# Small Business Development

Eastern Kentucky University has assumed responsibility for the operation of a Small Business Development Center serving the south-central Kentucky area, including Rockcastle.

The center, which is located in Somerset, is designed to provide counseling, training, information dissemination and applied research to serve the needs of small businesses in 12 southeastern Kentucky counties and three counties in central Kentucky, according to ECU President Hanly Funderburk.

"The Small Business Development Center is intended to strengthen the small business community and to contribute to the economic growth of all communities within the assigned geographic service area," he said.

"We hope that services provided through the center will stimulate the development and growth of existing and new small business enterprises."

Dr. Funderburk said plans call for a high level of cooperation between ECU and Somerset Community College to maximize the resources of both institutions, especially in the area of training programs.

EKU's College of Business will provide direction for and supervision of center activities. The University will also provide faculty and other resources for consulting and training programs.

Prior to Nov. 15, 1987, the center had been operated by the Southern Kentucky Economic Development Corporation.

The center, which is located at

602 Clifty Road, will provide a variety of training programs and one-on-one business consulting services.

Specifically, those services are: \*Advice, guidance and training in financial aspects of business operation.

\*Operational and management reviews and analysis, as well as follow-up counseling and assistance in implementing recommendations.

\*Evaluation of proposed new business ventures, expansion programs, relocation projects, and business restructurings.

\*Finding the critical factors necessary for success of proposed new enterprises.

\*Technical help in planning new businesses, business expansions, reorganizations, and relocations.

\*Help in planning a workable capital structure for the new business.

\*Technical, engineering and legal help in developing areas such as production capability, new product design, patent application, and general upgrading of operations.

\*Guidance in obtaining and filling government and private business contracts.

\*Technical assistance and advice using new technologies.

\*Assessment of an individual's business skills.

Ky. pastures need

renovation this year

More Kentucky pastures need renovation this year than usual because of the past two years' extreme drought, according to University of Kentucky college of Agriculture officials.

Garry Lacefield, Extension forages specialist at the Research and Education center at Princeton, said two years of drought, especially the more severe one of last year, has taken its toll of many state pastures.

Farmers ought to be thinking now about adding legumes, such as red or ladino (white) clover to their fescue pastures within the next month, he said.

"Last year's drought damaged much of the clover that was in the fields," Lacefield said. "It also prevented those who planted new clover from getting started."

He suggested that farmers be "ready to go" with their reseeding efforts by the middle of February and replant as soon as weather conditions permit. Waiting too late means the young clover plants are more likely to have "competition" from weeds and existing grasses.

"We don't know exactly how late you can plant and have successful growth," he said, "I have seeded successfully as late as April, but it's better to start as early as weather conditions will allow."

Lacefield did recommend farmers replant clovers damaged by the drought rather to rely completely on the fescue pastures. Research at UK consistently shows that cattle grazing fescue mixed with legumes have greater weight gains than those who feed on fescue alone.

"With just 15 to 18 percent clover, you still get positive results," he said. "Digestibility is higher. Conception rates are higher. The soil is improved. All this means more dollars for the farmer."

Lacefield said most pastures in Kentucky probably had a need for some legumes to be planted this winter.

Casey, Clinton, Jackson, Laurel, Lincoln, McCreary, Pulaski, Rockcastle, Russell, Wayne, and Wiley counties in southeastern Kentucky, and Madison, Estill, and Garrard counties in central Kentucky.

Counties served by the center are among those in which ECU has a long-standing record of service, according to Dr. Funderburk.

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## Burley quota increased

Burley tobacco growers can produce two percent more tobacco during 1988 than in past years, according to an announcement Monday by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The new quota is the first change since 1982 and was not met with much enthusiasm by growers. One said it was a "ho-hum" change; another called it a "drop in the bucket."

According to U.S. Sen. Wendell Ford, the added quota plus poundage carried over from the 1987 crop will add about \$40 million to the economy of Burley states.

The total quota reported for the eight burley growing states was set at 473,400,000 pounds up from 464,000,000 pounds in 1987.

The department did not announce the price support level for the 1988 crop. However, under the government's support system the price support level was

predicted to go up about a cent a pound to an average of \$149.8 a hundred weight.

A bill passed last year called for the price support level to go down 2.1 cents a pound. The smaller increase in the quota was due to the additional amount of tobacco that went into the reserve pool this year.

The pool purchases tobacco that company buyers pass over at auction and stores it until it is eventually sold.

Because of the dry weather last summer, less tobacco was purchased and more went into the pool. About 18 percent of the 1987 crop went into the pool compared to the three percent that was estimated earlier in the season.

The Kentucky Warehouse Association said it would like to see a quota increase of eight percent instead of two percent. The Kentucky Farm Bureau said the quota should be from five to seven percent.

## New diocese created by Catholics; will include Rockcastle County

Pope John Paul II has formed a new diocese in Central and Eastern Kentucky, that includes Rockcastle County.

He also appointed the Most Rev. James Kendrick Williams to be its first bishop. He is a native of LaRue County.

Williams, auxiliary bishop of the Diocese of Covington since 1984, will be installed as bishop of the Diocese of Lexington on Mar. 2.

Christ the King Church in Lexington has been named the Cathedral Church, or seat, of the diocese.

The new diocese covers 16,423 square miles, with 50 counties and with a Catholic population of about 40,000.

Northern Kentucky, which is considered Midwestern in

outlook, is about 25 percent Catholic. Central Kentucky, traditionally more Southern in attitude, is about 10 percent Catholic. Many rural and mountain Eastern Kentuckians do not belong to any church. Catholic population in most areas is less than one percent.

Monsignor Ralph Beiting, a priest in the Eastern Kentucky mountains for almost four decades, expects the new diocese to have a significant effect on the Catholic church in Kentucky.

"I think we will see more parishes developing, an increase in vocations, more lay leadership and a great deal of evangelism and ecumenism," he said. "The people in Lexington will look on the mountains as a special responsibility."

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## Grant fund applications

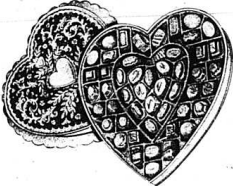

table plan for selecting the individual recipients and assuring the quality of work performed; support for the program by the local government of the area to be served; and sources of additional support, if any, to supplement the grant funds.

Ms. Baron said the Agency anticipates awarding the grants by August 1988.

## Governor requested to four-lane U.S. 150 by Lincoln Judge Sims

Lincoln County Judge/Executive Johnnie Sims has asked Gov. Wallace Wilkinson to four-lane U.S. 150 from Stanford to the Ky. 461 bypass at Mt. Vernon.

He has also asked the governor to lend his support to build a dam on Cedar Creek in Lincoln County to supply additional water for Stanford, which Sims says, needs the additional water for industrial development and to encourage tourism.

"Look how Lake Linville has helped Rockcastle County," Sims said in an interview. "When I lived in Mt. Vernon there was this one little lake out on the old Broadhead Road. Now with Lake Linville, there is enough water for the county and for industry."

Sims, who was a Kentucky State Trooper in Rockcastle up until 1966, said the governor "promised" to build the four-lane connection during the campaign.

Incidentally, Verla Scott, who was Wilkinson's Rockcastle campaign co-chairman during the campaign, recalled that Wilkinson had also told her the road would be built if he were elected.

"I'm sure it will at least get started," Mrs. Scott said. Sims, who was Wilkinson's campaign chairman in Lincoln County, said the new road would mean a considerable economic boost for both Lincoln and Rockcastle.

"Once you get four-lanes most of the way from I-75 to Louisville through Rockcastle, Lincoln and Boyle, the result has to be an economic boost since it would be much shorter than to go to Louisville on I-75," he said.

Reminded that the governor wants to balance the state budget with help from the road fund, Sims said he believed something could be worked out in the next four years.

Sims said he had also talked with State Rep. Danny Ford and had Ford's endorsement for the project.

This is not the first time the idea has surfaced to four-lane U.S. 150 from Mt. Vernon to the connection with U.S. 150 just west of Stanford, or at

## House votes Hall of Fame at Renfro

Danny Ford sponsors bill

To the strains of "Take Me Back to Renfro Valley," the Kentucky House of Representatives voted 100-0 Tuesday to designate a Kentucky Country Music Hall of Fame at Renfro Valley.

It was the first unanimous vote in this session of the legislature. Several entertainers who perform on the Renfro Valley Barn-dance attended and performed, including Pete Stamper, Bee Lucas, Virginia Sutton Meece, Patty Flye, Jan Cummins and Susan Thomas. Mrs. Ann Henderson, president of Renfro Valley Folks, Inc., accompanied the group and gave a short talk.

To a standing ovation, the performers sang and played familiar country tunes, many of which have been preserved through the efforts of the late John Lair, founder of Renfro Valley shows.

The House passed House Bill 479, sponsored by State Rep. Danny Ford to establish the Hall of Fame. The bill now goes to the Kentucky Senate where it is expected to pass by the end of the month.

Plans for the Hall of Fame have been under way for several months, according to Mrs. Henderson. Several prominent Kentuckians are on the board of directors.

To begin, the Hall of Fame will be located on the second floor of the Renfro Valley office building that once housed radio station WRVK until a building can be constructed at a later date. Money to start the Hall of Fame will come from private contributions, benefit shows, and possibly some kind of tourist grant.

The Hall of Fame is established to "recognize and honor Kentuckians who, both past and present, have made a significant contribution to the field of country music and to encourage and develop talents of future Kentucky artists," Mrs. Henderson said.

The Hall of Fame will also be a resource center for the informal history and study of Kentucky's musical heritage. The focal point is John Lair's music library and collection and the first order of business is the creation of a showcase for Kentucky music stars.

This will begin with a display of materials from John Lair's 50 years in radio and broadcasting, and adding memorabilia and

## City Council wants grant

An application for a \$15,000 grant for equipment to dechlorinate run-off from the Mt. Vernon sewer plant was approved by the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

The application goes to the environmental Protection Agency (EPA) which gave the city council approval to make the application.

If approved, which is likely, the EPA would grant \$8,250. The city's share would be \$6,750. Dechlorination was a late requirement for the city. It came after work on the newly expanded plant was nearly complete. It is an EPA requirement.

In other action the council voted to purchase gasoline from Town and Country Service Station beginning March 1, replacing Phillips 66. The council decided to pass around city business.

A.B. Thomason asked the council to extend the city water line on old Somerset Road on Fairground Hill to serve several houses. The council agreed to

## Commodities may be in short supply by spring

Some low-income Kentuckians may have to do without commodities after April, according to an announcement from the federal governments surplus food distribution officials.

Brad Hughes, a spokesman for the Cabinet for Human Resources, said fewer commodities have been purchased for 1988 and he could not predict how long they will last, but probably until April.

An earlier report said 200,000 may be affected when the program "ends this spring". However, it apparently will continue until the April date.

## Jackson RECC gets loan

The Rural Electrification Administration has approved \$7,137,000 in loans to expand and improve service in counties served by Jackson Rural Electric Cooperative Corp. The announcement was issued through the office of Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky.

Another loan for \$5,107,000 will finance facilities to serve

3,500 additional customers, build distribution lines and finance systemwide improvements. Affected counties are Lincoln, Madison, Powell, Pulaski, Wolfe, Jackson, Rockcastle, Laurel, Clay, Owsley, Lee, Estill, Breathitt, Garrard and Leslie.

In a related development, U.S. Rep. Larry Hopkins, R-Lexington, said the REA would lend \$2,030,000 in Inter-County Rural Electric Cooperative Corp. in Danville, which serves Boyle, Madison and Mercer counties.

The money will be used to finance facilities to serve 1,054 additional customers, build distribution lines and fund system improvements.

I am trying to get the Eastern Blue Bird made our state bird. The Cardinal now is our state bird and seven other states also have it as their state bird.

The cardinal never ate a bug from your flowers, trees, or garden. It's strictly a seed eater. The only good thing about it is the male is a beautiful thing. They eat your feed all winter. Come spring, they go to the briar patch. You seldom see one all summer and fall.

The blue bird raises two to four brood a year.

I took a watch, paper and pencil last summer and in 15 minutes they made 29 trips to their young ones. Both male and female feed their young. They are the first thing on the move in the morning and the last at night. It's worth \$100 dollars to have a nest of blue birds.

I sent a letter to all newspapers in Kentucky that the starling was destroying all our hole-nesting

birds that have an entrance one and a half inches. The letter has done a lot of good here. I have seen only four starlings here.

Some species of the woodpecker family is nearly extinct. I have seen but one of a certain kind in three years. I her there's a few down on the Rockcastle River. They may be saved if starlings are destroyed. Recently, Somerset sprayed and killed millions of starlings that are carriers of a disease fatal to man. The disease is histoplasmosis. It causes deterioration of the lungs.

I am now past 80 years old. When I was a kid we sprayed only Parisgreen on potatoes and a little woodashes on cabbage. The Japanese beetle is the only bug here now we didn't have then. There was hollow trees, fence posts and every kid put up blue bird, wren and Purple Martin house.

I came here 25 years ago and put up blue bird houses. For three years I did not see one blue bird, but I am sure they are now established in a circle beyond Corbin. One pretty day last week a neighbor and I counted over 50 pair here.

There have been stories from as far away as W.S.M., in Nashville, The Courier-Journal, Lexington Herald-Leader and channel 27 and on Feb. 18 there will be a story and pictures about our birds.

I beg all who will give a few moments of their time to write to our State Rep. Danny Ford and State Sen. John Rogers, Somerset, to have the blue bird made our state bird. Please help, and thanks.

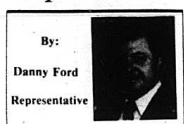

The General Assembly experienced a full in activities last week as the major issues of 1988 began to take shape.

Legislators, the Governor's Office and other interested groups started to maneuver and layout strategy on the budget, proposed constitutional amendments and election reform.

The Budget Review Subcommittee began to dissect the \$15 billion biennial budget proposed by Governor Wilkinson. The jurisdiction of the budget review panels are divided into six categories which are:

Transportation; Justice, Corrections and Judiciary; General Government, Finance and Public Protection; Commerce, Energy and Natural Resources; Education; and Human Resources.

The Subcommittees review their particular jurisdictions and then submit recommendations to the full committee. The full Appropriations and Revenue Committee then reviews, studies and finally writes a budget bill for the House of Representatives to consider.

In the House, proposed com-

stitutional amendments must pass through the State Government Committee. Although no amendments have been passed out of committee, proposed amendments to allow a state lottery and to allow the governor and other state-wide constitutional officers to succeed themselves in office have generated a measurable degree of debate and discussion. The lottery in particular has been the subject of energetic opposition by several groups across the state.

Also, last week the Senate Committee on Elections and Constitutional Amendments acted to weaken the effect of the broad-form deed in Kentucky. Under this amendment coal covered by broad-form deeds could be mined only with methods commonly used at the time the deed was signed.

The legislature can place no more than four constitutional amendments on the ballot in November. Usually, and by way of unwritten agreement, the House chooses two and the Senate chooses two.

A spirited support for Election Reform in Kentucky continues to build in the legislature. Already

The Senate has passed two bills to limit the activities of political action committees. Both measures were expected to be approved by a House Committee at the end of last week.

Another measure, House Bill 453 seeks to prohibit candidates for governor from lending money to their campaigns and to prevent individuals who contribute more than \$1,000 to gubernatorial candidates from getting gubernatorial appointments and non-bid state contracts. House Bill 453 has been approved by the State Government Committee, passed to the House Floor by the Rules Committee where it is now awaiting action.

Plus, an entire package of election reform measures will be introduced into the legislature in the next week or so. The package is the result of efforts made by the Legislature's Special Commission on Election Reform and the Attorney General's Task Force on Election Fraud. The package will address election problems in the areas of Campaign Finance, Conduct of Elections and Enforcement of Election Laws.

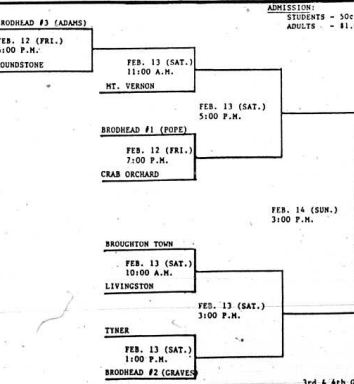
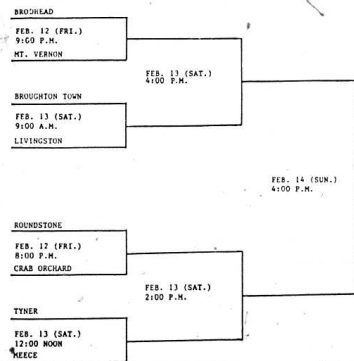
## Rockets lose to Maroons

### TUNA SURPRISE!

If you are looking for a relatively inexpensive way to add the benefits of fish to your diet, stick up on canned tuna.

Tuna, particularly "white" tuna, is generally recognized as one of the richest sources of beneficial Omega-3 fatty acids. Research has linked Omega-3 with the prevention of coronary heart disease and other ailments. But until recently, it was suspected that the canning process removed these widely touted compounds.

Extension nutrition specialist with the U.K. College of Agriculture, said—that a Massachusetts study has found that a can of white tuna contains close to one percent of its weight

in Omega-3. Chunk light tuna contained about half that amount.

For a 6½ ounce can of tuna, both amounts are substantially more than the Omega-3 found in most fish oil capsules.

Health professionals do not recommend fish oil capsules because safe amounts of Omega-3 fatty acids have not been established and because of possibly harmful levels of other components in the capsules. However, most health experts recommend two to three servings of fish a week.

Canned tuna is a good, inexpensive way to get Omega-3 naturally, in addition to the other

nutritive benefits of fish. Fish is a good source of protein and low in calories. Most whole fish, except for shellfish, is also low in saturated fat and cholesterol.

While several types of fatty fish, such as salmon, mackerel and sardines have higher levels, white tuna has more than double the amount of Omega-3 found in such commonly consumed fish as cod and haddock.

The study also found that tuna

packed in vegetable oil has about the same amount of Omega-3 as tuna packed in water. However, while draining water from tuna results in loss of only 3½ percent of the Omega 3, draining the oil removes 15 to 20 percent because fatty acids dissolve in oil.

White tuna comes from the albacore species of tuna. It is more expensive than chunk white tuna, which comes from bluefin, skipjack or yellow-fin tuna.

### SUMMER FUN AT 4-H CAMP

Hey!!! 4-H'ers, it's not too early to think about 4-H Camp.

For many youngsters, staying in cabins with other young people and adults will be their first experience in group living outside of their own families. They'll learn a lot about getting along with others and making new friends.

Extension Agents, adult and teen leaders will be on hand to supervise young campers. Camp staff, who are college students working at camp as a summer job, will also be around to teach classes and supervise youth.

Kentucky 4-H Camps will be participating again in the federally funded Summer Food Service Program for Children. This operates under guidelines similar to those of public school food service programs. The program enables the camp staff to hold down the costs so that most families can afford to send their children to camp.

For a week of swimming, boating, sports, crafts,

### RCCHS Art Dept. gets grant for visiting artist

The art department at Rockcastle County High School has obtained a grant from the Kentucky Arts Council's Artists in Education Program to place Sandy Speagle, a professional portrait artist, in the school system for one week to demonstrate her art form and share her ideas, creativity and talents.

The program, which is funded in part by the grant from the Kentucky Arts Council with funds from the National Endowment for the Arts, emphasizes the artist as practitioner, rather than as a teacher in the usual sense.

The grant is designed to enrich existing school arts programs, enlarge the scope of the school's curriculum, and enhance the life of Rockcastle County.

Sandy Speagle, the artist that was chosen for the residence, lives in Rockcastle County. She was recently commissioned to paint the official portrait of former Governor, Martha Layne Collins. Ms. Speagle has won several awards in national juried exhibitions in New York and frequently participates in major regional exhibits.

### Scholars program offered at Centre

Senior Scholars at Centre, an intensive three-week course of study for students who have completed their junior year of high school will be offered June 12-July 1 at Centre College.

Centre faculty members will teach five courses: Computers and Mathematics, Computer Applications to the Physical Sciences, International Affairs, Literature and Writing, and Shakespeare: Text and Performance.

"This is our eighth year to offer this program," said Dr. Preston Mills, assistant professor of chemistry and director of the Senior Scholars program. "It's a challenging experience that will be enjoyable for talented and motivated students. The reason they like it is they find themselves surrounded by an eager group of bright students studying subjects that are challenging and interesting."

The total cost of the program—including tuition, books, supplies, room and board and recreational activities—is \$725. Financial aid is available. Application before April 29 is encouraged.

"This year's courses will be: Computers and Mathematics—A study of selected mathematical topics including an introduction to calculus and to the computer as a powerful tool for solving mathematical problems.

Computer Applications to the Physical Sciences—An examination of fundamental concepts selected from the fields of chemistry and physics. Students will learn to write computer programs in BASIC and apply this knowledge to the collection and analysis of data using direct computer interfaces.

International Affairs—A course focusing on such issues as the nature of Soviet foreign policy objectives, ferment and revolution in Latin America, and

the causes of instability in the Middle East.

Literature and Writing—A study of selected works of literature and, in a series of guided assignments, writing about how those works relate to human self-understanding.

Shakespeare: Text and Performance—In this course students will examine several of Shakespeare's most popular plays, both as literature and as scripts for performance.

Admission requirements for the Senior Scholars Program include: completion of the junior year of high school; a strong academic record in a college preparatory program; the name of a teacher or counselor who can furnish a recommendation; submission of a current high school transcript; and, for some courses, high school preparation in certain academic subjects.

Most people don't really plan now for ten years later, but that's exactly what farmers who participate in the Conservation Reserve Program ought to be doing.

Under the CRP program, farmers receive about \$60 per acre per year to set certain highly erodible lands aside for 10 years as an erosion control measure.

Farmers will be signing up for this program during February, and many may not know just what they are committing themselves for.

According to David Ditsch, Extension soil scientist with the

least to Stanford.

In the 1960s, it came up and a survey was made by the Kentucky Department of Highways. At that time, Highway Commissioner Henry Ward said the project would eventually be done. He said perhaps in 20 to 30 years.

The Signal quoted Ward at that time as saying, "It's a priority project, but not a very high priority."

Also at that time, there was considerable controversy at a meeting in Mt. Vernon where property owners along U.S. 150 did not want the new highway to go to I-75 at Burr since it would take most of their business property. They suggested a route around the town, possibly to the south of the present highway.

Bringing the new highway just to the Ky. 461 bypass would eliminate that problem.

Also, at the time, the new route had the road bypassing Brodhead and Crab Orchard, something those business owners were not too happy about.

One was quoted at the time as saying, "We'll be left high and dry by the highway."

The project then died for all practical purposes.

However, times change, and Judge Sims believes the public would now welcome the new road because of ever increasing traffic and its deteriorating and outmoded condition.

University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, farmers may not use the set aside land for any purpose which would provide a financial gain. For example, there can be no grazing nor mowing the grass for hay. The cover crop planted for erosion control must remain on the field. (One exception to the no profit rule is that farmers may charge a fee for hunters to hunt the land.)

The danger is that farmers will take their CRP payments and then just forget about the land for ten years. If that happens, the farmer may find ten years down the road that his set-aside land is just a weed patch. A little planning now could pay big dividends then.

A farmer might do is consider using the set-aside land as a site for animal waste disposal. That is one of the few things not prohibited by the government program, and it would enhance the soil's fertility, he said.

"If you plan to return the land to row crops after the ten-year period," he said, "you should select the legumes desired for renovation with the idea of asking if that legume will last ten years. Not all of them will. And you need to plan on controlling the weeds, whether chemically, or

by mowing or through adequate legume establishment."

Ditsch added, "You should plan to re-soil test during the ninth year of the CRP contract, and begin to improve the soil fertility with needed nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium."

commodities," she said, "They can't just eat flour."

The program, started in 1981, was set up to distribute excess food items bought as part of price-support programs for U.S. farmers. The surpluses are gone. "This was never intended to be a permanent program," said Brenda Schuler, public affairs specialist for the USDA's South East Regional Office of Food and Nutrition Services.

Legislation reducing price supports for dairy products and a federal program for purchase of dairy herds to use as beef reduced the amount of dairy production, Ms. Schuler said.

The 1985 farm bill changed the price-support structure for honey and rice. Instead of buying surplus, the government pays a farmer the difference between the price-support level and the lower world-market level. The farmer keeps the product and sells it on the world market, she said.

The Temporary Emergency Food Assistance Program is at the bottom of the distribution list, Mrs. Castanin said. Government-bought food goes first to schools, child-care centers, domestic nutrition programs, the Defense Department and foreign aid, she said.

Low-income residents who pick up their cheese and honey allotments this month are signing petitions asking Congress to continue the cheese, honey, rice and milk shipments. But the petitions probably will not save the program.

"If it's not there to give out, I don't know what (Congress) could do," said Dave York, assistant to U.S. Rep. Jim Bunning, R-For. Thomas York said the government was not likely to buy food to distribute.

## LEAP gets \$2,000 grant

Livingston Economic Alternatives in Progress (LEAP) recently received a \$2,000 grant from the Christian Appalachian Project.

The grant was made as part of the Christian Appalachian Project's Economic Development Grant program. This program helps organizations dedicated to solving employment problems in Appalachian Kentucky through training, industrial development, grass roots economic activity, and coalitions of business operators and other groups involved in job-creation, retention, or skill training.

Opportunities for Women is helping low-income women in the Rockcastle County area develop a business that is owned and operated by them.

The business is developing a specialty line of Kentucky food products, which include

"Sorghum Praline Topping with Bourbon," and sorghum flavored "Kentucky Buckeyes."

An orange topping and a biscuit mix are nearing production.

LEAP gives OFW financial support, and will continue to give support during the three to five years it will take for a new business to become stable.

OFW currently employs four women, and plans to employ two additional women by the end of the year. The program gives the women the opportunity to gain management and leadership skills as well as income.

All OFW's first products use sorghum produced in Rockcastle County by another LEAP project, the Golden Kentucky Sweet Sorghum Project. This project cooperatively produces sorghum as an alternative crop to tobacco.

These goals are correlative to what the Christian Appalachian Project is trying to achieve. It seeks to create employment through economic development.

In addition to its grant program, the project offers a service to local business leaders under

the Business Development Coordinator Program to assist them in coordinating job-creation activities in their communities.

The Christian Appalachian Project offers skilled staff to help support local leaders in establishing development organizations and identifying

specific job development opportunities.

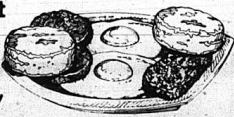
