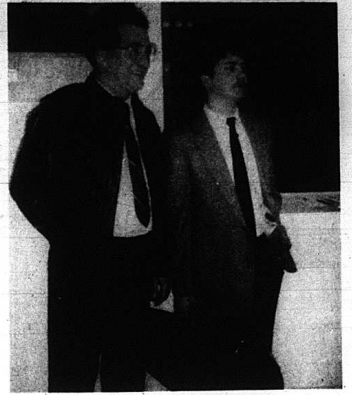

Meetings postponed in county

A meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and the Mt. Vernon City Council, scheduled for Monday, were postponed.

The city council meeting was postponed when Mayor Elizabeth Baker had to accompany her husband, Bob, to Central Baptist Hospital in Lexington after he became ill.

The meeting was the council's regular meeting. It has been tentatively rescheduled for next Monday.

The fiscal court meeting was a called meeting but was adjourned by County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker when only Magistrate Jack Bradley attended.

The meeting was to have been held to hire a clerical aid and the appointment of a county treasurer/finance officer.

Mrs. Anna Rose Mullins has been Judge Thacker's administrative assistant and finance officer since 1978.

The treasurer post became open about a week ago when Floyd Owens resigned because of failing eyesight.

Weather reported

It was March weather this week in Rockcastle as the weather alternated from snow to sun.

To date this month, a total of 1.93 inches of precipitation has fallen at Cox Funeral Home Weather Station. That amount compares to .54 of an inch during the same time last year.

Since Jan. 1, a total of 8.53 inches have fallen, well ahead of the same period last year when the total was just over 7 inches, 7.01.

Keith Cable on wheelchair team

Wright State University had lost three starters from its 1986-87 wheelchair basketball team that had set a school record with a 23-8 season and a runner-up in the national championships.

With two freshmen and a sophomore transfer, Keith Cable from Broadhead, in the starting line-up early in the season, at the Dayton, Ohio, University, head coach Dan Byrnes was skeptical about how much success his team would have and expected this to be a building year.

His skepticism didn't last long. "After the school record 23-8 season the year before, the 17-12 record was gratifying since we had lost three starters and were hoping to be .500," said Byrnes. "My only disappointment was not getting to the national finals."

The Raiders finished third in the important National Intercollegiate Wheelchair Basketball Tournament in which only the top two finishers get a bid to the national finals. Going into the tournament qualifier, the Raiders had a 16-10 record and upset on their minds. They defeated a team they twice lost to, Southwest State, 32-18 in the opening round and then lost two heartbreakers to a powerful Temple team, 58-52, and to the defending national champion, Illinois, 38-35.

"Coach Byrnes talked about his transfer player, Cable, son of Norman and Lydia Cable and a graduate of Rockcastle County High School, class of 1982.

"Keith was ineligible until the second week of December," the coach related. "His best asset is speed and quickness which enables us to pass better. Keith's shooting mechanics are coming along and he will be a good scorer next year."

His playing record this season shows Cable with a .393 percent in field goal shooting (35 of 89 attempts), a .357 percent free throw

Gardening time

CAP supplies needy with seeds

A total of 250 low-income families and elderly in Rockcastle County will have gardens again this year, compliments of the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP).

Seed and fertilizer were distributed March 8 at the Mt. Vernon Teen Center. Keith Gilbertson, an official of CAP, called the program a success. He estimated about 95 percent of those who have received garden supplies have used them successfully.

"We visit those who receive the

supplies to check to see if they use them," Gilbertson said. "If they don't try, we take them off. There's very few who do not try."

The supplies were given to about 1,405 persons in nine counties served by CAP, including Casey, Garrard, Floyd, Knott, Pulaski, Magoffin, Jackson and Lincoln.

Hundreds more will be given seeds in Lee, Owsley, Breathitt, Wayne, Monroe, Whiteley, Harlan, Madison, Estill, Powell and Wolfe counties and Lee County, Va. through 750 local outreach groups which are

cooperating with the Christian Appalachian Project in this program.

Each person or family will be given 50 pounds of potatoes and fertilizer; one pound, corn seed; 1.5 pounds beans; one pound, peas; four pounds, sevin and ten to twelve seed varieties which include cucumber, carrot, radish, turnip, beet, mustard, lettuce and spinach.

People participating in the Christian Appalachian Project's Small Garden Program, through cooperating outreach programs will be given the total package except for the potatoes and fertilizer. The project delivers the seed packets and then issues vouchers through the local outreach leaders to purchase the potatoes and fertilizer from local businesses.

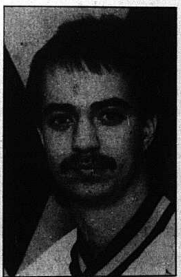

Wreck claims life of Carolina man

A North Carolina man was killed Monday about 9 a.m. on I-75 near the Madison County line when his car went out of control on the slick road and slid under a tractor trailer.

Kentucky State Police at the London Post said Michael J. Brady, 45, of Asheville, N. Carolina, died at the Berea Hospital around 10:45 a.m. after he drove his car under the truck driven by Haden Smith, 68, of Middleboro. Smith was not injured.

Brady's dog, a shepherd mix

named Sam, was injured in the crash but was doing well after treatment by Dr. Byron Dozier at Berea Animal Hospital.

I-75 had other crashes because of the snow squalls that were intermittent all day.

A coal truck overturned on an I-75 bridge in Laurel County, followed by a tractor-trailer at the same site and eventually causing a 14-vehicle pile-up. Minor injuries were reported.

Super Tuesday was costly, state official indicates

"Kentucky's participation in the Super Tuesday presidential preference primary places an unnecessary burden on Rockcastle County's budget," State Auditor Bob Babbage said in a press conference in Frankfort Wednesday.

Calling the presidential primary a luxury Kentucky cannot afford, Babbage explained that counties will have to pay the election expenses and be reimbursed by the state at a later date.

He said that since both state and local governments were financially strapped, this added expense was unfair. "It will take an estimated \$3 million to pay Kentucky's expenses for participating in Super Tuesday. The fact that 34,500 state workers are granted four hours leave to vote adds another \$1.5 million to the cost," Babbage continued.

"In light of the fact that only 1,512 persons voted in Rockcastle

County and the presidential candidates paid comparatively little attention to Kentucky, our participation in Super Tuesday is an experiment that has proven we would be better served to incorporate the presidential primary with the regularly scheduled May primary," Babbage said.

"My opposition to Super Tuesday is simple one of cost," Babbage said. "And at \$4.5 million, Super Tuesday is a luxury that Kentucky simply cannot afford."

"At a time when we are cutting education programs to the marrow, at a time when our state's future transportation system is being mortgaged, and at a time when layoffs of state employees is a real possibility - not to mention falling further behind the curve in paying our people what they are worth - we have just spent \$4.5 million for fewer than one-fourth

Toy chokes baby to death

A one-year-old baby died Friday after she swallowed a plastic toy while in the office of Dr. George Griffith.

Rockcastle Coroner Bill Dowell said an autopsy performed in Louisville Saturday on Nicole Rene Patterson of Mt. Washington, Ohio and Mt. Vernon, revealed a blocked air passage caused by a plastic toy which resulted in suffocation.

According to Dowell the child was in Dr. Griffith's office with her mother, who had a doctor's appointment, when she apparently swal-

lowed a "lite-brite" plastic toy without anyone noticing what she had done.

Attempts to revive the child were made by Dr. Griffith and later at the Rockcastle County Hospital where doctors and staff worked but without success. X-rays taken at the hospital failed to reveal the plastic toy which was later found to be the actual cause of death when the autopsy was performed.

The child was survived by her father, Benjamin Frank Patterson, and her mother, Vala Patterson.

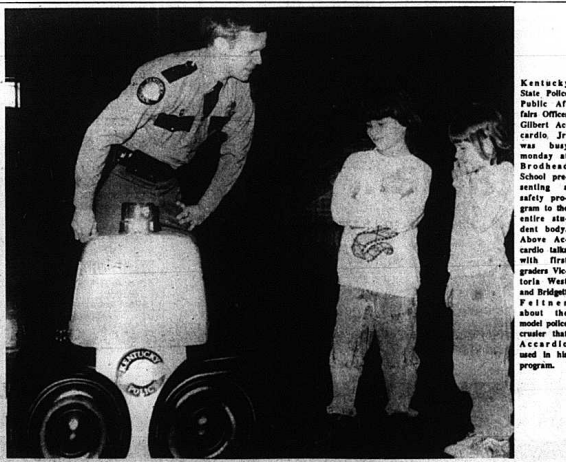
Governor signs Hall of Fame bill

Renfro Valley became the official home of the Kentucky County Music Hall of Fame with the signature of Gov. Wallace Wilkinson Friday.

His signature, making Renfro Valley Folks, Inc. the official organization for the Hall of Fame, came after the Kentucky House of Representatives passed the bill 100-0 followed by the Senate 37-0.

The bill was introduced in the House by State Rep. Danny Ford.

The Hall of Fame will be located on the second floor of the Renfro Valley office building that once housed the Pioneer Museum, pending construction of a separate building at a later date. No definite date to open has been set, according to Mrs. Ann Henderson, president of Renfro Valley Folks.

Dear Editor,

I am sure there are many Ken-

tuckians who do not understand what the term "broad form deed" means. You would need to see the devastation caused by strip mining under the broad form deed and witness the heartbreak and suffering it brings to the surface landowners to really understand.

At the turn of the century, representatives of coal companies persuaded people to sell their mineral rights for a pittance, sometimes for as little as 25 to 50 cents an acre. At that time, coal was mined by the deep mining method only. Even though they might have needed the money desperately, had these people known about strip mining and the destruction it leaves behind, they would never have sold the mineral rights to the land they loved.

The broad form deed has been outlawed in every state except Kentucky. In 1984, the Kentucky State Legislature passed a law giving landowners' rights precedence over mineral owners' rights. The Kentucky Supreme Court ruled the law unconstitutional.

This year, Senate Bill 145 was passed unanimously by the Kentucky Senate and sent to the House of Representatives. This bill would stop abuses under the broad form deed and return to the landowners control of their land. House Bill 228, a companion bill, will be voted on very soon. The bill must then be placed on the ballot in November to be voted on by all Kentuckians as a constitutional amendment. There is only room on the ballot for four amendments. There will be competition from other amendments for a place on the ballot.

To delay this bill only one year will mean that countless people will be added to those whose land had already been destroyed forever. You can write your legislators c/o State Capitol Building, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601 or call them toll-free at 1-800-372-7181 and leave a message

for them. Please ask them to place the constitutional amendment against the broad form deed, Senate Bill 145/ House Bill 228, on the ballot in November.

Dear Editor,

Recently I had to take my nineteen-month-old son to the Rockcastle Co. Hospital emergency room. It was around 7:30 in the morning and my son had been fussy with a cold. Only this particular morning when he awoke he couldn't walk. I rushed him to the hospital and told the nurse on duty that I wanted to see a doctor. She got all the information she needed and told me that Dr. Gutierrez was on call but that he really didn't like to come in before 9 a.m. I asked her to call him anyway and she said, "Well, I will but you would probably be better off to wait until one of the other doctor's office opened and take him there because he probably won't come in until 9 or 9:30." Sure enough, when she called, he asked a few questions and she

expressed her concern over a lot of swelling under his jaw and chin and he told her to get his vitals and he would see him around nine!

Luckily my son had only a severe strep infection and, after three hours, I got to bring him back home. Only because Dr. Davis came in before 9 a.m. did my son even get to see a doctor.

I know the situation wasn't life-threatening now but at the time all I knew was that my baby was ill and, worst of all, couldn't seem to walk. Yet, Dr. Gutierrez couldn't see his way to come over to the hospital to help my son or tell me what was wrong just because he "doesn't like to take pediatric cases" or because he didn't feel like getting up before 9 a.m.

I think if we are going to have faith in a doctor he should at least do the job he was hired to do! Our children can seem so worse than anything else when they are ill and then to have a doctor be so uncaaring and thoughtless can leave one with a very helpless feeling.

Maybe Dr. Gutierrez needs a class in people.

Program, a person or family must have a garden plot, make a good effort, be willing to allow a visit from project representatives, and have plans to preserve and store food. Eligibility is determined by a home visit.

In the summer, canning supplies — 12 quart jars, lids and freezer bags — are distributed during home visits. Tomato plants and flower and pepper seeds are also distributed.

The home visits are meant to build a rapport with the people, check on how they are doing, and offer technical advice.

People become participants in the program by request, by signing up at project attic stores, by referrals from county extension services and other project programs, and from Christmas visits.

of our registered voters to express their presidential preferences," Babbage added.

Babbage commended State Representative Mark Farrow, D-Summit Ground, for introducing House Bill 827 which would incorporate Kentucky's presidential primary with the regularly scheduled May primary election.

Babbage said that Farrow and his co-sponsors of HB 827, Representative Richard Turner and Joe Clarke, are doing a tremendous service to the state with this bill.

"House Bill 827 will save Kentucky over \$4.5 million in real dollar costs, at a time when we need to recapture every dollar of savings we can," Babbage said.

Babbage and Farrow were joined by Shelby County Court Clerk Sue Carol Perry, an officer of the Kentucky County Court Clerks Association, who have also endorsed the bill.

Babbage has encouraged officials of each Kentucky county to join him in supporting the passage of House Bill 827.

Notification of FmHA's Findings City of Brodhead

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has received a preapplication for financial assistance from the City of Brodhead, Rockcastle County, Kentucky. The specific elements of this proposed action are the construction of two polishing ponds next to the City's existing wastewater treatment plant. The ponds, when completed, will refine wastewater effluent as required to meet EPA discharge limits.

FmHA has assessed the potential environmental impacts of this proposed action and has determined that it will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment. Therefore, FmHA will not prepare an environmental impact statement for this proposed action.

FmHA will make no further decisions regarding this proposed action during the fifteen-day period. Last week's Super Tuesday was certainly a super waste of time for all involved in Kentucky and Rockcastle County was no exception.

In this time of budget woes, something such as Super Tuesday is definitely an item this county could have done without.

Early estimates are that the election cost the county, about \$6,000, or approximately \$4 for each vote. Only 1,512 registered voters cast a ballot in Kentucky's election. The lowest total in recent memory.

This county is lucky because we are not going to have to hold a primary election, because none of the elected officials up for re-election have opposition.

Those officials are State Rep. Danny Ford, State Sen. John D. Rogers and U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers. Ford and Hal, as his friends call him, do a good job for their constituents, but John Rogers, well I don't know about him.

Seems like the last time I saw him in Rockcastle County was eight years ago when Dean Stew was running against him. Well, since he has no opposition you won't see him around here. He doesn't seem to care about Rockcastle County. Never has, never will.

As the 1988 session of the Kentucky's General Assembly moved into March, the legislative

process began to yield new laws at a brisk pace.

Last week, the House Judiciary-Criminal Committee approved House Bill 505 to allow anyone in Kentucky to carry a concealed weapon in a holster or case.

House Bill 505, which now goes to the Rules Committee, is designed for people who work and travel at night, like store clerks depositing the day's receipts. Supporters of this measure say it will curtail late-night robberies.

In another committee action, the Senate State Government Committee approved a resolution seeking to establish a museum to honor Bill Monroe, also known as Uncle Pen the father of Bluegrass Music, in his native Ohio county.

Senate Joint Resolution 65 directs the Parks Department and the General Assembly to study the feasibility of establishing the museum.

Also, the House State Government Committee approved House Bill 7 to make Bill Monroe's "Blue Moon of Kentucky" the bluegrass song of Kentucky.

Both the House and Senate have passed three bills designed to regulate out-of-state waste being brought into Kentucky. House Bill 429, 430 and 432 are now awaiting the governor's action.

House Bill 429 will require that fiscal courts be notified of applications seeking to establish or alter a landfill in their counties. This measure also permits the state to require a list of materials to be buried at the dump.

House Bill 430 will allow counties to tax landfills at a maximum rate of 50 cents a ton or up to 5 percent of the gross receipts on the dump. The fees will be used for government expenses related to the landfill, such as hiring a local inspector.

House Bill 432 will require landfill operators who take out-of-state waste to prove that the waste is not hazardous, if it is hazardous, take steps to protect ground water. All new landfills would have to meet these requirements.

In other activities, House Bill 834 was introduced to abolish the presidential primary in Kentucky. Supporters of this measure believe the primary is too costly.

And, Senate Concurrent Resolution 83 was introduced to require a comprehensive study of Kentucky's executive branch to determine if its agencies are useful and efficient. This study would be performed under legislative supervision.

In the remaining weeks of the session such major issues as the budget, education initiatives, election reform and constitutional amendments will be addressed.

Visitors to the State Capitol and the 1988 session of the legislature are always welcome and especially visitors from home, they're as welcome

as the flowers in May.

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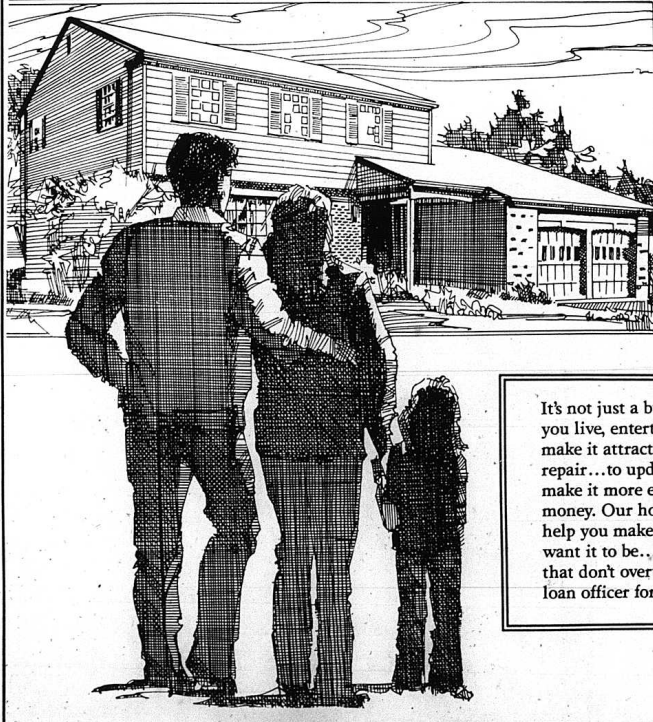

All information collected will be used to determine if a child is in need of special education services and/or for the purpose of planning an individual education program. All personally identifiable information collected and maintained in this "Child Find" activity will be confidential and subject to the district's policies and procedures concerning the review, amendment, hearings, disclosure and destruction of education records which were developed in accordance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act and the Education for the Handicapped Act. Copies of these policies and procedures are available upon request from the Early Childhood Office, located in the Board of Education Building.

Parents shall have the right to inspect and review any personally identifiable information collected or maintained on their child.

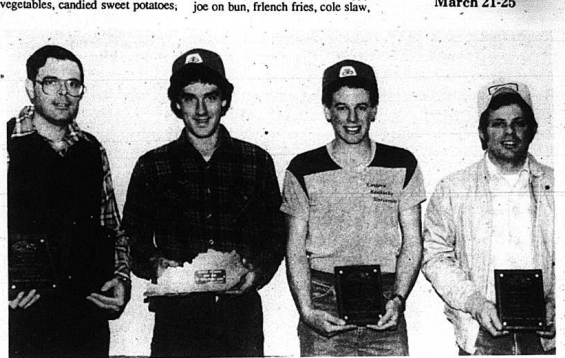

Tribute to a Rockcastle daughter

The Fellowship Hall of the Wildie Christian Church was recently the scene of a tribute to a native Rockcastle Daughter when the Rockcastle Chapter, DAR, honored its oldest Charter member, Miss Janie Ramsey, Mrs. V. Gordon Walker, member of the Berea-Laurel Ridges Chapter and Organizing Regent for the Rockcastle Chapter shared some of her friends' memories.

Janie was born in Rockcastle County on April 8, 1899, the only child of Joseph Love Ramsey and his wife, Glathie Coffee Ramsey. She started school at the age of four years at the old Medical Springs School with Anderson Burdette as her first teacher. After finishing the eighth grade, Janie attended the old Normal School at Berea for two semesters, after which she taught school for one year at Boiling Springs. In 1922, she

and her mother moved to Berea where Janie has continued to live for most of her life. She worked as a weaver at Churchill Weavers for seven years before becoming ill and being diagnosed as having T.B. She spent the next year recovering from her illness, then entered the old Berea Academy where she took all the business courses that were offered. She began a full-time career with Berea College as a bookkeeper and office manager in 1942 and worked there until her retirement in 1964.

In 1969, Janie entered a new phase of her life. Having grown-up among a number of older relatives who passed many evenings re-telling the past and telling stories of kinship and travels, Janie possessed a vast knowledge of oral history. When the Berea-Laurel Ridges Chapter began efforts to sponsor a new DAR Chapter in Rockcastle County, it was only natural for the then-State Regent Ellen Evans and Organizing Regent Mary Walker to turn to their friend, Janie Ramsey to help them trace lines and track-down family records. It was primarily through the efforts of these three women that the Rockcastle Chapter, DAR, became a reality on Oct. 9, 1970.

During the search for records for prospective members, Janie became so interested in the history of the county and the information that could be obtained in the old county records that she began to commute by bus from her home in Berea to Mt. Vernon where she would spend the day hand-copying names and dates from the surviving courthouse records. She copied enough Rockcastle Records that the DAR State Genealogical Records Committee bound two volumes and placed them in the National D.A.R. Library in Washington, D.C., the Kentucky Historical Society in Frankfort, the John Fox, Jr. Memorial Library in Paris, and the local Rockcastle County Library.

Janie also helped inventory a number of cemeteries in the county and was the motivating force behind her great-niece, Mrs. Jeanne Bonham, who has recently co-published an 856 page volume of Rockcastle Cemetery Records. Mrs. Bonham spoke briefly on how she spent most of her life not-at-all interested in genealogy until she listened to Janie tell of her kinships and she decided "to jot down a few things for the kids."

A number of friends, relatives and DAR members shared a variety of

memories at the meeting came to a close. The Regent, Mrs. Stephen Owens presided at a short business meeting before adjournment.

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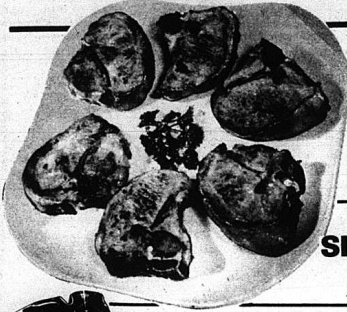
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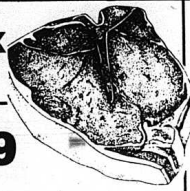

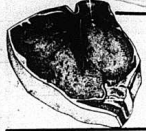

Your Child's Health

Different strokes do for different folks means different styles of practice of medicine for different patients. Every doctor in primary care has to decide certain things; how much to charge for an office call; when to be open; how to deal with pesky drug salespersons; and what the policy should be about calling in drugs.

Doctors get frequent requests to call in drugs from a description of the patient's symptoms. There are many requests for antibiotics for "fever" or "colds", or because "that's always what you give for Johnny's ears". The temptation is great to prescribe over the phone. Patients like it because it is cheap; doctors like it because happy patients are likely to talk nice about them; nurses in offices like it because they may get through earlier in the day. Druggists like it for the business it generates. Malpractice lawyers like it because it represents an easy jibe if something goes wrong. "Doc, you mean you didn't even examine the child before he came in with meningitis?"

I remember a mother who brought her child to the Emergency Room quite upset with the doctor who had been on duty the night before because he wouldn't prescribe an antibiotic for her child. She also showed her prejudice by remarks about the doctor's foreign accent. It turned out the child, who was now sicker, had spinal meningitis.

Because the infection not masked by small doses of antibiotics by mouth it was possible to diagnose the case very early and the child had an excellent outcome. Had he been on a "little dab" of penicillin or whatever the diagnosis would likely have been delayed and the outcome disastrous.

If your doctor declines to call in antibiotics and wants to "eyeball" the patient before prescribing just remember all the things the doctor must consider. With the ready availability of 10 minutes tests to diagnose strep throat and other modern techniques it is much less worthwhile to give "shotgun" treatments with antibiotics that may not be needed and may mask serious illness.

Abortion

January 22, 1973 was one of the blackest days in the 200 year history of the United States. On that day (Black Monday) the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that killing of an unborn baby is an act protected by the Constitution of the U.S. In that landmark decision, the court decided that the unborn child is not a "person" in any "meaningful" or "whole" sense, and therefore is not protected by the Fourteenth Amendment. However, there are human rights which no government can usurp. One is the power to determine if an INNOCENT LIFE should be terminated! (Acts 5:29)

Let someone think we are stretching the enormity of the crime against the unborn, consider these statistics: since 1973, total abortions are now approaching twenty million. The rate is now about 1.5 million each year. It is estimated that one fourth of all pregnancies in the U.S. now end in abortion. President Reagan has described the murder of millions of unborn babies as "A National Tragedy!" It must be stopped!

The key questions in this issue are: when does life begin? Is abortion murder? Is the unborn a human being, or is he merely a piece of tissue or a mass of protoplasm?

Medical authorities now agree that from 5 to 8 weeks gestation the baby's head becomes erect, the face develops, the eyes, ears, and nose appear. From 8 to 12 weeks, the fetus definitely resembles a human being, fingernails form and sex can be determined. In 18 to 25 days, the baby has a heart beat, and in 6 weeks, the baby has human brain waves and moves. In 12 weeks it breathes. All body systems are present by 10 weeks, and by 24 weeks the baby can open and shut its eyelids, stretch its arms and legs, and suck its thumb. The medical argument has been settled. The fact isn't even disputed any more by medical authorities that the unborn is a distinct human being with a separate life of his own. If the babe in the uterus is not ALIVE, there would be no need of abortion.

The Word of God identifies the unborn as "child" and "babe." While Rebekah was pregnant with Jacob and Esau the record says, "But the children struggled together within her" (Gen. 25:22). In Luke 1:39-44, the Bible says that the "babe leaped in her womb."

Deliberately taking the life of an innocent person is MURDER, whether performed by a skilled surgeon or legalized by a sophisticated judge! God says that murderers will be punished in the lake of fire (hell) (Rom: 13:9; Rev. 21:8). Who unto doctors and nurses who serve as executioners for money. Their prime concern should be the SAVING of life, not destroying it. Before God, how can we condemn a killer for mass murder and pretend to justify a like practice among ourselves in abortion. God hates "hands that shed innocent blood" (Prov. 6:16-17).
