Salvation is a Gift-Take it.

For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord' (Rom. 6:23). 

"The 1986 tobacco reform act has reduced the amount of burley going to the pool, and our farmers are feeling the benefits of that now. I hope that as foreign markets continue to open up and prices and quotas strengthen, the outlook for tobacco will continue to improve.

The assessment, to be announced officially today by the U.S. department of Agriculture, is half the size of last year's assessment, Hopkins said. Then on-net cost assessment is a fee levied to cover the government's costs for buying surplus tobacco through grower cooperatives.

School Improvement Act Will Help **Fifth District Schools**

While all of us know that the key to improving our schools is local involvement by parents and citizens, we also need to continue providing adequate funding. In our district, where openvity is too high and education needs an extra boost, the federal government has an important role to play in helping us help ourselves. This week, I joined the overwhelming majority of the House and Serane in voting for important legislation which will continue our assault on our nation's and our region's educational shortcomings. Called the "School Improvement Act," this legislation will extend the major federal elementary and secondary education programs now in place. But the bill also creates some new approaches to solving some of our education problems which should help us here in the Fifth District.

One such innovation is "concentration grants," which will be to pareet

One such involvation is "concentration grants," which will help target funding at school districts with a higher percentage of low-income students. Another new idea is the "even start" program to help disadvantaged children (aged 1-7) by assisting schools in setting up special programs for kids and their parents.

kids and their parents.

Another way this legislation will help is by helping bring new technology to our schools. A program called "star schools" will give grants to state and local agencies, colleges and school groups to begin bringing satellite technology into the classroom, thus gring our schools more access to computer information and to educational television programming.

To help light the increase in drug usage among young people, the Drug Free Schools and Comunities program will continue through 1993. Money will be made available for drug and alcohol education and preven-tion, as well as special treatment centers for teens who are at high risk of becoming involved in substance abuse.

The legislation will also continue important programs which provide adult and vocational education. The bill also continues funding to help adult and vocational education. The bill also continues funding to help strengthen our math and science teaching, including funds to help train new teachers for these critical specialties.

But the federal government has its responsibilities in this area as well, and I am confident the passage of the School Improvement Act will benefit every school in our region in the coming years.

Manganese Toxicity in Tobacco—a pH problem By: Tom Mills County Extension Agent for Agriculture

Tobacco producers in Kentucky lose about \$30 million a year in yield reductions because of manganese toxicity in their crops. Manganese toxicity results from low soil pH. Ken Wells, Extension Agronomist with the U.K. College of Agriculture in the control of the said, "Specialists have changed their liming recommendations this year to include enough to raise the pH to 6.6 from last year's 6.4. The pH level naturally drops when fertilizer is applied. This increases the acidity of soil. When the soil warms, bacte

ria digest organic matter that releases acids that reduce pH levels further". It's not too late to lime fields if they need it. It just has to be mixed in more thoroughly than before. Farmers who use five tons or more split the load in half. They should turn under the first half and then spread the rest and disk it in. Farmers who use two or ee tons should disk the lime in two ections to blend it in with the soil

If manganese toxicity does de-velop in the field, the farmer can spread fine sacked lime on the field before cultivation. This method only offers a fifty-fifty chance of working, but it is effective when it does.

Eastern Tent Caterpillars On the Limb Throughout

A caterpillar that builds unsightly webs in the crotches of trees has been noticed this week throughout the state. But as ugly as the Eastern tent caterpillar's habits are, it does not threaten trees other than those that are less than two years old, according to Doug Johnson, University of

to Doug Johnson, University of Kentucky Extension entomologist. The insects build silky webs in trees. During the day, they feed on emerging leaves and if the popula-tion is large enough, they may strip the tree bare.

However, only young trees will suffer enough stress from their feeding to cause the tree's death. Older rees will send out new leaves by the ime the caterpillar is readying itself to become a moth and will recover. Control is warranted only for

young landscape trees. Johnson rec-ommends using any one of a number of products containing Baccilus thu-ringingiensis (Dipel), a naturally occurring bacteria that causes dis-

Opinions about to tilet training vary from country to country and advice shoul it varies from grandmother to uncle to baby sitter, a couple of recent studies from Finland and New Zeal-and have shed light on, if not dried up the problem. the problem.

It was found that almost 10% (9.8%) of seven year olds still had problems with bladder control, most (9.3%) to severly gue a rous sain may problems with bladder control, most with wetting the bed at night. If eather had had wetting problems at age four years, the child was seven times more likely to have the same problem at age seven. If the mother had similar problems at age four, the child was five times as likely to still dwas five times as likely to still the problems. have problems at seven. Low birth-weight children, and those slow to are were at further increased risk

Other studies have suggested that trying to toilet train children too early in life can increase the risk of bed-

in life can increase the risk on we wetting.

These studies seem to show that the problem of bedwetting is more common than usually thought. Treatment is available in various forms including medication and behavioral modification devices and methods. You should seek advice, but also realize that the problem is more common than you probably though. Be supportive of your child and give positive rewards for dry nights. We would like the problem to be over as much as you would.



"Student teaching experience is required in Kentucky before a college graduate may be certified," Rush said. "At EKU, we've designed our program to ensure that our stu-dents are well prepared for this expe-

Students preparing for teaching careers at EKU may also gain practi-cal classroom experience at Model Laboratory School before student teaching. Model is the only university-operated laboratory school in Kentucky. It is dsigned to provide educational experiences for future teachers otherwise unavailable.

FmHA ready for 88 lending season

Robert W. Homstby, County Supervisor of the McKee office announced today that farmers should begin early this year making plans for needed operating credit. According to Homsby, the Farmers Bome Administration has funds available to cover farm operating needs of most family sized operations in this area. The agency has made a major shift away from direct lending to a government guaranteed program involving local banks as the source of the money, with the government backing the loans up to a 90% loss. The guaranteed program is a way to continue providing financing to farmers while serving as a means to saving direct outlays by the government during these times of budgetary restraint.

Weevils are being found across state

A small insect that has been known to destroy up to 50 percent of a hay crop is being found throughout the state and farmers are urged to check their fields for signs of its presence.

This week we have reports that alfalfa weevils are very active throughout Kentucky. And because most crops are still very immature, the common method of cutting the field early to control the insects may not be feasible," said Chris Chris-tensen, University of Kentucky Ex-tension entomologist.

tension entomologist.

The green insects vary in length from 1/32 inch to 3/8 of inch, although so far most found are at the smaller end of the range, he said.

Symptoms of the weevil's presence include chewing damage on the trowing time.



Students will be given KentuckyEssential Skills Test May 2-6

The Kentucky Essential Skills Test will be administered to all stu-dents in Rockcastle Schools the week of May 2-6.

These dates are determined by law, which states that the KEST must be administered between the 160th and 170th instructional school days. All students in grades K-12 will be

tested in the basic skills areas of read-ing, mathematics, spelling, writing, and library/research reference.

In addition students in grades 3-12 will take the Test of Cognitive Skills will take the 1 est of Cognitive Skills (TCS). The TCS is an aptitude type test which measures skills in se-quences, analogies, memory and verbal reasoning. The TCS assists in estimating the potential ability of a student. That potential ability can then be compared to the actual sephianet score. achieved score

Results from the KEST are used in monitoring the progress of individ-ual students, individual classes and entire grade membership at both the school and district levels. Test results are also utilized for placement pur-poses in the various special pro-

Parents can assist the testing effort by promoting the following recom-mendations: Recognize the importance of the testing program and support the effort; promote atten-dance in which students will be re-

quired to make up the test if absent; stress the importance of getting proper rest prior to test administra-tion because students need to get a good night's sleep and eat breakfast on test administration days: contact your school when the fall term begins


