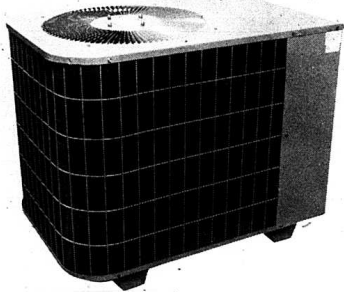



## Failed grade brings suit against board

A civil suit filed in the Rockcastle Circuit Court last Thursday names the Rockcastle County Board of Education, Rockcastle County High School Principal Ronnie Cash and RCHS chorus teacher Margie Wilcop as defendants in a suit brought because of a student's failing grade.

Terena Bond Wallin, a junior at RCHS, filed suit to get the F she received in chorus class last year changed to an A. Wallin was given a failing grade because of a student's failing grade.

The performance in question was a baccalaureate service, held on Sunday. Wallin contends that she did not attend the performance because of illness and that Mrs. Wilcop refused to let her offer her illness as an excuse.

The suit also contends that Mrs. Wilcop called roll, on the following day, to see who had attended the baccalaureate service. Wallin and three other students who had missed the performance were told by Mrs. Wilcop that they had failed the class and that she did not want to see their faces again.

Mrs. Wallin said that Mrs. Wilcop refused to let her attend class for the remainder of the year and gave her an F in each of the last two six-week grading periods.

Mrs. Wilcop denies the allegations in the suit. She contends that Mrs. Wallin never explained why she missed the baccalaureate performance and that she gave Mrs. Wallin an incomplete grade which the school later changed to an F. Mrs. Wilcop also denies that she told the students that she did not want to see their faces again.

This is not the first time that the grading policies of Mrs. Wilcop have caused an incident. The same incident in spring of 1987, two students, Bridget and Brandi Deborde received low grades because of their conduct at the 1987 high school graduation. The grades were later changed from C's to A's.

Mrs. Wallin lawsuit contends that expelling her from class was a violation of state law, state and federal constitutional rights, and the school system's own grading standards. The suit may also address the issue of whether students can be required to attend events when school is not in session.

The Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky prepared the suit on behalf of Wallin. The only mention of the suit by the Rockcastle Board of Education in their regular monthly meeting was that the Insurance Trust Fund of the Kentucky Department of Education would have to be notified and would appoint an attorney to handle the case. Board Chairman George Poynter said that the case might be dismissed on grounds of sovereign immunity where it concerned the board.

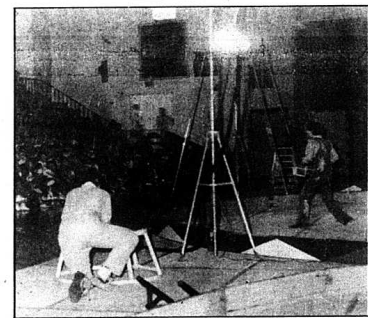

## Rate increases for sewer at Brodhead

The best laid plans sometimes go astray, and they apparently have done just that at Brodhead where residents can expect a possible 10 to 25 percent increase in their sewer bill.

Jim Cass, consultant for the City of Brodhead, told the Brodhead City Council at its regular meeting Monday night that the city's planned \$300,000 sewer plant renovation project is going to cost the city more than originally thought and the bill will have to be paid by water and sewer users.

The city had hoped for a \$210,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) and a \$90,000 loan from FmHA to finance the project, but the best the city can do is get a \$0.50 deal, with the ARC furnishing \$150,000 and the city (FmHA) \$150,000.

With those figures, the city sewer bill could be increased as much as 100 percent of the water bill. Based on the 100 percent rate of \$7.80 for 2,000 gallons of water, the total water and sewer bill would be \$15.60 for 2,000 gallons used. It would be more as more water is used. The sewer bill is currently 75 percent of the water bill.

"We don't have much of a choice in the matter," Mayor Billy Bussell told the council. "We have been told by the Environmental Protection Agency (ARC) that the sewer treatment plant must be remedied or the city could face a fine. So there's not much else we can do."

Cass told the council if the city

rejects the rate hike then the city will lose the \$150,000 grant and would still have to finance the project based on a \$300,000 loan, meaning an even higher sewer bill.

Inspection of the sewer plant by the EPA in months past indicated raw sewage is running into the Dix River at times, especially after heavy rains. The council will meet with officials and determine the steps to take, but in other similar situations, the EPA regulations must be complied with. Deaiva Bussell, water superintendent, told the council the Mt. Vernon Water Works is cutting down on the supply of water it supplies to the city and that he is unable to keep the city water tank filled.

He said on Monday the city was getting 204 gallons a minute, and that was not enough. The top among through the valve on Hall's Hill is 320 gallons a minute, but that amount is seldom necessary. The average is about 255 gallons a minute.

"They're squeezing us off," he said. "I don't know why and have been unable to get an answer. And I understand the same is happening with the Western and Northern water districts. It would help if we were told when the cuts are coming so we can be prepared. Our water runs on a time clock and that should be taken into consideration by Mt. Vernon."

City Attorney Jerry Cox said he was aware of the problem and suggested the three districts send someone to the Mt. Vernon City Council to discuss the matter.

## Verla Scott Democrat chairwoman

Verla Scott was named chairwoman of the Democrat Party at the Rockcastle County Democrat Convention last week.

Chosen vice chairman was former County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper. Rosalind Philbeck was chosen secretary.

Both Mrs. Scott and Jasper were backers of Gov. Wallace Wilkinson's campaign for governor last fall.

Both have been active in the Democrat Party for years. They will be delegates to the Democratic State Convention along with Gary Cromer.

The party has 42 delegates to the county convention, or three from each of the county's 14 precincts. The delegates then choose an executive committee of nine who choose the chairman and vice chairman.

The nine that chose Mrs. Scott and Jasper were Denver Barton, Chris McKinney, Tommy Bussell, Gary Cromer, Paul Owens, Garland DeBorde, Shon Poynter, Pat Craig and Willetta Owens.

## Court approves lake road repairs; looks at jail budget

After over a year of claims and counterclaims, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court agreed at its regular meeting Tuesday to do some work on Lake Linville Road.

The county finally related after Mt. Vernon officials said the city had not worked the road since it was deeded to the county in September 1970.

The kind of work to be done will likely be minimal, probably patching potholes. The county plans to ask the state to take over maintenance of the road sometime after the fiscal year begins in July.

The court also tentatively approved the Rockcastle County Jail budget for 1988-89.

Estimated money available for appropriation is set at \$152,800, up from last year's \$119,788. Appropriations include \$100,500 for jail personnel, up from \$73,007 last year; \$36,200 for operating expenses; \$2,000 for equipment and \$14,100 for administration.

The court got much needed financial help when the state approved a check for \$71,875 for medical expenses incurred by Vince Pittman.

Pittman of Indiana, and formerly of Rockcastle, was sentenced to a jail term in Rockcastle County and during that time he was diagnosed as having leukemia and was taken to the University of Kentucky Medical Center for treatment that amounted

to \$71,875 and charged to Rockcastle County.

Through the efforts of State Rep. Danny Ford, the state agreed to pay the bill after Indiana refused to pay it. County prisoners who need medical help are hospitalized at county expense, a controversial practice.

Bids on a bridge on Brodhead/Chestnut Ridge Road were opened by the court. Apparent low bidder was Polly & Trent Construction Co., of Bardonia at a bid of \$69,976. There were seven bidders on the project that is expected to begin soon. County Attorney James H. Lambert will check the bids before a contract is made.

The court did not have a county attorney at Tuesday's regular fiscal court meeting. James H. Lambert is recuperating from a broken right arm after he fell while visiting in Somerset.

## Angry Brodhead folks get help from council

Several residents of Brodhead complained to the Brodhead City Council Monday night about upkeep of property reportedly owned by Ray Alexander whose address is unknown.

Residents of the Sigmon/Pike streets area called the property an "eyesore," and a junk heap, and claimed the property is infested with rats and snakes. They said the property has not been lived in for over a year.

Mayor Billy Bussell told the residents he was well aware of the problem and had contacted Stephen

Midkiff, environmentalist for the Rockcastle Health Department.

The mayor said he had received a letter from Midkiff noting that Alexander's address is unknown and suggested the city pass an ordinance to remedy the nuisance and other nuisances that might come up in the future. Midkiff cited Lexington where there is a tall weed and grass ordinance.

Midkiff wrote that the ordinance should carry a provision for action in case the owner cannot be found and/or fails to correct the nuisance.

In the breakdown by enrollment, Rockcastle ranked 105 of 345 schools with 501-1,000 students. This was the highest position of any school from Kentucky. The next highest Kentucky school was Grant County at 116.

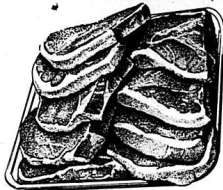

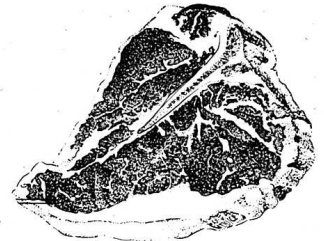

"In this case," Midkiff wrote, "workers (city or hired) would clean up the nuisance and a lien be placed on the property for cost of the service."

Midkiff said to date he had not been able to find the address of the owner.

City Attorney Jerry Cox told the council before passing an ordinance, he would check current law to determine if a clean-up would be done under existing state laws.

Attorney Cox told the council Tuesday that KRS 381.770 allows a city, county and unincorporated area to give five day notice to a property owner, where a nuisance and unsightly area is visible, to clean up the property or the city will clean it up and bill the property owner or file a lien on the property to recover the cost.

The council told Attorney Cox to send the letter to Alexander's last address taken from property tax rolls.

In other action, the council approved a resolution making city elections non-partisan, meaning no political party will be designated on a city ballot for city offices. Most cities, including Mt. Vernon, have already passed a similar resolution.

Following the meeting, the council went into closed session to confirm Grant Petyr is still city policeman and asked Joe Bussell, who has been filling in, to take a watchman's job without arresting power.

Bussell has been a policeman since

Petyr was taken ill and hospitalized, and on Petyr's day off.

The council also told police they should patrol only in the City of Broadhead.

Getting a Graduate Equivalency Diploma (GED) has become a family affair for students at the Christian Appalachian Project's Family Life Center School.

Sisters, mothers and daughters, mothers and sons, and brothers and sisters were recognized by the Christian Appalachian Project at a ceremony, May 3 at the Recreation Center, three miles north of Renfro Valley on U.S. 25 for receiving their GED through the project's Family Life Center School and School-on-Wheels programs.

Rockcastle County High School seniors, Amy Hamm and Darren Allen were present and gave the board a report on "Project Graduation."

Hamm and Allen along with junior Adam Coleman attended a workshop in the fall to find out about the effort and how to go about planning a successful "Project Graduation." According to Allen, the graduation effort is an attempt to keep kids off the street after graduation and hopefully save the life of a person who would be drinking and driving.

"Project Graduation" was begun about three years ago and has been growing in popularity throughout Kentucky and other states. Some schools have such parties following either graduation or their proms. The events have been successful and according to Hamm, "We have been lucky in our county since we have not had any tragedies, but just like on prom night when one of our classmates was involved in a traffic accident, this is the type of thing we hope 'Project Graduation' will alleviate."

Superintendent Bigge Towery, Jr. praised the efforts of the three students and officially sanctioned and endorsed "Project Graduation."

Board member Earl Cummins suggested that the board do something monetarily for the graduation effort. A figure of \$500 was decided upon and passed by the board. The alcohol and substance free graduation party will be held May 17, from 10 p.m. until 6 a.m. at the high school. Prizes will be awarded every 30 minutes and two meals will be served, according to Hamm and Allen.

Construction of the new Mt. Vernon Elementary School is close to being underway according to Superintendent Towery. The state school board is meeting Wednesday night in Somerset and one of their items for approval is the construction of the

Mt. Vernon School. Once they approve it it goes before Dr. John Brock, Kentucky Superintendent of Public Instruction for his approval. Towery added that it should be only a couple of weeks before they get the official go ahead with the construction of the entire facility.

Along with construction of a new building comes expansion of the first of which the board approved Tuesday night with a payment of \$55,000 to the architectural firm of Johnson/Romanowicz of Lexington. The payment represented a portion of the total amount the firm will receive once the project is completed. The architects costs will run about five percent of the total budget of the \$4.2 million project or about \$200,000 depending upon the final cost of the new facility.

In other construction and repair projects that will be undertaken as soon as school is out are: A new roof at Brodhead Elementary, a new Livingston cafeteria ceiling, blacktopping at Roundstone and the high school.

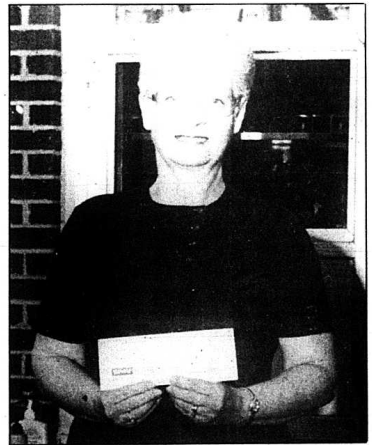
The Livingston cafeteria ceiling was declared an emergency by the board following Towery's recommendation. It had to be declared an emergency because the new school survey listed the Livingston school as an interim facility. According to Towery it was listed an interim because of the poor facility and because the school is below the minimum number of students to be considered an elementary school. The minimum number is 350 students.

A civil suit brought against the board, RCHS principal Ronnie Cash and music teacher Margie Wilcox was mentioned briefly during the meeting. The suit brought against the board by Terena Wallin was filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court last week. Towery said the only action the board had to take at this time was to notify the Insurance Trust Fund of the Kentucky Department of Education, who will in turn appoint a lawyer to the case.

### BEEF CHECK OFF VOTE

On May 10th Beef (or Dairy) producers will vote in a referendum on the future of the \$1 dollar per head Beef check off. October 1, 1986, the first check off funds were collected to promote beef through consumer education, research, promotion and media advertising. Just as poultry, fish and dairy have advertised and promoted their products, the beef

industry is following suit. Beef's "Real Food for Real People" is a readily identifiable image of the Beef Board's efforts to bring beef to the public's attention.

Farmers wishing to participate in the referendum may vote on Tuesday, May 10th at the County Extension Office between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The Extension Office is located on Richmond Street in the Agricultural Services Center.

A complete list of the rules are available, but a brief high light is as follows. Persons owning cattle between Oct. 1, 1986 and March 31, 1988 are eligible to vote. Persons are to vote in the county of residence. For cooperations or partnerships, only one vote will be cast. For all farmers, their wives, or youth who individually own and market cattle in their names, each person has a vote.

Voters sign verifying their compliance with the rules. If for any reason, someone's eligibility to vote is to be challenged, this is to be done in writing to the ASCS Committee. Ten days following the election, ASCS Board members will count ballots and report results for state and national tallies.

### Mother's Day marks the beginning of National Osteoporosis Prevention Week

Make No Bones About It: Osteo Can Be Prevented

Most people think of osteoporosis as an old ladies' disease, but it's something you need to start thinking about when you are a teenager.

In the United States, 15-20 million people have this brittle bone condition. Women are eight times more likely to have osteoporosis than men. Osteoporosis develops gradually. It is often called the silent epidemic because by the time you notice symptoms, you already have the disease and there is not much you can do about it. Symptoms include back pain, loss of height and spinal deformity.

At about age 35, bone starts being withdrawn from the body. At menopause, bone loss accelerates even more. Whether osteoporosis develops depends on many factors, including how much bone mass you start with and how fast you lose it. The most important step you can take to prevent an old age marred by this disease is to make sure your diet has adequate amounts of calcium. The average intake of adult women for calcium is only 500 milligrams a day. Women who have not yet had the "change of life", and older, post-menopausal women who take estrogen supplements need 1000 milligrams a day. Postmenopausal women who do not take estrogen need about half-again more. Teenage girls need 1200 milligrams a day.

Eight ounces of low-fat milk contains 300 milligrams of calcium. A cup of broccoli has 100. An ounce of cheddar cheese has 200. One cup of plain, low-fat yogurt has about 400. Some things may inhibit the absorption of calcium, regardless of

whether it comes from food or supplements. Among these are high amounts of protein, caffeine and alcohol in the diet. There are also things that help prevent calcium loss. Vitamin D, the sunshine vitamin -- also present in fortified milk -- aids in calcium absorption. And there is evidence that acidic foods such as oranges help the body use calcium.

USDA findings show that the mineral boron also may help prevent bone loss, as does moderate weight-bearing exercise such as aerobic dance, walking and tennis.

If you already have osteoporosis, check with a physician about hormone therapy in conjunction with vitamin D and calcium. At home, take precautions to reduce risk of bone injury, such as installing rubber mats and grab bars in the bathroom, rearranging furniture and removing scatter rugs.

### Soil Conservation News

The 60-day public review period for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) proposed changes in the National Conservation Program is half over. Randall W. Gessler, head of Soil Conservation service (SCS) programs in Kentucky said today.

"Anyone interested in the future of soil and water conservation and the environment should study the changes and make their comments and suggestions before June 4," Gessler said.

Changes proposed by USDA may be reviewed in local SCS or Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) offices.

"Under requirements of the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act (RCA), public participation and cooperation is an integral part of any conservation program formula-

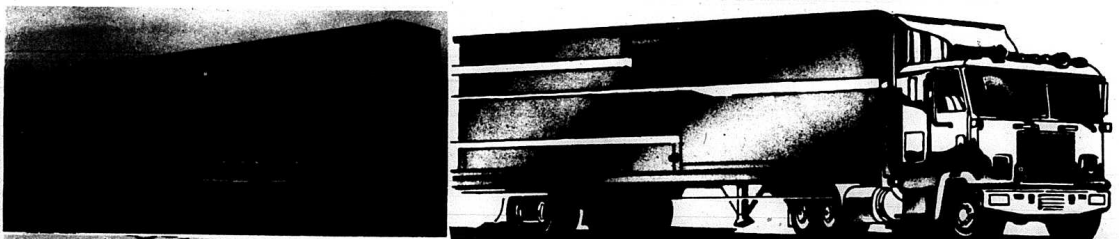

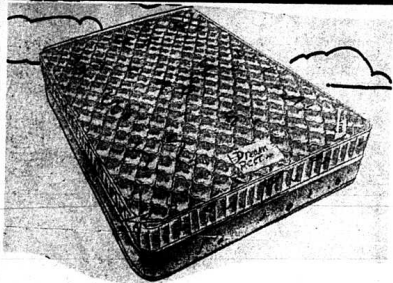

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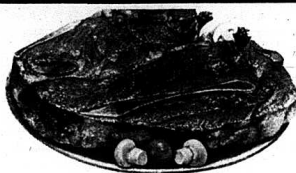
