Grass tetany is a result of a magnesium deficiency in the cow. Weather and soil fertility seem to be factors. Grass tetany occurs when soil tem-perature is between 40 and 60 degrees and often during changeable weather. High levels of nitrogen, potassium and moisture in the soil increase the incidence, because they apparently decrease the level of magnesium found in plants naturally

Symptoms of the disorder usually begin with nervousness and then progress to a stilted gait, staggering, convulsions, coma and death. It alconvuisions, coma and death. It al-ways requires immediate veterinary treatment.

About two-thirds of cows treated intravenously with nagnesium and calcium compounds recover. However, to prevent relapses, treated cows should be removed from the pasture. They should be fed hay and grain plus two ounces of magnesium

oxide daily for at least a week.

Because animals do not store up magnesium, their dietary requirements have to be supplied on a dayto-day basis. The only way to prevent grass tetany is to supplement the diet with additional magnesium. This can be done with commercial minera mixes containing magnesium or with homemade mixtures. Mixing 1 part magnesium oxide, 1 part trace min-eral salt and 1 part dry molasses or soy bean meal will do fine if this is the cattle's only source of salt. Tobacco Bed Bugs—A Site Prob-

Tobacco bugs usually are found in Tobacco bugs usually are found in the areas surrounding seed beds. Checking key places around beds will enable the grower to correct the problem before plants are badly

Beds that are surrounded by woods or previously planted fields offer the flea beetle more chances to invade seedlings. The beetle will not be-come active until late April or early May, however, inspecting leaves for feeding damage will permit applica-

tion of a leaf spray if needed.

Rock or trash piles are perfect places for slugs to live. When these are close to seed beds the slugs can readily feed on the plants. Elimina-tion of such rock piles is the best method to avoid the slug problem. However, if this is not possible, slug baits aid in control. Slug populations also thrive in alfalfa and clover fields and will pose a problem for seed beds planted nearby.

Thick, low-growing weeds found along bed margins harbor cutworms which also like to feed on tobacco seedlings. By inspecting the borders, early damage detection and treatment is possible.

As with all insecticides, care must be taken to follow directions carefully and if questions arise, contact your county extension office.

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

Talking it over

State warns fiscal court about county waste plan

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court needs to be more active in its garbage program, Cathy Blair of the Office of Solid Waste Management, told the court during an unofficial meeting Thursday, and added the court "is out of compliance" on some points.

"The court has been pretty passive in the past," she said. "You've got to say what you are going to do. You

Ms. Blair, who is in charge of the state's solid waste program for eight counties in this area, told the court she has been along almost every road in the county and that there are garage dumps scattered everywho he suggested the court get busy a clean them up and keep them that

She reminded the court the county is not getting fees from franchises as it should and is not budgeting money for solid waste collection. She suggested the county come up with fran-chising as it said it would in the garbage plan passed in 1986. County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker told Ms. Blair the county

would like to "leave things as they are," that the county looks much better than it did a year ago. The judge said there are two collection stations in the county where residents busy.

The judge also pointed out the

court recently appointed a coordina-tor for the program (Luster Bullock) and he (the judge) believed things will work out. Bullock is county road

supervisor.

Ms. Blair said she was aware that Bullock has been hired, but said it is a parttime job and she doubted the state would accept a parttime coordi

sale would accept a partime condi-nator. "But we'll just have to wait and see how things work out," she said. One of the magistrates asked again if the court could leave "things as they are," and could the county can-cel its plan and start over.

Ms. Blair said the county could

But what about plants? Do you know any reasons why we should protect wild plants? Over half of prescription drugs contain substances derived from plants (aspirin

Major crops are constantly being genetically altered to keep them disease resistant and increasing in yields. Much of this genetic material comes from wild plants, the relatives of modern crops. Seeds from native prairie plants have been used to creative the constant of the plants and the constant of ate stronger hybrids of domestic wheat. In Asia, new hybrids have been developed from a few weedy

types of wild rice that have boosted

the value of rice harvests by as much as \$1.5 billion a year.

During the past several decades, research by plant geneticists and agronomists has enabled American farmers to produce over three times. mers to produce over three times more corn per acre. Part of this in-crease is due to massive amounts of fertilizer and pesticides, but agricultural experts calculate that approximately three-fifths of the increase can be credited to the continuous redesign of corn's genetic composition. In 1970 as the result of a leafblight attack, a new variety of corn was developed by crossbreeding with a disease resistant species of corn originally from Mexico. An-other new species of Mexican "wild" corn has been discovered that is a perennial and is already being crossbred with traditional corn, hopefully producing a perennial hybrid, If America's corn crop were a perennial, coming up each spring like daffodils, farmers would not have to plow and plant every year and

would save about \$300 million in diesel fuel. Most importantly, the wild corn is highly immune to at least four of eight major viruses and dis eases that now cause \$500 million in damage each year. There are similar stories about wheat, barley, toma-toes; oranges, and other modern

With the increase in oil prices several years ago, scientists began looking at plants for sources of lubri-cants and oils. The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently screened

Choose Good Nutrition - Choose Cereal Wisely

Many of us cat cereal for breakfast and a lot of us eat it more than once in a day, often as a bedtime snack. But with the multitude of varieties in the market, making the healthiest choice isn't easy. Some of us wanta cereal that's high in filter others look for one low in sugar. And, of course, we expect our cereals to be low in fat and most, except granola, are.

To make good choices, learn to read cereal packages for sugar, fiber and fat content. Nutrient information is mainly on the bottom portion of the cereal box's side panel, marked "Carbohydrate Information."

Here is an example from the box of one ready-ho-cat cereal. Information is provided for the cereal itself and for cereal with milk added. Note that sugar content increases when milk is added because of milk sugar or lactose contributed by the milk.

Carbohydrates are the chief component of cereals. The label divides total carbohydrate content into three categories: complex carbohydrates, sucrose

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and other sugars and dietary fiber.

The best choices for many of us would be cereals fairly high in complex carbohydrates and dietary fiber and low in sucrose and other sugars. Much of the sugar in cereals is added by the manufacturer in the form of table sugar or sucrose, honey, brown sugar and corn syrup.


Although the label doesn't let! you the percentage of total carbohydrates from sugar, you can calculate this by dividing the grams of sucrose and other sugars by grams of total carbohydrates upon the sugars by grams of total carbohydrates upon the sugars of sucrose and other sugars by grams of total carbohydrates and multiplying by 100. For example, using the carbohydrate in abox of Strawberry Squares, one fifth is from sugar. (Five grams divided by 23 grams equals .21 or 21 percent.)

Fiber is another item to look for on cereal sleels. Many experts suggest eating 25 to 40 grams a day. Fiber from cereals can help increase our total intake, which for most of us is low. However, fiber should come from a variety of food, including fruits and vegetables and dried beans and peas.

Cattle farmers need to aware of grass tetany during early grazing

Adult beef cows nursing young calves while grazing grass or small grain pastures in later winter or early spring are especially susceptible to spring are especially susceptible to an extremely acute disorder known as grass tetany. Affected cattle can die suddenly and in fact are fre-quently found dead before the disor-der is discovered.

Although in some seasons, Kentucky farmers experience losses due to grass tetany from November to April, cows are more susceptible in the later winter and early spring when they graze heavily on the nev growth of grass and refuse other feed offered to them. Each loss is espe-cially damaging, because it is invariably a big, sleek cow with a healty young calf that dies. Cont to B-6 "Wild Plants"

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


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
