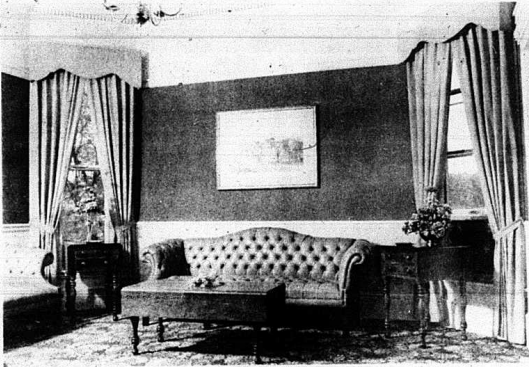




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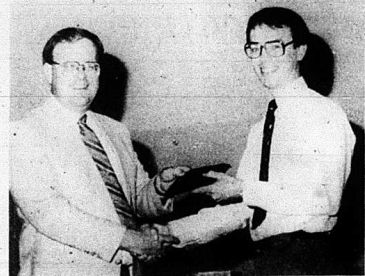

Wheat Danger

A wheat disease that has been identified in Kentucky only once before now, has been positively identified in a field in Marion County.

"Wheat streak mosaic virus can infect a field in a matter of days after first symptoms develop reduce yields, in severe cases, to the point where it is no longer economical to harvest it," said Dick Stuckey, University of Kentucky Extension plant pathologist.

The disease, he said, has been quite severe in Kansas and Nebraska wheat fields this year. The confirmed case was reported in Marion County and other suspected cases are being studied, Stuckey said. Initial pathology reports for those fields were inconclusive and serological samples have been sent to Cornell University for further testing.

One of the symptoms of the disease include the yellowing of the top three leaves of the growing plant. The yellowing is the color of a legal note pad. Streaking of leaves may be present in some wheat varieties. In the field, the plants appear in patches at first observation, he said.

The viral disease is transmitted by the wheat curl mite, which is about 1/100 of an inch in length and looks much like a speck of pollen. On closer observation, very reduced front legs can be seen. It is found often on the leaf vein of the growing wheat plant. The mite can be carried either by wind or by flying insects, according to Lee Townsend, an Extension entomologist with the College of Agriculture.

"We were able to make positive identification of the mite's presence in the Marion County field and in some other fields where the disease is suspected," Townsend said.

The mite also damages the wheat plants, causing curling of the flag leaf -- sometimes so tightly that the emerging grain spike cannot break through the curl, Townsend said.

The mite has not been extensively identified in Kentucky before now, although it was found in Ohio in 1969 and 1970, Townsend said.

If the disease strikes a field early, the grain spikes emerge without grain kernels present. If it strikes later, the spikes have only a few kernels, Stuckey said.

The two scientists hope to make a positive identification of what disease is infecting the other fields. At that time, they will issue a statement concerning what farmers can do about infected fields.

"Fields that have been positively identified as being infected by the disease may need to be plowed under if the infestation is severe," Stuckey said.

The mite can also carry the virus to corn fields and cause disease in the plants.

"Although the cause of the yellowing in the fields is still under investigation, we are sure that it is not a fungal disease that can be cured by use of fungicides," Stuckey said.

Renfro Valley going strong after nearly 50 years



Many visitors return

As the Renfro Valley Barn Dance heads toward a half century of country music entertainment, it remains as new to some visitors as it did when John Lair opened it on Nov. 4, 1939. Just ask Charlie Nichols of Lexington, Mr. and Mrs. Hampton of London, and Mr. and Mrs. Rummage and son, Billy, of Harrodsburg. They never miss a Saturday night unless sickness or an emergency intervenes. "It never gets old to us," said a once-a-year visitor from Ohio. "It's old music, sure, but that's what we like, all the old-time music." Apparently so, they keep coming back. "We're doing very well this season," said Ann Henderson, an owner and acting manager. "We're having about the same attendance this season as last, and we felt last year was one of our best. Of course some weekends are better one year than in another year, depending on various things. But this year seems very good. However, we always have to wait until we close at the end of November to know exactly how we have done."

dances different from other shows." In short, Dolly and Loretta won't be singing. Many visitors who see the barn dance and Jamboree often point out they like Renfro better than Nashville. As one visitor put it: "We went to Nashville to see Dolly, but Dolly was in Las Vegas. Kenny was in Los Angeles, and Randy was, who knows? We like Renfro."

For those who do not know, Renfro has two barn dance shows. The original barn dance is performed in what they call the "Old Barn," and has the old-time country and mountain music using only string instruments. The Jamboree across U.S. 25, has the more modern, Nashville-type music that is equally well received by visitors.

There's also the Sunday Morning Gatherin' performed free in the Old Barn. The Gatherin' first went on radio in 1943 and has continued since. John Lair introduced it, "so that Renfro would be able to extend the idea of neighborliness and friendly cooperation to a much larger community." The program is now carried by 65 stations in 24 states. The closest to Renfro Valley where the Gatherin' is aired is on WKXO in Berea. The largest station is WJR in Detroit.

"The Gatherin' is not strictly religious in character; and was never presided over by a minister. It has always been more of a neighborhood and community meeting with gospel and good will music. In his lifetime, John Lair was the director."

"There is also the Redub School. It is an 1840s restored school house furnished with desks, books and slates. It is open to the public. Aunt Polly House is a log house, the oldest structure in Renfro Valley, and furnished like a home in the mid-1800s. It is also open to the public."

County must change garbage plan

The Kentucky Division of Waste Management has told Rockcastle County to change its garbage plan to conform to the steps taken by the county to improve garbage collection. The county has 45 days in which to comply.

Although the report is less severe than expected, it made clear that the county is expected to continue to accomplish the goals set out by the state, and goals described under the plan.

In a letter from Shelby C. Jett, manager of the Solid Waste Branch of the Division of Waste Management, the county was told that "overall the Division is pleased that the county has hired a solid waste coordinator (Luster Bullock) and has taken steps toward better managing solid waste."

"Nevertheless," Jett continued, "the county must address the . . . deficiencies immediately since they involve major changes in the original plan."

The letter is the result of a meeting between the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and a state representative of the division on April 7 at which time the court was quizzed on its implementation of its garbage plan.

In the letter, Jett noted the county "has not initiated any steps to enter the Kentucky Clean Community Program nor to encourage recycling."

"Promoting recycling could be a major component of the Clean Community Program," Jett wrote. "The county must revise the time frame for . . . On other points, the state official pointed out that the county's current garbage ordinance is not consistent with the county's solid waste system, with the county's solid waste system. Because changes in the collection system from a franchise system to a convenience center method, a major change to the solid waste management plan will require a formal amendment which the Division will have to approve."

Jail now on good footing

While many county jails are closing their doors and others are becoming only 12 hour holdover facilities, the Rockcastle County jail appears to be on solid ground.

Recent renovations, with a total cost of \$90,000, have proved to be money well spent, according to jailer Billy Kirby.

"About 25-30 counties have closed their jails or have become 12 hour holdover facilities," Kirby said. "Rockcastle County is actually saving money by not having to pay other county jails for the housing of our prisoners."

"In fact the county's scheduled contribution to the jail's budget in fiscal year 1988-89 of \$7,000 is \$1,500 less than the \$8,500 it contributed during the 1988-89 fiscal year. The jail's total budget for the 1988-89 year is \$150,000, an increase of about \$30,000 over the previous year. Much of the increase will come from the housing of state inmates from other counties such as Jackson, Fayette, Clay, Laurel and other surrounding counties."

As of last Friday, 31 inmates were housed in the Rockcastle County Jail, only eight of which were from Rockcastle. Twelve of the 31 were from neighboring Jackson County whose jail became a holdover facility earlier in the year. "We are now keeping all of Jackson County's prisoners and they usually have at least as many as we do," Kirby added.

More prisoners from other counties may appear to be burdensome for the jail, but in reality it could be a prime source of income for the jail. Considering that the jail is paid \$13.50 a day, for each inmate, the county contribution could be even less than estimated, that figure will jump to \$16 a day July 1. From these statistics, it appears obvious where a large portion of the operating money will originate.

Last year's budget included \$11,250 for the housing of out-of-county prisoners. The 1988-89 budget estimates the county will be paid \$3,000 for the housing of state prisoners. Kirby admitted that this figure may have been estimated a bit low.

"The more prisoners we house from other counties the more money we can put back into the facility and make it a top-notch jail," he stated.

The renovations that have enabled the jail to come up to the state standards include: a no-contact visiting booth and holding room, a drunk tank, and a multi-purpose room (yet not completed) to be used by long term prisoners for exercise and recreation.

The 1988-89 budget was set by the state and approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court. The budget also increased the jailer's salary to that of other elected officials in the county such as judge executive and county

Sewer plant grant at Brodhead approved

The Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) has confirmed a grant of \$150,000 being awarded to the City of Brodhead for improvements at the city sewer plant.

The ARC had earlier reported the money would likely be available to Brodhead for the project, granted the city plans to continue the project. If not, the money will go to another city.

State Rep. Danny Ford and county Democratic chairman Verle Scott both reported confirmation of the grant.

Although the money is available, the city still needs another \$150,000 to complete the estimated \$300,000 project.

That money, or most of it, will or could, probably come from a Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) loan. Possibly \$20,000 could be obtained from Cumberland Valley Area District's Area Development Fund, but that amount is not assured. With the present figures, and based on a \$150,000 FmHA loan, the city sewer bill could increase as much as 100 percent.

Based on 100 percent of the \$7.80 percent water bill for 2,000 gallons of water, the total bill would be \$15.60 for 2,000 gallons. The sewer bill is currently 75 percent of the water bill.

Earlier, Mayor Billy Bussell said the city does not have much of a choice but to remedy the plan. The Environmental Protection Agency

(EPA) has told the city to remedy the plant or face possible heavy fines.

Inspection of the sewer plant by the EPA in months past indicated raw sewage is running into the Dix River at times, especially after heavy rains.

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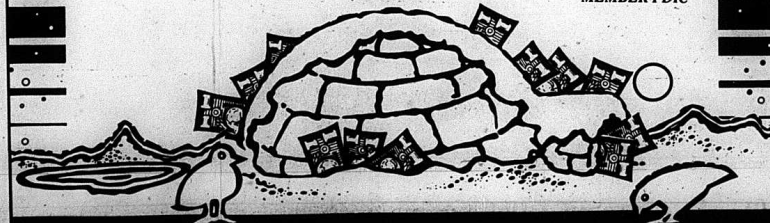
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Self-Evaluation

Beginning June 9, brother Danny McKibbin, having begun work with the Providence Church of Christ, will be writing the articles for this column. As editor for these religious articles over the past several years, I want to express my thanks to all who have read them and, hopefully profited from them. We have received many comments regarding these articles and for them we're also grateful.

In 2 Cor. 13:5 Paul said, "Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith..." With these words he challenged the Corinthians to engage in self-evaluation, a very important aspect of the Christian's life - important because SELF-IMPROVEMENT IS DEPENDENT UPON ACCURATE SELF-EVALUATION.

On the day of Pentecost Peter labored to bring the multitude to see themselves as they really were; the murderers of the Messiah. His success was evidenced by their question: "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" (Acts 2:37). They were now ready for self-improvement because they had been brought to accurate self-evaluation.

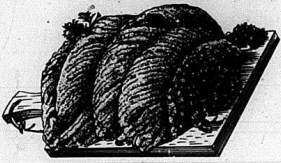
How can one come to see himself as he really is? The following steps should help.

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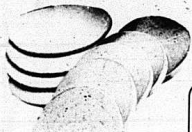


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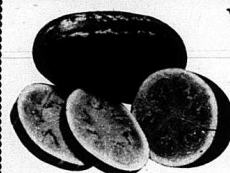

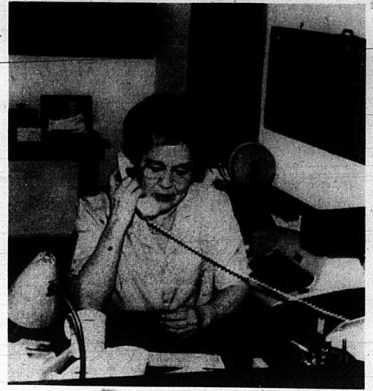

Water ballon toss causes window in bus to break

In the aftermath of a tragic collision of a Radcliff church bus and a pick-up on I-71 near Carrollton in which 27 children and adults died in a fiery crash several questions have been raised about the safety of school buses.

The bus involved in the crash was a 1977 model. Buses that are 1977 models or older supposedly have an increased chance of having their gas tanks erupt during a collision. This is due to the fact that these model buses do not have certain safety features that the later model buses have. In April of 1977 the Federal Government changed the requirements on school buses. The buses manufactured after April of 1977 are required to have two, tubular, steel bars running along the sides of the gas tank.

According to Richard Bray, Rockcastle County Transportation Director, the local school system presently has six large buses and two small buses that are 1977 models or older. The total of eight buses is out of an overall total of 63 buses that the school system has in operation.

The older buses that the school system operates are not driven on field trips or on the interstate" Bray added. Most of the routes that the six large buses have are in town or on rural routes where there is less traffic than in other routes where the traffic

is heavier. "In the future I expect that either the Federal Government or the State Transportation Board will require some changes in the older models such as where they are driven or require certain safety features to be installed" said Bray.

In another incident involving a school bus last Friday afternoon a bus driven by Robert Pybas was struck in the windshield by a water balloon thrown by an oncoming car. The balloon broke the windshield and sent bits of glass flying into the driver, Pybas, and a student who was sitting on the front of the bus. Neither Pybas or the student was injured by the glass.

Pybas was traveling from the high school to the grade school on West Main Street when the incident occurred. Pybas' bus was loaded with high school students enroute to the grade school.

After the balloon was thrown, Pybas turned the school bus around and followed the car back to the high school.

At the high school Pybas confronted the passengers in the car, Troy Lear and Doug Shields, along with two juveniles. They all denied the incident.

Tuesday, Pybas got a warrant against Lear and Shields. Further action was to be taken against one of the juveniles.

Strawberries High in Vitamin C

One cup of fresh strawberries provides more vitamin C than you actually need for the day and can take the place of your usual grapefruit half or glass of orange juice. Without sugar added, strawberries are low in calories—55 per cup. So sweeten them lightly, or not at all.

Do include them in your meals while they are plentiful. If there is a "pick-your-own" commercial berry patch in your area, it might be fun to patronize it. You pay less, you select your own red-ripe berries and know exactly how fresh they are.

Strawberries are good on breakfast cereal and easy to work into lunch and dinner menus, too. For an easy and different way to serve them, wash them under cold running water, leave the caps on, provide sour cream or plain yogurt to dunk them in.

Handle with care
In the berry patch or at the food market, avoid berries with large scabby or uncolored areas. These will be poor in flavor and texture, while costing just as much as the rest. Also avoid berries that are soft or have a dull, shrunken look. They are not fresh, and they are ready to decay. Berries are very perishable and spoilage spreads quickly.

For more than a few hours' storage time, spread strawberries on a cookie sheet or other shallow container and refrigerate them. To keep nutrients, flavor and a natural protective outer layer, do not wash or wash strawberries until just before serving. If they are fresh to start with and are properly refrigerated, they will keep bright and fresh for several days.

Strawberries picked at the right stage are quite a treat when frozen. Be sure to add ascorbic acid to help hold both flavor and color.

Strawberry Parfait

Here is an easy-but-elegant dessert to serve: Slightly crush clean, fresh strawberries. Sweeten them if you wish, then alternate them with layers of vanilla ice cream in a parfait glass or tall goblet. Top with whipped cream and a big, perfect strawberry with the cap still on.

Canning strawberries is not worth the effort. People used to can strawberries, but the product is disappointing. The color is very faded and the flavor is not too good. It is better to spend your time and effort in freezing strawberries, or in making jam, jelly or preserves.

To freeze strawberries, handle them in small quantities and freeze them at the peak of their maturity. To help hold color and flavor, add ascorbic acid to the sugar or syrup when you freeze the berries.

If you use ascorbic acid in crystalline form, use 1/2 teaspoon for each quart of strawberries. If you use an ascorbic acid mixture, follow the directions on the label.

It is not a good idea to freeze strawberries without sugar for pies. It is possible, of course, but I think you will be disappointed in the product. Sugar or syrup helps retain the flavor and color of strawberries. When using your frozen berries for pie, make allowance for the sugar already added.

What is the best way to prepare frozen strawberries for eating? That package in refrigerator for several hours and open just before serving. Frozen strawberries are at their best while there are still some ice crystals.

You can use frozen berries just the way you use them fresh in most recipes. Remember to allow for any sugar or syrup that was added in freezing.

Kentucky still tourist attraction

Tourism continued its six-year record of steady growth in Kentucky last year, generating more than \$4 billion for the first time, Gov. Wallace Wilkinson announced today.

The tourism industry contributed \$4.02 billion in direct and indirect expenditures, according to a study recently completed by the cabinet's Department of Travel Development. That represents a 7.4 percent increase between 1986 and 1987, after inflation is taken into account.

The study showed that tourism spending maintained more than 114,000 jobs for Kentuckians last year. An estimated \$283 million in tax revenues were generated by tourism expenditures.

Gov. Wilkinson made the announcement at the National Scouting Museum on the campus of Murray State University. The Governor was in two-day Kentucky with his cabinet for a two-day working visit called Capito to the Counties. The trip to the First Congressional District is the first in a series that will take the Governor and his cabinet to every area of the state to bring state government closer to the people.

The Governor was joined by Tourism Secretary Mary Ray Oaken for the announcement. A Cadiz resident, Oaken said that while she represents all regions of the state on behalf of

Kentucky tourism, she considers herself an ambassador for the west Kentucky region.

The news conference was hosted by Dr. Kala Stroup, president of Murray State University. The announcement included a presentation of Gov. Wilkinson's Boy Scout uniform to the museum, which will place it on temporary display.

The new tourism economic-impact figures were released as part of cabinet activities for Tourism Week in Kentucky, an observance proclaimed by Gov. Wilkinson to call attention to the industry's importance to the state economy. It corresponds with National Tourism Week, May 15-21.

Since the state began conducting an annual economic-impact study in 1981, tourism has maintained an average annual growth rate of more than 10 percent, when adjusted for inflation.

Appeals Process

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is proposing changes in the process that allows the public to appeal decisions made by national forest officials.

"We reviewed the current regulation and found that we needed to streamline, simplify, expediate and eliminate confusion in the appeals process," said F. Dale Robertson, chief of USDA's Forest Service. The proposal separates appeals on permits with the Forest Service to use or to occupy National Forest System lands from appeals involving objections to land and resource management planning and project implementation decisions.

Currently, all appellants use the same process. They can obtain review of a forest officer's decision at two higher levels of authority. For example, a district ranger's decision can be appealed to the forest supervisor and then to the regional forester. The decision can be changed at either of the levels.

Under the proposal, both types of appeals would be given a streamlined, one-level review at the next administrative level, with discretion for further review at one more level. Appeals involving special use permits would retain many of the features of the current rule. Contractual disputes would not be subject to either rule.

"Our appeals process is a valuable way to review key decisions, but it

had become too slow and too costly a tradeoff that impeded land and resource management activities," Robertson said.

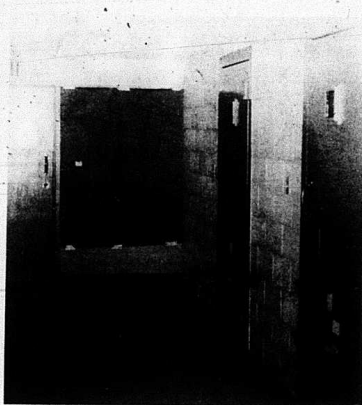
If the proposed rules are adopted, the Forest Service will monitor how well Deciding Officers and Reviewing Officers meet deadlines and prompt action will be taken to remedy excessive delays in processing of appeals, Robertson said.

The proposal will be published in the May 16 Federal Register. Comments on the proposal must be received in writing by July 15 and should be sent to F. Dale Robertson, Chief (1570), Forest Service, USDA, P.O. Box 96090, Washington, D.C. 20096-0900.

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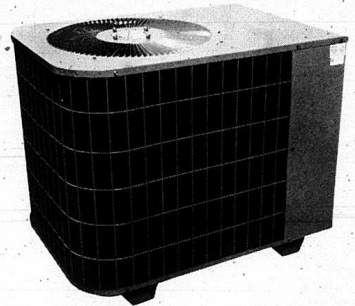

Renfro Valley & 50 Years

Renfro Valley also has its own newspaper, the Renfro Valley Bugle. Published since 1942, it has about 2,500 subscribers who never want to miss a single issue. It is tabloid size and contains such things as news of the valley, pictures of barn dance performers, quilt patterns, recipes, poems, and many of the old songs.

"The Bugle is a promotional device," Mrs. Henderson related, "It has a lot of information about the valley and items of interest that many of our fans want to know about." Discussing the philosophy of the valley, Mrs. Henderson said, "Renfro has enjoyed a reputation for simple, down-to-earth, genuine country music and atmosphere. We believe it is this sincerity that has come across to listeners and visitors alike, and has kept them coming back to Renfro Valley. The three most frequent responses to, 'What did you enjoy most from your trip to Renfro?' are, the old-time country music, friendly people and beautiful, peaceful surroundings and scenery."

"We are very proud of the fact that Renfro Valley has a favorable reputation throughout most of the United States, Canada and foreign countries," she continued. "This reputation is earned, and spread, through the medium of radio, and perhaps eventually television. We've heard many times that we need to make some changes to appeal to the younger people, and while this may be true in part, here's another point to consider. The music and entertainment that is geared to young people does not try to change to appeal to them as they grow older. They know that younger generations will keep coming on that will like what they do; so maybe the same is true for us. We appeal to the over 35 or 40 age group, teenagers who have grown up-- and this is an age group that continues to live longer, and thus constitute a larger audience. They are also the people that have the time and money to travel."

As for what's new in the future, the proposed Kentucky Country Music Hall of Fame will be a tremendous addition to the valley and Rockcastle County. The Kentucky Legislature at its session this year established Renfro as the Kentucky Hall of Fame. Also planned is a half-wall radio station just for the valley area. It will be non-commercial and specialize in nostalgia.

The Saturday night shows are not all the entertainment at Renfro. There are several special events, including Friday night gospel sings under the direction of Jim Waggoner of Knoxville, Tenn., and the annual all night gospel sing in August; this year, Aug. 6.

Your Child's Health

It is very common for a parent to say "Johnny caught his cold at the daycare...or the sitter or etc." They almost never mention he passed on the same bug to Susie at the same daycare.

It is common knowledge that children pick up viruses from others. Recently a prospective study was done to see how many more illnesses children in daycare had than those who stayed home. Prospective means a long study in which the children are followed for years and tested periodically instead of trying to go back and remember when they were sick in the past.

The doctors found that indeed those in daycare had more illnesses than those who stayed home. This should not be a surprise. However, there is also evidence, which will need to be confirmed over the next few years, that children who do not attend daycare will have MORE illness later in childhood and in early school years. There are many viruses to which children must develop immunity and they will do so when exposed; it just depends when the exposure occurs.

Parents should not make decisions about day care based on fear of their child catching something as they probably will; rather on the quality of the day care program and the suitability of other arrangements. All the usual childhood illnesses will catch up with the child sooner or later.

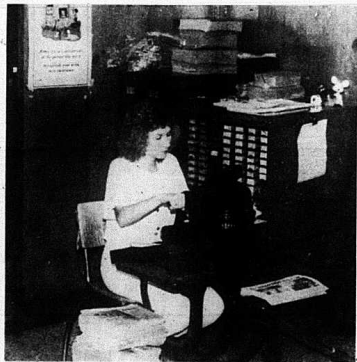

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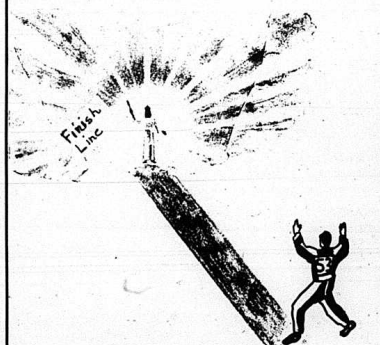

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ACP Sign-up begins Tuesday

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office has announced the second 1988 ACP sign-up period as being June 1 through July 15, according to D.G. Albright Chairman of the Rockcastle County ASCS Committee.

Mr. Albright stated that practices available to the farmers of this county include cover crops, new seedlings, renovations, water conservation, critical areas, and forestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices available for this period is available in the county office.

Seeding practices, both new seedlings and renovations must first have a current soil sample, in the County Extension Office before signing for Cost-Sharing.

Rockcastle Co. is now under the variable cost-sharing method. Requests are evaluated at the end of the sign-up period according to soil erosion. ACP practices which result in

the highest saving of soil may receive up to 75 % of the actual cost of completing the practice.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASCS Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

Mr. Albright urges Rockcastle County farmers interested in applying for ACP cost-sharing practices to bring their soil samples to the county agent's office as soon as possible. A soil sample must be turned in to the county agent's office before signing up for a cost-share practice. Remember July 15 is the deadline!
