"Project Graduation: will be held

May 17, immediately following the Rockcastle County High School graduation. The same festive atmosphere will be prevalent only without chemical substances.

The party will feature numerous events, activities, a band and several other things for the graduating seniors to enjoy.

"Different schools do different things at their Project Graduation," according to Darren Allen a senior at

RCHS. "We feel this a very worthwhile event and we hope that not only the graduating seniors support it, but also the entire community will lend its support to such an event that could help save the life of a graduate or other high school student." Allen said.

Reaction among the seniors has been mixed according to Amy Hamm, a senior and another of the student representatives. "Some of

the students are behind us all the way others are a bit undecided about what they should do," she said. "The administration has been very supportive of what we are trying to do. They too, are not sure of what to expect since they have never been involved with anything like this in the past."

To make the event a success, it will take the efforts of many volunteers and also the support of community businesses and leaders. At this point

several parents of graduating seniors have started organizing into various committees each of which is responsible for a different facet of the event's planning.

The KEST (Kentucky Essential Skills Test) will be given during the week of May 2-6. Please help by seeing that your child is in attendance everyday that week. Although we do

try to make-up every test, it is much easier on the students to take their test within the regular classroom situation.

The test results are used to determine instructional needs; to measure mastery of a skill or concept; to help identify students for special programs, such as gifted education,

remedial math and/or reading, special education, etc.; and to provide scores that tell how students compare with a set of achievement standards, norms, other schools, or other school districts.

Grass tetany is a result of a magnesium deficiency in the cow. Weather and soil fertility seem to be factors.

Grass tetany occurs when soil temperature is between 40 and 60 degrees and often during changeable weather. High levels of nitrogen, potassium and moisture in the soil increase the incidence, because they apparently decrease the level of magnesium found in plants naturally.

Symptoms of the disorder usually begin with nervousness and then progress to a stilted gait, staggering, convulsions, coma and death. It always requires immediate veterinary treatment.

About two-thirds of cows treated intravenously with magnesium and calcium compounds recover. However, to prevent relapses, treated cows should be removed from the pasture. They should be fed hay and grain plus two ounces of magnesium oxide daily for at least a week.

Because animals do not store up magnesium, their dietary requirements have to be supplied on a day-to-day basis. The only way to prevent grass tetany is to supplement the diet with additional magnesium. This can be done with commercial mineral mixes containing magnesium or with homemade mixtures. Mixing 1 part magnesium oxide, 1 part trace mineral salt and 1 part dry molasses or soy bean meal will do fine if this is the

cow's only source of salt.

Tobacco Bed Bugs—A Site Problem

Tobacco bugs usually are found in the areas surrounding seed beds. Checking key places around beds will enable the grower to correct the problem before plants are badly damaged.

Beds that are surrounded by woods or previously planted fields offer the flea beetle more chances to invade seedlings. The beetle will not become active until late April or early May, however, inspecting leaves for feeding damage will permit application of a leaf spray if needed.

Rock or trash piles are perfect places for slugs to live. When these are close to seed beds the slugs can readily feed on the plants. Elimination of such trash piles is the best method to avoid the slug problem. However, if this is not possible, slug baits aid in control. Slug populations also thrive in alfalfa and clover fields and will pose a problem for seed beds planted nearby.

Thick, low-growing weeds found along bed margins harbor cutworms which also like to feed on tobacco seedlings. By inspecting the borders, early damage detection and treatment is possible.

As with all insecticides, care must be taken to follow directions carefully and if questions arise, contact your county extension office.

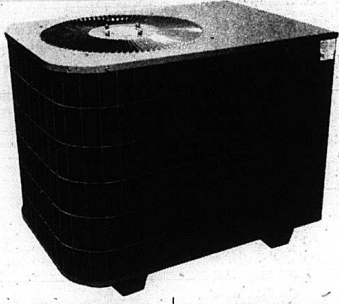

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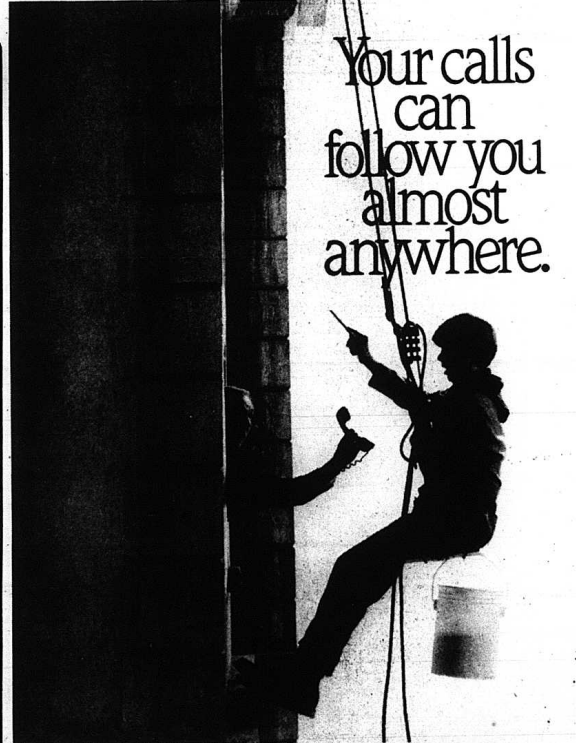

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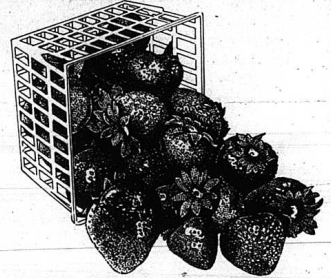

Skiing at Lake Linville left to poll of residents

To ski or not to ski, was the question that faced the Mt. Vernon City Council at its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

After a brief, heated discussion that sometimes got loud, the council agreed to let residents of Mt. Vernon 18 and older vote on water skiing on Lake Linville.

The ballot appears on the front page of the Second Section of this issue of the Signal.

Only persons actually living in the city are eligible to vote. Copies of the ballot may be obtained at city hall if needed. Ballots should be mailed or brought in person to city hall.

The previous council approved an ordinance prohibiting water skiing on the lake on the basis it is the city's

drinking water supply and that the lake is too small and should be used only for fishing from shore or from boats. The ordinance also set a speed limit for boats.

Regardless of how the voting turns out, the council agreed there will be no skiing in the area known as Hysinger Hollow and around the city boat dock.

Mayor Elizabeth Baker, or one of the councilmen, suggested the ballot method be used after Councilwoman Clarice Kirby and former councilman Tom Welch exchanged opposing views.

Mrs. Kirby said persons she had talked with approved of skiing. Welch said the previous council had the opinion that most residents opposed skiing, including him.

Mayor Baker added that most of

the persons who had contacted her opposed skiing. It was then she or one of the councilmen suggested the ballot.

The council voted to take advantage of a jail work release program for a month. The council agreed to use inmates of the county jail to work at odd jobs in the city under the supervision of city employees. Only those inmates who are in jail for public intoxication will be accepted. The inmate will have to volunteer for the work detail.

The council approved an ordinance allowing the council to choose a person to act as mayor in case the mayor becomes incapacitated or cannot attend a regular meeting because of some emergency.

Talking it over

State warns fiscal court about county waste plan

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court needs to be more active in its garbage program, Cathy Blair of the Office of Solid Waste Management, told the court during an unofficial meeting Thursday, and added the court "is out of compliance" on some points.

"The court has been pretty passive in the past," she said. "You've got to say what you are going to do. You can't leave things as they are."

Ms. Blair, who is in charge of the state's solid waste program for eight counties in this area, told the court she has been along almost every road in the county and that there are garbage dumps scattered everywhere. She suggested the court get busy and clean them up and keep them that way.

She reminded the court the county is not getting fees from franchisees as it should and is not budgeting money for solid waste collection. She suggested the county come up with franchising as it said it would in the garbage plan passed in 1986.

County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker told Ms. Blair the county would like to "leave things as they are," that the county looks much better than it did a year ago. The judge said there are two collection stations in the county where residents can take their garbage and both are busy.

The judge also pointed out the

court recently appointed a coordinator for the program (Lester Bullock) and he (the judge) believed things will work out. Bullock is county road supervisor.

Ms. Blair said she was aware that Bullock has been hired, but said it is a parttime job and she doubted the state would accept a parttime coordinator. "But we'll just have to wait and see how things work out," she said. One of the magistrates asked again if the court could leave "things as they are," and could the county cancel its plan and start over.

Ms. Blair said the county could amend, but not cancel, the plan, and stressed that the amendments to the plan must be accepted by the state after a review. She warned the court it would be wasting time to make changes the state obviously would not accept.

Ms. Blair read a check list of points which she said would be forwarded to the state office in Frankfort.

She reported she will tell the state office the court has not prepared a franchise document; that a question remains on the solid waste coordinator's parttime status, and the county has not started a Kentucky Clean Community Program campaign.

She explained the court will receive a letter from the state shortly pointing out officially where the county is not in compliance and giving the county a certain date to get in

favor of the big headlines. You could say: Who wants to read it? However, for those who comment from time to time and want to see what wasn't reported recently, here goes.

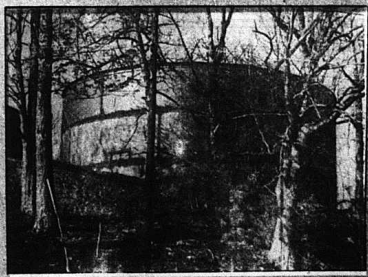

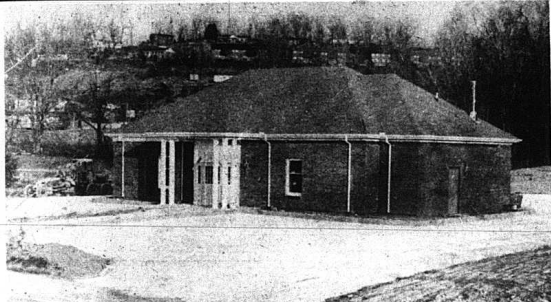

to go to Bath County and open a new plant there since there simply wasn't room for expansion at the local facility.

Plant officials have said that in no way will the new plant affect anything there.

the council Mayor Baker's husband is ill and there may be times when she would be unable to attend a meeting. He said the council should be able to complete city business in the mayor's absence.

The council approved a request by officials of VFW Post 5908 at Lake Linville to take over the two ball fields adjacent to the post and improve them for use by the public. The council also agreed to allow the post to extend its leased area by 20 feet in order for the post to expand its building.

The council approved an \$8,690 grant from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as its share of a \$15,000 de-chlorination project at the city sewer plant. The city will furnish \$7,110.

The state mandated the de-chlorination of water coming out of the sewer plant into Town Branch.

The council also agreed to purchase about a quarter of an acre of land adjacent to the sewer plant for \$1,500. The land belongs to Shirley Burton and is needed for sand boxes and a turning area for vehicles.

At an earlier called meeting, the council was told that Mrs. Ginger Fletcher has been appointed as executive director of the Mt. Vernon Housing Authority replacing Floyd Owens.

The Housing Authority board make the appointment. The city council chooses a chairman.

The board appoints a chairman and the chairman and board appoints the executive director and maintenance person. Board chairman is Bud Cox.

Board members are Bob Baker, Harry Harmon, Bobby Kendrick and Joe Korn. One board member is appointed or reappointed each year by the council for a four-year term.

filling vacancies should they occur." The filling of administrative positions is one area that could give the school system some difficulty. Since the school system must advertise all administrative positions for at least 30 days prior to filling the vacancy, this could place a bind upon hiring if several of those positions were to become vacant. This requirement is not statewide. It was part of the judgement against the local school board in the Sue Hamm case.

The deadline for teachers to retire, so they would not miss any of their benefits and would begin receiving them on time is May 1, according to Towery.

It does not appear that "27 and Out" will place the local system in an undesirable position. But if more teachers take advantage of the early retirement and more and more teachers move into the retirement category, as Superintendent Towery said, the potential is present.

ORDINANCE 540.0 - 540.4 For Citizens of Livingston

Adopted & Effective 4-5-87
As Set Forth in KRS Chapter 446

Section I. Parking on Main Streets and All Streets in the City of Livingston, Ky. No exception at any time. There will be no double parking, no parking on wrong side of street and/or the wrong way. No vehicle shall be parked on any side street in the City of Livingston, unless in a specified parking space. Therefore, no vehicle shall have tires parked on the blacktop on above said streets.

Section II. Parking of Vehicles in this manner is strictly prohibited any time. The only exception will be for loading or unloading freight.

Section III. Violation of Section One or Section Two of this Ordinance constitutes a misdemeanor, with a penalty of a fine not less than \$25 for each offense. Also violator shall be responsible for towing charges of vehicle and storage costs, if applicable.

Section IV. This ordinance shall be in full force and effective as of 4-15-88 at 7 p.m., as required by law on its adoption, approval, attestation and publication by law. All fines payable and due 10 days from issue to either Mayor Billy Medley or City Clerk, Rebecca Bullock.

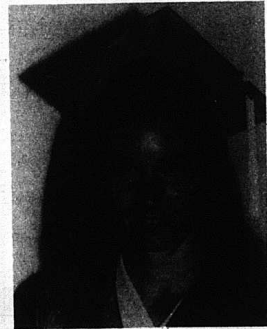

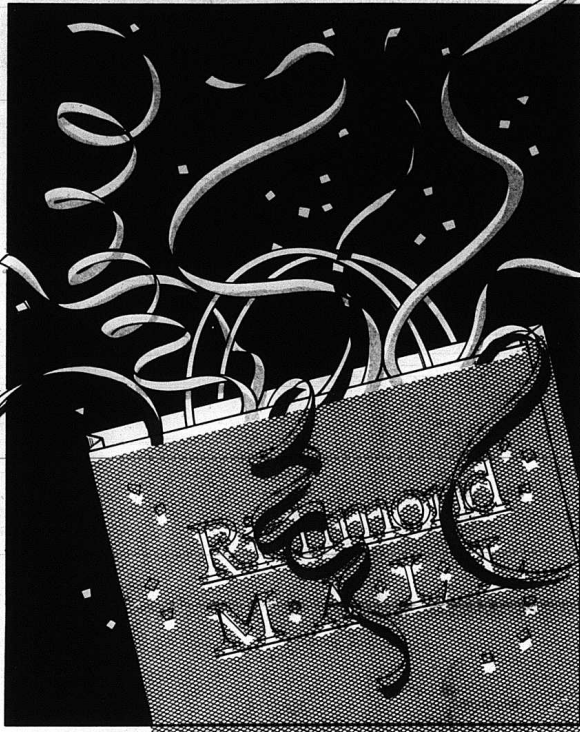

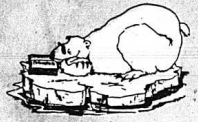

Should wild plants be protected just as some wild animals are?

Most people agree that some animals should be protected. That's why there are hunting seasons — to protect the populations of game animals. Most also agree that some nongame animals should be pro-

ected, like bald eagles.

But what about plants? Do you know any reasons why we should protect wild plants? Over half of prescription drugs contain substances derived from plants (aspirin

came from the willow), and yet only a fraction of the species of plants in the world have been analyzed for their medicinal properties — a darn good reason to protect wild plants! Farmers should be particularly

interested in protecting wild plants. Major crops are constantly being genetically altered to keep them disease resistant and increasing in yields. Much of this genetic material comes from wild plants, the relatives of modern crops. Seeds from native prairie plants have been used to create stronger hybrids of domestic wheat. In Asia, new hybrids have been developed from a few weedy types of wild rice that have boosted the value of rice harvests by as much as \$1.5 billion a year.

During the past several decades, research by plant geneticists and agronomists has enabled American farmers to produce over three times more corn per acre. Part of this increase is due to massive amounts of fertilizer and pesticides, but agricultural experts calculate that approximately three-fifths of the increase can be credited to the continuous redesign of corn's genetic composition. In 1970 as the result of a leaf-blight attack, a new variety of corn was developed by crossbreeding with a disease resistant species of corn originally from Mexico. Another new species of Mexican "wild" corn has been discovered that is a perennial and is already being crossbred with traditional corn, hopefully producing a perennial hybrid. If America's corn crop were a perennial, coming up each spring like daffodils, farmers would not have to plow and plant every year and

would save about \$300 million in diesel fuel. Most importantly, the wild corn is highly immune to at least four of eight major viruses and diseases that now cause \$500 million in damage each year. There are similar stories about wheat, barley, tomatoes, oranges, and other modern crops.

With the increase in oil prices several years ago, scientists began looking at plants for sources of lubricants and oils. The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently screened

6,400 plants for new oils and waxes. They found 460 promising ones, including the buffalo gourd and the joboba shrub of the deserts of northern Mexico and the American southwest. Wild plants have been found that can be used for manufacturing fibers, detergents, starches, and even improved golf balls.

We are still identifying new species in Kentucky. An exciting discovery from Lewis County several years ago was the Kentucky lady's slipper orchid, an extremely large white lady's slipper now known from at least ten counties in eastern Kentucky. May of the full-grown plants stand waist high, and their creamy-white pouches are nearly as large as a man's fist.

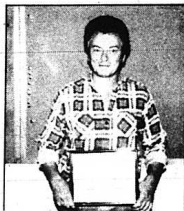

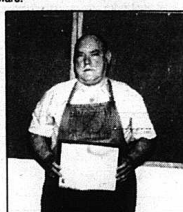

Choose Good Nutrition - Choose Cereal Wisely

Many of us eat cereal for breakfast and a lot of us eat it more than once in a day, often as a bedtime snack. But with the multitude of varieties in the market, making the healthiest choice isn't easy. Some of us want a cereal that's high in fiber; others look for one low in sugar. And, of course, we expect our cereals to be low in fat and most, except granola, are.

To make good choices, learn to read cereal packages for sugar, fiber and fat content. Nutrient information is mainly on the bottom portion of the cereal box's side panel, marked "Carbohydrate Information."

Here is an example from the box of one ready-to-eat cereal. Information is provided for the cereal itself and for cereal with milk added. Note that sugar content increases when milk is added because of milk sugar or lactose contributed by the milk.

| Strawberry Squares Carbohydrate Information | Cereal | With 1/2 Cup Skim Milk |

| Total Carbohydrates | 23 grams | 29 grams |

Carbohydrates are the chief component of cereals. The label divides total carbohydrate content into three categories: complex carbohydrates, sucrose

and other sugars and dietary fiber.

The best choices for many of us would be cereals fairly high in complex carbohydrates and dietary fiber and low in sucrose and other sugars. Much of the sugar in cereals is added by the manufacturer in the form of table sugar or sucrose, honey, brown sugar and corn syrup.

Although the label doesn't tell you the percentage of total carbohydrates from sugar, you can calculate this by dividing the grams of sucrose and other sugars by grams of total carbohydrate and multiplying by 100. For example, using the carbohydrate in a box of Strawberry Squares, one fifth is from sugar. (Five grams divided by 23 grams equals 21 or 21 percent.)

Fiber is another item to look for on cereal labels. Many experts suggest eating 25 to 40 grams a day. Fiber from cereals can help increase our total intake, which for most of us is low. However, fiber should come from a variety of food, including fruits and vegetables and dried beans and peas.
