BEWARE!

After a construction project is finished the area should be cleaned up. This is not always a reality. People find dynamite or blasting caps lying on the ground too frequently. These finds can detonate and maim.

Blasting caps contain primary explosives like lead oxide, mercury fulminate, or lead styphate. These take only a slight pressure to detonate them. They are not toys.

Dynamite is a high explosive. It contains an explosive, usually nitroglycerin or sensitized ammonium nitrate, an anticid to neutralize any acids that are formed, gelatin, sulfur, or sodium nitrate depending on the type and strength desired. The strength, 40% dynamite for instance, is determined by the % of explosive it contains.

When most dynamites come into contact with moisture for a time, the waxed paper cover becomes loose and the powder becomes exposed and crystallizes. The neutralizers break down and the nitroglycerin become more sensitive then before.

If you find any explosive materials, do not touch them, get qualified people to handle the situation like the State Police or explosive experts. Always practice safety.

**INSPECTION PERIOD
For the Property Tax Assessment Roll**

The Rockcastle County property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 23 through June 4, 1988. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 1988 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1988 will be due about September 15, 1988.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Any person who wishes to appeal an assessment must file a written letter or petition with the county clerk within the above period of time. This letter or petition must state the reasons for appeal, identify the property in question, and state the taxpayer's estimate of actual fair cash value. (KRS 133.202)

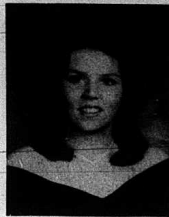

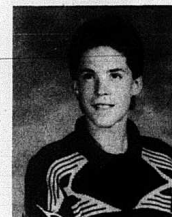

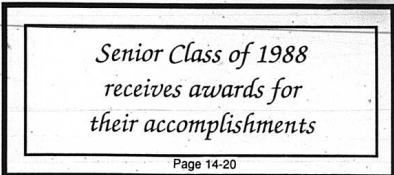

Philbeck stabbed 5 times; uncle jailed on charges

An Orlando man is being held in Rockcastle County Jail on charges ranging from nine counts of wanton endangerment, arson, to attempted murder.

Mark Baker, 23, is being held under \$25,000 cash bond and \$50,000 property bond on the nine counts of wanton endangerment in the first degree that were handed down in indictments by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury on April 22.

Baker is also charged with criminal attempt to commit murder in the stabbing of Jeffrey Philbeck, his nephew. Philbeck is the son of Robert E. and Rosalind Philbeck.

Philbeck was reportedly stabbed five times in the left side and chest by Baker. He was released from St. Joseph's Hospital in Lexington Tuesday and is resting comfortably at home.

The stabbing incident occurred May 12 at a mobile home in Mt.

Vernon. Philbeck was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and then sent on to Lexington.

According to court records, Baker was indicted for wanton endangerment for shooting a firearm on April 16 at Eddie Falin, Sandra Falin, Brenda Falin, Darlene Weaver, and Wilbur Weaver.

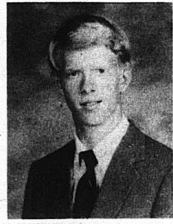
Baker was again charged with shooting a firearm on April 17 at Eddie Falin, Sandra Falin, Lori Falin and Hank Edward Falin.

On the same day he allegedly committed arson in the second degree by setting fire to a barn owned by Wilbur Weaver, and with committing arson in the first degree by setting fire with intent to destroy a trailer owned by Wilbur Weaver and occupied by Sandra and Eddie Falin.

Baker failed to appear in Rockcastle Circuit Court on May 13 and a warrant was issued for his arrest. He was arrested May 16 when he turned himself in at the county jail.

Mayor still undecided about water skiing veto

Will she, or won't she? That is the question. Whether it is in the best interests of the city and county to veto water skiing on Lake Linville, or after consideration, let sking resume at the lake as the council recently voted.

That is the decision that Mayor Elizabeth Baker will have to make, and only the mayor knows what she will do. To date she has said "no comment at this time." Speculation is that the mayor will, in the final analysis, probably abide by the 250-166 survey of city residents that disapproved of skiing. If so, it will be the first time a Mt. Vernon mayor has exercised a veto, or at least no one could remember one.

"I don't think she can do it legally," said one councilman this week. "I didn't vote for skiing just to oppose the mayor. I just think it wouldn't hurt a thing and it would encourage tourists to use the lake."

A former councilman, who was one who voted to prevent skiing, had another opinion. "The people of the city said in the survey they don't want skiing on the lake," he noted. "I think most of us think the lake is for fishing and small boats, not big boats roaring up and down the lake pulling skiers. The council should abide by the survey."

Another councilman who is for sking, said there would be restrictions on skiing when the new ordinance is drawn up.

One county official guessed if water users in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and the Northern and Western districts voted they would turn down skiing by a wide margin.

"I don't think people in these water districts want skiing," she said. "After all, it's our water supply."

According to one attorney, the mayor can legally veto the council vote, but it takes time.

A veto resolution must be written up and read to the council two times. The mayor then has 10 days after the second reading to send individual letters to each councilman stating her intentions.

She would then exercise the veto. It would take one more vote than a majority to over-ride the mayor's veto.

In the case of Mt. Vernon, there are six councilmen. A majority would be four. One more than a majority is five. Since two of the present councilmen have voted against skiing, the mayor's veto would stand.

One resident related that his feelings were similar to the mayors when she discussed skiing at a recent council meeting.

"The council has a lot of important business to do and I think they should

No election Tuesday; four races in November

As a friendly reminder, there will be no primary election in Rockcastle County next Tuesday.

All candidates are unopposed. However, some counties will have an election where local officers are up for election.

Slate Rep. Danny Ford, R-Mt. Vernon is unopposed for his seat in the 80th District that includes Rockcastle, part of Pulaski and McCreary County.

U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers, R-Somerset, is also unopposed for his 15th District Senatorial seat.

There will be local candidates on the Nov. 8 election ballot.

Ricky Ray Kirby will seek the Third District magistrate seat vacated by Doug Bishop. Kirby is a Republican from Brodhead. The district includes Brown, Bullock and West Brodhead. He was chosen to run by the Rockcastle Republican Executive Committee.

His opponent has not been announced by the Rockcastle Democrat Executive Committee. The term will be for one year left on Bishop's term.

Three Rockcastle Board of Education seats will be up for election in November. They are: Division 2, Brown, West and North Brodhead, held by Willie Taylor; Division 4, Climax and Orlando, held by Edna Cameron, and Division 5, East Mt. Vernon, Conway and Roundstone, held by Kenneth Adams.

Filing deadline for school board seats is 4 p.m. Sept. 1 in the Office of the County Clerk.

Also on the November ballot are President/vice president.

U.S. Senate seats in Kentucky are not up for election this year.

The next local election after November will be for all county offices in May 1989.

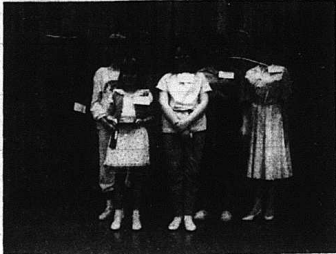

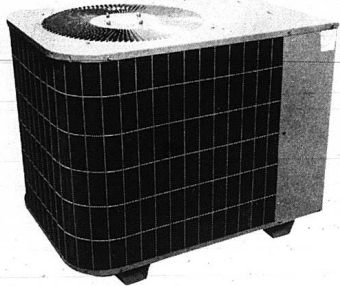

Public Service Announcement

Notice to persons served by Mt. Vernon Water Works, Broadhead Water Department, Northern Rockcastle Water District, Western Rockcastle Water Association, and Livingston Water Works pertaining to lead in drinking water.

Since 1976 lead contamination in drinking water has been reduced significantly. Your water company is cooperating in the effort to further reduce human consumption of lead.

Lead can occur at potentially harmful levels in tap water if the plumbing fixtures through which the water travels, including the solder and fluxes used to connect them, contain lead. The ERA has recently mandated that all newly installed plumbing materials be essentially lead-free.

Your drinking water meets the lead standard of .050 parts per million (ppm) as required by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

- * if your home or water system has lead pipes, or
- * if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
- * if the home is less than five years old, or
- * if you have soft or acidic water, or
- * if water sits in the pipes for several hours.

To find out which type of plumbing you have, look at it and perform the following simple tests:

- * Lead pipe is most often found in very old homes and buildings. Lead pipe is gray, relatively soft, and can be easily scratched to shine with a screwdriver, coin, or key. Some iron pipe is very hard and usually black.
- * Copper pipe usually has a characteristic copper color. Until very recently, most copper pipe was installed using lead-based solder. Lead solder is also gray, soft, and is scratched shiny. Copper pipe that has been soldered with lead usually contributed less lead to the water as time passes because the solder gets coated with minerals from the water. After being installed about five years, lead solder usually contributes very small amounts of lead to the water.
- * Iron, steel and "plastic" pipe have not been associated with any health effects from lead since they contain very small amounts of lead or none, and are assembled without lead solder.

You can reduce the possibility of consuming water with high lead concentrations by following these simple precautions:

- * If the water has not been used for several hours, flush the cold water pipes before using the water for human consumption. Turn on the faucet and let the water run until the water temperature cools and get no cooler. If there has recently been major water use, such as showering, bathing, flushing toilets, or cold water laundry, flushing pipes may take only 30 seconds. If there has been no recent major water use, flushing the pipes may take several minutes.
- * Use only cold water for drinking, cooking, or preparing baby formula.
- * If new plumbing is installed or repairs are made, insist that lead-free materials be used.
- * Lead pipes and service connections can be replaced.
- * The only way to be sure of the amount of lead in your water is to have the water tested by a state certified laboratory. Contact your water system or the Drinking Water Branch of the Kentucky Division of Water for information about testing.
- * The Mt. Vernon Water Works, Livingston Water Works produces non-corrosive water that is less likely to dissolve lead from plumbing.
- * The Broadhead Water Works, Northern Rockcastle Water District, and Western Rockcastle Water Association purchase water for distribution from Mt. Vernon Water Works. The managers of these water systems are working together to provide water that is non-corrosive and less likely to dissolve lead in plumbing.

Summer Snacks

Summer vacation is just ahead - a terrific time for children to prepare snacks and light meals in the microwave oven. Quick and easy recipes will be enjoyed by beginners as well as more experienced cooks.

For children who are just beginning, here are a few tips to remember:

- * Ask for permission to cook.
- * Ask for help, if needed, in getting ingredients ready and for measuring and chopping.
- * The microwave oven cooks foods fast so be sure you use the minimum time listed and add extra time if needed.
- * Remember never to operate the oven when it is empty.
- * Do not use metal containers and spoons. Glass and many plastic dishes work best.
- * Be sure to clean up afterwards so you will be able to cook again.

The following recipes are both nutritious and fun to eat. Whether you use them for snacks or meals, you can have the pleasure of using the microwave to prepare delicious food for your self, your family

and friends.

Peanut Butter-Caramel Crackers

- 18 Graham cracker squares
- 1/4 cup creamy peanut butter
- 3 tablespoons milk
- 1/2 teaspoon cooking oil
- 2/3 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces
- 1. Butter bottom of 8" square microwave safe baking dish. Spread peanut butter on one side of 9 of the crackers. Top with second cracker. Arrange in single layers in baking dish, set aside.
- 2. Combine brown sugar, butter and milk in 1-quart glass mix 'n' pour bowl.
- 3. Microwave (high) 1 to 1 1/2 minutes or until boiling, stirring once. Stir to dissolve sugar. Then, microwave (high) 2 minutes. Pour over crackers, set aside. Combine chocolate pieces and oil in 1-cup glass measure.
- 4. Microwave (high), uncovered, 1 to 1 1/2 minutes or until chocolate is melted, stirring once. Stir until smooth. Spoon over caramel layer;

spread evenly. Cool until chocolate is set, cut into squares. Makes 20 bars/125 calories each.

Fudgy Frozen Treats

- 3 1/2 cups milk
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 pkg. (3 1/2 oz.) chocolate pudding mix (not instant)
- 1. Measure milk into 2-quart glass mix 'n' pour bowl. Stir in pudding mix until smooth.
- 2. Microwave (high), uncovered, 10 to 12 minutes or until mixture boils and thickens, stirring 2 or 3 times. Blend part of hot mixture into egg; return to pudding mixture, stirring until smooth.
- 3. Microwave (high), uncovered, 1 to 1 1/2 minutes or until edges bubble. Cool, stirring occasionally.
- 4. Divide mixture among 8 paper cups. Insert a wooden stick or plastic spoon into center of each. Freeze until firm, about 6 hours. To serve, peel off paper and enjoy. 8 servings/130 calories each.

Ham 'N Eggs In a Blanket

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup cubed cooked ham
- 2 tablespoons shredded Cheddar cheese
- 2 Tablespoons water
- 2 flour tortillas (7-inch size)
- 1. Beat eggs in 2-cup glass measure until scrambled. Mix in water and ham.
- 2. Microwave (high), uncovered, 2 to 2 1/2 minutes or until eggs are just about set, stirring once. Spoon egg mixture down center of tortillas. Roll up and place seam-side-down on microwave-safe serving plate.

Sprinkle with cheese.

- 3. Microwave (high), 1 to 1 1/4 minutes or until cheese is melted. Makes about 2 servings/275 calories each.

Ment-tators

- 2 large baking potatoes (8 oz. each)
- 4 teaspoons mild picante sauce
- 4 tablespoons shredded cheddar cheese
- 1. Scrub potatoes; prick with fork in several places. Place in microwave oven.
- 2. Microwave (high) 7 to 8 minutes or until potatoes are just about tender, turning potatoes over once. Let stand 5 minutes.
- 3. Cut each potato in half lengthwise; place cut-side-up on microwave-safe serving plate. Top each with 1 teaspoon picante sauce and 1 tablespoon cheese.
- 4. Microwave (high), uncovered, 45 to 60 seconds or until cheese is melted. Makes about 4 servings/75 calories each.

Choose Good Nutrition-Choose Cereal Wisely

Many of us eat cereal for breakfast and a lot of us eat it more than once in a day, often as a bedtime snack. But with the multitude of varieties in the market, making the healthiest choice isn't easy. Some of us want a cereal that's high in fiber; others look for one low in sugar. And of course, we expect our cereals to be low in fat and most, except granola, are.

To make good choices, learn to read cereal packages for sugar, fiber and fat content. Nutrient information is mainly on the bottom portion of the cereal box's side panel, marked "Carbohydrate Information". Here is an example from the box of one ready-to-eat cereal. Information is provided for the cereal itself and for cereal with milk added. Note that sugar content increases when milk is added because of milk sugar or lactose contributed by the milk.

Carbohydrates are the chief component of cereals. The label divides total carbohydrate content into three categories: complex carbohydrates, sucrose and other sugars, and dietary fiber.

The best choices for many of us would be cereals fairly high in complex carbohydrates and dietary fiber and low in sucrose and other sugars. Much of the sugar in cereals is added by the manufacturer in the form of table sugar or sucrose, honey, brown sugar and corn syrup.

Although the label doesn't tell you the percentage of total carbohydrates from sugar, you can calculate this by dividing the grams of sucrose and

other sugars by grams of total carbohydrate and multiplying by 100. For example, using the carbohydrate in a box of Strawberry Squares is from sugar. (Five grams divided by 23 grams equals .21 or 21 percent). Fiber is another item to look for on cereal labels. Many experts suggest eating 25 to 40 grams a day. Fiber from cereals can help increase our total intake, which for most of us is low.

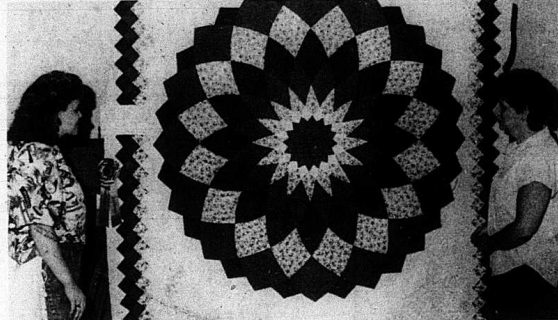

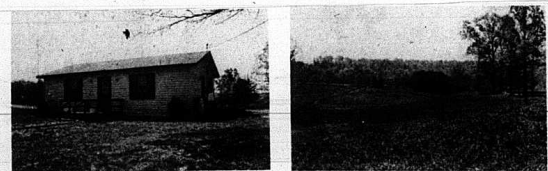

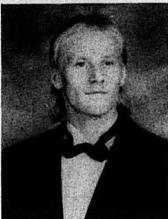

Service jurisdiction on certain drug laws contained in Title 21, U.S. Code. The Act authorizes the Forest Service to train up to 500 officers to enforce the law prohibiting the growing, cultivating or possession of marijuana on federal lands.

Preliminary indications for the upcoming growing season are that the amount of marijuana plants which could be grown on Nation Forest lands will surpass that of previous years. Forest Service officials plan to continue cooperating fully with the Drug Enforcement Administration, The Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Kentucky State Police and 7 Sheriff's Departments to counteract the marijuana growers' operations on these public lands.

The U.S. Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Kentucky fully supports the Forest Service's eradication program, the success of which will permit visitors to use and enjoy these lands and also permit Forest Service employees to carry out their mission of caring for the land and serving people.

The citizens of Kentucky and the rest of the Nation are owners of the National Forests, and their tax money is being used to manage them. The Forest Service seeks their support of its marijuana eradication program so that these publicly owned lands can continue to yield the many benefits of which they are capable

get on with it and not spend all their time fussing over water skiing," he said. "Let's get on with other business."

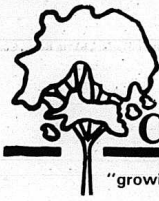

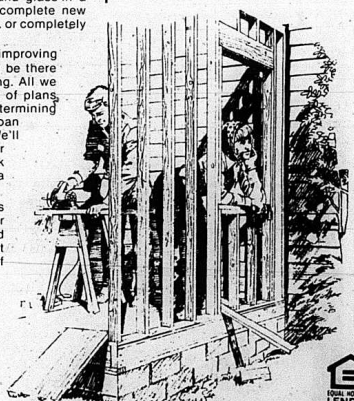
