Grise called a few urologists because he wanted to find the best surgeon around. Dr. J. William McRoberts, a professor of surgery and specialist in urology at the UK Medical Center was recommended.

More than a year passed between Hammond's first visit to Grise and the first trip to see McRoberts.

During that time Hammond came to the point where his confusion and desire for a normal life was more painful than the fear of exposure and finally the will to do something went out.

McRoberts diagnosed Hammond's problem right away. Tests followed, but they were only to make sure nothing had been missed. The cause of Hammond's lifelong confusion was a birth defect.

Hammond had been born male. He had male sex organs, but his development had been incomplete and at birth he'd been confused with a female. The male hormones produced by male glands had given him normal male desires.

Most times, such problems are detected at birth, sometimes the birth defect is discovered later. As a surgeon specializing in defects, McRoberts had seen babies with confusing birth defects, but rarely in anyone over the age of eight.

At 26, Hammond was the oldest patient with such a problem whom McRoberts had ever seen. McRoberts was sure that Hammond's condition could be surgically corrected to give normal male sexual function.

During the first few weeks after his visit to McRoberts, Hammond didn't worry about the operations to come. He was relieved that his confusion was over. He knew he'd always been male. McRoberts signed statements to substantiate the fact.

With the help of a lawyer, Hammond's name was changed from Linda Jean to Steven. He chose Steven because he wanted a strong name and his thoughts went to Steven in the Bible and how he had strong faith and he chose that name.

Hammond had no trouble adjusting to his new role of being male. "I had had male impulses all along. It was if a big burden was lifted. I knew that God wanted me to live a normal life—that he wanted me to fit as the man I had always been. When I made my decision to reveal my body, I had to think about Judgment Day and how I would be judged and I knew God was telling me what I should do. "I've worked things out so that it happened at the proper time. I don't think I could have handled it when I was younger."

While it was easy for Hammond to accept his new life, he was worried about how his family and his co-workers would respond.

When he called his mother, she was surprised, but remembered that as a child he'd had boyish behavior and boyish hands and feet.

"I guess it was my fault letting him have his way [not seeing a doctor]. But when he was a baby, there was no way you could tell. I don't know, I guess you accept children the way they are."

When his stepfather found out, he cried, not because he was ashamed, but because he remembered how Hammond had helped him in the garage and he sensed the embarrassment Hammond would face in explaining his new identity.

Generally his co-workers were supportive and some have said he's one of the bravest people they've ever known because he had the nerve to stay at his job.

It was awkward when he started using the men's bathroom at work. The first time there were 10 men inside, some of them snickering.

It wasn't long after Hammond changed his identity that he met his future wife Sara Jane Van-der-Hoek through a mutual friend. To Sara, Hammond was just another guy in a T-shirt and sweat pants. But he was open and honest, two qualities she admired and their relationship developed. Hammond explained everything to Sara Jane.

Most of her friends accepted Hammond without question, including her pastor who married them in 1983, a few months after his first visit to McRoberts. He was 26, she was 27.

McRoberts performed four operations on Hammond the first in 1983, in which his testicles were brought down. The second surgery removed the layers of skin around his penis and released it. The third surgery was on Hammond's urethra, running his urinary tract to his penis. A fourth operation had to be performed to redo the third when Hammond pulled out the catheter too quickly.

The Hammonds are an ordinary couple happy with their life together in a snug house that Steve built. Steve's extraordinary story has brought a bit of notoriety to their lives and it has taken a lot of their energy to keep re-telling the story, but for them it's worth it.

Steve hopes that by telling his story, young people in similar circumstances might be helped. He also hopes that people in his home nearby and elsewhere will understand that he didn't have a sex change, but that finally he is living as a male, the way God made him.

## Stalled garbage project may get underway when fiscal court meets again

With the state poised to visit the county on April 7 to discuss progress made in the county's solid waste management (garbage) plan, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court is reportedly planning to choose a garbage coordinator to run the program at its meeting April 5.

In order to give the state Department of Waste Management a name to show good faith on the part of the county in getting the plan underway, the court is expected to appoint a part-time coordinator, someone who is already a fulltime employee of the county.

The county's approved \$13,000 garbage plan has not been implemented since it was passed in 1986.

When green boxes were removed from the county along with the expense, the plan has collected dust on the shelf.

The state informed the county that investigators would be in the county March 1 to tour the area and meet with the court, but the date was changed to April 7 after a county official reportedly went to Frankfort to plead for time and to assure the state there is very little garbage in Rockcastle County and what there is being disposed of at two central locations.

The solid waste coordinator, according to the county's plan, is a fulltime position.

According to the plan, the coordinator is to be responsible to the county Judge/Executive, with monthly reports being provided to the fiscal court and a Solid Waste Advisory Committee. That committee has not been appointed.

The coordinator is to be responsible for the day-to-day operations of solid waste management in the county, and would specifically be in charge of the following duties:

Solid Waste management enforcement through county patrol; issuing warnings to people known to

be dumping; issuing citations to persons on second offense; working with the courts in getting convictions and working with the county attorney and district county judge in sentencing such as hours of clean-up work; posting no dumping signs.

The coordinator would be in charge of supervision of private franchise haulers system. He or she would check hauler receipts for legal disposal of solid waste at an approved landfill site on a monthly basis.

Coordinator would be responsible for supervision of disposal system, keep records on solid waste activities; handle complaints and referrals for collection services available and report monthly to fiscal court and the advisory committee.

The coordinator would work with and become chairman of the Kentucky Clean Community Program and help implement a voluntary drop-off-center source separations program in the county; help to encourage individual composting operations; help to encourage white paper recycling program in private business and county and city government offices.

The coordinator should have the skill and ability to provide leadership, direction and coordinate in carrying out the county garbage plans, as well as capability and experience in meeting and speaking effectively before local groups and organizations.

He or she should develop skills and techniques for motivating people effectively. Also, to have the ability to participate in the motivation of the public and community civic groups in the educational phases of the implementation of the solid waste plan.

In 1986, the county advertised for applicants for the job of coordinator and received 10 applications, interviewed them but never hired them.

In addition to approving the plan, the court has also passed an ordinance regulating solid waste management.

## Tobacco support price raised

Price supports for burley tobacco will be increased by \$1.20 per hundredweight, according to an announcement by U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell.

The average loan rate will be \$150 per hundredweight, up from \$148.80 per hundredweight.

This is the first increase in price supports we have seen in six years. Kentucky's tobacco growers have

weathered some difficult times, but this announcement, coupled with the increase in quotas will mean that growers will be putting more money in their pocket this year from tobacco sales," McConnell noted. "I think this is an indication that we have the tobacco program back on solid ground."

The average support price for burley tobacco is set by a formula

established in the 1986 Tobacco Program Improvements Act. The formula has two components. Two-thirds weight is given to a 5-year average of prices, excluding the high and low years. One-third weight is given to an index of cost of production adjusted for changes in yields.

In addition, the Secretary of Agriculture has the authority to limit the

## Police Cars, water lines, boat dock on council agenda

Where to park city police cars when not in use was discussed at length at the monthly meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

Councilman Tommy Bussell brought up the matter, suggesting the three police cars be parked in front of the city hall when not in use by officers instead of at the officers' homes. The

fourth car would be kept, as it is now, with Police Chief Joe Howard.

Mayor Elizabeth Baker reminded the council that the cars would take up space needed by customers at city hall, and that parking them in front, especially at night, would be an invitation to vandalism.

She also said if the cars were parked in the city parking lot at the railroad that would also be an invitation for them to be stripped. She

added that allowing cars to be driven home by officers and parked would make response time quicker in case of an emergency.

Assistant Chief Bill Mink told the council the cars were parked at the officers' homes when not on duty and that the cars are not used for personal business or pleasure by the officers.

A motion was made by Bussell to park in front of city hall, but the motion died for lack of a second.

As expected, the city-owned Lake Linnville area and boat dock was back before the council. The council set the week of April 11 through 16 as clean-up around the lake as well as throughout the city. Residents were

asked to cooperate.

Questioned about a structure out in the lake described as a floating shed used to cover a boat when docked, the council voted to determine the owner, give him two weeks to remove it, or the city would remove it.

Jimmy Hale, boat dock operator, agreed the shed was unsightly and also a danger to boats since it floats around the lake.

The council set 7 p.m. April 4 to meet with Hale to discuss the lake area and boat dock and sort out any problems that might exist this season.

The council approved a request by residents in the area of the old Somerset Road on Fairground Hill to

extend a city water line to their homes. The homeowners presented a drawing of the line that must be sent to the state for approval. All new water lines must now be approved by the state.

A spirited discussion arose when some councilmen thought the city would extend that line 125 feet to the city limits at city cost.

However, Mayor Baker reminded the council city policy has always been that water lines be extended at the expense of those installing the line. The city checks the installation, lays the pipe, and sees that it is covered correctly, but all at the home owners expense.

Estimated cost for the 125 feet is

\$1,243 for the pipe plus labor and engineering.

In the same area, Councilwoman Clarice Kirby told the council she would like to see changes made in the location of the water line, her water meter, and one other meter, to prevent further problems that have plagued the present water line. The council did not act on the request.

The council voted to accept a grant of \$4,000 from the Land Conservation agency for development of a 1-ball field on Old Broadhead Road. The city will match the \$4,000 with \$4,000.

The council also approved a city water line to serve six houses on a road extending from the Rockcastle Steak House area, if owners would pay for engineering and for the work on the 1,820-foot line.

The council also approved a request to allow the Mt. Vernon Little League and Senior League softball teams to practice on two ball diamonds.

## Feed-grain sign-up underway

The annual Feed Grain Program sign-up will be held by the Rockcastle County ASCS office through April 15.

Producers must reduce their feed grain plantings by 20 percent of their crop acreage base to be eligible for loans, purchases and payments for the 1988 crop.

Producers may also participate in an optional paid land diversion for the 1988 crop year by diverting 10 percent of their feed grain base. The diverted acreage must be devoted to ACR. The diversion payment will be paid all in generic commodity certificates on or about May 16.

Producers are eligible to earn deficiency payments on the actual acreage

planted, within their permitted acreage. Advance payments will be equal to 40 percent of the estimated commodity deficiency payment rate,

payable one-half in cash at sign-up and the balance paid in generic commodity certificates on or about May 16.

## Coyotes make appearance in state

Have you seen any coyotes roaming around in Rockcastle County in the last few months?

There have been some sightings but descriptions have been sketchy, and some folks claim the sightings have been seeing dogs.

Lauren Schaff, director of the division of wildlife for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, reports coyote sightings are increasing, as is the number of

coyote pets sold at fur sales, so something is happening.

Schaff said there have been verified sightings in all but 17 mountain counties, and "it's likely that coyotes are in the mountains too, but they are real wary and seldom seen."

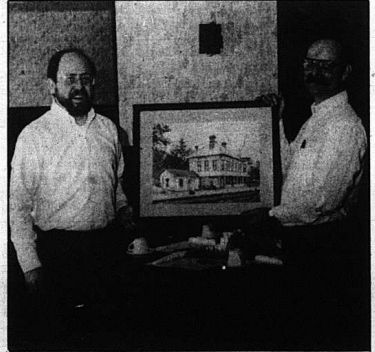
Some farmers are unhappy claiming coyotes pose a threat to domestic animals, mainly newborn calves.

A check with state biologists indicates the coyotes in Kentucky may be

descendants of animals that migrated into the state from Illinois, Missouri and other border states when the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers froze over during the severe winter of 1978.

There is a bill in the state legislature that would allow the establishment of coyote control zones, with the written permission of the landowner, in an attempt to control coyotes.

### REFLECTIONS ON NATIONAL AGRICULTURE DAY

Tuesday, March 22nd, was a day of recognition for one of the most important industries in America -- the agriculture industry. National Agriculture Day is a time to reflect on the contributions of the men and women -- farmers, businessmen, scientists, chemists, and laborers -- who make their living feeding not only this country, but most of the world as well.

Agriculture's contribution to the U.S. economy can not be underestimated. It is far and away the biggest industry in America. How big? Last year the U.S. produced over \$135.2 billion worth of agriculture products. In the battle of exports, corn, wheat, and soybeans move across our docks every day on their way overseas to help reduce our trade deficit.

In Kentucky, we have a history that is rooted in our agricultural heritage. It was the burley tobacco grown in Kentucky that provided early settlers with the currency our fledgling commonwealth needed to survive. Today, the agriculture industry continues to dominate the Kentucky economy.

Only Texas, Missouri and Iowa have more farms than the 99,000 located in Kentucky. The men and women who work on these farms generate over \$2.4 billion annually in business. In 1986, Kentucky exported over \$669.8 million worth of agricultural commodities.

To help the agriculture industry, I have worked long and hard to open foreign markets to Kentucky's agriculture exports -- especially tobacco. For example, Japan stands as a big success to these efforts. Over the past two years U.S. cigarette sales have moved from 1% of the Japanese market to over 10%. Egypt and Turkey are new markets that hold great promise for burley growers.

To help boost sales abroad, I introduced legislation to establish an international trade development center at the University of Kentucky's College of Agriculture. The trade center, which has been approved, will play a vital role in helping our farmers take the offensive and seek out and develop new opportunities. It represents the forward-thinking that is required between government, the private sector, and educators to help the U.S. return to a positive balance of trade.

Farmers and agribusinessmen have weathered a severe economic storm. Once again they have demonstrated a resilience to hang tough that goes back to the founding of our country. The agriculture industry will always be the bedrock strength of our state and our nation. As your senator, I reaffirm my support for Kentucky's farmers and agribusinessmen in the U.S. Senate.

rules and guidelines:

- 1) Specialty Acts shall consist of four 4-H participants or fewer and have a time limit of four minutes. A 4-H club may have up to two specialty acts.
- 2) Minimum requirements for the Club Act state that 20% of the club participants or five participants, whichever is greater, must be involved. Club acts have a time limit of eight minutes.
- 3) Only one person other than 4-H participants, such as a pianist, may accompany the act. Other than the one accompanist, only 4-H participants may appear on the stage during the act.
- 4) Variety show participants must be a 4-H club member or have participated in a 4-H activity since September, 1987, and may only represent one club. 4-H'ers belonging to two clubs may not be in both club's acts.
- 5) An act exceeding the time limit should be permitted to finish but cannot be awarded champion.
- 6) Since participation is of the utmost importance, the combination of clubs for the purpose of presenting a club or specialty act is not permitted.
- 7) Dramatic readings can be entered as a variety act.
- 8) All acts must use the same P.A. system. No act will be allowed to provide their own system. As it was last year, an additional P.A. system will be used to supplement the existing Brohead system. A record player and tape recorder will be available and must be used by participants.
- 9) Leaders must take care of their own music (Have tapes set at starting point).
- 10] Each school will sit together until time for their acts. Club leaders

are responsible for keeping their group together and quiet. Parents should be recruited to help as chaperones.

11] Admission will be charged to those who are not participating in acts; .75 for children; and \$1.00 for adults. Tickets for participants and leaders will be delivered after clubs call in to register their acts. 4-H'ers who lose their tickets will have to pay the admission charge.

12] Clubs must register their act by calling the Extension Office (256-2403) by Friday, April 15th. No acts that fail to register will be allowed to perform. Registration information will include:

- \*Name of your Act
- \*Type of music you will be using [Tape, Record, Piano]
- \*Number of youth in a club act.
- Names of youth in specialty act
- \*How many leaders assisted with the act

This year, all acts will receive either a white, red or blue ribbon according to their score. No green ribbons will be given. The first place specialty and club act will also receive champion ribbons. First and second place acts will receive 4-H plaques.

## Stamps by phone available nationwide

For the first time, postal customers nationwide will be able to use their credit cards to buy nondenominated stamps during the transition period to new postage rates.

Postmaster General Anthony M. Frank said, "the new program is intended to make the transfer to the new rate structure more convenient for our customers."

Customers will be able to order nondenominated "E" stamps by calling a toll-free number, 1-800-STAMP24, 24 hours a day and can charge orders to MasterCard or VISA. There will be a minimum order of \$12.50 with a \$2 service charge.

Orders for the new "E" stamps, featuring a colorful design of the Earth, will be taken until such time as stamps specifying the new rate are available. The orders will be mailed when the Governors of the Postal Service approve the new rates.

The Postal Service began testing this program in September 1987 in Sacramento. Since then, eight other cities were added to the test program.

## Your Child's Health

By: Dr. John Payne

A common concern about very young infants is that they frequently have "matters" in their eyes. Mothers complain that they have to soak the eyes or one eye with warm water to get it open in the morning. This doesn't happen with all babies, but when it does it is usually due to plugging of the tear ducts. Normally we have tears that pass over our eyes to keep them moist. The tears drain away through tiny tubes which go from the inner edge of the eye next to the nose travel down to empty into the nose. This happens all the time, not just with crying.

The tear ducts are so small they can easily get plugged up with mucus, especially in young infants. Sometimes these ducts are not fully developed at birth. If your infant seems to have this problem you should massage gently from the inner corner of the eye to the upper third of the nose 3 or 4 times daily for a few minutes. Watch that fingernails don't jab the babies' eyeball.

If the condition persists you should of course see the doctor. If it doesn't clear by about 6 to 9 months of age the infant may need to be examined by an eye doctor, or ophthalmologist. A small surgical procedure called probing the tear duct may need to be considered. Your doctor may also prescribe antibiotic drops or ointment to use in the eye.

Woodford County had the lowest rate, 4.2 percent, and five other counties had rates of 6 percent or lower.

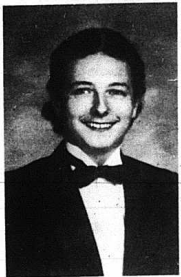
Unemployment rates were higher in all but seven of the state's 120 counties in January compared with December. Six counties had lower unemployment rates, and the rate in Owen County was unchanged from December to January.

The cabinet reported last week that the statewide unemployment rate shot up 1.3 percentage points, from 8.2 percent in the last month of 1987 to 9.5 percent in the first month of 1988.

Among the counties with the highest rates were Edmonson County, 27.4 percent; McCreary County, 27.3 percent; and Elliott County, 25.5 percent.

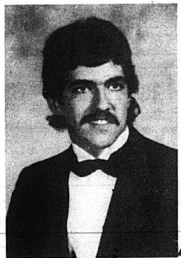
Among those with the lowest rates were Fayette County, 4.2 percent; Shelby County, 4.9 percent; Kenton County, 5.3 percent; Boone County, 5.8 percent; and Franklin county, 6 percent.

## Restoration program sees 919 turkeys put in state forest land

Kentucky forest land received 919 wild turkeys this winter, a record breaking season for the wild turkey restoration program administered by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

Fifty-seven sites were stocked in 51 counties, bringing the total to 112 counties across the Commonwealth that now have wild turkeys. Six of the remaining counties have relatively poor habitat and are scheduled to be stocked next year if suitable sites can be found. Fayette and Bourbon counties are less than four percent forested and are considered not to have any turkey habitat.

According to George Wright, turkey program coordinator, several factors were involved in this year's successful restoration effort. The most important was that other states worked hard to meet long-standing obligations to Kentucky for wild turkeys.

"Our involvement in wildlife exchanges with other states really paid off well this year," said Wright, referring to the department's recent practice of trading river otters for wild turkeys.

"We received several hundred birds from states that had contracted with Kentucky for wildlife trades over the past few years. These states were behind in supplying turkeys, but made up a good part of the deficit this season," Wright added.

A total of 740 wild turkeys were acquired from out-of-state sources, while the remaining 179 were live-trapped and relocated by department personnel. The in-state effort was also a record for a single wild turkey trapping season.

"This exceptional year has put us ahead on the statewide restoration effort six or seven years," said Wright.

"In a normal year, we relocate about 250 birds, and we released almost four times that many this season. Since reproduction takes place three years after release, we calculate a gain of six or seven years over what would occur from an average season," said the biologist.

"We'll probably never have another restoration season like this one, since our out-of-state sources fulfilled most of their prior obligations.

I expect we'll receive the remaining 140 or so birds next spring," Wright said.

After the remaining contracts are filled, Wright plans to negotiate for more out-of-state sources to continue the wild turkey restoration. Areas with suitable habitat to support larger flocks will be targeted for additional turkeys.

"We wanted to be as fair as possible with the initial statewide distribution of wild turkeys," said Wright, "and after we've released birds in the last six counties, we'll return to areas with several hundred miles of turkey habitat."

Turkey season in Kentucky is just a few weeks away, and should prove to be another record harvest season. The number of turkey hunters in Kentucky woods on opening day April 20 will be over 5,000, and according to Wright that figure is growing about 25 percent each year.

Sportsmen should remember the effectiveness of turkey restoration, or any similar program, relies heavily on the observance of game laws.

Poaching is the most detrimental factor to the establishment of huntable game populations.

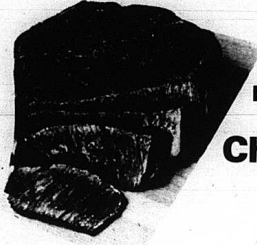

ote predation on livestock and poultry. People would be hired to kill coyotes for \$50 a day plus \$50 per animal, with a limit of \$25,000 to be spent on the program.

Smith also said there is a new collection box outside the post office for local mail only.

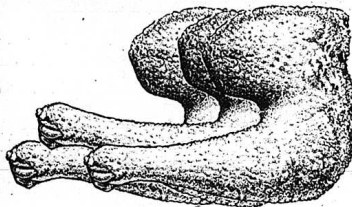

## Steve Hammond free of burden that plagued him most of his life

Most everybody has something they keep secret from other people. When and if they are brave enough to let others know the truth about who they are or what they have done, it is like a burden has been lifted from them, like they are free at last.

Steven Hammond, of Rockcastle County, a native of Jackson County, is free of a burden he carried for more than half of his 31 years.

When Hammond was born June 2, 1956 at Mary Rutan Hospital in Bellefontaine, Ohio, he had a genital birth defect that went unnoticed and he was thought to be a female and was named Linda Jean by his parents. Hammond's testicles were undescended and his penis was covered by folds of skin, giving the appearance of a female's genitalia.

### Lottery likely on ballot

Governor Wallace Wilkinson's campaign promise to establish a state lottery took another giant step toward becoming reality on Tuesday when a Senate panel passed the lottery bill, virtually assuring that the issue will be on the November ballot.

The amendment passed the Senate Elections and Constitutional Amendments Task Force where it had been bogged down for two weeks by a 4-2 vote. Senate Democratic leaders say that the measure should be considered Thursday or Friday and has more than the 23 votes needed for passage. Once approved, the issue would automatically be placed on the November ballot.

State Rep. Danny Ford, of Mt. Vernon, voted against the lottery

In 1963, Hammond's father died and his years got harder for the family. "We woke up sometimes bleeding—me on the toes and my sister from the head—where the rats bit us."

Photos of Hammond during his early years show a cute, cheerful child—a little girl with chestnut hair cut in a page boy. The family thought that Linda was tomboyish but never suspected the truth.

When Hammond was 10, his mother married John R. Johnson and life got much better. "He loved us a lot. I have a biological real dad, but to me he is my real dad because I didn't know my other dad. He [Johnson] ran a filling station and taught all of us, but I guess I was the one most interested in electrical work, plumbing, carpentry and mechanics. Mostly, he taught a lot of common sense."

While Hammond was a small child, he thought he was a girl. There was no reason not to believe it. His confusion began when he went through puberty. He didn't develop breasts or start menstruating. Girlfriends talked of what was happening to their bodies. Hammond's anatomy was wrong and it scared him.

At 11, Hammond did tell his mother, "I get hard down there." He had started having erections. He made his mother swear she wouldn't tell his stepfather.

Hammond's mother thought things would either get better for her "daughter" or she would get sick and have to see a doctor. But with Hammond's birth defect, that didn't happen.

Hammond's first gym class at Jackson County High School in the early 1970's was terrifying. The teacher announced that everyone had to take a shower after each class.

Hammond didn't know how a shower would be possible without revealing his secret to his classmates. Hammond waited until the girls left and took a sponge bath or skipped the shower altogether.

"During that time, I wanted everything to be normal for that person [Linda] because that was the person I was. That was the person I was raised to be. I wanted everything to take the right course. I did a real good job of protecting that person."

Hammond went to work as a shipping clerk in a 13 acre warehouse in Berea. He wore padded bras and his frustration kept building. He transferred from the clerk's job to loading trucks. To Hammond's co-workers "Linda" was the "strongest woman they ever had to work."

Hammond used softball to fill up the hours after work. His trophies from women's softball leagues and tournaments filled a room. His frustration became a full-fledged battle between his spiritual side and the angry person who wondered why God would make such a person.

"I'd pray to God, 'Please take this thing away from me, whatever it is.'"

Hammond had been "saved"

at a pentecostal church on Dry Fork in Jackson County in 1978.

Later, in a white cinderblock Baptist Church in Berea, the preacher seemed to speak directly to Hammond. He said the Bible said men shouldn't wear women's clothes and women shouldn't wear men's clothes. That was one of the last times Linda wore a skirt.

Hammond was troubled by an attraction to women and the attraction grew as he got older. He wasn't exactly sure what was wrong with him. He was afraid that he was both sexes. He knew he wasn't a woman but he wasn't sure he was a man.

A female friend urged him to see a doctor. To do so, Hammond had to work up the courage to show a body that had been hidden for so long.

In 1981, Hammond stepped into the Richmond office of Dr. William P. Grise a few minutes after the office opened.

"It was the first time ever I'd revealed myself to a doctor. I'd been to a doctor for an earache and an infected hand but had never had a complete physical...I was very embarrassed and scared. I knew my secret was going to be revealed, a secret I held in all my life."

Hammond didn't get a quick

definitive answer during the first visit to the Richmond doctor. Grise had never encountered

Hammond's problem in 30 years of practice.

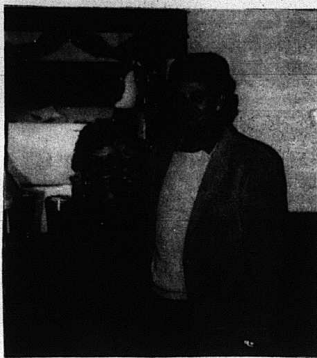

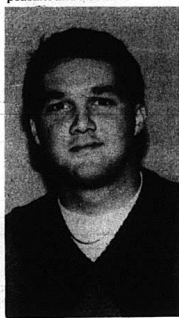
A large parrot overlooked the food, two crocheted shawls graced the wall behind this table. Thanks to Quail Club for the decorations.

After Ella Mae Martin gave the blessing we filed around the foods table to fill our plates with food. There was plenty for second helpings as well as a dessert.

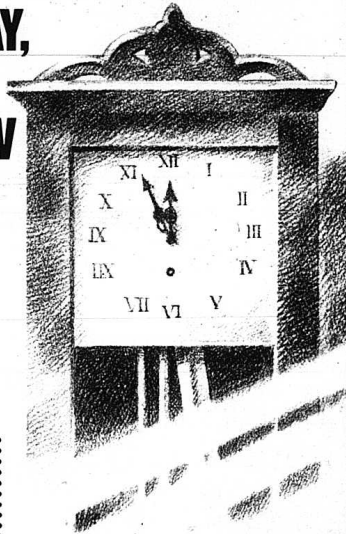

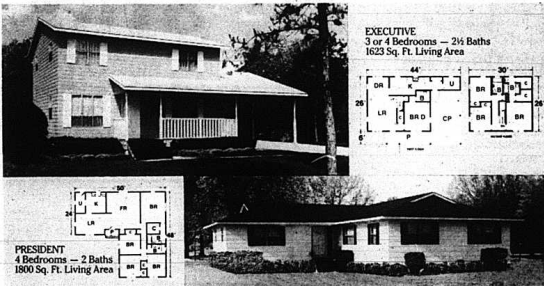
