The daughter of J.C. and Fannie Lee Goldiron of Brodhead, she will be principal over about 900 students grades seven through nine at the Laurel County School.

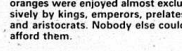

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Experts say quake in state will come

Scientists say the real question about a Kentucky earthquake is not if, but when.

And when it comes Rockcastle will be shock, but most experts believe it will be minor.

"The New Madrid fault, on Kentucky's western edge, last gave a major heave in the winter of 1811 - 1812. It has been accumulating energy for another shake, since then. When it will release that energy is the question," said Larry Piercy, agricultural engineer with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Right now, he said, the New Madrid fault has enough stored energy to cause a major earthquake if it were all released at once.

"According to the Tennessee Earthquake Information center the chance of a major quake in the next 15 years is about 40 to 60 percent," Piercy said.

The major shaking will be in the area closest to the fault, but most damage will occur in urban areas, Piercy said.

Most casualties will result from falling objects and debris as a result of the shaking which damages and destroys buildings. Disruption of communication, electrical, gas sewer and water services can be expected, as can damage to railroads and highways," he said.

In addition, fires and explosions from ruptures to gas and petroleum lines are likely, he said.

Even though it is impossible to predict when a major earthquake

will occur, Piercy said that it's not too early to plan how to deal with one safely.

If you are indoors when the first shock begins, stay there. Find protection from falling debris under a desk or heavy table. Stay away from windows, he said.

If you are outside, get in the open, away from buildings, trees, walls and power lines that could

fall. If you are in a car, stop and stay inside until the shaking stops. Do not attempt to cross bridges or overpasses, Piercy said. Before resuming activities, check for fire, electrical hazards and gas leaks. If you smell gas leaks, turn off the gas supply immediately and avoid doing anything that might ignite the gas that already has leaked, Piercy said.

Be prepared for aftershocks. While aftershocks generally are less intense, they may do damage to previously weakened buildings, the engineer said.

The new federal tax laws. Fred will be in Mt. Vernon on Thursday, Feb. 18 discussing these new changes as part of the Beef Cattle Short Course at 7 p.m. in the Agricultural Service Center Meeting Room.

The increased tax bite comes as a result of a provision in the new law that penalizes farmers for deducting expenses incurred in raising replacement animals for the herd. The previous tax laws allowed them to deduct from their income the amount they paid out to raise a replacement animal to maturity.

Farmers still will be able, if they choose, to deduct from their income (expensing) the costs associated with raising replacement animals. However, if they do choose to continue to expense their animals, they will have to live with using a slower depreciation schedule for all of their other capital assets purchased for the farm.

Whether a farmer should choose to deduct the costs of raising replacement animals or choose to capitalize them depends on the individual's situation.

A farmer who will put into service a lot of expensive capital assets, such as tractors, combines and buildings, will probably want to capitalize his replacement animals, even though his tax bill on them may increase. By capitalizing them, he also will be able to depreciate other capital assets.

Farmers who do not anticipate buying any big ticket items may want to continue to use the expensing method, which may reduce their taxes for the first couple of years, but may increase their taxable income when they sell animals from the herd.

The expensing method also has advantages for farmers placing small capital items put into service. The current tax law does allow a maximum of \$10,000 in capital assets to be deducted (expensed) from income.

However, Benson cautions, once a farmer decides to deduct expenses for replacement animals, he will be forced to use a slower, straight-lined depreciation for all other assets.

Farmers may want to have a tax preparer familiar with tax laws review their situations before they make the decision whether to capitalize their reproduction expenses.

New policy for human burials and grave artifacts

A unique policy for the treatment of human burials and grave artifacts was signed by two regions of the Department of Agriculture's Forest Service last week in the agency's Washington office headquarters, and includes the Daniel Boone National Forest.

The signing was conducted by Southern Regional Forester John Alcock and Eastern Regional Forester Floyd Marita. Witnessing the ceremony was National Congress of American Indians Director Suzan Harjo and member of the Forest Service.

The new policy is the outgrowth of years of concern over the treatment of human remains which have been disturbed or removed from public lands. Native Americans, in particular, have expressed strong concern that ancestral burials be treated with respect and that human remains which have been disturbed be reburied with dignity. But the policy also considers the legitimate interests of the scientific community which has historically studied and analyzed human burials for the valuable information they can yield on human health and cultural

development.

Among its components, the new policy requires that burial sites be left undisturbed if at all possible. When this is not the case either through accidental or unavoidable reasons, the human remains and grave artifacts will be reburied after full consultations with affected groups and individuals. In this manner, the Forest Service will attempt to strike a balance between the lineal, cultural or ethnic descen-

dants of those buried on public lands and members of the scientific community.

The joint regional effort represents the first time the Forest Service has attempted to systematically deal with this sensitive issue on this scale. The policy is also being reviewed and considered for nationwide use by the Forest Service. In the interim, it will be implemented within the Southern and Eastern Regions.

Shootings result in arrest here

Apparently upset over the murder of his brother-in-law, Johnny Kirby of Chestnut Ridge has been charged with attempted murder and two counts of wanton and endangerment.

Kirby, 21, pleaded not guilty in Rockcastle District Court Wednesday to the charges, which were brought against him by Gary Griffin and Phyllis Mills. The case was continued until Monday.

Griffin has been charged with murder in the shooting death of Kirby's brother-in-law, David Bradley of Mt. Vernon.

Terry Miller and Billy Gene Hubbard have also been charged with murder in the same case.

According to a criminal complaint filed in the circuit court clerk's office, Kirby fired several shots at Griffin the night of Jan. 29. The complaint was sworn out by Griffin who stated that the shooting incident took place at his residence south of Mt. Vernon.

The two charges of wanton endangerment stem from two criminal complaints taken out against Kirby by Griffin's girlfriend Phyllis Mills of Calloway.

According to one complaint, signed by Mills, Kirby fired a military type semi-automatic rifle into Mills home on Feb. 2. At the time of the shooting, five people including Griffin were in Mills' home. Police found 16 empty

Judge Venters out as federal judge choice

A Harlan attorney has apparently been the choice for a federal judgeship in Eastern Kentucky passing over Pulaski/Rockcastle Circuit Judge Daniel J. Venters.

Although he may be disappointed, a quick check of local officials in Rockcastle showed most were pleased he will remain judge, at the same time sympathizing with him in his disappointment.

The apparent nominee is

Harlan lawyer Karl S. Forester who will be based in Pikeville.

Forster, 47, has practiced civil and criminal law in Harlan for 21 years. He is said to be well respected in the legal community.

The other finalist was U.S. Magistrate Joseph M. Hood, 45, of Russell. He has been a federal magistrate in Ashland for 12 years.

Judge Venters, 37, has been circuit judge for Rockcastle and Pulaski counties for four years and was district judge in the two counties for five years.

The Pikeville judgeship opened up when U.S. District Judge G. Wix Unthank asked to be relieved of the post following a stroke.

The first finalist for the \$80,000 a year lifetime job, were chosen from 22 who sought the judgeship.

It may not be the trolleys of San Francisco or the subway in New York, but Rockcastle County now has public transportation.

The Rockcastle County Public Transit is just that, public transportation. According to Shirley Cummins, projects director of Senior Citizens Programs in the county, "We want to provide the people in this county with efficient transportation service," she said. "Many people feel we are serving only the people in the towns, we want to help those people in the outlying areas of the county, also."

The transit was made possible through a public transportation grant, from the Kentucky Division of Mass Transportation. According to Mrs. Cummins, Glenn Westbrook, Transit Coordinator for the Cumberland

Valley Area Development District (CVADD), was instrumental in assisting with the grant application.

"Individuals that currently have to rely upon friends or relatives to take them to their doctor appointments, shopping, on errands, or just visiting can now use the transit."

In addition, although the Rockcastle County Transit is not authorized to go out-of-county, they can help needy individuals who need to travel to Richmond or Lexington to the doctor by referring them to other means of transportation, namely Clay and Jackson Counties, who do have operating authorization and who do make regular runs to these

cities. "One of the priorities of the transit coordinator is to see that duplication of transit services does not happen," she noted. "Therefore, since Clay and Jackson Counties frequently make trips to Lexington then it is only feasible that we schedule our people with them in order to avoid duplication and higher costs."

Mrs. Cummins added that Rockcastle Transit is willing to transport the people to the I-75 exits to be picked up by other transits so they can then go on to their scheduled appointments. Mrs. Cummins recently put together a schedule regarding

So many from Rockcastle County have never heard of, nor seen this huge rock formation, resembling a castle and called Castle Rock, from which Rockcastle County and Rockcastle River received their names. This gigantic rock is located high on a hill, just south of Livingston, in Rockcastle County overlooking U.S. 25 and Rockcastle River and was a noted Kentucky landmark for Indians, travelers and our forefathers.

Around 1929 a camp was built for the Mt. Vernon Girl Scout Troop at Beech Bottom, off of U.S. 25 and on the banks of Rockcastle River, Miss Helen Spicer Orth, formerly of Maryland and Washington, D.C., was captain of the Mt. Vernon Troop and I (Cepha Davis at that time) was lieutenant.

Once while at camp a picnic pack was prepared and the troop crossed the river on rocks at a low point and climbed the steep hill to Castle Rock. After lunch we explored the rock and surrounding area. We entered a cave-like entrance on the north side. There was a narrow, curved passage, but more flat and had the appearance of being smoked or burnt. Someone said, they were probably meteors. Not far from there was a home. Miss Orth being the county nurse at that time and residing at Langdon Home in Mt. Vernon had visited the family there often before. She had been treating one of the children for blood poisoning, as a result of stepping on a rusty nail. The family seemed so isolated. I can't remember seeing any roads

leading to or from the home. The troop went again to Castle Rock. The river having raised, we went in cars on down the highway, where there was a store and several homes. A young girl took, a few at a time across the river in a boat and we climbed up a path to Castle Rock.

There has been so many older citizens and younger people who have been interested in the history of Rockcastle County, who have accomplished compiling some history and markers. But this awe-inspiring, historical monument, which has withstood the centuries has rarely been mentioned. It seems God placed it there for a purpose and to remind everyone of His greatness and that He watches over all.

If Castle Rock should ever become a shrine, park or have a marker, I would like to see the flag placed on its summit.

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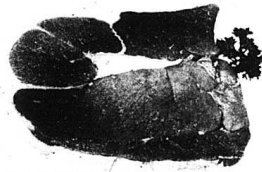

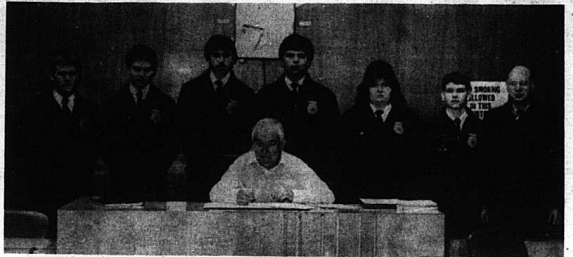

Randall Hayes chosen as National Merit Finalist

Randall Hayes, a senior at Rockcastle County High School, has been chosen a finalist in National Merit Scholarship competition.

Only about half of one percent of all high school seniors in the United States are chosen for this honor.

Hayes, son of Floyd and Lena Hayes of the Broadhead area, who is very active on the RCHS academic team, will be told by May 13, if he is one of 6,000 chosen from the 13,500 finalists, to receive a scholarship.

The Merit Program, which

receives neither federal nor state funding is privately financed by grants from over 600 independent sponsors who share the goals of National Merit Scholarship Corporation or (NSMC). Although this nationwide academic competition is the largest of its kind, funds for Merit Scholarships are limited. In 1988, NSMC will be able to provide awards for only about 44 percent of the finalists, each of whom must use the Merit Scholarship for fulltime attendance at a college or university in the United States that holds accredited status with a regional accrediting commission on higher education.

in Rockcastle County 65 percent of the population do not have a high school diploma and 50 percent do not have an eighth grade education. This is a basic reason for the high drop-out rate. Education is a low priority to many. The high drop-out rate and low priority on education can be countered with concentrated Adult Education as well as early childhood education programs. Mr. Towery mentioned the need for an Adult Education Center in Rockcastle County, and complimented the Family Life Center at Renfro Valley for their extensive work and support in the area. He also complimented the Literacy Council and Forward in the Fifth as routes to improvement.

Mr. Towery encouraged community and personal involvement as keys to educational reform.

Mr. Towery talked about criteria for effective schools and stated these were his personal

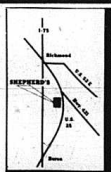


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Highly touted Redhounds down Lady Rockets

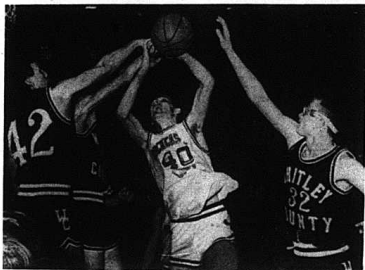
The Lady Rockets fell to 7 and 14 on the year while Jackson County improved its record to 9 wins and 12 losses on the season.

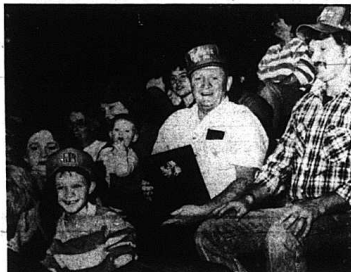

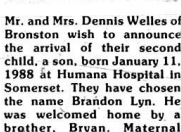

INDULGE IN GOOD FOOD AND FITNESS DURING PREGNANCY

If there's ever a time in a woman's life when nutrition and fitness are more important than at other times, it's when she is pregnant. A woman's nutritional status profoundly influences not only her own health but the outcome of her pregnancies as well. All the food your baby needs to build a strong, well-developed body must come from you. What you eat and drink is what your baby eats and drinks.

The easiest way to eat proper amounts of the right foods during pregnancy, and throughout your life is to plan meals using the daily food guide based on the food groups. When you are pregnant, your nutritional needs increase (usually your appetite does too). To provide the extra nutrients you and the baby require, you need to eat two extra servings from the milk-cheese food group, and one more serving from the meat, poultry, fish and beans group.

Here is a comparison of recommended daily servings for women during pregnancy and at all other times:

DAILY FOOD GUIDE

	Servings when not pregnant	Servings while pregnant
Vegetable-fruit group	4	4
Bread-cereal group	4	4
Milk-cheese group	2	4
Meat, poultry, fish and beans group	2	3

A healthy diet includes eating a variety of foods, drinking six to eight glasses of water or other liquids daily, and cutting down on sweets, soft drinks and other empty calories.

You should avoid or limit coffee and other caffeine-containing drinks, such as teas or colas, and also chocolate, since caffeine may be harmful to the development of your baby.

Pregnancy is not the time to indulge in alcoholic beverages at all. Even a few drinks can turbo the baby's mental and physical growth or cause deformities and brain damage. And don't take any medications, even aspirin, without first asking your doctor.

Exercising in some way every day is desirable during pregnancy, just as it is at any other time of life. But, a woman who had led a sedentary life should not start strenuous activities when she's pregnant. Instead, other forms of exercise such as walking or even caring for the home would be more appropriate and sensible.

Exercise offers benefits for both body and mind, and fresh air is also very important. But exercise that leads to exhaustion is not recommended.

A good diet and regular exercise can help relieve a few of the common complaints of pregnancy, too, namely nausea, heartburn, and constipation. Heartburn and indigestion are caused by decreased gastric mobility and increased pressure being placed on the stomach by the enlarging uterus, and the result is the reflex of gastric contents into the esophagus.

Here are suggestions for reducing some of the discomfort:

For nausea and vomiting:

- Eat a few crackers or dry cereal or dry toast prior to getting out of bed.
- Get up slowly.
- Drink fluids between meals rather than with meals.
- Avoid fatty or fried foods.
- Avoid spicy foods.
- Open windows or use an exhaust fan when cooking.

For heartburn:

- Eat 5 or 6 small meals per day.
- Avoid fatty or fried foods.
- Avoid spicy foods.
- Wear clothes which are loose around the waist.
- Avoid bending over.
- Avoid lying down after a meal.

For constipation:

- Eat raw fruits and vegetables, including skins
- Use whole grain cereals and breads
- Drink a glass of warm liquid upon getting out of bed
- Drink 8 or more glasses of fluids a day
- Eat meals at regular times

Exercise regularly
See your doctor or visiting a clinic regularly throughout your pregnancy and direct questions about nutrition or exercise to the professionals.

Each pregnancy is different. So follow your doctor's advice, not that of your friends or relatives.
