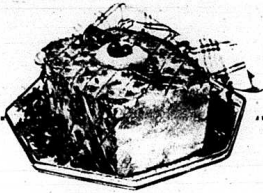

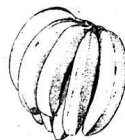

Two shot in fracas

Two counts of first-degree assault have been filed against a county man after he allegedly shot two men as they drove by in a pick-up truck.

Charged is John Lamb, 35, of Route 2, Mt. Vernon. He is charged with shooting Gary Griffin, 25, and Jesse Mason, 27, both of Livingston. State Police reported Griffin and Mason were driving on U.S. 25 near Calloway about 8 p.m. Sunday when Lamb, reportedly sitting beside the road opened fire with a rifle, according to Gilbert Acciardo Jr., spokesman at the London Post.

Mason was shot twice in the chest and Griffin once in the shoulder. Both were treated at Rockcastle Hospital and released.

Acciardo said the shooting was the result of a dispute between the three men.

Lamb is in Rockcastle County Jail in one of two \$25,000 cash bonds pending a hearing May 4 in District Court.

It's never over "till it's over, football coach Vince Lombardi once said, and that appears to be the case with the sport of water skiing on Lake Linville.

In a vote of 250 to 166 residents of Mt. Vernon said "no" to water skiing on the lake, but it's apparently not over yet. The council seems to be in the mood to allow skiing in spite of the vote.

After the vote was counted at a called meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night, a lively discussion ensued.

Numbered among the remarks: It's a survey, not a vote. The council should decide sking and not by a poll, I say, let's vote now. The ballot wasn't worded right, I don't think the whole story was told. Still, 166 want sking. Who all went around soliciting votes, not me.

Although no action was taken, indications were if a vote had been taken Monday night, by the council it would have been 4 to 2 in favor of sking. The council will make a final decision on the matter at its regular meeting May 9.

However, it may do proponents little good if sking is voted. Conceivably, the mayor could cast a veto if she so desired. If she did veto the ordinance allowing sking, it would take one more than a majority to override. In the case of Mt. Vernon, it would take five votes. The mayor has not indicated any action she plans to take.

It should be pointed out that a legal opinion will have to be made on the mayor's veto power.

Mayor Elizabeth Baker told the council they had approved of using the Signal to advertise the survey and she thought the council planned to abide by the results.

She got silence from the council. The mayor then said she thought the council should wait until the regular session in May before voting. One councilman agreed. No one else suggested a Monday night vote.

Mayor Baker reminded the council she does not intend to tie a tie. She also commented that a lot of time has been spent on the subject of water skiing and she hoped the council would move along to "more important business."

"We have many problems that are very important to the city that we should be trying to solve," she said. "We should move along to more

A few figures: A total of 416 persons replied to the survey. They were required to be living in the city limits and to be at least 18 years old. A check with County Clerk Norma Houk shows there are 2,780 voters in the four Mt. Vernon precincts. However, not all voters in the precincts live in the city limits.

Not counted were two ballots from Brodhead. Seven ballots came in after the 3 p.m. Monday deadline. One ballot was signed but the person failed to indicate a preference. Two ballots were spoiled.

In other action Monday night, the council approved a second reading of an ordinance establishing rules on how to conduct a meeting in the absence of the mayor. It becomes law after publication in this week's Signal.

Under the ordinance, a member of the council will be chosen by the council to conduct the meeting in the absence of the mayor. The mayor has 30 days in which to rescind an action taken during the meeting if she did not attend.

The council voted to construct a chain link fence around a pump station in Chestnut Hills Subdivision as cheaply as possible. The fence is to especially protect children who might wander into the area where there are electric circuits.

The route would connect with I-75 at Renfro Valley using the Mt. Vernon bypass of Ky. 461 as the final connector.

New elementary school may be completed early

A bill that would allow the new Mt. Vernon Elementary School to be constructed in one phase instead of three has been passed by the General Assembly, according to a report by State Rep. Danny Ford.

Ford, the sponsor of House Bill 657 that allows a new school survey to be done by the Kentucky Department of Education, said that Rockcastle County will now be eligible for about \$5.2 million.

"This will allow the entire elementary school facility to be completed in one phase," Ford added.

Originally, because of a lack of funds, the school had been scheduled to be constructed in the three phases with the gymnasium the final stage of construction. With the advent of additional funding, the \$4.2 million needed for the project is now available.

According to Ford, "increased bonding potential and an increase in money available from the state will more than allow the construction of

the plan proposed spending \$125,000 in the coming fiscal year for the route study.

The road has been a project of Lincoln County Judge/Executive John Sims, who said he was satisfied with the inclusion of the study which will begin July 1.

State Rep. Danny Ford said he was encouraged by the study and would

be happy to see the new highway since it would further open the area to tourism and industry.

Several projects are included in the six-year plan in Rockcastle and will be reported in the Signal when the list is available. The DOT plan is usually referred to as a "wish list" of projects that could be done as time and money allow.

At a statewide transportation forum conducted in Frankfort by the Transportation Cabinet, several items in District 8 were mentioned. Rockcastle is in that district.

Watch out for buried cable

Underground cable being accidentally dug up and damaged as a result of local construction and building activities represents a continuing problem for Contel.

Bill Dezarm, local manager for the telephone company, indicated that this has accounted for several service outages in the Rockcastle County area over the past few weeks.

"Burying cable is one of the safest

and most effective ways we have of providing reliable telephone service," said Dezarm. "But, when damaged or cut, it can be more difficult to repair. Although we can usually make repairs within a very few hours, in some cases it can take days."

Cable has the potential of being tragically serious if telephone customers are cut off from hospital, police and fire services.

Costs associated with the repair of cut cables either becomes an operating cost for Contel, which is ultimately reflected in customer bills, or an extra cost to contractors who have to pay the cost of repairs to the cable they have damaged.

With the arrival of nice weather, the pace of outside construction work increases. Dezarm encourages contractors or anyone who plans to dig near buried cable routes to call the repair service number in the front of the telephone directory before you dig. A telephone company employee will be dispatched to spot and mark the cable at no charge.

Traffic report

A total of 235 Rockcastle motorists were issued citations for traffic violations during March, according to Kentucky State Police.

A total of 15 were issued for driving under the influence of intoxicants.

Twenty-two traffic accidents were investigated. There was one fatal accident. 18 criminal investigations were made resulting in five criminal arrests.

In the area of the London Post 1,498 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations, including 114 for driving under influence of intoxicants.

Assess burley at two cents

The no-net cost assessment for burley will be 2 cents a pound for 1988, U.S. Rep. Larry Hopkins of Lexington announced yesterday.

"Things are looking up for burley farmers," Hopkins said in a news release late yesterday afternoon. "The 1986 tobacco reform act has reduced the amount of burley going to the pool, and our farmers are feeling the benefits of that now. I hope that as foreign markets continue to open up and prices and quotas strengthen, the outlook for tobacco will continue to improve."

The assessment, to be announced officially today by the U.S. department of Agriculture, is half the size of last year's assessment, Hopkins said. The no-net cost assessment is a fee levied to cover the government's costs for buying surplus tobacco through grower cooperatives.

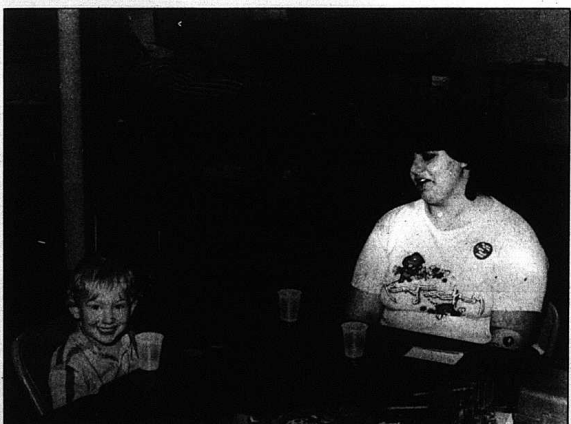
The actual assessment was placed at 1.6 cents a pound, but there will be an additional assessment of four-tenths of a cent a pound—a provision that now applies for this year only—as required by the Budget Reconciliation Act.

The 2-cent assessment will be divided evenly between growers and processors, with each paying 1 cent a pound.

"We're pleased with that," said Henry West, president of the Council for Burley Tobacco. "That'll be a net gain for the farmer of 1 cent."

"We need every cent we can get. The profit's very slim in tobacco now, so we need any improvement we can get."

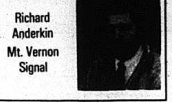

There are now 187 persons working at the hospital. They are paid \$2.6 million in wages, wages that are in turn spent in this community. When the \$3.5 million expansion is completed, 71 new employees will be hired with an additional \$1 million in wages.

The hospital also gives people a chance to stay at home and work where otherwise they would have to leave town.

It was only a few years back that the hospital was having the kind of problems that most rural hospitals have, and that is financial.

But through the efforts of the board and employees they turned things around. Not only is the hospital a

A Weekly Report from Fifth District Congressman Hal Rogers



School Improvement Act Will Help Fifth District Schools

While all of us know that the key to improving our schools is local involvement by parents and citizens, we also need to ensure providing adequate funding. In our district, where poverty is too high and education needs an extra boost, the federal government has an important role to play in helping us help ourselves. This week, I joined the overwhelming majority of the House and Senate in voting for important legislation which will continue our assault on our nation's and our region's educational shortcomings.

Called the "School Improvement Act," this legislation will extend the major federal elementary and secondary education programs now in place. But the bill also creates some new approaches to solving some of our education problems which should help us here in the Fifth District.

One such innovation is "concentration grants" which will help target funding at school districts with a higher percentage of low-income students. Another new idea is the "even start" program to help disadvantaged children (aged 1-7) by assisting schools in setting up special programs for kids and their parents.

Another way this legislation will help is by helping bring new technology to our schools. A program called "star schools" will give grants to state and local agencies, colleges and school groups to begin bringing satellite technology into the classroom, thus giving our schools more access to computer information and to educational television programming.

To help fight the increase in drug usage among young people, the Drug Free Schools and Communities program will continue through 1993. Money will be made available for drug and alcohol education and prevention, as well as special treatment centers for teens who are at high risk of becoming involved in substance abuse.

The legislation will also continue important programs which provide adult and vocational education. The bill also continues funding to help strengthen our math and science teaching, including funds to help train new teachers for these critical specialties.

When the House approved this education bill, we were also able to solve another problem of interest to many in our district—the availability of pornography over the telephone. I cosponsored legislation to outlaw this so-called "dial-a-porn," and thanks to a Senate amendment attached to this education bill which the House also approved, this legislation now totally bans all such obscenity. This will help protect thousands of children from such filth, and I am hopeful the amendment approved in this legislation will withstand any future court tests.

State and local government and the involvement of local citizens are still the most important factors in the success of our schools. The work of volunteer groups like our own "Forward in the Fifth" can have a significant impact. But the federal government has its responsibilities in this area as well, and I am confident the passage of the School Improvement Act will benefit every school in our region in the coming years.

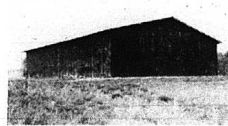

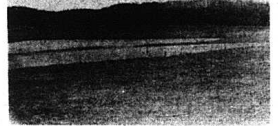

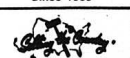

Japanese 4-H/LABO
Exchange Students
coming to Ky. in July

Forty teenagers and leaders from Japan will be arriving in Kentucky in late July as part of the 4-H/LABO exchange program. Each will spend about a month living with a Kentucky family as part of that family.

"The LABO project is one geared to teach the visiting young people about family life here in Kentucky. We place each of the young people with a family we know will allow them to be part of the family—and not just a guest," said Karen Hicks, Extension 4-H program specialist who is coordinating the project.

Hicks said that almost all families who have "adopted" a Japanese young person in the past have said that they learned far more from the Japanese visitor than they were able to teach.

Most of the Japanese do not speak much English, she said, but usually they pick up key phrases quickly



enough to become contributing members of the families.

When the Japanese arrive in Lexington July 25, they will be given a two-day orientation before they are placed with their Kentucky families. A separate orientation will be given to host families prior to the arrival of the exchange students, she said.

"We are still taking applications from Kentucky families who would like to have an exchange youth as part of their family," she said.

Families who are interested in hosting one of the Japanese teens need to have a child of the same sex and about the same age as the young person they adopt, Hicks said.

Manganese Toxicity in Tobacco—pH Problem

Tobacco producers in Kentucky lose about \$30 million a year in yield reductions because of manganese toxicity in their crops. Manganese toxicity results from low soil pH. Ken Wells, Extension Agronomist with the U.K. College of Agriculture said, "Specialists have changed their timing recommendations this year to include enough to raise the pH to 6.6 from last year's 6.4. The pH level naturally drops when fertilizer is applied. This increases the acidity of the soil. When the soil warms, bacteria digest organic matter that releases acids that reduce pH levels further".

It's not too late to lime fields if they need it. It just has to be mixed in more thoroughly than before. Farmers who use five tons or more split the load in half. They should turn under the first half and then spread the rest and disk it in. Farmers who use two or three tons should disk the lime in two directions to blend it in with the soil.

If manganese toxicity does develop in the field, the farmer can spread fine sacked lime on the field before cultivation. This method only offers a fifty-fifty chance of working, but it is effective when it does.

Eastern Tent Caterpillars
On the Limb Throughout
Kentucky

A caterpillar that builds unsightly webs in the crotches of trees has been noticed this week throughout the state. But as ugly as the Eastern tent caterpillar's habits are, it does not threaten trees other than those that are less than two years old, according to Doug Johnson, University of Kentucky Extension entomologist.

The insects build silky webs in trees. During the day, they feed on emerging leaves and if the population is large enough, they may strip the tree bare.

However, only young trees will suffer enough stress from their feeding to cause the tree's death. Older trees will send out new leaves by the time the caterpillar is readying itself to become a moth and will recover.

Control is warranted only for young landscape trees. Johnson recommends using any one of a number of products containing Bacillus thuringiensis (Dipel), a naturally occurring bacteria that causes disease only in caterpillars.

Products containing Bt can be sprayed directly on the web and will

May 15 is final reporting date for wheat, barley and oats

The final reporting date for Wheat, Barley and Oats is May 15, 1988.

ASCS encourages all producers growing crops who desire to be eligible for price support and other program benefits to file a timely crop acreage report. Farmers growing program crops but not participating in current programs should report crop acreages to insure the opportunity for participating in future programs.

Producers who have an established base but are not growing crops need to file a Zero Report of acreage in order to have an established history file.

Failure to report crop acreages when a producer is enrolled in the current program results in failure to fully comply and makes producers subject to penalties.

Remember May 15th is the deadline to report!

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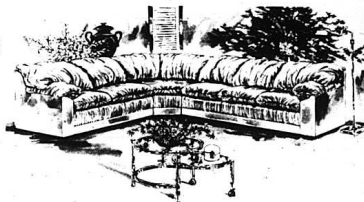
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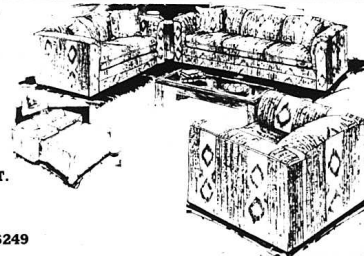
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Around Brodhead





For women over 40, having a mammogram is good health practice. A low-dose breast x-ray, when combined with a physical exam, is the most effective way to find breast cancer early, when it's more curable.

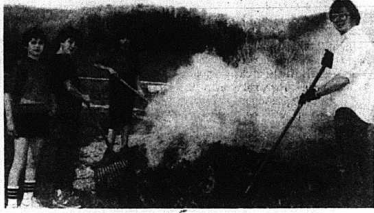

ORDINANCE NO. 1-88

An ordinance of the City of Mt. Vernon prescribing the manner of selecting a member of the council to preside at meetings of the council when the mayor does not attend.

Whereas, KRS 83A.130(5) permits the City Council, by Ordinance, to set the manner in which one of its number may be selected to preside at meetings of the council when the mayor is absent, and

Whereas, the Council deems the adoption of such an ordinance advisable,

Now Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON: Section 1. When the Mayor is absent or otherwise unable to attend regular or called meetings of the City Council, the Council may, if a quorum is present, by majority vote, select one of its members to preside at the meeting.

Section 2. This ordinance shall be effective upon publication.

Local students at EKU are now student teaching

Three Rockcastle County students at Eastern Kentucky University, are among more than 351 EKU students who are gaining practical classroom teaching experience during the 1988 spring semester.

Local EKU students who are now student teaching include: Roberta Gabbard from Brodhead, Shelia McQuary and Karen Powell, both of Mt. Vernon.

EKU's College of Education places its student teachers in classrooms for the last 12 to 13 weeks of the semester, according to Dr. David Rush, who directs EKU's professional laboratory experience office. The practical experience follows three to four weeks of on-campus instruction in teaching fundamentals.

"Student teaching experience is required in Kentucky before a college graduate may be certified," Rush said. "At EKU, we've designed our program to ensure that our students are well prepared for this experience."

Students preparing for teaching careers at EKU may also gain practical classroom experience at Model Laboratory School before student teaching. Model is the only university-operated laboratory school in Kentucky. It is designed to provide educational experiences for future teachers otherwise unavailable.

"As one of the state's largest producers of school teachers, we feel a special obligation to our students and to the Commonwealth to provide as many quality educational experiences as possible," Rush said.

This spring 117 EKU students are student teaching at the secondary level, 135 are placed in elementary classrooms, and 99 are also assigned to practicum arrangements, he said. Eastern Kentucky University at Richmond is a comprehensive regional University serving more than

13,000 students through a diversity of programs in its nine colleges and graduate school.

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FmHA ready for '88 lending season

Robert W. Hornsby, County Supervisor of the McKee office announced today that farmers should begin early this year making plans for needed operating credit. According to Hornsby, the Farmers Home Administration has funds available to cover farm operating needs of most family sized operations in this area. The agency has made a major shift away from direct lending to a government guaranteed program involving local banks as the source of the money, with the government backing the loans up to a 90% loss. The guaranteed program is a way to continue providing financing to farmers while serving as a means to saving direct outlays by the government during these times of budgetary restraint.

Weevils are being found across state

A small insect that has been known to destroy up to 50 percent of a hay crop is being found throughout the state and farmers are urged to check their fields for signs of its presence. "This week we have reports that alfalfa weevils are very active throughout Kentucky. And because most crops are still very immature, the common method of cutting the field early to control the insects may not be feasible," said Chris Christensen, University of Kentucky Extension entomologist. The green insects vary in length from 1/22 inch to 3/8 of inch, although so far most found are at the smaller end of the range, he said. Symptoms of the weevil's presence include chewing damage on the growing tips.

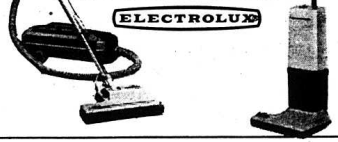

Also on the agenda as reported earlier, is reconstruction of an area of I-75 from Conway into Madison County.

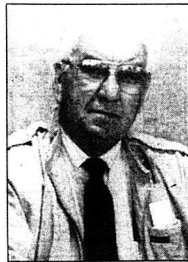
A contract has already been awarded for resurfacing of I-75 this year between Madison County and the Tennessee state line.

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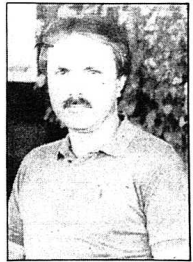

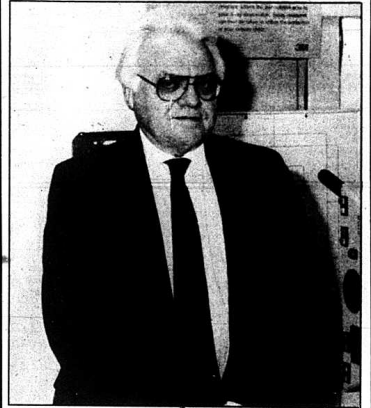

Students will be given Kentucky Essential Skills Test May 2-6

The Kentucky Essential Skills Test will be administered to all students in Rockcastle Schools the week of May 2-6.

These dates are determined by law, which states that the KEST must be administered between the 160th and 170th instructional school days.

All students in grades K-12 will be tested in the basic skills areas of reading, mathematics, spelling, writing, and library/research reference.

In addition students in grades 3-12 will take the Test of Cognitive Skills (TCS). The TCS is an aptitude type test which measures skills in sequences, analogies, memory and verbal reasoning. The TCS assists in estimating the potential ability of a student. That potential ability can then be compared to the actual achieved score.

Results from the KEST are used in monitoring the progress of individual students, individual classes and entire grade membership at both the school and district levels. Test results are also utilized for placement purposes in the various special programs.

Parents can assist the testing effort by promoting the following recommendations: Recognize the importance of the testing program and support the effort; promote attendance in which students will be required to make up the test if absent; stress the importance of getting proper rest prior to test administration because students need to get a good night's sleep and eat breakfast on test administration days; contact your school when the fall term begins and review the test results for your child since it is important that parent and school work together in designing appropriate educational programs.

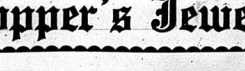

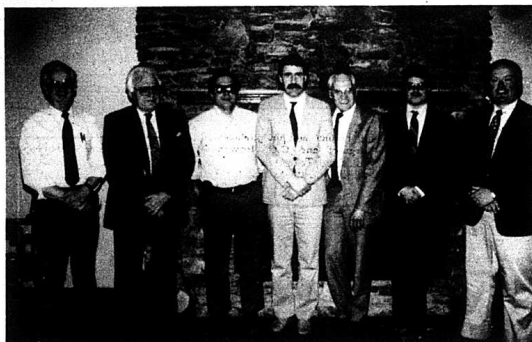
