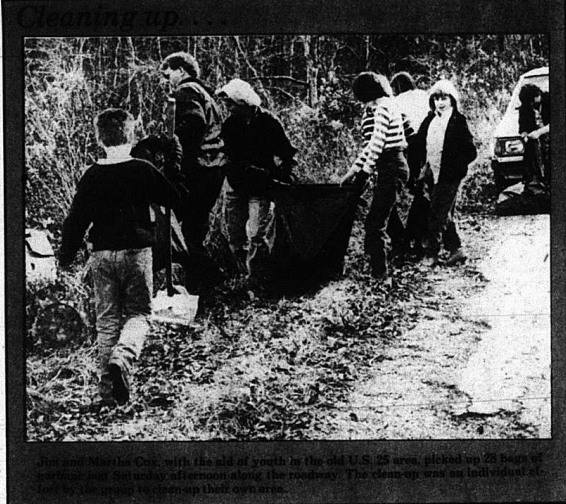
The council has been threatened by the Environmental Protection Agency with a suit if the sewer plant is not remedied. During heavy rains the sewer plant overflows allowing raw sewage to flow into the Dix River.

The estimated \$300,000 project would be financed hopefully with a \$210,000 grant and a \$90,000 FmHA loan. Both figures are tentative.

Conservation guidelines set

U.S. Department of Agriculture announced recently a change in what kind of land is eligible for the Conservation Reserve Program.

"For the first time, landowners can bid to enroll land that is adjacent to a permanent or seasonal stream or creek in the CRP program. Farmers now can receive payment for sowing such land to

Land again occupies board

"We basically have three options in disposing of the land," said Superintendent Bige Towery at the monthly school board meeting on Tuesday night held at the central administration building.

According to Towery and the sketches of the new building, the land near the Snack Shack would not be vital since the new school building would be located on the other end of school property. In the end the board voted to give Towery the authority to proceed with the option of a trade in property. Towery will now get an appraisal and meet with the parties involved. The board will approve

City gets grant for ball field

County to receive half-million for rural road work

A \$518,558 rural secondary road fund for maintenance of state roads in Rockcastle County was proposed by the Department of Transportation and accepted by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at its meeting Tuesday.

The department maintains 114.95 miles of county roads of which only 9.2 miles are gravel.

The figures by the department shows it will spend \$2,900 a mile for maintenance of county roads for a total of \$333,366, leaving \$185,191. After taking \$3,600 from that for County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker's expenses, the remaining amount is \$181,591 which will be used for special projects.

The department did not name any planned projects, but did say that there are no plans to add more county roads to the state secondary road program.

Roads approved for blacktop this year are:

Chestnut Ridge Road from U.S. 25 to old Chestnut Ridge School, 2.1 miles;

Brush Creek Road from Ky. 2614 to the last resurfaced section, 1.41 miles;

Hurricane School Road, from 1-75 overpass to Ky. 1505;

Jackson-Rockcastle County line road from Climax-Three Links Road to Ky. 1912, a distance of 1.87 miles.

Attending the court meeting were Mrs. Verla Scott and Bob Jasper who were co-chairmen of Gov. Wallace Wilkinson's successful campaign '87 Rockcastle County in November.

Mrs. Scott, accompanied by several residents of the Brodhead area, asked the court to make one of its goals the maintenance of Chestnut Grove Road beginning at Brodhead Nursing Home and continuing to Ky. 1505, a distance of 4.9 miles, when possible.

Mrs. Scott told the court the Wilkinson administration is willing to work with everyone in the county for the betterment of the county.

She thanked those present for

"helping us" in the campaign.

"We have a good person in Frankfort," she said. "And you helped us, both Democrats and Republicans. Our Fifth District has long been forgotten, so our goal must be to work for a better district and county."

Mrs. Scott sat with the highway officials during their presentation of the road program.

In other action, the court voted narrowly to purchase a radio for Deputy Sheriff Kenny Holt to use in his work.

Magistrate Amos Burdette made a motion to purchase the radio but to limit future purchases to one radio for each magisterial district. Judge Thacker seconded the motion. Magistrate Doug Bishop voted "yes." Jack Bradley voted "no" and Glen Ellison and Donald Bullock abstained.

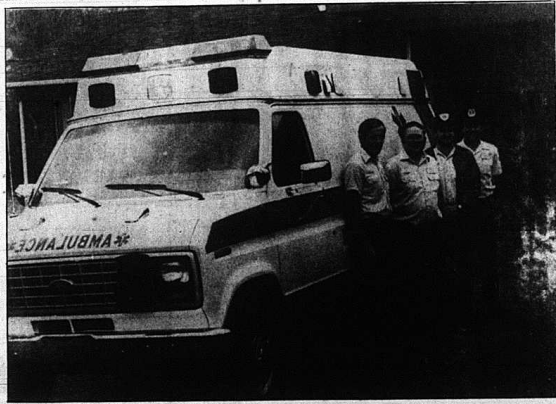
During the meeting the court set guidelines and job description for Bill Livesay, county maintenance man, and authorized him to begin a program of upgrading the courthouse, including painting inside and out and other items.

Magistrate Burdette asked the court to go into closed session to discuss a problem with a visitor. It turned out to be former Sheriff William Taylor.

Reminded that under the state's Sunshine Law the court could only go into closed session for land acquisition and personnel matters, the court adjourned. The magistrates then met with Taylor to discuss a question of tax settlement payments left over from his tenure as sheriff.

According to the state auditor, Taylor failed to settle accounts when he left office including \$2,262 owed to the county, \$450 owed for advertising, \$313 to the Rockcastle Health Department, \$800 to Agriculture Extension Office and \$8 to the Conservation Service.

Taylor claims he paid the bills and has checks. The county says it has no record of payment. The auditors have continued on the state audit since 1982.

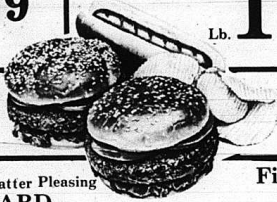

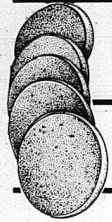

4-H DEMONSTRATIONS

The 4-H Demonstration Contest will be held at Livingston Elementary on Tuesday, March 15th at 7 p.m. 4-H members will be able to "show and tell" about a subject or project area which

interests them. Suggested topics and judge's score sheets will be distributed later to help 4-H'ers prepare demonstrations.

Rules & Regulations

1) The same rules apply to

- 2) demonstrations and illustrated talks. Juniors (age 9-13) and Seniors (age 14-19) do not compete against one another. There may be a junior and senior in each category. (Age as of January 1, 1988)
- 3) Time limit is 15 minutes. (Except for breads - 20 minutes).
- 4) A maximum of two demonstrations in different categories may be given by each 4-H'er.
- 5) 4-H'ers may help in preparing and setting up demonstrations.
- 6) Team demonstrations are permitted. A team will consist of two 4-H'ers sharing equally the vocal responsibility of the presentation. A demonstration using others as props will not be considered a team.
- 7) A 4-H'er does not have to be enrolled in a project to give a demonstration.
- 8) Demonstrations must be entered in the correct category.
- 9) The decision of judges is final.
- 10) The categories 4-H'ers may choose to compete in are: Bread Making, Photography, Dairy Foods, Horticulture, Egg Preparation, Entomology, Other Foods, Home Environment, Clothing, Home Management, Creative Crafts, Animal Science, Electric, Horse Health, Ag. Engineering, Small Engines, General.
- 11) 4-H'ers will be able to earn extra points for their club and towards the outstanding 4-H'er award by giving a demonstration. Fifteen points will be awarded each 4-H'er who participates in the classroom contest and 15 points for the county contest.
- 12) Champions in each category at the county contest will compete in the Area contest in London, Saturday, March 26. Area winners go to state competition in June.
- 13) 4-H'ers planning to give a demonstration or illustrated talk in the county contest must register by calling the County Extension Office at 256-2403 by Friday, March 11th.

THE GARDEN OF NUTRITIOUS DELIGHTS

Having a nutritious garden takes more than just planting a few seeds. For a more nutritious garden this summer, begin planning now.

All gardens are not equally nutritious. How nutritious your garden is depends on what you grow and how you grow it.

Dark-green, leafy vegetables are among the most nutritious vegetables. Grow leaf-lettuce rather than head lettuce, and darker-colored cabbage or kale instead of pale varieties.

Darker yellow or orange vegetables are generally richer in vitamin A than paler vegetables. Remember this when selecting carrots, sweet potatoes and winter squash.

Vegetables with green and yellow color throughout are generally more nutritious than those with color only on the surface. Peeling vegetables with surface color removes much of the nutritional value.

Harvest summer squash and cucumber while they are young and tender and eat the whole vegetable, including peel and seeds, for the most nutrition.

Using organic or inorganic fertilizer has no effect on the nutritive value of the vegetable. Plant your garden where vegetables will receive maximum sunlight. The Vitamin C content increases in plants growing in bright light, and decreases in little or no light.

Finally, keep your garden growing as long as possible. Fresh vegetables are more nutritious than stored or process-



THOSE WHO NEED TO RENOVATE PASTURES SHOULD DO IT WITHIN THE NEXT MONTH

More Kentucky pastures need renovation this year than usual because of the past two years' extreme drought. Garry Laclefeld, Extension forage specialist at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, said two years of drought, especially the more severe one of last year, has taken its toll of many state pastures. Farmers ought to be thinking now about adding legumes such as red or Ladino (white) clover to their fescue pastures within the next month.

Last year's drought damaged much of the clover that was in the fields. It also prevented those who planned new clover from getting started.

He suggests that farmers be "ready to go" with the reseeding efforts by the middle of February and replant as soon as weather conditions permit. Waiting too late means the young clover plants are more likely to have "competition" from weeds and existing grasses.

We don't know exactly how late you can plant and have successful growth. Sometimes April seedings have succeeded, but it's better to start as early as weather conditions will allow.

Laclefeld did recommend farmers replant clovers damaged by the drought rather to rely completely on the fescue pastures. Research at UK consistently shows that cattle grazing fescue mixed with legumes have greater weight gains than those who feed on fescue alone.

With just 15 to 18 percent clover, you still get positive results. Digestibility is higher. Conception rates are higher. The soil is improved. All this means more dollars for the farmer. Laclefeld said most pastures in Kentucky probably had a need for some legumes to be planted this winter.

Your Child's Health

By: Dr. John Payne

Every so often we get questions from worried parents about ringworms in children. The very

idea of a child having a worm of any kind freaks out many moms. Actually this condition is not caused by a worm at all, but the name refers to any one of a variety of infections caused by a fungus. These organisms, related

to molds and yeasts can infect the body in any location on the skin, hair or nails. They cause a superficial infection which expands and the scaly raised circle grows, leaving a clear area in the center which gives rise to the name

ringworm.

The condition can be confused with eczema, another skin disease. The doctor needs to see a child to try and determine which condition may exist, as the treatments are different.

It is not necessary to shave the scalp to get rid of ringworm, as was once thought. The condition is not highly contagious either, and children should not be excluded from school once treatment is started. The spores of the

fungus do spread by air and by direct contact. We probably have the spores of such fungi on us many times, but what makes it start to grow and make a ringworm is not known.

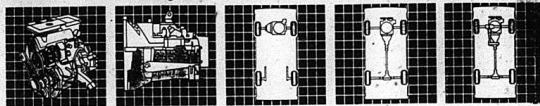

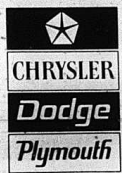

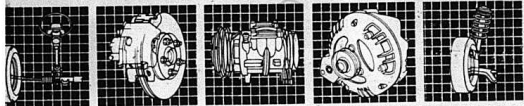

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Southern Cablevision TV rates could be a lot higher

So you don't like the fact that Southern Cablevision raised your basic cable rate by \$3.95 a month.

True, that seems like an extreme amount, but one thing you must look at is that the folks at Southern Cable could raise your rate to \$25 or \$50 a month if they so wished. Remember they have an exclusive franchise.

If you want to get upset at someone or some group, you might take into consideration that the Mt. Vernon City Council of 1982 granted Wayne Stewart the exclusive franchise for cable TV, which is good and transferable for 10 years.

Stewart sold the cable to Johnny Wilcop, who in turn sold it to Southern Cablevision. The franchise remains in effect.

Although Southern Cablevision raised Mt. Vernon's basic rate they lowered the fee that subscribers must pay for special channels, such as Home Box, Office, Showtime and The Disney Channel and they expanded the basic service to 15 channels, from 11.

Southern Cablevision is not the "Big Bag Wolf" that many people have labeled them, because if they so wished, they could charge whatever they wanted too. They have about 1,000 monthly subscribers now. Say they raised the rate to \$30 a month. They may lose 500 subscribers, but they would have the same amount of income and they would have half as many people to please.

But, Southern Cablevision has not done that. They have expanded service, and are trying to work with their customers.

If you don't think you can afford cable, have them cut it off, it is not like you must have it to survive.

I certainly don't remember so much "hoopla" when the city doubled sewer rates. Move out in the country and see what you would pay for cable.

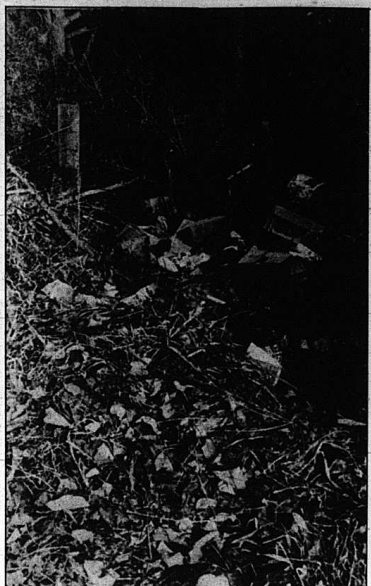

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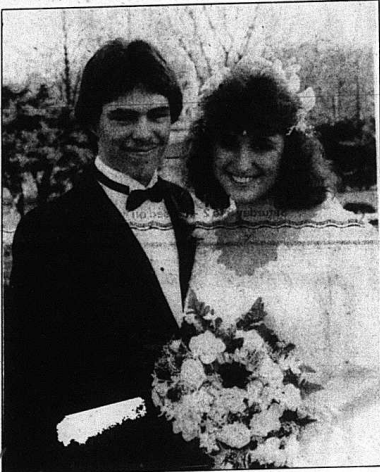
