Surveying Technician Ray Powell is refurbishing Daniel Boone National Forest landlines in Owsley, Lee, Estill, Rockcastle and Owsley Counties.

## Refurbished landlines for national forest in county

Do you own land adjacent to the Daniel Boone National Forest?

If so, you might already know or will be meeting Ray Powell. He is the surveying technician for the Berea Ranger District under the supervision of Shirley Black, forest surveyor. Ray has worked for the district since 1963.

The property of the Daniel Boone National Forest was purchased from Warfork Lumber Company and other property owners during the 1930's and 1940's. Most of the land lines of the forest were established when the property was obtained.

National Forest land lines were not posted with boundary signs. Instead,

trees located near the line were blazed and painted with red paint. In many cases the property line ran through old fields where there were no trees. In these instances, the line was marked on the nearest trees which were sometimes 30 feet from the actual boundary line. The blazed and painted trees that were marked showed on which side the boundary line was located. Much property has been bought and sold by forest neighbors assuming that the painted trees marked the line. Unfortunately, this misunderstanding has caused land ownership disputes.

The boundary lines are now marked by Ray using improved sur-

veying instruments and new techniques. He still blazes and paints the adjacent land line trees. These trees are not blazed unless they are within 2-3 feet of the line. The marked trees only indicate which side of the line the line is located. The only markings that are placed on the actual property line are posted signs. These signs are erected when a land line goes through an open area or field.

The Forest Service is interested in maintaining accurate lines. Even though the line looks as if it is being moved, the trees have grown closer to the original boundary. The newly blazed trees appear as though some land is being taken away from adjacent owners and some land is being given to other owners. Instead, the markings are more accurately reflecting the location of the line.

When Ray Powell is ready to refurbish a land line, he makes every effort to contact our neighbors. We want very much to work with them in this effort. During the next six months, Ray plans to be working at South Fork and near the Bebel Ridge area off Highway 1955 in Jackson County. Also, he will be at New Hope off Highway 1004. Special projects may be upcoming in the future Owsley, Lee, Estill, Jackson and Rockcastle county.

### Your Child's Health

Waking during the night and resisting going to bed by infants and especially children is a frequent source of frustration and exasperation for parents. About 20 to 30 percent of children have such problems at one time or another, so it may be considered normal. Usual suggestions include diet modifications, ignoring the behavior, and more recently, a graduated ignoring of the crying.

There can be many reasons for such crying spells, and therefore scientific study of the problem is difficult. A recent study did attempt to study three ways of dealing with the problem. One group of parents was asked to ignore the crying, that is, to let the children cry it out. A second group was asked to awaken the child 15 to 60 minutes before expected awakenings, and feed and console them in an effort to "head off" spontaneous tantrums. A third, or control group of parents was asked only to record the crying episodes and note when they came and how long they lasted.

Researchers found that after two months both children who were ignored and those were awakened and consoled cried less than those whose

episodes were only recorded. However, those parents who were asked to ignore the crying did not stick with the study very well, and that scheduled awakenings may work better.

Even those families who only recorded the events found improvement in their children's behavior, probably because they found by recording them that they felt they were doing something, and that the crying did not last as long as they had believed.

It was not clear to me from the study how the problem of refusing to go to sleep was handled as this could not be handled by waking the child up beforehand. What was noted was the complexity of the issue. Is the child being expected to sleep 11 hours when 10 hours of sleep is all he needs and all his body will tolerate? Is he a two year old learning to test limits, or a one year old with a chronic health problem who can't tell mommy what hurts? Is it a four year old who is frightened from scary programs on TV or who fears his parents will divorce because they fuss so much? All these factors make a study of sleep disturbance difficult, but remember, scheduled awakening before the expected tantrum, if it can be anticipated, seems to be effective.

## Hospital planning expansion

A multi-million dollar expansion program at Rockcastle County Hospital "is in the planning stage," Wayne Stewart, hospital administrator, told the Rockcastle Signal at a meeting Tuesday.

He asked for the court's blessing and got it since no county money is involved. Stewart told the court the hospital is doing very well and there is a backlog of applicants for some types of care. "It's just time for us to expand," he said.

The expansion program is expected to cost about \$3.5 million. It calls for 28 more beds and necessary remodeling of the kitchen, all connected with the present structure. Stewart reported the hospital has 187 employees with a payroll of \$2.6 million annually. He said the new section would provide work for an additional 71 employees with an additional million dollar annual payroll.

In other action, County Clerk Norma Houk asked the court and got \$250 yearly raises for two of her longest employees and \$200 for one other employee, if and when money becomes available. Salaries in her office come from office fees. If and when money becomes available, the court approved purchase of hose for the county fire truck at Mt. Vernon; will purchase fencing for the t-ball field at Brodhead, and install a partition in the Rockcastle Library at the request of the senior citizens organization.

## Fiscal Court buys land for industrial site

In need of more land to entice industrial development in the county, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted Tuesday to purchase 63 acres near Mt. Vernon to develop an industrial site.

The site, known as Henderson Bottom, and owned by heirs of Clyde Henderson, will be developed by the county, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted Tuesday to purchase 63 acres near Mt. Vernon to develop an industrial site.

The tract borders on old Ky. 461 with an access on U.S. 150 and will cost \$200,000. Cost of the site development is estimated at \$90,000. The property is adjacent to the J.C. Bowling farm and Hamn subdivision.

Of the \$200,000 amount, the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority has already invested \$4,000 in an option and has another \$16,000 available to invest in the property.

The county will service the remaining \$180,000 at eight percent interest for 15 years.

Attorney John Clontz, spokesman for the group, told the court the county has run out of property for industrial development and in a world of intense competition counties and cities must make property available to companies if they are

going to get them.

Clontz added that the Commerce Cabinet has found the site feasible because of its proximity to utilities and highways. The group does not have a definite company that is interested in locating here, Clontz added.

Prior to Clontz's talk to the court, a representative from Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) told the court the \$385,000 grant to the county to loan to Mt. Vernon Plastics for expansion has been finalized and he confirmed the county will receive \$2,850 a month for 15 years from the loan, meaning the county will have a pay back of \$512,000.

He pointed out several areas in which the interest money can be spent, including industrial development.

It was at the end of his discussion that Attorney Clontz told the court the \$2,850 a month coming to the county could be best used to purchase the Henderson property. The court agreed.

Accompanying Clontz at the meeting was a representative of Highlands Company, Sammy Ford and Wayne Stewart.

## Court chooses garbage boss

There's a new county solid waste (garbage) coordinator today.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted Tuesday at its regular meeting to hire Luster Bullock as coordinator at a salary of \$200 a month.

Bullock is also county road foreman. The position is a part-time one. The county's approved garbage plan calls for a fulltime position.

The vote was 3-1 with Amos Burdette abstaining. County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker voted "yes".

When the parttime question was raised, one magistrate said other counties are doing it, meaning using employees as coordinator.

"We hired the person for the job," the magistrate said. "If the state don't like it, I guess we can fire him."

What the state will do will probably come to light at a meeting at 2:30 p.m. today (Thursday) when a representative of the state's Department of Waste Management comes to the fiscal court for a meeting.

Tim Schwendeman of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) at London, the agency that devised the plan, called it "crunch time" for the county's garbage plan.

"The representative will ask the court about 20 questions about im-

plementing the plan," Schwendeman said. "The questions are very comprehensive."

If the plan is found to be out of compliance, a letter will be sent from Frankfort to the court pointing out what is to be done and by when. The court will then start its program as passed by the court, or request an amendment to some points in the plan.

"It's a matter of the court getting the plan under way, or come up with another plan acceptable to the state," Schwendeman said. He added it would have to be done quickly.

He noted that the state department now has more employees available to monitor plans around the state.

In a manner of speaking, the court got a reprieve when a meeting scheduled for March 1 was postponed until April 7 reportedly at the county's request.

Schwendeman said he did not expect the state to allow more delays in implementation. "They're anxious to get the counties into compliance," he stated.

Rockcastle is not the only county that will be monitored by the state. Several are already being monitored to keep them in compliance.

"I think state personnel are aware of Rockcastle's many open dumps and litter," an official stated. "I think now the state will turn the screws on

## State reports lead in water

All Rockcastle community and non-transient non-community public water systems have been ordered to notify their customers of the potential hazards of lead in their drinking water.

All systems in Rockcastle, as well as in other counties throughout the state, have received notices stressing that official publication of information on lead is mandatory.

Systems in the county are Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, Livingston, Western Water District and Northern Water District.

The regulation is included in the 1986 Safe Drinking Water Act Amendments passed by Congress that requires "an increased effort to minimize lead contamination in drinking water."

In addition to banning the use of lead plumbing materials, the amendment requires that the customers of public water systems be notified of the potential hazards of lead in drinking water.

In its notification to the various public water systems, the Department of Environmental Protection (EPA) of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet, stated the EPA "sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million. Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly."

The EPA and other departments are concerned about lead in that too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain,

kidneys, nervous system and red blood cells.

The greatest risk, even short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

The EPA says lead levels in drinking water are likely to be highest if a home or water system has lead pipes, or if the home has copper pipes with lead solder. Also, there is a problem if the home is less than five years old, or if it had soft or acidic water, or if the water stands in the pipes for several hours.

The only way to be sure the amount of lead in your water is to have the water tested by a state certified laboratory.

Testing for lead in water may be especially important to apartment dwellers because flushing the water line may not be effective in more than

## Board tackles school plans

With the construction of the new Mt. Vernon Elementary School fast approaching, revisions in the architectural plans, heating and cooling systems, and the actual cost of construction were key items of discussion at the Rockcastle County Board of Education Tuesday night.

Bob Cocanougher, a spokesman for the architectural firm of Johnson/Romanowitz gave the board an update on the new school's plans that had to be changed because of state regulations affecting the construction of new school facilities.

The revisions most of which were minor, ranged from having to place individual restrooms in the kindergarten rooms to an addition room in the school's administrative area for another counselor.

Cocanougher said this did not mean there must be an additional counselor but that the state required that the room be there for the future when and if it were to be needed. Too, the loading and unloading of students

which will occur from the new building's west side, facing Williams Street had originally been planned to be a one-lane drive, because of state regulations this dropoff must be two lane in order to meet state safety requirements.

Garlan Vanhook, also from the firm of Johnson/Romanowitz, was on hand with a color drawing and gave a brief presentation about the aesthetics of the new school building.

Vanhook displayed the changes that had been recommended by the Mt. Vernon Elementary Building Committee, such as the variations in the red brick that will give the new school a better look aesthetically, large windows in the stairwells, such as those found at the Brodhead Elementary School, and a red tin roof to match the school colors at certain points around the school building.

Since the school will be built in phases and cost is certainly a factor in determining certain variables, Vanhook added that Johnson/Romanowitz was more than willing to work

with the school in order to help the school system remain within their budget. Certain changes that could help bring the cost down are holding off on construction of some classrooms until a later phase was undertaken.

Tim Wilson, a mechanical engineer, presented the board with four possible options in regard to the heating and cooling of the new facility. The systems ranged individual classroom ventilators, that would be controlled by each teacher, to large

### Special modifications assist handicapped farmer's use of equipment

Have you given consideration to how a handicapped person would use the same farm equipment you do? Probably not, unless you or someone in your family has been faced with a physical condition limiting their movement. I use physical condition because many farmers who become handicapped were not born with the physical condition which now limits their movement. Although farm accidents can account for many people becoming handicapped, physical therapists indicate there are many causes. With the farm population growing older, strokes are increasing the number of people who fare the loss of movement. With this and accidents in mind, we see that becoming physically handicapped may be a fact that families will have to deal with.

What is available for handicapped farmers or even homeowners who want to continue using their equipment? Unfortunately as an organized program available to all Kentucky handicapped farmers, help is limited.

However, other states have organized programs, compiled research and devised methods to get their information out.

Although Kentucky faces this limitation, farmers in Rockcastle County have a rare opportunity to see what is available for altering their farm equipment. John Hancock, Former Purdue University Handicapped Farm Program Coordinator, will be at Blaine and Bernice McHargue's farm on Saturday, April 9th, demonstrating how farm equipment can be altered to assist handicapped farmers to better use their machinery. John presently served as Agriculture Agent in Carroll County, and when asked to share the information from Purdue, he gladly donated his personal time to conduct this program. He indicates that many devices and methods of installation exist for assisting farmers to continue using their equipment. Being physically handicapped himself, John understands the need to share this type of information.

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## Farmers Home to elect new committee member

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will begin accepting nominations April 5 for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Robert Hornsby, County Supervisor, said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Mr. Hornsby said. "The new definition also included the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come

from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Mr. Hornsby said. "At least three eligible farmer voters including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Mr. Hornsby said. "Previously this was not allowed."

Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at P.O. Box 122, McKeen, Ky. 40447, Mr. Hornsby said.

## 1988 Feed/Grain sign-up deadline is April 15

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office will be having the annual Feed Grain Program sign-up through April 15. Provisions for this year's sign-up are as follows:

**GENERAL PROVISIONS:** Producers must reduce their feed grain plantings by 20.0 percent of their crop acreage base to be eligible for loan, purchases and payments for the 1988 crop.

Producers may also participate in an optional paid land diversion for the 1988 crop year by diverting 10 percent of their feed grain base. The diverted acreage must be devoted to ACR. The diversion payment will be paid all in generic commodity certificates on or about May 16.

Producers are eligible to earn deficiency payments on the actual acreage planted, within their permitted acres. Advance payments will be equal to 40 percent of the estimated commodity deficiency payment rate, payable one-half in cash at sign-up and the balance paid in generic commodity certificates on or about May 16, 1988.

Remember sign-up ends April 15, 1988!

People who get Social Security retirement or survivor checks and who earned more than the annual exempt amount in wages from a job or in self-employment in 1987 have until April 15, 1988, to file an annual report of their earnings, Bob Anderson, Social Security manager in Richmond, said recently.

The 1987 exempt amounts were \$6,000 for people under 65 all of the year and \$8,160 for people 65 or over any part of 1987. In general, a person has \$1 in benefits withheld for each \$2 of annual earnings over the exempt amount.

## Fiscal Court agrees to purchase more land for industrial growth

Cont. From Front should be completed in about 90 days including access road and landscaping.

The only possible loss to the county would be the failure to sell the property to an industry. But it could likely be re-sold.

In other action the court approved a bid from Singleton and Associates of Mt. Vernon for county insurance including vehicle, comprehensive general liability, public officials liability and physical damage. Total yearly premium is about \$31,000 near, the same as last year.

The only other bid was for vehicles from a Stanford Company. Their bid was \$18,240 for vehicles. Singleton's vehicle bid was \$9,549.

A representative from the Department of Transportation district at Somerset told the court the state had approved up to \$85,000 to construct a new bridge over Long Branch on Chestnut Ridge Road at Broadhead. The road accesses on U.S. 150 at Sowder Nursing Home.

The court agreed to solicit bids on the bridge that will be 48 feet long and 24 feet wide.

In other business, Mt. Vernon City Councilman Wayne Adams suggested the court, the city, and state highway officials meet to settle who will repair the road around Lake Linville. The court agreed.

The court also voted to work four roads: Ellis McNew Road at Conway; old U.S. 25 Roundstone through Fish Hill; George Lakes Road on Fairground Hill at Mt. Vernon and West Road at Maple Grove, all gravel roads.

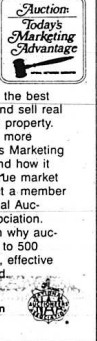

A good recipe should yield a good product, but it also should be good for you. Learn to critique recipes for good nutrition. Choose those that are moderate in fat, salt, sodium and sugar. The key word is moderate.

Learn to improve recipes by substituting ingredients or changing their amounts to make them conform to your nutrition needs. For example, if you want to reduce calories or fat in your diet, low-fat or skim milk can replace whole milk, and whole milk can substitute for cream or half-and-half in most recipes. Often a recipe

will call for a stick of butter or margarine when two or three tablespoons are plenty.

If you find a cream soup recipe that calls for whipping cream and half-and-half, chances are the soup will be just as good and better for you if you substitute milk for the cream.

Sugar is another area where many recipes can be improved. Sweet desserts can be just as tasty or even better with a little less sugar. Other flavors previously masked by overwhipping sweetness will come through, especially in fruit pies and fruit salads. Try reducing sugar by a tablespoon or two each time you prepare a favorite dessert until you reach a good balance between sweetness and other flavors.

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

units that would control the entire facility. The fuel source to power the system such as coal, electric, propane and yes, natural gas were all discussed.

Lynn Perkins, from Central Associated Engineers, told the board that he had been in contact with the Hunts, Leo and Stanley, his nephew, who are developing natural gas wells nearby.

Perkins added that the Hunts felt there was an abundance of natural gas to supply the City of Mt. Vernon, the Rockcastle Industrial Park and the new school. The wholesale price of the natural gas would be about \$3.50 per 1,000 cubic feet. Leo Hunt was on hand and assured the board that there was indeed an abundant supply of gas and added that he was presently working on a grant for the City of Mt. Vernon so the actual line would be run to the city. The city must first become a utility and authorize natural gas use. This remains to be approved.

While Wilson would not recommend one system over another, Coanougher did recommend the heat pump system over the others mentioned. He said heat pump systems have the capability of heating and cooling within the same day. Therefore, the building would not be extremely hot or cold because of rapid changes in the weather.

The cost of installation ranged from a high of \$398,000 for the heat pump system to \$322,000 for the electric boiler type system. However, the heat pump system had the lowest projected energy cost with the average yearly cost about \$24,000. The boiler type system had the highest year average of \$37,000.

Phase 1 of the project will cost about \$2.7 million according to Freddie Tarkey, construction manager for the project, who presented the board with an estimate of the total cost of construction from excavation of the property to moving out of the construction crews.

State Rep. Danny Ford was on hand with some good news for the board from the general assembly. A bill sponsored by Ford had gained approval that will allow Rockcastle County school to undergo a new facility survey which will in essence mean more money for construction. However, the state superintendent of public instruction must first recommend that a survey be done. Ford added that this should not be a problem.

Other legislation that could have dramatic impact upon the local school system is known as "27 and out". This bill, just signed into law by Gov. Wallace Wilkinson, provides teachers the opportunity to retire with full benefits after 27 years. This could mean a great number of retirees with the system within the next few years. Board member Earl Cummins asked Towery if he had received many notices of employees intending to retire. Towery responded that at this point only two individuals had initiated the paper

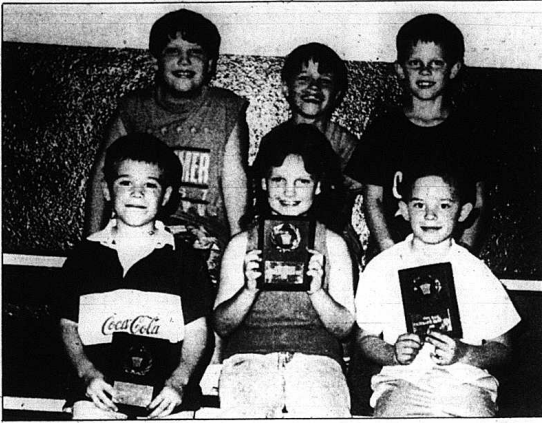

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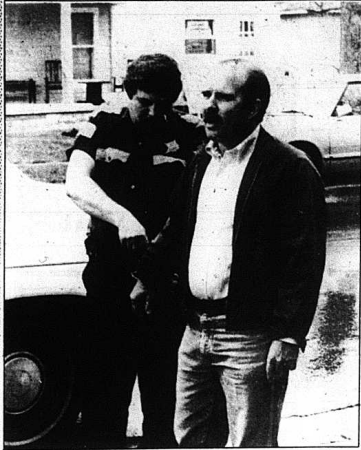

## Carl, Miller and Sowder are Governor's Scholars

Three Rockcastle County High School juniors are among 653 outstanding juniors chosen to attend the 1988 Governor's Scholar Program. They are Angela Clark, daughter of Raymond and Linda Carl of Conway; Adam S. Miller, son of Jackie and Patricia Miller of Disputana, and Alison Sowder, daughter of Vernon and Jenny Sowder of the Level Green area.

The nationally recognized, residential academic program will be held at Murray State University from June 19 to July 23 and at Centre College from June 26 to July 30. Students, who are selected competitively, attend the program free of charge through funds provided by a partnership of government and business.

"I am impressed by the ambition and motivation of these Scholars," Gov. Wilkinson said. "They commit the major part of their summer to this intensive academic and personal growth program. They stay on campus for five weeks, including weekends. I think that makes a clear statement about how our bright young Kentuckians feel about enrichment and their lives through quality education."

Gov. Wilkinson said that record number of applications were received this year, resulting in the heaviest competition to date for admission to the program. "The Statewide Selection Committee had to make some extremely difficult decisions in choosing Scholars," he said. The largest number of Scholars, 28 percent, will come from Eastern Kentucky, as in most other years. Other regions of the state will be represented as follows: 22 percent from Western Kentucky; 22 percent from Central Kentucky (this grouping includes such counties as Oldham and Hardin); 11 percent from Northern Kentucky; and, 17 percent from Jefferson County, including private and Catholic schools. The

number of nominations allowed for each public school district is based on the number of high school juniors in the district, but students must qualify and are selected on merit from the nominations submitted. The program was able to accept approximately only one of every three candidates at the statewide pool this year.

The Governor's Scholars Program, founded in 1983, is now entering its sixth year. Lillian Press, executive director of the program, said that it is becoming increasingly more difficult to meet the demand for admission to the program. "The caliber of the applications was very high this year, and it was hard to have to turn down, literally, hundreds of highly qualified, enthusiastic students," she said.

School districts plus an impartial blue-ribbon Statewide Selection Committee choose the Scholars. The statewide committee includes admissions directors from public and private college and universities, assistant admissions directors, vice presidents, academic deans, college professors from Kentucky public universities and college, representatives of the Council on Higher Education and the State Department of Education.

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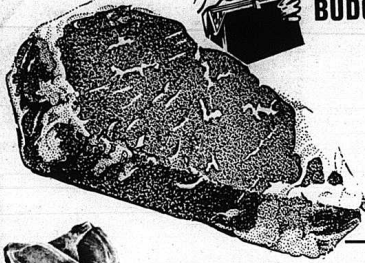
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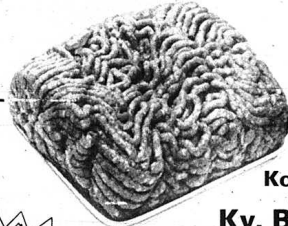

one-story buildings that have lead-soldered central piping.

Recommended is to flush cold water pipes before using the water for human consumption. Turn on the faucet and let the water run until the water temperature cools and gets no cooler.

Use only cold water for drinking, cooking, or preparing baby formula. If new plumbing is installed, or repairs made, insist that lead free materials be used. Lead pipes and service connections can be replaced.

The EPA does not recommend that city water lines be replaced, an expensive and probably impossible job.

A community public water system regularly serves an average of at least 15 service connections or 25 residents on a daily basis. This includes systems serving municipalities, subdivisions, permanent mobile home parks, water districts and water associations.

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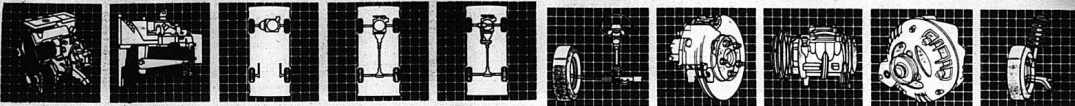
