near Renfro Valley and Burr. At the time, the court agreed the Renfro and Burr collection stations could remain until the garbage plan was in effect about April, 1987. During that time, the court amended the county's illegal dumping ordinance making it a \$25 to \$500 fine to dump. The court also approved an ordinance regulating garbage disposal in the county. It had its first reading on Feb. 20, 1987, and at subsequent meetings. The court then advertised for a solid waste coordinator and received several applications on which they never acted. Since that time the plan has not been discussed at court meetings, and only two cases have come into court for garbage violations.

TRAFFIC CITATIONS ISSUED

A total of 247 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations during January, according to a report from the Kentucky State Police at London. Of the 247, 17 were issued citations for driving under the influence of intoxicants; 43 were issued courtesy notices for faulty equipment and 41 were assisted with breakdowns. There was a total of 31 accidents, with 20 property damage only; 11 personal injury accidents. There were 18 criminal investigations resulting in 27 criminal arrests. In the entire London Post area, 1,443 were issued traffic violations, with 133 driving under the influence.

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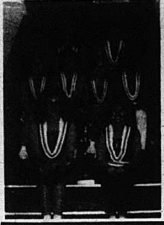

Wrecks claim two lives

A reckless homicide case will be presented to the Rockcastle County Grand Jury this Friday as a result of a fatal accident on I-75 last week.

Kentucky State Trooper Jack Lawless said that he had opened a case of reckless homicide against Joe Falusckai, 25, of Columbia, a driver for Super Service of Somerset.

Falusckai was the driver of a tractor trailer that rear ended a 1978 Subaru last Wednesday about 4:45 a.m. at the Renfro Valley exit of I-75.

The driver of the Subaru, Edward Rice, 67, of Barboursville, was thrown from the vehicle after he was knocked into the guard rail by the transfer truck, according to Lawless.

Rice died at the UK Medical Center about 11 a.m. Wednesday according to Lawless, who said both men were driving south when the accident occurred.

Trooper Lawless said Tuesday that Falusckai had also been cited for leaving the scene of an accident. Lawless reported Falusckai did

Ballot set for March primary

Voters in Rockcastle, Kentucky and several southern states will go to the polls Mar. 8 to vote for the candidate they prefer for president.

"They'll find 17 candidates on the ballot, and voters must vote for a candidate of the party in which they are registered."

Some of the candidates have withdrawn, but their names will appear on the ballot since the ballots were set before the candidates withdrew.

"Republicans listed are: Harold Stassen, Pete dePont, Jack Kemp, George Bush, Bob Dole, Pat Robertson and Alexander M. Haig Jr."

Since publication of the ballot, dePont and Haig have withdrawn.

On the Democratic ticket are:

According to the dispatcher, White pulled her 1985 Cadillac into the path of Thacker's 1987 Toyota pickup as she attempted to make a left turn onto old U.S. 25.

White was pronounced dead on arrival at Berea Hospital. Thacker was admitted to the Berea Hospital and later released.

State to question court compliance with garbage plan

State officials will visit Rockcastle Mar. 1 to prod the Rockcastle Fiscal Court into implementing the garbage plan the court approved a year ago.

An a letter to County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker, Vicki Pettus of the Department of Waste Management of the Natural Resources Cabinet, advised the court representatives are coming to Rockcastle to see how the county's garbage plan is progressing, and if it is not, why.

Ms. Pettus said the representatives will want to look at all phases of the plan. The letter was accompanied by a check sheet with about 20 points to be discussed.

The court will discuss the plan with the representatives immediately following the regular fiscal court meeting on Mar. 1.

"The visit by officials of the waste management section is not unexpected. They have been to

several counties and had said earlier they would be in Rockcastle about November.

"What they are going to do is urge the county to get going on the plan," one county official noted. "If the county can't show much change since the plan was approved, then they will likely give them a certain time to comply and watch it closely."

Failure to abide by the plan could bring a hefty fine for the county.

It was exactly one year ago this month that the court approved its solid waste management plan. The court removed the expensive green dumpsters from county areas and suggested residents take garbage to dumping areas

The worst probably was on Monday afternoon when about 20 acres burned threatening the home of Earl Cummins at the intersection of old and new Ky. 461.

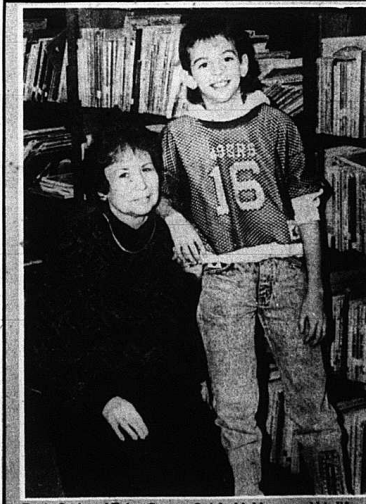
Also on Monday, the Mt. Vernon department extinguished a grass fire on the Rigby Road that burned about half acre.

Dear Editor,

A bill to allow the citizens of Kentucky to vote on a constitutional amendment which would restrict the use of Broad Form Deeds is now in the State Government committee of the Kentucky House. Most of you probably know what the broad form deed is, but for those of you who don't (as I didn't when I moved to Kentucky), the deed allows mineral owners to strip mine property regardless of the landowner's wishes. Most broad form deeds were signed in the late 1800's or early 1900's before strip mining was developed. The proposed amendment would limit the mineral owners' rights to the type of mining that was being done when the deed was signed.

Kentucky is the only state to still uphold these deeds. In a 1984 law, the Kentucky legislature declared broad form deeds invalid, but in 1987, the State Supreme Court said the 1984 law was unconstitutional. Now, the only hope for threatened landowners is a constitutional amendment. This bill has widespread support and has already passed the Senate 38-0. However, there is a limit on the numbers of constitutional amendments that can be placed before the voters at one time. Our representatives need to know that we think this bill is important. Please call the toll free legislative message line 1-800-372-7181 to express your support for House bill 228 (Senate bill 145). An operator will take your message and give it to any legislators you name. Danny Ford is on the state government committee that will be reviewing the bill. He needs to know how his constituency feel about this and other issues. You can help to end this injustice by calling and you must do it soon.

LEGISLATIVE Report . . .

A protest march, a visit from a movie star and Governor Wilkinson's controversial education package highlighted activities in the State Legislature last week.

Nearly 2,000 college students, professors and administrators marched on the Capitol last week to protest Wilkinson's zero-growth budget for higher education. The properly behaved throng was led by a pep band, cheerleaders and athletic team misfits.

Actually, the protest march was more of a pep rally for higher education, urging the legislature to appropriate funds for salary

increases for university faculty members.

Victoria Principal of 'Dallas' fame, in her capacity as National Chairman of the Arthritis Foundation, addressed the House of Representatives on behalf of House Bill 480.

House Bill 480 would permit Medicaid reimbursement for outpatients needing anti-inflammatory medications. This measure will primarily aid arthritis sufferers and make Kentucky one of the first if not the first state to take such an action.

The movie star was well received and House Bill 480 was passed by a big margin and sent to the Senate. However, House Bill 480 would have passed easily even without the movie star.

Governor Wilkinson's two pronged education package calls for School Incentives and Benchmark Schools.

The School Incentive Program seeks to pay bonuses to the staffs of schools that improve. The teaching staff would receive at least \$1,800 each, and the non-teaching staff would get no more than 25 per cent of that.

A nine-member council would develop policies and procedures for judging schools. Criteria would include student test scores, attitudes, attendance, and dropout and suspension rates.

The schools would be judged during the 1989-90 school year,

and the first bonuses would be paid the next school year. Also, the governor's plan seeks to set aside \$70 million a year for the bonuses and divide the money among qualifying schools.

Under the Benchmark Schools

program twenty-one schools would be established to experiment with effective ways to teach schools.

A total of 21 schools, an elementary, middle and senior

high would be selected for the program in each of the seven congressional districts. The program would cost \$5 million each year of the 1988-90 biennium.

The Wilkinson plan, based on a program recently established in South Carolina, is controversial for several reasons.

The governor has not indicated how the state will pay for the majority of his programs or how the program will be administered.

Additionally, there is concern that the educational improvements in 1985 and 1986 have been put on hold. And, the fact that although the Wilkinson plan is obviously well-intended it is so very new that the legislature will necessarily have to review it with extreme care.

In other action, the House of Representatives also passed legislation for increased legislative oversight of the state economic development expenditures.

Save money on meat purchases

Because more of the weekly grocery budget is spent on meat than on other foods, a savings will definitely stretch the food dollar. Most families can get more for their money in buying meats and at the same time provide wholesome, nutritious meals for the family.

One obvious way to cut back on the cost is to cut back on the meat. Many people don't realize they buy more meat than is strictly necessary from a nutrition standpoint. Two servings daily, each two to three ounces, of lean meat, poultry or fish will give the average adult over half the protein he needs. The rest will come from milk, breads, and cereals.

But if one doesn't want to cut back on the portions, he can still save money with careful shopping. The cost of a cut of meat depends on the number of servings as well as the cost per pound. For example, a high-priced meat with little or no waste may be a better buy than a low-priced cut with a large amount of bone, gristle and fat.

Some processed meats such as hot dogs and bologna actually cost more as a source of protein than some pork or beef roasts. A three ounce serving of roast beef will contain 20 grams of protein. To get that same 20 grams, one would have to eat four hot dogs or 10 pieces of bacon.

Cozy fireplaces are appealing but beware of the hidden cost

If you're using a fireplace as a source of heat, you probably should stop doing it during the cold, sub-freezing temperatures much of Kentucky experiences at this time of year.

It's costly, and it's inefficient. According to Bill Murphy, housing and energy engineer with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, most people are better off to not use their fireplaces, once temperatures drop below 40 degrees.

Fireplaces with forced heat exchangers can be used when it is somewhat colder, and systems with a separate outdoor air intake can be used effectively in colder weather, he said.

"When you open the damper in traditional fireplaces, it's just like opening a door to the outside," Murphy said. "The cold air from outside will spill into the room. Yet the damper needs to be open for combustion."

Murphy said a fireplace at best is not very efficient. An ordinary open fireplace has an efficiency of about 10 percent. That means only 10 percent of the fuel energy in the wood actually makes it into the living space of the house.

"By adding some sort of blower to the fireplace, the efficiency rate can be raised to 20 percent or so," Murphy said. "That means the net efficiency of either of these fireplaces may actually be negative on a cold day."

He explained that if 5,000 Btu's are required normally to warm 40 degree outdoor air which seeps in around the doors and windows to a desired 70 degrees, twice the energy (10,000 Btu's) will be needed if the outdoor temperature drops to 10 degrees. That's because the frigid outdoor temperature will need to be warmed twice as much, 60 total degrees rather than the 30 needed when the outside temperature is 40.

"Now suppose we decide to open the damper on the fireplace and start a fire," he said. "Even more cold air will spill into the room. It could double the air infiltration rate."

The room surrounding the fireplace may be comfortably warm by direct heat radiation from the fireplace while the rest of the house becomes chilled.

"There is nothing like a crackling fire to give a person a sense of warm coziness on a cold winter night," Murphy said. "Economically though, you probably should not use an open fireplace anytime it gets below 40 outside."

1988 Feed Grain Program

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office is now having the annual Feed Grain Program sign-up. Provisions for this year's sign-up are as follows:

0/92 Provisions: Feed Grain producers have the option of participating in an optional acreage

division in which they may underplant their permitted feed grain acres and still under some conditions, receive deficiency payments on the underplanted acreage.

The 0/92 provision allows producers to devote all or a portion of their permitted acreage to conserving uses (CU) and receive deficiency payments on the acreage. The maximum acreage for deficiency payments under this provision is 92 percent of the permitted acreage. The deficiency payment rate on the CU acreage will not be less than the estimated deficiency payment rate.

To minimize the adverse effects on agribusiness and other related economic interests in an area, measures may be taken to limit the amount of acreage idled through the 0/92 option, taking as the Conservation Reserve Program. Therefore, the decision to participate in the 0/92 program must be made earlier in the sign-up period.

Feed Grain producers may apply to participate in the 0/92 program through March 11, 1988.

One cup of sugar: Replace with three-fourths cup of honey; or substitute one cup of corn syrup and use one-fourth cup less liquid in the recipe.

You can also use cooked and pureed dry fruit as a sweetener - it's a natural.

One cup all-purpose flour: Substitute self-rising flour. Leave out salt and baking powder or soda.

One cup self-rising flour: Use regular white flour, adding the amount of salt and leavening agent usual for whatever it is you're making.

You can also replace up to half of the white flour in a recipe with whole wheat flour.

producers who do not submit an application to participate in the 0/92 program before March 11, 1988, will not receive deficiency payments on conserving use acres. Production of nonprogram crops will not be permitted on CU acreage under the 0/92 provision for feed grains. Remember March 11, is the deadline.

General Provisions: Producers must reduce their feed grain plantings by 20.0 percent of their crop acreage base to be eligible for loans, purchases and payments for the 1988 crop.

Producers may also participate in an optional paid land diversion for the 1988 crop year by diver-

using 10 percent of their feed grain base. The diverted acreage must be devoted to ACR. The diversion payment will be paid all in generic commodity certificates on or about May 16.

Producers are eligible to earn deficiency payments on the actual acreage planted, within their permitted acreage. Advance payments will be equal to 40 percent of the estimated commodity deficiency payment rate, payable one-half in cash at sign-up and the balance paid in generic commodity certificates on or about May 16, 1988.

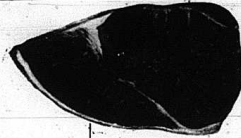

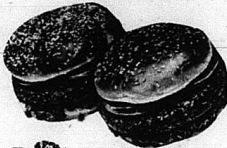

"Credits earned can be transferred to other accredited institutions or applied directly to a degree program at Eastern," Hall said.

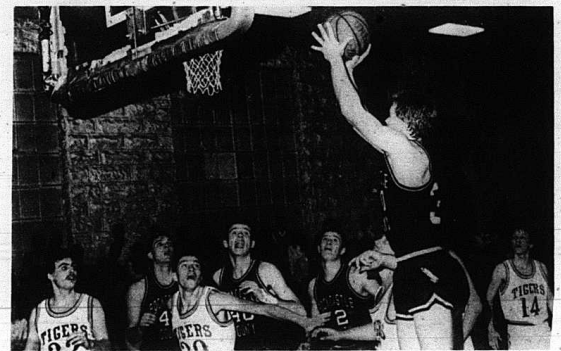

The College Warm-Up program, as well as most courses at Eastern this summer, will operate on a four-day week--no Friday classes.

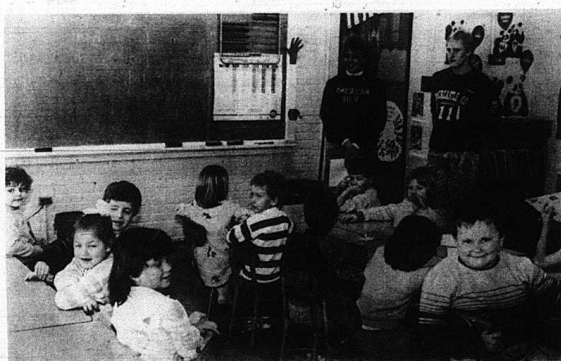
Information about enrolling in College Warm-Up may be obtained from Hall, who is an assistant professor in the EKU Department of Mathematics, Statistics, and Computer Science.

of Ms. T. C. Carroll who had been active in the Federation; and the other from Sammy Ford, who explained that Forward in the Fifth was implementing a work-study program in Rockcastle with two students participating, and that they need donations. President Allen said that this request would be brought before the group at the next meeting. With the business finished, Mrs. Nancy Mullins introduced the speaker, Sammy Ford, who discussed the work of Forward in the Fifth. He enumerated some

problems that hinder education in the Fifth Congressional District: low expectations for performance, some schools categorizing students according to appearance and names, poor communication between parents and school, parents who are intimidated by the school environment, some teachers who feel defensive if they are questioned, large schools overwhelming children who would feel more comfortable in a small school, overcrowded classes, poor teacher education in some areas, too much funding, and too little local politics.

Even with this fairly bleak picture, he believes there are solutions. He suggested at least 10: expose children to experiences outside their area, form organizations dedicated to education and economic improvement in the county, try to get employers to require a high school diploma and assist others to get GED, award teachers with mini-grants, encourage parent involvement, establish speakers' bureaus so students can learn about jobs, establish internships, help students get jobs, publicize educational issues and concerns, and recognize outstanding students, teachers, and educators.

After a brief question-answer session with Mr. Ford, Mrs. Allen adjourned the meeting; the group recited the collect and enjoyed refreshments served by Mrs. Nancy Mullins.
