Experts say quake in state will come

Scientists say the real question about a Kentucky earthquakes not if, but when.

And when it comes Rockcastle will be shook, but most experts believe it will be minor.

"The New Madrid fault, on Kentucky's western edge, last gave a major heave in the winter [181] - 1812. It has been ac-Kentucky's western cuge, was agave a major heave in the winter of 1811 - 1812. It has been ac-cumulating energy for another shake since then. When it will release that energy is the ques-tion," said Larry Piercy, agricultural engineer with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. Right now, he said, the New Madrid fault has enough stored energy to cause a major earth-

energy to cause a major earth-quake if it were all released at

energy to cause a major earning and the register of the case of th

Even though it is impossible to predict when a major earthquake

will occur, Piercy said that 'it's' not too early to plan how to deal with one safely.

If you are indoors when the first shock begins, stay there. Find protection from falling debris under a desk or heavy table. Stay away from windows, he said.

If you are outside, get in the open, away from buildings, trees, walls and power lines that could

a result of a provision in the new law that penalizes farmers for deducting expenses incurred in raising replacement animals for the herd. The previous tax laws allowed them to deduct from their income the amount they paid out to raise a replacement animal to maturity.

animal to maturity.

Farmers still will be able, if they choose, to deduct from their income (expensing) the costs associated with raising replacement animals. However, if they do choose to continue to expense their animals, they will have to live with using a slower depreciation schedule for all of their other capital assets, nurchased for the capital assets purchased for the

Whether a farmer should choose to deduct the costs of raising replacement animals or choose to capitalize them depends on the individual's situa-

A farmer who will put into s A farmer who will put into ser-vice a lot of expensive capital assets, such as tractors, combines and buildings, will probably want to capitalize his replacement animals, even though his tax bill on them may increase. By capitalizing them, he also will-be able to depreciate other capital

Farmers who do not anticipate buying any big ticket items may want to continue to use the ex-pensing method, which may reduce their taxes for the first

pensing method, which may reduce their taxes for the first couple of years, but may increase their taxable income when they sell attimates from the herd.

The expensing method also has advantages for farmers, placing small, capital tiems put into service. The current tax law does allow a maximum of \$10,000 in capital assets to be deducted (expensed) from income.

However, Benson cautions, once a farmer decides to deduct expenses for replacement animals, he will be forced to use a slower, straight-lined depteciation for all other assets.

Farmers may want to have a tax preparer familiar with tax laws review their situations before they make the decision whether to capitalize their preproduction expenses.

The signing was conducted by Southern Regional Forester John Aclock and Eastern Regional Forester Grown Congress of C

development.
Among its new policy requires that burial sites be left undisturbed if at all possible. When this is not the case either through accidental or unavoidable reasons, the human case either through accidental or unavoidable reasons, the human remains and grave artifacts will be reburied after full consulta-tions with affected groups and in-dividuals. In this manner, the Forest Service will attempt to strike a balance between the lineal, cultural or ethnic descen-

dants of those buried on public lands and members of the scientific community.

The joint regional effort represents the first time the Forest Service has attempted to systematically deal with this sensitive issue on this scale. The policy is also being reviewed and considered for nationwide use by the Forest Service. In the interior the Forest Service. In the interim it will be implemented within the Southern and Eastern Regions.

INDULGE IN GOOD FOOD AND FITNESS DURING PREGNANCY

If there's ever a time in a woman's life when nutrition and fitness are more important than at other times, it's when she is pregnant. A woman's nutritional status profoundly influences not only her own health bit the outcome of her pregnancies as well. All the food your baby needs to build a strong, well-developed body must come from you. What you eat and drinks is what your baby eats and drinks.

and drinks.

The easiest way to eat proper amounts of the right foods during pregnancy, and throughout your life is to plan meals using the daily food guide based on the food groups. When you are pregnant, your nutritional needs increase (usually your appetite does too). To provide the extra nutrient you and the baby require, you need to eat two extra servings from the milk-chees food group, and one more serving from the meal, poultry, fish and beans group.

Here is a comparison of recommended daily servings for women during pregnancy and at all other times:

DAILY FOOD GUIDE

Vegetable-fruit group	4	4
Bread-cereal group	4	4
Milk-cheese group	2	4
Meat, poultry, fish and beans group	2	3

A healthy diet includes eating a variety of foods, drinking six to cight glasses of water or other liquids daily, and cutting down on weets, soff drinks and other empty calories.

You should avoid or limit coffee and other caffeine-containing drinks, such as teas or colas, and also chocolate, since caffeine may be harmful to the development of your baby.

Pregnancy is not the time to indulge in alcoholic beverages at all. Even a few drinks can retard the baby's mental and physical growth or cause deformities and brain damage. And don't take any medications, even aspirin, without first asking your doctor.

Exercising in some way every day is desirable during pregnancy, just as it is at any other time of life. But, a woman who had led a sedentary life should not start strenuous activities when she's pregnant. Instead, other forms of exercise such as walking or even earing for the home would be more appropriate and sensible.

Exercise offers benefits for both body and mind, and fresh air also very important. But exercise that leads to exhaustion is not recommended.

A good diet and regular exercise can help relieve a few of the common complaints of pregnancy, too, namely nausea, heartburn, and constipation. Heartburn and indigestion are caused by decreased gastric mobility and increased pressure being placed on the stomach by the enlarging uterus, and the result is the reflex of gastric contensi into the esophagus.

Here are suggestions for reducing some of the discomfort:

For nausea and vomiting:

Eat a few crackers or dry cereal or dry toast prior to getting out of bed.

Get up slowly.

Drink fluids between meals rather than with meals.

Avoid fatty of fried foods.

Avoid a priv foods

Open windows or use an exhaust fan when cooking.

For heartburn:
-Earl'S or 6 small meals per day.
-Avoid fatty or fried foods.
-Avoid spiey-foods.
-Wear clothes which are loose around the waist.
-Avoid bending over.
-Avoid bying down after a meal.

-Drink a glass of warm liquid upon getting out of bed


