Philbeck stabbed 5 times; uncle jailed on charges

An Orlando man is being held in Rockcastle County Jail on charges ranging from nine counts of wanton endangerment, to arson, to attempted

murder: Mark Baker, 23, is being held under \$25,000 cash bond and \$50,000 property bond on the nine counts of wanton endangerment in the first degree that were handed down in indicuments by the Rock-castle County Grand Jury on April 22

22. Baker is also charged with criminal attempt to commit murder in the stabbing of Jeffrey Philbeck, his nephew. Philbeck is the son of Robert E. and Rosalind Philbeck.

Philbeck was reportedly stabled five times in the left side and chest by Baker. He was released from St. Jospeh's Hospital in Lexington Tuesday and is resting comfortably at

The stabbing incident occurred May 12 at a mobile home in Mt.

Vernon. Philbeck was taken to the Rockastie Hospital and then sent on to Lexington. 



one ready-to-eat cereal. Information is provided for the cereal itself and for cereal with milk added. Note that

Carbohydrates are the chief com-ponent of cereals. The label divides total carbohydrate content into three legories: complex carbohydrates, crose and other sugars, and dietary categories: fiber.

The best choices for many of us would be cereals fairly high in com-plex carbohydrates and dietary fiber and low in sucrose and other sugars. Much of the sugar in cereals is added by the manufacturer in the form of table super surveys however brown. by the manufacturer in the state table sugar or sucrose, honey, br

able sugar on success sugar and corn syrup. Although the label doesn't tell you the percentage of total carbohydra sugar, you can calculate this by grams of sucrose an dividing the

other sugars by grams of total carbo-hydrate and multiplying by 100. Fey example, using the carbohydrate in a box of Strawberry Squares is from sugar. (Five grams divided by 23 grams equals. 21 or 21 percent). Fiber is another item to look for on creat labels. Many experts suggest eating 25 to 40 grams a day. Fiber from cereals can help increase our total innake, which for most of us is low.
