There has been severe weather several times in March. One such time began the last week of February 1960. The Weather Service said there could be snow, heavy at times.

On Feb. 24 the first snow came ending on Feb. 25 with five inches on the ground. Temperatures fell to near zero and were to remain below freezing for the next 37 days.

A second snow came on Mar. 3 and when it was over there was a total of 11.60 inches on the ground. Snow was stacked along the streets. It was a time when there was only one snow plow and no salt for streets.

On Mar. 9 a third snow arrived with an eight-inch accumulation that brought the total on the ground to 24 inches.

Two more snows later in the month brought the total to 36 inches on the ground. During March, the snow remained. It was into the first week of April that the snow finally melted away.

Perhaps the most severe storm in the past 20 years was on April 3, 1974 when dozens of tornadoes touched down across the Midwest.

Rockcastle was not spared. A tornado damaged homes, mobile homes and killed one person in the county. It touched down along the Rockcastle River south of Livingston uprooting whole acres of trees, followed the river, jumped a mountain and touched down again east of Livingston.

But, after the meeting assistant Principal Mark McKinney said that he had some reservations about leaving the old gymnasium and the classrooms that surround it.

The precinct with the largest turnout was West Mt. Vernon with 181 votes. The smallest turnout was in Bullock precinct with 47 votes followed closely by Climax with 48.

On the Democratic side, only 10 Democrats voted in the Bullock precinct and all were for Gore. Five Democrat voters voted in Climax and Gore got 4 and Dukakis got one.

A total of 1,512 cast ballots in Rockcastle County, or a meager 18.5 percent of the total 8,199 registered voters.

The percentage voting Tuesday was about half the 35.7 percent who voted in the county last November.

There were few hitches during the voting in the county. However, when the Brown precinct officers sent the official voting tally to the election commissioners at the courthouse, they failed to list the vote totals.

Sheriff Clarence Hasty and commissioners Shirley Riddle and Clyde Barnett went to the Brown precinct, opened the voting machine and figured up the totals.

Voters in Rockcastle followed the rest of the state in their voting. On the Republican ticket, it was Bush, Dole, Robertson, and Kemp in that order. On the Democratic ticket, it was Gore, Dukakis, Jackson, Gephardt and Hart in that order.

County gets grant to loan to plastic factory for expansion

Rockcastle County has received a check for \$385,000 to loan to Mt. Vernon Plastics for use in the company's expansion program. The money is a Community Development Block Grant and will be part of the company's \$2,873,085 project. The county is in no way responsible for the loan money.

Planning and application for the loan had been made by the company and Rockcastle Fiscal Court over a year ago.

The company plans to use the money to primarily expand production at the plant and to create an eventual 125 jobs.

The bulk of the money for the project will come from the Kentucky Development Finance Authority (\$1,821,000) and from the First National Bank of Louisville (\$750,000). The company's equity in the project is \$415,000. A total of \$2,085 is earmarked for administrative costs.

Broadhead council wants sewer loan

A pre-application for financial assistance for the City of Broadhead has been made to the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) to help finance upgrading of the Broadhead sewer plant.

But that the city must go through the necessary steps to get the money approved.

The EPA has warned the council at least three times to upgrade the plant or face a fine.

In other action, the council voted to pay the Broadhead Volunteer Fire Department liability insurance premium for the year totalling \$604, but left until later an additional estimated \$215 for the premium on errors and omissions.

The insurance is with Hart Insurance Co. of Stanford. Councilman D.A. Robbins told the council he preferred insurance be purchased from agents in the county if and when possible.

The council agreed to hire someone to clean several street signs so the Lions Club could paint and re-install them.

Stormy Weather

County has had its share

When the Weather Service set this week aside as Severe Storms Awareness Week, a reader called to remind the Signal that in other years severe weather did not always wait until March came along. January and February have had a share.

Curious about local weather, we checked Signals as far back as 50 years ago and discovered that, even though March in Kentucky can be very unpleasant, so can the months surrounding March.

Take for example a January 1937 report.

There was no school locally. Residents were asked to donate clothing.

Food was also needed, as well as a place to prepare it.

And, everything was wet, wet, wet.

The year 1937 was called the year of the Great Flood. And it all began in the last days of January.

The Weather Service said, an "intense low pressure area is riding across Kentucky bringing rain that could last for several days."

Unfortunately, the low slowed down over Kentucky and finally came to a stop over West Virginia where for four days about 11 inches of rain fell sending up tributaries of the Ohio River out of their banks.

Before a week passed "a wall of water was pouring into the Ohio River" one report said, and flood warnings were issued for Charleston, W. Va., and Ashland.

"It looks bad," an Ashland resident told WHAS radio in Louisville, "it's getting worse by the hour. The whole

area is under water. We don't know anywhere to go except to the hills."

The flood moved methodically down the Ohio River drowning Maysville, Cincinnati, Louisville and Paducah in the next 10 days.

"It's a mess here," the Cincinnati Enquirer reported. "We've got water in downtown. It's everywhere."

When the flood reached Louisville, the downtown area was a lake. The Brown Hotel, then a favorite stopping place, had a lobby full of water and water was on the mezzanine floor. Fourth Street and Broadway became popular with boaters.

The call went out for help including shelter, clothing and food. Rockcastle responded.

For over a week the gymnasiums at Mt. Vernon Elementary School, Livingston and Broadhead schools were turned in to shelters for the homeless. Cots were set up, and residents furnished bedding, clothing and hot food for the refugees. Local youngsters were the only ones happy over the situation. They got out of school.

Some reported that some of the area churches took in refugees.

It was also very rainy and wet in the county. There was so much rain that the sinkhole at Mt. Vernon Elementary School could not take the run-off and water backed to Lovell Lane.

There is no official record of the amount of rain that fell in the county that year since it was before the late Bill Cox began keeping records.

The visitors to Rockcastle were generally a pleasant and ap-

Robertson, Jackson third

As predicted by local politicians, Republican Vice President George Bush and Democrat Tennessee Senator Albert Gore scored easy victories in Rockcastle County in Tuesday's Presidential Preference Primary.

Bush carried all 14 precincts in the county, 741 votes to second place finisher Bob Dole who got 229.

On the Democrat side, Gore carried all 14 county precincts with 287 votes to his closest rival Michael Dukakis who received 89 votes.

Also on the Democratic ticket, Jesse Jackson was in third place with 25 votes and tied with Richard Gephardt who also had 25.

On the GOP ticket, third place finisher in the county was Pat Robertson who nosed out Jack Kemp 31 to 30 votes.

Rounding out the Republican ticket, "uncommitted" got 16 votes. Alexander Haig and Harold Stassen, both got 6, and Pete duPont got 4. Haig and duPont withdrew their candidacy after the ballot was completed.

Rounding out the Democratic ticket, Gary Hart got 9 votes, Paul Simon, 5, and "uncommitted" 5. Receiving no votes were: Richard B. Kay, Anthony R. Martin-Trigona, Bruce Babbitt and Lyndon LaRouche. Babbitt withdrew earlier.

There were 15 absentee voters cast in Rockcastle. Bush got 6, Dole 2, Simon 1, Gore 5, and uncommitted 1.

In the precincts in the county, Bush received the most votes in West Mt. Vernon precinct with 89 compared to his nearest rival, Dole with 32.

As expected, Gore received his biggest vote in Brown precinct with 45 votes compared to his nearest rival, Dukakis, who had

School to be built in phases

With the construction of a new Mt. Vernon Elementary School likely to begin in the next few months, the Rockcastle County Board of Education invited architects and the construction manager to the latest school board meeting to go over plans.

About 25 interested teachers, parents and board members turned out to hear what has been done toward the construction of the new facility and what will be done in the future.

The meeting was held in the Library of the Mt. Vernon School.

Bob Cocanougher and Garlan Vanhook, employees of the architectural firm of Johnson/Romanowitz, the firm chosen to do the work at the new school gave about a 30 minute presentation on the new school and fielded questions from the audience.

The two-story 68,400 square foot facility is going to cost about \$4.1 million, and the local board is going to have to foot the bill for all of the project, except for about \$240,000 that they will get from the state. The new school will be built on the present site. Superintendent Bige Towery Jr.,

said Tuesday that the \$240,000 was only an estimate and that the local system may get more or less when it comes down to the final funding of the School Facilities Construction Commission by the Kentucky Legislature. The commission was set up by former Governor Martha Layne Collins two years ago to help districts with their construction needs.

If Rockcastle had participated in the program two years ago instead of waiting they would have gotten a greater amount of Mt. Vernon School funded by the state. Some districts that participated in the first go around got as much as half of their projects paid for directly by the state.

But that is not the case for Rockcastle County. Assuming that \$240,000 is all the state pays, the local board will fall short of the needed \$4.1 million by about \$1.56 million. Thus the project will be built in phases. Phase I will be started in what is now the ballfield at the old school. Architects said last week that a high buffer fence would be put up when the construction starts to

separate the old school from the new and to protect students and teachers while construction was going on. The new school will actually face Williams Street.

Once Phase I is completed all that will be left of the old school will be the gymnasium and the classrooms around it.

Charles Carter, a physical education teacher at the school and a member of the building committee said that he was well pleased with the plans that have been completed for the new school.

"I had some reservations about building on the same site, but with the financial situation the way it is, I can understand why we cannot afford another site," he said during last week's meeting.

Principal John Hale said that he too was pleased with the plans and felt like the school would be

A house belonging to Denver Burton on Level Green Road just off Ky. 70 burned Saturday night.

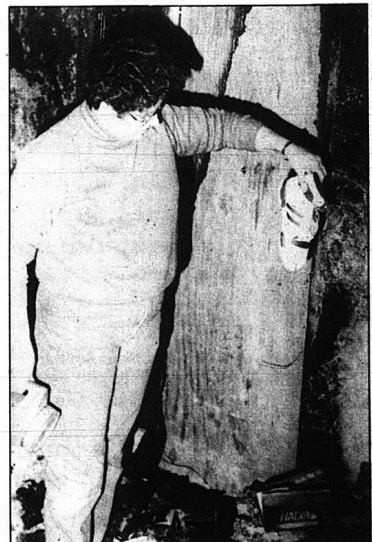
The house was occupied by Eugene Northern.

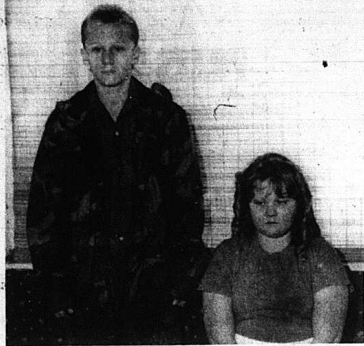

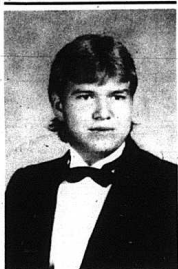
Class Registration

School is for all children...

The Rockcastle County Schools are in the process of initiating a major "Child Find" effort during 1988 for the purpose of identifying and locating all children, ages 3 - 5, who are believed to have handicapping conditions. All personally identifiable information collected and maintained in this "Child Find" activity will be confidential, and subject to the district's policies and procedures concerning the review, amendment, hearings, disclosure and destruction of education records which were developed in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act and the Education for the Handicapped Act. Copies of these policies and procedures are available upon request from the Early Childhood Office, located in the Board of Education Building.

Parents shall have the right to inspect and review any personally identifiable information collected or maintained on their child.

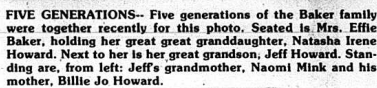

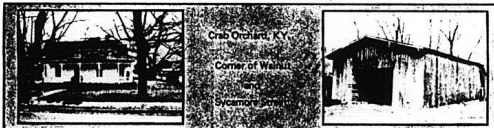

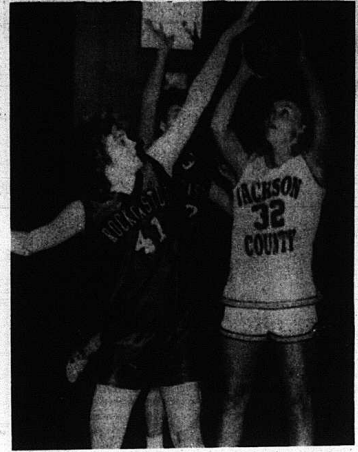

Crappie tourney set for Lake Cumberland

A fishing tournament with a purse of \$274,965 in cash and prizes, will run March 26 through May 24 on Lake Cumberland.

This is the second year the tournament has been held on Lake Cumberland. Last spring about 5,000 anglers fished and won \$26,650 in cash," said Tony L. Estes, general manager of the tournament, Crappie, U.S.A. "Six big-dollar fish were caught for a total payoff of \$18,000. That's about four big-dollar fish above the average."

In two weeks last year, four Central Kentucky anglers won more than \$16,000 by catching the specially tagged crappie.

To qualify for prize money, first buy a bounty hunter badge for \$5 at any participating bait and tackle store or marina around Lake Cumberland. Then start crappie fishing. If a tagged crappie is caught, take it alive to the nearest participating business.

"We plan to tag and release 1,838 crappie," Estes said. The tagged crappie are worth \$25 to \$50,000 each. The prize money is from national and local sponsors.

Anyone may enter, regardless of age, fishing ability or the kind of boat they own. In fact, you don't even have to fish from a boat. The tagged crappie are scattered around

the lake and just as likely to be caught from a private boat dock as a flooded willow tree on the main lake.

Last year 529 tagged crappie worth \$203,925 were released in Lake Cumberland. "Sponsorship has grown and there's a great deal of local interest in having the Crappie on at Lake Cumberland," Estes said.

All of the crappie are tagged with gray tags just behind the dorsal fin. The tags are inscribed

with the letters "CR" and "1988." Crappie tagged for last year's tournament aren't redeemable this year.

Estes of Decatur, Ala., started the tournament, and pilot tournament were held on Lake Weiss in Alabama in the early 1980s. Kennedy Lake was the first lake at which the trademarked tournament logo was used.

As part of the 60-day tournament at Lake Cumberland, a one-day buddy tournament is scheduled for April 23.

"I'll cost you \$50 (\$4 more for big fish) to enter the buddy tournament. The team with the heaviest stringer of 20 crappie wins cash and prizes worth \$16,000. The tournament will run from 6:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. out of Alligator Dock No. 2.

A seminar for all entrants will be April 22 at 7 p.m. at Russell County High School in Russell Springs.

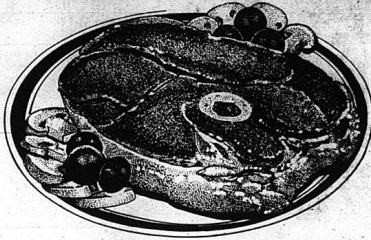
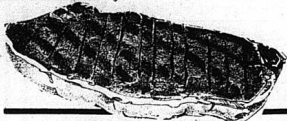
