### Cutting Machine

Millions of power lawn mowers have already been "fired-up" to begin the annual spring/summer grass cutting ritual. Unfortunately, this increased exposure, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, results in approximately 50,000 injuries every year.

Power mower accidents tend to result in cuts, amputations, burns, or deep-penetrating wounds from flying projectiles.

The following safety rules should be observed to prevent lawn mower accidents:

Wear steel toed shoes, eye and hearing protection.

Before you mow, clear the yard of rocks, sticks, toys or anything else the mower might pickup and fling.

After a rain or heavy dew, wait for grass to dry before mowing. Wet grass will clog the chute and cause you to slip.

If the chute clogs, shut off the mower and wait for the blade to stop turning, then clear it with a stick; never with your hands.

On hills, mow across the face of the slope with a walk-behind mower so your feet won't slip under the blades. With a riding mower, mow up and down the slope so you're less likely to tip over.

Never leave a running mower unattended and always clear all persons, especially children and pets from the area being mowed.

Fill the gas tank before starting the job. Never refuel a hot mower.

## GOOD NEWS ABOUT CHOLESTEROL

Experts are constantly studying ways in which high blood cholesterol can be handled. One good thing they found is that not all cholesterol is bad. Cholesterol is a fatty, wax-like substance that circulates in the blood. Some of it's used by the body to build cells and make hormones. In moderate amounts, it's vital for good health.

Cholesterol travels in the blood in "packages" of fat and protein called "lipoproteins." These are made in the body. Two kinds are:

HDL — high density lipoprotein. Often called "good" cholesterol, it appears to clear excess cholesterol from the arteries.

LDL — low density lipoprotein. Often called "bad" cholesterol because too much can lead to cholesterol buildup in artery walls. Most people with high total cholesterol have too much LDL. If you're among

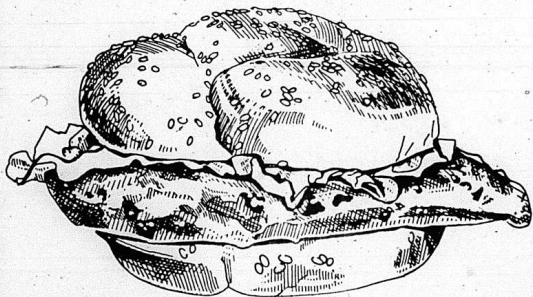

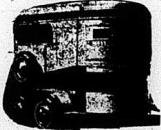

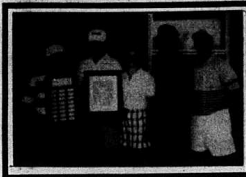

## Court date listed for fraud cases

Five Rockcastle residents have been summoned to Rockcastle Circuit Court June 10 to answer welfare fraud charges, a class D felony that could bring one to five years in prison.

Linda Jean Durham, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon, is charged with failure to report changes in factors affecting her eligibility for food stamps totalling \$2,159.

Janie Benge Robbins, of Rt. 1, Brodhead, is charged with receiving false benefits totalling \$3,998 in food stamps and \$1,880 in aid to families with dependent children.

Delphia G. McClure, Rt. 2, Livingston, is charged with accepting false benefits totalling \$1,298 in food stamps. Doris J. (Weaver) Ballinger, Route 1 Orlando, is charged with false benefits totalling \$1,056 in food stamps, \$634 in aid to dependent children and \$137 in heating assistance.

Thomas Arnold Cook of Mt. Vernon is charged with taking false benefits totalling \$1,254 in food stamps and \$111 in medical assistance benefits.

To be arraigned in Circuit Court on June 10 is Mark Baker of Rt. 1, Orlando, who is charged with assault in the first degree on Jeff Philbeck in a stabbing incident.

Also to be arraigned on June 10 is John L. Lamb of Rt. 2, Mt. Vernon, charged in two cases of assault in the first degree on Gary Griffin and Robin Mason in shooting incidents.

## Watch out for rabies

Close encounters of the animal kind increase when school lets out for the summer. Children must use care to avoid harm to themselves and the animals.

"The gravest concern, of course, is rabies," said Fred Servello, Extension wildlife specialist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. "Wild animals naturally avoid people. When one is acting friendly, or does not flee when humans approach, that animal may be sick. And although it does not flee when approached, it may bite if handled." If a child is bitten by a wild animal and the animal escapes, the child will have to undergo rabies shots as a precaution.

Servello said she's heard of no increase in the incidence of rabies in the state, but that prudence requires that an animal which bites a human and escapes be presumed to be rabid.

"You must wait to prevent rabies infection. You cannot wait to see if symptoms occur. There is no cure for rabies at that point," Servello said.

The chances of encountering a wild animal are not limited to rural settings. A study done several years ago in Cincinnati showed a greater concentration of raccoons in urban neighborhoods than in surrounding rural areas.

## Subscription rate increase

Postal rate increases have caught up with the Signal.

After July 1, subscription rates will be increased to \$12 a year in the county, \$15 in-state out of county, and \$20 a year out of state.

Postal rates increased substantially recently which in turn must be added to the cost of mailing The Signal.

If residents act now the price will remain the same until the July 1 date. See advertisement on page 6.

Many persons from other states who have roots in Rockcastle County always make it a point to visit local cemeteries on Memorial weekend.

Another event in the area saw several hundred persons turn out for a craft show at Renfro Valley Friday and Saturday.

It was the first craft show at Renfro, but it will likely become an annual event. About 30 craftsmen had booths at the show, described as excellent by many visitors.

Restaurants and camping areas were also busy during the holidays. Happily, there were no traffic fatalities in the county over the weekend, despite a crowded I-75 and Ky. 461.

## Post office site may change to Baker property

A trade is reported in the making that could see a change in the site for a new post office in Mt. Vernon.

At least, steps have been taken and the Postal Service has agreed to look at plans and consider a change to the Baker property on East Main Street.

Henry Hines, Mt. Vernon print shop owner, said he has sent a petition with about 40 names of business, professional and office holders to the Postal Service, all wanting the change to the Baker property, owned by Hines.

Hines said he told the Postal Service he is willing to negotiate a trade that would see the Baker property traded for the former Henderson property on Richmond Street, now owned by the Postal Service.

Hines said he sent a plat of the Baker property at the suggestion of the Postal Service.

"That does not mean they will make the trade, but it's a beginning," Hines said. "Many business people were unhappy that the post office would move to Richmond Street, so it was

easy to get people to sign the petition. It's a start."

The Baker property contains about 26,000 square feet with a 172-foot fronting on E. Main Street. The Henderson property is reported to be less. The Baker property, which Hines bought at auction for \$24,000, joins First Street and the courthouse on the west and Mt. Vernon city property on the east where the city plans a parking lot and fire station.

The Signal learned that should the Postal Service turn down the trade, the county might be interested in the Baker property for an addition to the county jail, possibly a juvenile facility and recreation area.

If the Postal Service gets the Baker property, it does not mean the new post office would be constructed soon. Plans are on hold for the new facility that is reportedly as much as two years away.

The Postal Service looked at several pieces of property before they purchased the Henderson property.

## Pioneer family member, W. W. Thompson dies

William Wallace Thompson Sr., a member of a pioneer Rockcastle family, died May 23, 1988 in Pompano Beach, Fla. He was 89.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Will Logue Thompson whose home was a showplace in Mt. Vernon for years. It stood opposite the Rockcastle County Courthouse on land that is now a parking lot. His father was a salesman and well known throughout Kentucky.

A native of Mt. Vernon, he visited yearly in Mt. Vernon until poor health intervened. Over the years he explored many county cemeteries making notations from tombstones. He still corresponded with local people and wrote letters to the editor of the Signal of which he was a subscriber for 70 years.

He was a graduate of Harvard University, Class of 1920, where he was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity.

The owner and operator of the Delta Tool and Supply Co., of Memphis, Tenn., he was a member of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR), Harvard Club of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., Flagler Museum of Palm Beach, Fla., a member of the

Kentucky Historical Society, the LaCrosse League of America and a Life Member of the Masons.

Mr. Thompson was a veteran of World War I, and during World War II, he was Commandant of the Yugoslav Refugee Camp in the Sinai Desert in Egypt. He had been honored several times for his work with refugees during the war years.

He was Organizational Secretary of the Frankfort, Kentucky Chamber of Commerce; general manager of the Mammoth Cave National Park Commission of Kentucky; and president of Kentucky National Park Commission Inc.

He is remembered by acquaintances in the county as a tall slender man with an engaging personality. He often commented that he would have retired to Kentucky, but because of medical reasons had to live in a more moderate climate.

He is survived by his wife, Gladys J. of Pompano Beach; a son, William W. Jr., of Port Naches, Texas; a brother, James of Rochester, New York, and three grandchildren. Private services and burial were held in Pompano Beach under the direction of Krazer Funeral Home.

## County budget

First reading of the county budget ordinance for 1988-89 was held by the Rockcastle Fiscal May 24th.

A second reading will be on June 7, the next regular meeting of the court, at which time the budget will be final.

As reported earlier, the budget totals \$11,100,800.

Also at the meeting was J.C. Rogers of the Kentucky Office of Public Accounts, who presented the state audit of county finances for the fiscal year that ended June 30, 1987.

In a letter to the court, the state office had comments and recommendations.

The audit suggested the court adopt an administrative code. Further, the county should obtain a pledge of securities on funds depository banks for all funds on deposit in excess of the legally insured amount of

\$100,000.

According to the audit, the county should invest general fund surpluses monies which was not done in 1986-87. The surplus was \$17,352. It recommended certificates of deposit or interest bearing checking accounts.

The audit warns that county funds should not show a deficit. As of June 30, 1987 the fund had a deficit of \$13,034. Kentucky Statutes does not allow the fiscal court to spend more money than it takes in.

The audit calls for former sheriff, William Taylor to settle taxing districts for all taxes and refunds due and advertising costs for the years 1982, 1983 and 1984.

The amounts owed are: County, \$2,262; health, \$313; extension, \$800, and advertising costs \$450.

# Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor:  
Teaching the truth of God's word results in various reactions from people. The Jews killed our Lord because He taught the truth (Acts 2:23, 36). Paul had enemies because he taught the truth (Gal. 4:16). On Mars Hill, when Paul taught the resurrection of the dead, some mocked (Acts 17:32). Because I teach the truth I have been held at gunpoint, laughed at, sneered at, but never before have I been accused of causing one to have blood pressure problems (Mt. Vernon Signal 5/26/88).

My critic, Naomi Edwards, wrongly accused me of "picking his pees, taking words here and there, and using them literally to prop up his opinion." She gave no proof for her assumption and had she taken the time to study the Scriptures I always cite, she would have readily known that her accusation was false.

Perhaps Mrs. Edwards was prompted to write because of my article "Why Teach Just One Church" (Signal 5/12/88). I showed from the scriptures that: (1) The Lord promised to build but one church (Matt. 16:18); and (2) He built but one body of church (Col. 1:18; Eph. 1:22-23). The church which He built is composed of every person who obeys the gospel of Christ (Acts 2:38; 1:47), and does have a name (Rom. 16:16). This is not my opinion but the Word of God.

She quoted part of John 3:16 and stressed that all who believe will be saved, then later said that one should repent of sins also. It is true that one must believe and repent in order to be saved, but the same Lord who said belief and repentance are pre-requisites to salvation (Luke 1:18; Eph. 1:22-23), also said that baptism is essential to salvation (Mark 16:16). I believe all the Lord said regarding salvation and everything else, not just part of it. Mrs. Edwards obviously believes only part of what Christ said is required for salvation. Could it be that I am not the one doing the picking and choosing of words to prop up an opinion?

"I am accused of 'judging' and 'consigning good people to a devil's hell'." I am not the consigner to either heaven or hell; Christ will do that at the judgment. His Word (all of it) will be the standard of judgment. (John 12:48). That's why I preach it! I want as many people as I can reach to avoid being placed on His left hand when he separates those who have done good (kept His word) from those who have done evil (worked without His law). (Matt. 25:31-46).

We certainly have no right to judge people for sins that we ourselves are guilty of (Matt. 7:1-5; Rom. 2:1-3). However we have Christ's authority to "judge righteous judgment"; that is, judgment which the law dictates (John 7:24). If all judgment is prohibited, then no one could criticize another for anything! Ridiculous, of course! Such prohibition would re-

quire no judge on the bench and no preacher in the pulpit. Mrs. Edwards thinks I am guilty of judging others and then proceeds throughout her letter to judge me. She also "judges" that many whom she knew have gone to heaven. That judgment is the right of the Son of God exclusively and no one but He has either the power or the insight to make that judgment. We have reason to have hope for our loved ones who have lived faithfully, but the final judgement will be His alone. We can judge only by outward appearance, but the Lord knows the heart.

Finally, far be it from me to want to raise one's blood pressure, but I do want to raise their consciousness, and if the truth I teach causes one to have high blood pressure, they need to go to the "Great Physician", Jesus Christ, and take His prescription - ALL OF IT. This will ease the guilty conscience and bring the blood pressure back to normal. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." Do you believe HIM?

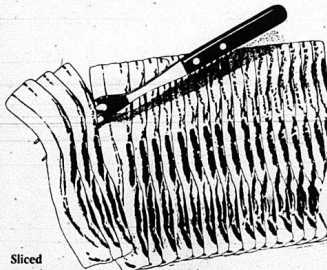

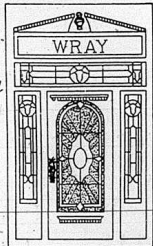

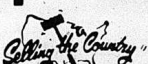

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## Filing deadline for school board positions

The filing deadline for candidates to run in school board elections this fall is September 1. Nominating petitions must be filed with the office of the County Court Clerk by 4 p.m. on that date.

Nominating petitions include information and qualifications on the candidate, along with signatures of at least 20 petitioners who desire and are legally qualified to vote for the candidate. Petitions may be obtained from the County Court Clerk, local board of education or the Kentucky School Boards' Association in Frankfort.

State laws stipulate the following requirements of school board mem-

- bers:
  - \* minimum age of 24
  - \* state citizenship for at least three years before election
  - \* voters registration in the district represented
  - \* high school education.
- Besides the statutory requirements, effective school board membership requires a considerable commitment of time and energy and a desire to work for the benefit of all school children in the community. Board members have a responsibility to the entire community not to be overly influenced by or obligated to any special interest groups.
- Other important qualities school

board members should have are decision-making skills, having the ability to judge people well, public speaking skills, creative thinking skills, organizational and planning abilities and positive thinking.

In this fall's election, there will be nearly 500 school board positions open in 177 of Kentucky's 178 school districts (all districts except Jefferson County). For information about school board elections in your community, contact your local school superintendent.

"Skunks and raccoons have become city dwellers. They stay hidden in the daytime, coming out to hunt for food after humans have gone to bed. If you feed your dog outside, and the

dog leaves any food in the dish, there's a good chance a raccoon will be along to finish it off before morning," Servello said.

Usually, though, it's the animal that gets hurt when children find them.

"Young birds often leave the nest before they are accomplished flyers. Children will find them flapping about in the yard and conclude that they are either injured or have been abandoned by their parents. Neither is the case," Servello said.

The result is that the young bird is brought into the house and installed in a shoe box which has been converted into a bird hospital. Attempts to feed the bird are generally unsuccessful, and it dies within a few days. It's difficult to raise baby birds even when you know what you are doing and have the proper equipment. The baby birds are much better off if left

alone. If children want to be of help, they can watch from a distance and protect the young bird from dogs and cats," Servello said.

The library owes Taylor \$396. Repeating previous figures in the next budget, the general fund is set at \$199,000; the road fund, \$650,000; jail fund, \$152,800; local government economic assistance fund, \$64,000, and the economic development fund, \$35,000.

Prior to the budget hearing, the court held two hearings. One hearing was on the use of county road aid but no one attended. No one attended the other hearing on use of the \$64,000 coal and mineral fund that goes to the county.

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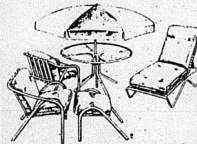

### ACP cost share program starts June 1

The sign up period for the ACP cost share program will begin June 1st and will run through July 15 at the Rockcastle County ASCS office. Practices eligible for cost share will include new grass seedings, grassed waterways, critical area treatments, ponds, and other specified conservation measures.

Eligible practices will be cost shared on a variable rate depending on the amount of soil erosion. The rates can run from 50%-70% of the total estimated cost.

The practices, following approval, may begin after contacting the local Soil Conservation Service. SCS will provide plans and specifications for the approved practices. SCS will also be available during construction to insure practices will meet specifications.

### Blue Mold

Already blue mold is rampant in wild tobacco in Southeast Texas. And already the Kentucky Blue Mold Network officials are monitoring its activity.

"So far we have not found any blue mold in Kentucky tobacco, but we will continue to monitor the situation throughout the growing season," said Don Hershman, University of Kentucky Extension plant pathologist who is coordinating Kentucky's alert system.

The fungal disease has probably been present in the state for a long time. However, in 1979, six diseases exploded and the state's producers lost some \$50 million. Subsequent infections were less damaging because farmers were better prepared for the disease, Hershman said.

The blue mold network was set up, Hershman said, to keep growers alert to its development and to advise them about how to lessen the chances of an outbreak in their field.

"If we find blue mold activity in Kentucky, or in states adjacent to Kentucky, we will issue a watch to growers to let them watch their plants for the disease. If widespread outbreaks seem imminent, we will issue a blue mold warning," Hershman said.

Both watches and warnings will be issued through the Department of Agricultural Communications at University of Kentucky. That department will issue statements to the media concerning the situation as it develops, Hershman said.

Farmers should monitor their fields and plant beds for signs of the disease. Any suspected cases should be reported to their county Extension agent for agriculture at once for positive identification. The agent will alert the network of the disease presence, he said.

The disease can appear in plant beds. Plants become stunted and will have distorted, yellowing leaves, he said. In the field, the disease first appears as small, roughly circular patches of pale yellow tissue on leaves. As the disease progresses, the patches turn bright yellow and finally they turn bluish as the fungus sporulates, Hershman said.

## EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

Herbs are easy to grow and require much less attention than vegetables. Once you plant them you can practically forget about them until harvest time.

Herbs are classified into two groups, annuals and perennials, which is a clue to planting them. Generally, annual herbs are started from seed sown in the spring and harvested in the fall. They complete their life cycle in one year. Perennial herbs usually are started from rooted cuttings and divisions of the plants' roots. Because the seed costs of most perennial herbs are hard, they germinate slowly.

Some of the most popular annual herbs are anise, sweet basil, borage, chervil, coriander, dill, geraniums, sweet majoram, sweet savory and

nasturtium. Most of these herbs like slightly sandy soils and a lot of sun, except nasturtium which prefers partial shade.

Popular perennial herbs include sweet bay, salad burnet, Roman chamomile, chives, comfrey, lavender, germander, horshound, hyssop, loyage, mint, rosemary, sage, winter savory, French tarragon, thyme, and lemon verbena.

When sowing seeds, make sure the seedbed is level and has fine soil. Sow the seeds in rows by distributing them on the soil surface and lightly covering them with fine sifted soil. Firm the area carefully and moisten the bed with a fine spray of water. Keep the soil moist, not soggy, until germination occurs.

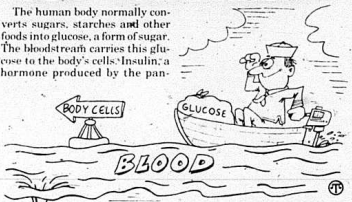
Transplant herbs on a cloudy day or late in the afternoon since tender seedlings will rapidly. A cup of starter fertilizer around each transplant will encourage rapid root growth.

If you plan to use cuttings, select ones from healthy, well established plants. Cuttings may be taken any time during the spring, summer or fall.

Either snap the cuttings from the plant or use a sharp knife. Stick them into three inches of rooting medium such as a mixture of one-half sphag-

## Did You Know?

The human body normally converts sugars, starches and other foods into glucose, a form of sugar. The bloodstream carries this glucose to the body's cells. Insulin, a hormone produced by the pan-



creas, enables the cells to use glucose for energy or store it for later use.

When a person has diabetes, either the body doesn't produce enough insulin or doesn't use it properly. Glucose builds up in the blood, that can lead to blindness, heart and kidney disease, gangrene and stroke.

People with insulin-dependent diabetes must have regular doses of insulin. Insulin can be derived from pigs and cattle, but these forms can cause an immune reaction in some people. Researchers found a way to create human insulin with recombinant DNA technology. Known as Humulin, it's less likely to cause an immune response in diabetics and is considered especially good for those with a long life expectancy.

num peat moss and one-half perlite, coarse sand or vermiculite. If sphagnum peat moss is used as part of the medium, add one tablespoon of limestone per gallon of soil.

After the cuttings have been stuck into the medium, place the container in a clear plastic bag. Make sure the plastic completely encloses the container and is air-tight to prevent

drying. Use pieces of wood or wire to keep the plastic from touching the leaves of the cuttings. During the time of rooting check the medium periodically to monitor water needs. Place the container in indirect sunlight within a few weeks, when the roots are about one-half inch long, transplant the cuttings to another container or into your garden.

### Your Child's Health

Ipecac is a medicine used to make people vomit after they have swallowed dangerous or poison substances. It should be in every home and day care and baby sitter's home. However, recently two brands were found to be mislabeled and have been recalled. What was intended to prevent poisoning has become a potential poison.

The Humco brand was recalled at the end of April when it was found that some bottles contained eucalyptus oil instead of ipecac. This stuff is used in vaporizers and in nose drops. The problem is that only a teaspoon of the pure oil can be fatal. The usual dose for inducing vomiting is several times this amount. It is very

important that you check and be sure you don't have any of this brand on hand. It has nationwide distribution and has been given away by poison control centers for poison prevention week. This is a very serious problem and there are thought to be as many as 40,000 suspect bottles on the loose.

The FDA has also recalled certain lots of Brite Life Ipecac syrup, lot 004715, expiration 7/92. It was found that tincture of iodine was labelled as ipecac. While this is not as serious as the eucalyptus oil, it must be checked for. Iodine would not induce vomiting when it was needed, and could have had bad consequences. Also, Brite Life Iodines Tincture, lot 004713, expiration 2/92 has been recalled as some of these bottles contain ipecac.

### CPR COURSE TO BE OFFERED

The American Red Cross has been offering courses in CPR to the general public for the past thirteen years. The schedule for CPR courses is as follows: June 18 - Adult CPR - 9 a.m. (approx. 6 hours).  
July 23 - CPR/BLS (Basic Life Support) - 8 a.m. (approx. 8 hrs.)  
September 10 - Adult CPR - 9 a.m. (Approx. 6 hrs.)

All classes will be held at the Berea College Nursing Bldg.
