Choose Pasta**

There was a time when everyone thought that pasta was fattening and should be avoided. Now, we know better.

Pasta is a good choice of good nutrition, for economy, and for ease of preparation.

With the number of varieties and flavors available, Americans have consumed 50 percent more

pasta since 1977.

Pasta is a general name used for macaroni, spaghetti and noodle products. The difference is in the shape. The basic ingredients are the same except noodles have egg solids added. Noodles are usually flat and are easy to make at home without a pasta machine. Spaghetti is a long, solid rod that varies in thickness. Macaroni is tubular, and can be long or short, curved or straight.

Pasta offers something for every age—it is easy to chew and to digest. It can be one of the foods that children learn to

prepare first because it is as easy as boiling water.

Pasta is usually made from durum wheat or semolina, or from whole wheat flour. All-purpose flour is usually used when making pasta at home with a pasta machine. Reading the label is a good clue as to the content and nutritive value. One advantage is that it is low in fat and sodium. Without added salt, one serving has less than 10 milligrams of sodium.

Although a one-cup serving of cooked pasta is low in calories, sauces and other extras can make a difference. One cup of pasta with a quarter cup of tomato sauce and a tablespoon of Parmesan cheese has about 250 calories.

To keep the calories lower in pasta dishes, use lean meats, low-fat cottage cheese, ricotta cheese, plain-yogurt instead of sour cream, and go easy on the amount of sauce added. Low calorie salad dressing and herb dressings also help keep the calories lower for pasta salads.

Different kinds of pasta are interchangeable in recipes. Substitute according to weight and not by the cup.

Pasta is as easy to store as it is to cook. Dried (uncooked) macaroni and spaghetti keep well at room temperature for one year and noodles keep for about six months.

Cooked too much? Leftover pasta can be frozen and reheated in both conventional and microwave ovens. Many pasta dishes can be frozen to use later. In this case, pasta should be slightly undercooked to prevent overcooking when reheating.

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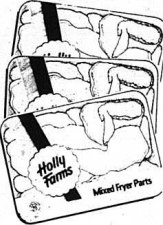

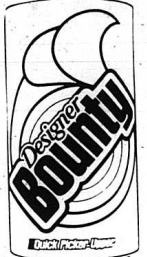

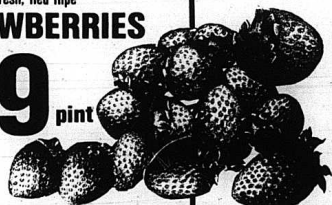

Gas funds allocated to county

Rockcastle County will receive \$404,945 in July as its share for maintenance of the county road program the Rockcastle Fiscal Court was told at its meeting Tuesday.

The amount compares to \$361,054 the county received for the program last year, or \$43,891 more.

The money is the county's share of the gasoline tax.

The agreement does not specify roads on which the money will be used.

The court added four roads to the county road program: Old Buffalo and Line Creek Road in District 3; Howard Linville Road in District 1, and Rogers Road in District 4.

The court approved the application for a grant from the Juvenile Justice Commission of up to \$2,853 to reimburse the county for the cost of transporting juveniles to Somerset and Bowling Green who have been charged with a crime.

The amount received is based on mileage.

A hearing on the county's garbage plan by the state was postponed until Apr. 7 at the courthouse.

Meanwhile, the court brought two laid-off road workers back on duty until Apr. 11 to clean up the trash along the roads. They are George Bowles and M.B. Kimer. They will receive \$4 an hour. The two will be back on regular duty after Apr. 11, in the county road department.

The court turned down a request from Senior Citizens that they be allowed to tend a small garden at the Senior Citizens Center at Brodhead.

Lake road owner still a question

The question of ownership of a road at Lake Linville was once again a center of attention at a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday.

With Rose Hill/Oak Hill road from U.S. 25 to Mt. Vernon Boat Dock on Lake Linville in need of work, Mt. Vernon City Councilman Wayne Adams asked Rockcastle Fiscal Court about ownership of the road and who should maintain it.

In an on-going controversy over ownership, the court asked the Kentucky Department of Transportation to put the road on the state road program but was told by the state the road belonged to the city. That was in 1986.

Then Mayor Roland Mullins disputed the city's ownership and claimed the county owned the road and it should be maintained by the county.

The road was relocated when Lake Linville was filled. It was then a city road.

However, in September 1970, a deed transferred "Lake Linville Roads" from the City of Mt.

Vernon to Rockcastle County for maintenance.

Then at the September 1970 meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court the minutes of the meeting state:

"It being deemed in the best interest of Rockcastle County and KRS Chapter 178 of Statutes having been complied with and deed having been accepted and recorded, a motion was made by Hewitt Jones, seconded by Sherman Sargent that Rockcastle Fiscal Court accept the roads as described in deed recorded Deed Book 9, Page 358 and said roads be known as Linville Lake roads."

All magistrates voted "yes".

At the July 1971 meeting of the court, the minutes note: "A motion was made by Hewitt Jones and seconded by Sherman Sargent that if there is any surplus money for Rockcastle County, this money be used for maintenance and improvement of Renfro Lake road."

All magistrates voted "yes".

The court left the question of the road Tuesday where it was left in September 1986, noting

that the city has used its state money to keep up the road.

"We don't get any money from the lake and boat dock," one magistrate said. "The city always kept it up as far as I know. The state says so."

The Kentucky Senate passes bill for Hall of Fame at Renfro Valley

The Kentucky Senate has approved a bill 37-0 designating a Kentucky Country Music Hall of Fame at Renfro Valley.

The bill now goes to Gov. Wallace Wilkinson who is expected to sign it.

The Senate followed the Kentucky House of Representatives which voted 100 - 0 earlier this month to approve the Hall of Fame for country music at Renfro.

The bill was originally introduced in the House by Representative Danny Ford.

The only difference this time was the entertainers from Renfro Valley did not perform for the Senators because of their busy schedule.

The Hall of Fame will be located in the beginning on the second floor of the Renfro Valley office building that once housed the Pioneer Museum. According to Mrs. Ann Henderson, president, no definite date to open the new facility has been set.

Fires destroy houses, barns

Two house fires, two barn fires and at least eight woods and grass fires kept county firemen busy during the past few days.

An unoccupied house owned by John Powell of Madison County burned at Cove Branch early Sunday. A barn belonging to Pleas Moley was damaged by fire near the same location, according to Mt. Vernon firemen who answered the call. Arson is suspected.

Later on Sunday morning, Mt. Vernon firemen extinguished a second barn fire at Cove Branch. The owner's name is unknown.

A house and two outbuildings were destroyed by fire near Scenic View north of Renfro Valley about 11:30 a.m. Sunday. Lewis Rowe was moving into the house at the time. It was owned by Oscar Rucker Jr. of Berea.

A bedroom fire in a home of Willie Leece was extinguished by Brodhead firemen.

3 county residents die in head-on crash in Madison County

Three Rockcastle residents were killed in a head-on collision between a van and a pickup truck near Appalachian Village Monday night.

The driver of the van was critically injured. Theresa Mae Gregory, 24, the driver of the pickup, died Monday night at Berea Hospital of injuries sustained in the accident. Her 8-month-old daughter, Ashley, was taken by a UK helicopter to the Medical Center where she later died.

Mrs. Gregory's mother, Pauline Yarbter Gregory, 50, was pronounced dead at the scene by Madison County Coroner Emory Curry. Pauline Gregory was partly thrown from the pickup, according to State Trooper Darrell Hutchison.

The driver of the van, Ronald Newman, 30, of Berea, also was taken by helicopter to the UK medical center, where he was still listed in critical condition Wednesday morning.

Pauline Gregory, her daughter and granddaughter were on their way to the grocery, said Trooper Hutchison. They all lived at 343

Flat Gap Road in northern Rockcastle County.

The accident occurred at 7:10 p.m. on U.S. 25 near Appalachian Village about 2 1/2 miles south of Berea. Newman's van crossed the center line and collided head-on with the southbound Gregory pickup truck, police reported.

Trooper Hutchison said that police found empty and full beer cans around Newman's van. "We suspect from all indications that alcohol was involved on the driver's part," he said. No charges were filed immediately pending investigation. Seat belts were not in use.

Pauline Gregory, a native of Owsley County, was a cook at the Dinner Bell Restaurant in Berea. Teresa Gregory, was a cashier at the Powell Grill at Eastern Kentucky University.

Pauline Gregory is survived by her husband Oscar Gregory, a daughter, Elaine Milligan, and her parents, Earl and Mabel Yarbter of Richmond.

Combined services will be at 2 p.m. Thursday at Wray Funeral Home in Berea.

Brodhead man charged

A Brodhead man is being held in the Rockcastle County jail in lieu of a \$25,000 bond after he was charged with a Thursday morning armed robbery at Convent Food Mart in Brodhead.

LeRoy Williams, 24, Castle Village apartments in Brodhead was arrested by Kentucky State trooper Jack Lawless Thursday afternoon in Brodhead and charged with the early morning robbery.

Williams said that he arrested Williams after he stopped a car in which Williams was a passenger around 2 p.m. Thursday in the city limits of Brodhead.

According to the trooper a man carried a knife into the Convent around 5:30 a.m. and demanded money from the clerks. After getting the cash the man left on foot. Lawless said that although the man had a stocking over his head one of the clerk's recognized the man as Williams. Only about \$230 was taken in the robbery and none of it has been recovered.

Friday the Rockcastle County Grand Jury returned an indictment for first degree robbery against Williams, who will be arraigned in Rockcastle Circuit Court on March 11.

Anti-lottery meeting held

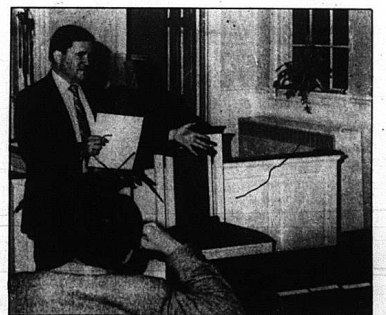

Hamill shared his own personal involvement with underworld gambling prior to becoming a born-again Christian in Las Vegas. He had, according to his

own description, "become one of the underworld leaders in gambling and knew the ins and outs of the industry." He now seeks to help citizens of Kentucky understand the deceptiveness of a state lottery.

At the present time, the lottery bill being considered will be an open door to all types of gambling, if approved. Hamill pointed out that this bill merely gives sanctions to a lottery that will be

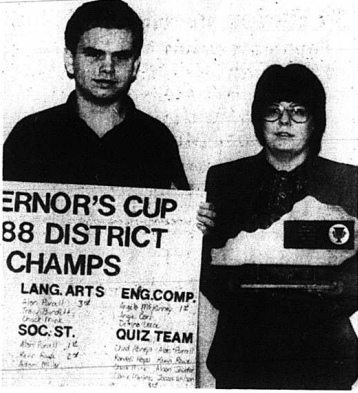

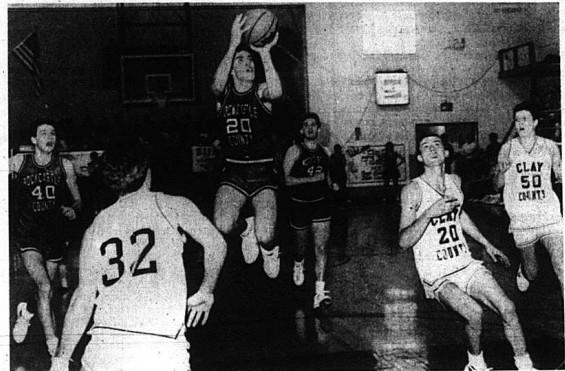
Bullens' outside shooting gave

Little League Sign-Up

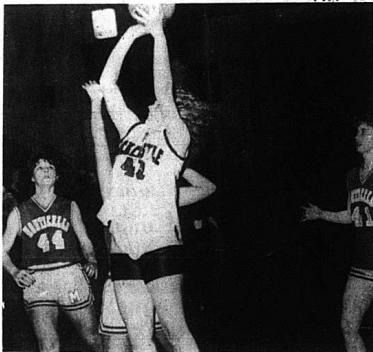

Commentary: "Politics in Athletics"

On the heels of Rockcastle's defeat at the hands of Clay County, one of the top ranked high school basketball teams in the nation, there are several points that did appear on the scoreboard.

While Clay County has a high ranking in the polls, deservedly so, Rockcastle County has a high ranking as well. Their ranking may not appear in the pages of USA Today or in the Herald Leader's sports pages, but it appears in the hearts and minds of the players and fans. This does not mean that they are the same caliber basketball team as Clay, it simply says they are just as important an entity in Kentucky high school athletics as any other team in the state and deserve a fair shake of things.

My reference is to the pairings for the 49th District Tournament. Had the members of the district gone by the arrangement they had agreed upon, then Rockcastle should have played Jackson County. Whether they would have won or lost this game is irrelevant. One can only project what the outcome of basketball games will be, usually with less accuracy than tossing a coin. But it seems to me that the Rockets did not lose to Clay County, 84-41, they actually lost by a score of 3-1 in the district.

Onida contended that the Courier-Journal's ratings were inaccurate because Rockcastle had not called in all of their scores. Therefore, they should not have been ranked below Rockcastle when it came time to decide the pairings. Onida failed to mention the strength (or lack thereof) of their own schedule.

For the record, I feel rankings are an unreliable and inefficient method to use when setting pairings for tournaments. A blind draw is much better to all teams involved. However, if this is what all members agreed upon then all members of the district should stick by their decision.

This is where the political aspect comes in to play. Onida did have something to gain if they did not play Clay. Likewise Clay did have something to gain by playing at home. And nowhere in this scenario did Rockcastle come into the picture until, for all intents and purposes, it had been decided that Clay would play Rockcastle and Onida would host the tournament on Clay's home court and in turn play Jackson.

The real losers are not the school, who probably would lose only a small percentage of revenue, but the players. It is not fair to the players in this county to be done unjust. Principal Ronnie Cash and Coach David Perkins deserve a great deal of praise for standing up to the other members of the district even if their efforts were with out reward.

Which brings me to another point. When Rockcastle finally gained a meeting with the Kentucky High School Athletic Association (KHSAA) Board of Directors only four of the ten members were present. Supposedly a board of this magnitude must have a quorum present when making judgements. Four of ten does not appear to constitute a quorum.

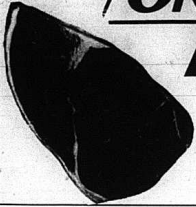
All of this means that while the efforts of the Rockcastle principals and coaches were to be praised it was probably already decided before they arrived at the meeting what their judgement was going to be.

The KHSAA Board is just as politically motivated as most state agencies. Let us keep in mind they are supposed to be objective and fair to all members of the KHSAA. Whether you be ranked first in high school basketball or last.

So, why does Rockcastle County find itself as an outsider in its own district? The answer, in part, lies in geographic location. Rockcastle is not centrally located in the 49th District. When was the last time you went shopping in downtown Manchester? Therefore, the other members of the district feel they can have their way with Rockcastle County.

The grackles are coming! The blackbirds are coming! Putting it another way, the blackbirds are beginning to make their springtime appearance in Mt. Vernon after spending the winter in warmer climes where most folks in the city had hoped they'd stay.

Grackles are a type of blackbird in fact, they're jet black with a dark blue head and of the bird family, Icteridae.

They swarm and swarm settling finally in their favorite roosting place, in the sinkhole area near Mt. Vernon Elementary School south to Crawford Street.

Some yards and fields in the area have already had a hundred or so blackbirds picking at bugs and insects. But most of the birds, including a smattering of starlings, are still out there somewhere waiting to make an appearance for the summer.

Starlings, unlike grackles, are black with small white spots and often join with the grackles in the roost.

When they do return to the area there will be thousands of them. Some folks estimate they are in the millions. One fact, early morning in the summer when they leave their roost and return at sundown they are in swarms, at dawn taking as long as 15 minutes to finally be on their way.

The 49th District victory was the first of the post season that Clay County fans hope will end in Louisville, with the Tigets defending their high school basketball championship. Clay County must now win eight straight tournament games in order to defend their title. Quite a task even for a team as talented as Clay.

For the game the Rockets did not play their best game, nor did they play their worst. They were simply outmanned by a superior basketball team.

The Rockets were led in scoring by Bulls' 11 points, Pat Hance 9, Anthony Lewis and Allen 6 each, Shannon Burton 4, and Chuck Shields 2.

The winners were led by Russ Chadwell's 24 and Ritchie Farmer's 21 points. Kevin Jackson scored 17 most of which came off offensive rebounds.

The Rockets finished the year with 10 wins and 16 losses.

According to Steve Midkiff, environmentalist at the Rockcastle Health Department, it won't be easy to remedy the bird problem that is often considered a health problem.

"The grackles are on the federal list of protected species," Midkiff said. "And as such it will be difficult to get anything done since permission has to be obtained from federal officials or so I'm told."

He added that there has to be birds in the tens of thousands before permission for a kill is given, and probably Mt. Vernon does not have that many, even though it looks that way.

Added to permission, he said it would cost thousands of dollars to do the spraying job necessary to kill the birds in large numbers. The department does not have the money for the chemical required to spray the trees, plus the equipment to do the spraying that must be done while the birds

are asleep in the trees at night.

A chemical detergent is mixed with water and sprayed on the roost. It must be the right night when the temperature is below freezing. The detergent soaks the feathers, and removes the protective oil, and the birds literally freeze to death.

Midkiff explained that bird droppings can be a hazard to health, transmitting histoplasmosis, a type of fungus that grows in bird droppings. Dust is inhaled causing damage to the lungs, spleen and the central nervous system.

Jim Wesley environmentalist for the Pulaski County Health Department, who spearheaded an all-out attack on a blackbird roost in Somerset, said the Wildlife Control of the U.S. Department of Agriculture must make a bird count in order to receive federal approval to kill the birds. About 400,000 to 500,000 birds must be in the flock

to qualify for a kill.

"There's a lot of labor and money involved," Wesley said. "Here in Somerset, the city, county, federal, state and fire departments all got together to do the job. It was a total community effort. And, we still have birds."

He said a water cannon was used in Somerset where there was an estimated two million birds in the roost. Thousands of them were killed.

Wesley said the Mt. Vernon roost could be ideal for spraying because of its close location to city services including water. When told the birds roost in Mt. Vernon in the spring, summer and fall and not in winter, he called it unusual since they roost in winter in Somerset and leave in the spring.

"Perhaps you're getting our birds when they leave here in the spring, which they always do. He suggested the city contact the Louisville office of Wildlife Control.

The birds are very difficult to control," a spokesman for the

Kentucky Health Department in Frankfort said. "We'll leave control with the local health department. We know the birds can be a health hazard and pests, but there really isn't much that we can do here. One other remedy besides spraying is to cut down the roost, but they would just find another."

Midkiff said he could not understand why the grackles are federally protected since there are so many of them. Probably, someone acted in haste.

"The only good that I know of," Midkiff said, "is that they do eat a lot of insects."

He related that the Russians are having the same bird problem and have apparently found some innovative way to control them. He said he had been unable to find out the method they are using.

"But in Rockcastle, we just don't have the money and equipment to do the job, even if we had the permission."

The grackles are not here in large numbers yet since the leaves are not on the trees.

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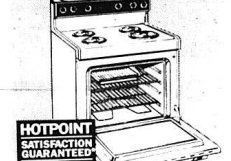
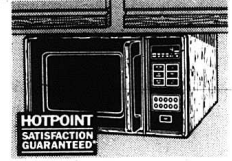

Something is Wrong

The religious situation prevailing in America forces a diligent student of the Scriptures to conclude that SOMETHING IS WRONG. Hundreds of divergent religious bodies cannot all be right. New Testament Christianity is not correctly pictured when people obey different commands, believe contradictory doctrines and wear partisan names which reflect differences. Rather, this demonstrates that God's way has been corrupted (I Tim. 4:1-3). Truth remains the same regardless of the century or geographic location in which it may be found. And when men differ so widely on matters clearly revealed in the word of God, we have positive proof that SOMETHING IS WRONG!

Perhaps it is a LACK OF STUDY. Many highly respect the Bible, but never actually study it. They do not want to be disturbed by learning new truths. Jesus said, "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness" (Matt. 5:6). We all need to have this yearning for knowledge, and then satisfy it by a diligent study of God's word (2 Tim. 2:15).

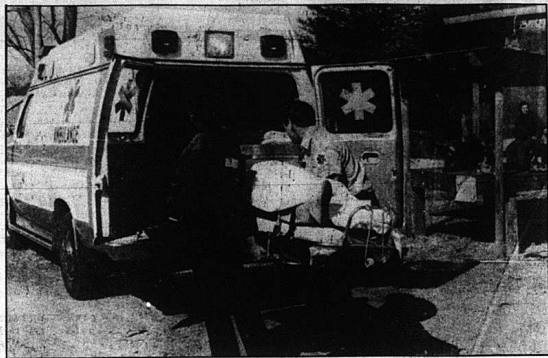
Maybe it's WISHFUL THINKING. A person who wants badly enough to believe in another chance at redemption for those who die in sin may easily persuade himself to accept one of the many doctrines (purgatory, for example) which offer a second chance. People are reluctant to accept the Bible teaching on "eternal punishment" and hence, though "wishful thinking" invent doctrines which offer a means of escape. More people believe in Heaven than in hell. Yet Jesus taught as much on eternal punishment as He did on Heaven (Matt. 25:46).

When error is pointed out, many are too proud to admit they are wrong, and hence refuse the truth when it is presented. Some are willing to admit wrongs in a general way, but get their pride severely wounded when specific mistakes are pointed out. Solomon said, "Pride goeth before destruction and a haughty spirit before a fall" (Prov. 16:18). We should humble ourselves and accept the truth when presented, because it is only by the truth that we are made free (John 8:32).

Unscriptural LOYALTY TO MEN also leads us to conclude that SOMETHING IS WRONG. This is one of the most subtle problems with which we are confronted because the teacher, or preacher may be involved. But we should not blindly accept the teaching of others simply because they are kind and good, and should never think more highly of men than "that which is written" (I Cor. 4:6). We should follow others only as they follow Christ (I Cor. 11:1).

We owe it to God, to our fellowman and to ourselves to examine our religious convictions in the light of scripture (2 Cor. 13:5). When the truth was pointed out to Saul of Tarsus, he changed from a bitter persecutor to a faithful believer and immediately began preaching Christ. It is better to abandon error and be right than to spend eternity in regret. Like the Bereans, we should "search the scriptures daily" (Acts 17:11). "Am I right or wrong" is a serious question in religious matters!

If the legislature allows this bill to come to a public vote, a local committee will be organized to oppose the lottery by trying to educate the public on the hard fact (Go) what a state lottery is going to mean in the state of Kentucky.
