Do you own land adjacent to the

Doniel Boone National Forest?

If so, you might already know or will be meeting Ray Powell. He is the surveying technician for the Berea Ranger District under the supervision of Shirley Black, forest surr. Ray has worked for the district

The property of the Daniel Boone National Forest was purchased from Warfork Lumber Company and other property owners during the 1930's and 1940's. Most of the land lines of the forest were established when the property was obtained.

National Forest land lines were not posted with boundary signs. Instead,

blazed and painted with red paint. In many cases the property line ran through old fields where there were no trees. In these instances, the line was marked on the nearest trees which were sometimes 30 feet from which were sometimes 30 reef from the actual boundary line. The blazed and painted trees that were marked showed on which side the boundary line was located. Much property has been bought and sold by forest neighbors assuming that the painted trees marked the line. Unfortunately, this misunderstanding has caused land ownership disputes.

The boundary lines are now marked by Ray using improved sur-

veying instruments and new tech-niques. He still blazes and paints the adjacent land line trees. These trees are not blazed unless they are within 2-3 feet of the line. The marked trees only indicate which side of the tree the line is located. The only markings that are placed on the actual property that are placed on the actual property line are posted signs. These signs are erected when a land line goes through an open area or field.

The Forest Service is interested in

maintaining accurate lines. Even though the line looks as if it is being though the line looks as if it is being moved, the trees have grown closer to the original boundary. The newly blazed trees appear as though some land is being taken away from adja-cent owners and some land is being given to other owners. Instead, the markings are more accurately reflecting the location of the line.

When Ray Powell is ready to re hish a land line he makes every effort to contact our neighbors. We want very much to work with them in this very much to work with them in this effort. During the next six months, Ray plans to be working at South Fork and near the Bethel Ridge area off Highway 1955 in Jackson County, Also, he will be at New Hope off Highway 1004. Special projects may be upcoming in the future Owsley, Lee, Estill, Jackson and Rockcastle county.

Your Child's Health

Waking during the night and re-sisting going to bed by infants and young children is a frequent source of frustration and exasperation for or institution and exasperation for parents. About 20 to 30 percent of children have such problems at one time or another, so it may be consid-ered normal. Usual suggestions include diet modifications, ignoring the behavior, and more recently, a

graduated ignoring of the crying.

There can be many reasons for such crying spells, and therefore scientific study of the problem is difficult. A recent study did attempt to study three ways of dealing with the problem. One group of parents was asked to ignore the crying, that is, to let the children cry it out. A second group was asked to awaken the child 15 to 60 minutes before expected awakenings, and feed and console them in an effort to "head off" spon taneous tantrums. A third, or control group of parents was asked only to record the crying episodes and note when they came and how long they

Researchers found that after two months both children who were in nored and those were awakened and consoled cried less than those whose

episodes were only recorded. How ever, those parents who were asked to ignore the crying did not stick with the study very well, and that sched-uled awakenings may work better.

Even those families who only re-Even those families who only re-corded the events found improve-ment in their children's behavior, probably because they found by re-cording them that they felt they were doing something, and that the crying did not last as long as they had be-

It was not clear to me from the at was not clear to me from the study how the problem of refusing to go to sleep was handled as this could not be handled by waking the child up beforehand. What was noted was the complexity of the issue. Is the child being expected to sleep 11 hours when 10 hours of sleep is all he needs and all his body will tolerate? Is he a two year old learning to test limits, or a one year old with a chronic health problem who can't tell mommy what hurts? Is it a four year old who is frightened from scary programs on TV or who fears his parents will divorce because they fuss so much? All these factors make a study of sleep distrubance difficult, but remember, scheduled awakening before the expected tantrum, if it can be anticipated, seems to be effective.

Stewart reported the hospital has 187 employees with a payroll of \$2.6 million annually. He said the new section would provide work for an additional 71 employees with an additional million dollar annual pay-

In other action, County Cerk Norma Houk asked the court and got \$250 yearly raises for two of her longest employees and \$200 for one other employee, if and when money becomes available. Salaries in her office come from office fees.

The tract borders on old Ky. 461 with an access on U.S. 150 and will cost \$200,000. Cost of the site development is estimated at \$90,000. The property is adjacent to the J.C. Bowling farm and Hamm Subdivision.

Of the \$200,000 amount, the Rockcastle County Industrial Devel-

Rockeastle County Industrial Devel-opment Authority has already in-vested \$4,000 in an option and has another \$16,000 available to invest in the property.

The county will service the re-maning \$180,000 at eight percent interest for 15 years.

Such grants are usually applied for and recommended by the city involved, and in some cases the city requests the money for a project, and

State reports lead in water

All Rockcastle community and non-transient non-community pub-lic water systems have been ordered to notify their customers of the potential hazards of lead in their drinking water.
All systems in Rockcastle, as well

as in other counties throughout the state have received notices stressing that official publication of informa-tion on lead is mandatory.

Systems in the county are Mt.

Vernon, Brodhead, Livingston, Western Water District and Northern Water District.
The regulation is included in the

1986 Safe Drinking Water Act Amendments passed by Congress that requires "an increased effort to minimize lead contamination in drinking water."

In addition to banning the use of lead plumbing materials, the amendment requires that the customers of public water systems be notified of the potential hazards of lead in drink-In its notification to the various

public water systems, the Depart-ment of Environmental Protection (EPA) of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet, stated the EPA "sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million. ased on new health information EPA is likely to lower this standard

significantly."
The EPA and other departments are concerned about lead in that too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous sytem and red The greatest risk, even short-term

exposure, is to young children and pregnant women. The EPA says lead levels in drink-

ing water are likely to be highest if a home or water system has lead pipes, or if the home has copper pipes with lead solder. Also, there is a problem if the home is less than five years old, or if it had soft or acidic water, of if the water stands in the pipes for several hours.

The only way to be sure the amount of lead in your water is to have the water tested by a state certified labo-

Testing for lead in water may be especially important to apartment dwellers because flushing the water line may not be effective in more than

Board tackles school plans

With the construction of the new Mt. Vernon Elementary School fast approaching, revisions in the architectural plans, heating and cooling systems, and the actual cost of construction were key items of discussion at the Rockcastle County Board of Education Twesday night. of Education Tuesday night.

Bob Cocanougher, a spokesman for the architectural firm of Johnson/ Romanowitz gave the board an up-date on the new school's plans that had to be changed because of state regulations affecting the construc-tion of new school facilities.

The revisions most of which were

minor, ranged from having to place individual restrooms in the kindergarten rooms to an addition room in the school's administrative area for another counselor.

Cocanougher said this did not

mean there must be an additional counselor but that the state required that the room be there for the future when and if it were to be needed. Too, the loading and unloading of students

which will occur from the new building's west side, facing Williams Street had originally been planned to be a one-lane drive, be-cause of state regulations this dropoff must be two lane in order to meet

State safety requirements.

Garlan Vanhook, also from the firm of Johnson/Romanowitz, was on hand with a color drawing and gave a brief presentation about the aesthetics of the new school build-

Vanhook displayed the changes that had been recommended by the Mt. Vernon Elementary Building Committee, such as the variations in the red brick that will give the new school a better look aesthetically. large windows in the stairwells, such as those found at the Brodhead Ele-mentary School, and a red tin roof to match the school colors at certain

points around the school building. Since the school will be built in phases and cost is certainly a factor in determing certain variables, Van-hook added that Johnson/Romanowitz was more than willing to work

with the school in order to help the school system remain within their budget. Certain changes that could help bring the cost down are holding off on construction of some class-rooms until a later phase was under-

Tim Wilson, a mechanical engineer, presented the board with four possible options in regard to the heating and cooling of the new facility. The systems ranged individual classroom ventilators, that would be controlled by each teacher, to large Cont. to 7

Probably not, unless you or someone in your family has been faced with, a physical condition limiting their movement. Use physical condition because many farmers who become handicapped were not born with the physical condition which now limits their movement. Although farm accidents can account for many people becoming handicapped, physical therapists indicate there are many causes. With the farm population growing older, strokes are increasing the number of people who fare the loss of movement. With this and accidents in mind, we see that becoming physically handicapped may be a fact that families will have to deal with. in your family has been faced with a deal with

What is available for handicapped farmers or even homeowners who want to continue using their equipment? Unfortunately as an organized program available to all Kentucky handicapped farmers, help is limited.

1988 Feed/Grain sign-up deadline is April 15

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office will be having the annual Feed Grain Program sign-up through April 15. Provisions for this years sign-up are as follows: GENERAL PROVISIONS: Pro-

ducers must reduce their feed grain plantings by 20.0 percent of their crop acreage base to be eligible for loans, purchases and payments for the 1988 crop.

Producers may also participate in an optional paid land diversion for the 1988 crop year by diverting 10 percent of their feed grain base. The diverted acreage must be devoted to ACR. The diversion payment will be paid all in generic commodity certifi-cates on or about May 16. Producers are eligible to earn defi-

ciency payments on the actual acreage planted, within their permitted acreage. Advance payments will be equal to 40 percent of the estimated equal to 40 percent of the estimated commodity deficiency payment rate, payable one-half in cash at sign-up and the balance paid in generic com-modity certificates on or about May 16, 1988.

Social Security report deadline

People who get Social Security retirement or survivor checks and who earned more than the annual exempt amount in wages from a job or in self-employment in 1987 have until April 15, 1988, to file an annual report of their earnings, Bob Ander-son, Social Security manager in Richmond, said recently.

The 1987 exempt amounts were
\$6,000 for people under 65 all of the
year and \$8,160 for people 65 or over
any part of 1987. In general, a person
has \$1 in benefits withheld for each

report to decide whether the person received the correct amount of benefits during 1987. If too much or too little was paid, any adjustment neces-sary is made based on the annual

A special monthly test is used during a person's first year of retire-ment. Under this test, a person can get a benefit for a month in which he or she did not earn wages over the monthly limit and did not perform substantial services in self-employment. This monthly test can be used only in the person's first year of re





Choose Good Nutrition -Choose Good Recipes

A recipe is a blueprint for success in the kitchen. A good recipe should list the correct amounts of ingredients and provide concise directions ents and province concise antections for combining them. A good recipe, when doubled or cut in half, still should yield a good product. During National Nutrition Month add another dimension to the definition of a od recipe: nutrition.

There are many recipes that look

fabulous and appealing. But when you examine the recipes closely you ay find not-so-nutritious ingredi ents or amounts of certain ingredi-ents that increase the fat, salt or sugar

content unnecessarily.

Many of these recipes are the result of attempts by food companies and marketing associations to push their products.

If you are selling chocolate chips. If you are selling chocolate chips, for example, you could double sales by doubling the amount of chocolate chips in your chocolate chip cookie enips in your enocotate enip cookle recipe. Recipes promoted by the dairy industry often contain gener-ous amounts of whipping cream, butter, sour cream and other dairy

A good recipe should yield a good product, but it also should be good for you. Learn to critique recipes for good nutrition. Choose those that are moderate in fat, salt, sodium and

sugar. The key word is moderate.

Learn to improve recipes by substituting ingredients or changing their amounts to make them conform to your nutrition needs. For example, if you want to reduce calories or fat in your diet, low-fat or skim milk can replace whole milk, and whole milk can substitute for cream or half-andhalf in most recipes. Often a recipe



If you find a cream soup recipe that calls for whipping cream and half-and-half, chances are the soup will be just as good and better for you if you substitute milk for the cream.

Sugar is another area where many recipes can be improved. Sweet des-serts can be just as tasty or even better with a little less sugar. Other flavors previously masked by overwhelm-ing sweetness will come through, especially in fruit pies and fruit sal-ads. Try reducing sugar by a table-spoon or two each time you prepare a favorite dessert until you reach a good balance between sweetness and other flavore



A community public water system regularly serves an average of at least 15 service connections or 25 residents on a daily basis. This includes systems serving municipalities, sub-divisions, permanent mobile home parks, water districts and water asso-
