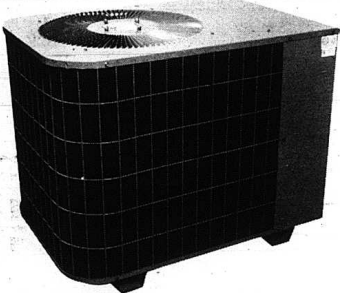

SWEET LAND OF COOKIES

My country tis of thee, sweet land of cookies!
Our country is a land of cookie monsters. Americans crunch more than two billion pounds of cookies annually. That averages to more than 300 cookies a year for every man, woman and child.

Although there are many varieties, most cookies are based on the same three ingredients: sugar, flour and fat in the form of shortening.

The difference is in the ratios of these three ingredients and the amount of other additives, such as chocolate chips and creme fillings. That's what accounts for the fact that one half-ounce cookie has as many as 90 calories while another kind of cookie of the same weight has just 65 calories.

In most cases, the information on the package is little help because it doesn't provide the number of calories per cookie and the percentage calories that come from fat.

To give you an idea of what you are getting from your favorites, this list of best selling varieties will assist you.

If you're a monster for softer cookies, the softer the cookie, the higher the fat content. The extra fat is what helps to soften the cookie. Compare the weight of cookies. There may be no difference in calories between several kinds of cookies, but with some brands, more of those calories come from fat. Since fat contains more calories per gram than sugar and flour, you get less cookie for the same amount of calories.

Selecting lower-calories, lower-fat cookies may be an option if you're really worried. Such types of cookies are vanilla wafers, graham crackers, ginger snaps, and fig bars. Each cookie contains less than 30 percent caloric fat, and even smaller amounts of calories.

But, who can eat just one cookie?

Finding that your child has elevated cholesterol or triglycerides is only the beginning. Families must make the effort to change eating patterns to bring the abnormal values into line. It is indeed a big job to change a lifetime of eating habits and to learn new ways to cook appetizing meals. However, preventing the premature death of your child or yourself obviously makes it worth the effort.

Many schools are teaching children about food groups and nutrition right from kindergarten or first grade. This is good and may show up in better health statistics for the next generation.

Soil Conservation

With the plowing season coming up, many farmers have been confused concerning the regulations of the 1985 Farm Bill.

A big help for the Rockcastle County tobacco producers came with the 2 acre and less exemption for tobacco. When a producer completes a 1026 and certifies that he uses a rotation, plants across the slope and uses cover crops, he is exempt from obtaining a conservation plan for all tobacco patches 2 acres and less on his farm. In other words, he can plow when and where he wants as long as it is less than 2 acres and for tobacco.

When the producer completes the 1026 for his farm and it is necessary for him to crop a field that doesn't have any crop history, that field falls

under the sodbuster provision of the 1985 Farm Bill. If the field is determined highly erodible he must obtain a conservation plan for that field from the S.C.S. This does not mean the field cannot be plowed.

If the field in question has crop history it falls under the compliance provision of the farm bill. Under this provision the field must have a conservation plan before 1990 from SCS.

Appointments for these conservation plans can be made at the SCS office on Richmond Street. Considering that nearly all farms in Rockcastle County will need a plan your cooperation in making these appointments will assure that everyone will have a conservation plan before the deadline.

Busy time in circuit court; 2 sentenced

A Rockcastle County Circuit Court jury found Otis Kirby guilty of criminal mischief in the second degree and public intoxication in action last week.

Kirby, 26, of Chestnut Ridge, had been indicted last year on five counts for an incident involving Charles Prickett.

According to the indictment, Kirby allegedly pointed a .22 caliber pistol at Prickett, hit him with his fists and struck his car with an ax.

Besides the guilty verdicts, Kirby was found not guilty of two counts of wanton endangerment in the first degree and fourth degree assault.

Circuit Judge Dan Venters sentenced Kirby on April 12 to six months in the county jail and a \$252 fine.

Calvin Moore of Mt. Vernon pleaded guilty last week in Rockcastle Circuit Court to fourth degree assault.

The 61-year-old man had been indicted for first degree assault in January by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury, after he allegedly shot his son-in-law Ben Durham on Jan. 15.

Circuit Judge Dan Venters gave Moore a 30 day suspended sentence and fined him \$50 plus court costs.

A traffic accident on Ky. 70 in Rockcastle County Tuesday night resulted in a driving under the influence citation for a local man.

According to State Police at the London Post, Ned S. Purcell of the Old Broadhead-Mt. Vernon road was traveling east on Ky. 70 when he lost control of his vehicle, hit an embankment and overturned, at about 9 p.m. Sunday night.

Purcell was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital and later transferred to St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington by the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service.

Tractor accident

Raymond Brown of Ottawa escaped serious injury Monday night after a tractor struck him on his farm on Ottawa road.

According to a family member, Brown set the brake on his tractor and got off to open a gate. While he was attempting to open the gate the brake released and the tractor rolled down the hill.

A garden has the potential to increase food stamp benefits in two ways.

"The harvest may well provide substantially more food than that which could be purchased with the food stamps at the grocery store," Robinson said.

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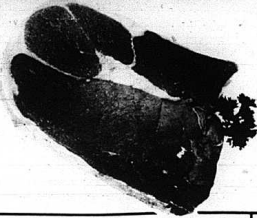

Firemen's Column

Outdoor burning!!!

Outdoor burning is an idea that can spread like wildfire. A little preparation can make a safe difference. Check with your local fire authorities before you burn any size materials. If burning is allowed, make sure your fire is properly contained and supervised.

Never leave the fire unattended. Never burn on a windy day. Use a metal barrel in good condition. Add a hinged and weighted mesh screen to prevent debris from escaping from the barrel. Punch air holes about one inch in diameter near the bottom of the barrel to ensure more thorough burning. Clear a recommended safe area around the barrel. Three feet on all sides should be sufficient.

If your fire escapes, you may be liable for the firefighting costs and damages.

For information before burning, contact your local fire department.

Have you ever wondered how your local volunteer fire department operates like a boss? I do. Everyday some departments cease to operate because contributions cease to exist.

This misuse of gasoline for washing mechanical parts creates an explosive air mixture that only requires a source of ignition. A pilot light flame or a spark from an electric switch or motor will do. Kerosene is safer for this task.

Tragically, thousands of people are killed or injured and property destroyed every year because of ignorance of the lethal qualities of this familiar liquid.

Do not use gasoline in a confined room or near open flame. Do not put gasoline into heating stoves. They will explode. Do not store any flammable liquids in the home or near any heat source. A flammable or combustible is self explanatory. It will burn. Always practice safety.

agriculture economists.

"The rate for some rural counties may be under the real value by as much as five times the real rate," said Jerry Skees, who along with John Prestinger compared the official unemployment rate with the actual unemployment rate in 19 south central Kentucky counties.

The two found that for the entire 19-county area, the official unemployment rate was 7.5 percent, but the actual rate was 38 percent.

"The significance of the disparity is that these counties, as well as other rural counties, may not receive the same level of federal benefits as more urban counties," Skees said. Currently, the county unemployment rate is used to determine the level of two federal programs, Skees said.

Administration uses the rate in making decisions about granting federal contracts. Preferences are given to counties with high unemployment rates," Skees said.

In addition, federal job training program are based on the official unemployment figure, Skees said. Perhaps more important than the two programs that are tied directly to the Bureau of Labor Statistic's figures is the sense of economic well being portrayed to policy makers by the use of the official figures, he said.

"When policy makers decide what federal projects are needed to bolster local economies, they may find that the rural unemployment rate is so low that they don't need to act," Skees said.

The agricultural economists found the reason for the difference between the official rate and the real rate is the process by which people are counted in the unemployed ranks.

"The official rate assumes that the unemployed are those who are not working but have applied for jobs within the previous six weeks. In rural areas, where jobs are scarce, it is likely that many of the unemployed will not find jobs to apply for within a six week period and become discouraged workers," Skees said.

date on the coupons, those stamps not immediately needed when the garden comes in may be saved and used

later." Obviously some of Kentucky's 172,000 families enrolled in the food stamp program have insufficient space for a garden but a significant number could grow items in small backyard plots or in pots or planters on the porch.

Mini-gardens, small plots of land with rows planted closely together, are becoming increasingly popular with people wanting to grow their own fruits and vegetables, the commissioner said. "Others are growing their produce in containers such as clay flower pots or wooden planters."

There is no minimum or maximum limitation on use of food stamps for this purpose, and seeds or plants may be purchased whenever recipients have available coupons.

"By growing their own carrots, lettuce, tomatoes or other vegetables

and fruits, families can reduce their food purchases and save food stamps they receive during and after the harvest period," Robinson said. "These coupons may then be used during the winter months, when food consumption rises and demands increase for spendable income for things such as utility bills, winter clothing or Christmas gifts."

Seeds, garden plants and fruit trees may be purchased from any Kentucky grocery or other food store approved to accept food stamps. Farm supply warehouses, lawn and garden centers and discount stores that sell plants and seeds usually are not authorized to accept food stamps as payment for these items.

Recipients or merchants with questions regarding the allowance of seed or plant purchases with food stamps may contact any local Department for Social Insurance office.

list" of all projects under way, planned and in some cases only hoped for over the next six years.

A state law says the legislature can delete parts of the plan. The law implies, but does not say directly, that the plan cannot be implemented unless the General Assembly approves it.

However, Transportation secretary Milo D. Bryant said he was forced to delay some projects because the previous administration authorized more projects than it had money to pay for. As noted, Ky. 461 is not one of them.

Bryant said the plan contained several new projects but that major additions, including some major Eastern Kentucky roads that Gov. Wallace Wilkinson promised in his campaign last year would not be financed because of lack of money.

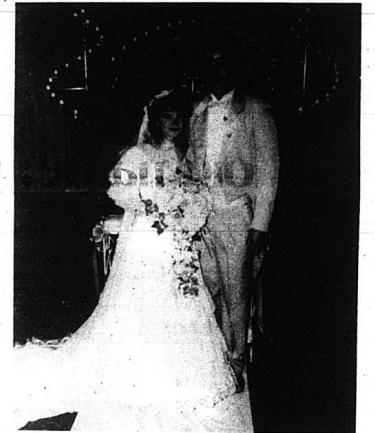

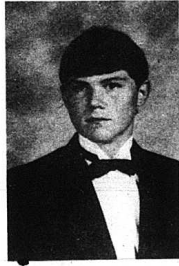
