County gets grant to loan to plastic factory for expansion

Mount Vernon, Kentucky 40456

Rockcastle County has received a check for \$385,000 to loan to Mt. Vernon Plastics for use in the company's expansion program.

The money is a Community Development Block Grant and will be part of the company's \$2,873,085 project. The county is in no way responsible for the loan money.

in no way responsive.

The \$385,000 loan will be repaid to the county over a 15-year period at four percent interest for which the county will receive \$2,848 a month from the company as principal and in-

Brodhead council wants sewer loan

assistance for the City of Brodhead has been made to the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) to help finance upgrading of the Brodhead sewer plant. A pre-application for financial

The estimated \$300,000 project includes the development of two polishing ponds at the plant and other necessary work to treat the effluence that drains from the plant into the Dix River, and to meet Environmental Protection

meet Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) discharge limits. The city is hoping for a \$210,000 grant from the Ap-palachian Regional-Commission (ARC) and a \$90,000 loan from the FmHA.

James Cass, consultant for the

city, told the Brodhead City Council at its Monday night meeting that he believes both the grant and loan will be approved,

Planning and application for the loan had been made by the company and Rockcastle Fiscal Court over a year-ago.

The company plans to use the money to primarily expand production at the plant and to create an eventual 125 jobs.

The bulk of the money for the project will come from the Kentucky Development Finance Authority (St. 821,000) and from the First National Bank of Louisville (575,000). The company's equity in the project is \$415,000. A total of \$22,085 is carmarked for administrative costs.

When the Weather Services set this week aside as Severe Storms Awareness Week, a reader called to remind the Signal that in other years severe weathers did not always wait until March can always and and February have had a share.

Curious about local weather, we checked Signals as far back as 50 years ago and discovered that, even though March in Kentucky can be very unpleasant, so can the months surrounding March. Take for example a January 1937 report.

There was no school locally, Residents were asked to donate clothing.

Residents were asked to domine clothing. Food was also needed, as well as a place to prepare it. And, everything was wet, wet,

The year 1937 was called the year of the Great Flood. And it all began in the last days of

all began in the last days of January.

The Weather Service said, an "intense low pressure area is riding across Kentucky bringing rain that could last for several days."

rain that could last for several, days."
Unfortunately, the low slowed down over Kentucky and finally came to a stop over West Virginia where for four days about 11 inches of rain fell sending upper tribularies of the Ohio River out of their banks.

Before a week passed "as wall of water was pouring into the Ohio River" one report said, and flood warnings were issued for Charleston, W. Va. and Ashland. "It looks bad," an Ashland resident told WHAS radio in Louisville," and it's getting worse by the hour. The whole

area is under water. We don't have anywhere to go except to the

hills."

The flood moved methodically down the Ohio River drowning Maysville, Cincinnati, Louisville and Paducah in the next 10 days.

"It's a mess here," the Cincinnati Enquirer reported. "We've got water in downtown. It's everywhere."

When the flood reached.

When the flood reached Louisville, the downtown area was a lake. The Brown Hotel, then a favorite stopping pleas then a favorite stopping place, had a lobby full of water and water was on the mezzanine floor. Fourth Street and Broad-way became popular with


