

Watch out for rabies

Close encounters of the animal kind increase when school lets out for the summer. Children must use care to avoid harm to themselves and the

animals.
"The gravest concern, of course, is rabies," said Fred Servello, Extension wildlife specialist in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture will a control of the control sity of Kentacky College of Agricul-ture. "Wild animals naturally avoid people, When one is acting friendly, or does not fice when humans ap-proach, that animal may be sick. And although it does not fice when ap-proached, it may blie if handled. If a child is bitten by a wid animal and the animal escapes, the child will have to undergo rabies shots as a precaution.

Servello said he's heard of no in-enses in the incidence of rabies in

precaution.

Servello said he's heard of no increase in the incidence of rabies in the state, but that prudence requires that an animal which bites a human and escapes be presumed to be rabid.

You must treat to prevent rabies infection. You cannot wait to see i symptoms occur. There is no cure for abies at that point," Servello said.

The chances of encountering a wild animal are not limited to rural set-tings. A study done several years ago in Cincinnati showed a greater con-centration of raccoons in urban neighborhoods than in surrounding rural areas.

Pioneer family member, W. W. Thompson dies

Mr. Thompson was a veteran of World War I, and during World War II, he was Commandant of the Yugoslav Refugee Camp in the Sinai Desert in Egypt. He had been honed several times for his work with ored several times for his work with

He was Organizational Secretary
of the Frankfort, Kentucky Chamber of Commerce; general manager of the Mammouth Cave National Park Commission of Kentucky, and presi-dent of Kentucky National Park Concession Inc

Highas remembered by acquaintances in the county as a tall slender man with an engaging personality. He often commented that he would have retired to Mt. The audit suggested the court adopt an administrative code. Further, the county should obtain a pledge of securities on funds depository banks for all funds on deposit in excess of the legally insured amount of

According to the audit, the county should inve should invest general fund surpluses noneys which was not done in 1986-

snoula invest general runa surpluss moneys which was not done in 1986-87. The surplus was \$17,732. It recommended certificates of deposit or interest bearing checking accounts. The audit warms that county funds should not show a deficit. As of Juné on, 1987 the fund had a deficit of \$13,034. Kentucky Statutes does not allow the fiscal court to spend more money than it takes in. The audit audit calls for former sheriff, William Taylor to settle taxing districts for all taxes and refunds due and advertising costs for the years 1982,1983 and 1984.

The amounts owed are: County, \$2,262; health, \$313; extension, \$800, and advertising costs \$450.







Filing deadline for school board positions

"The filing deadline for candidates to run in school board elections this fall is September I. Nominating petitions must be filed with the office of the County Court Clerk by 4 p.m. on that date.

Nominating petitions include information and qualifications on the candidate, along with signatures of a test and are legally qualified to vote for the candidate. Petitions may be obtained from the County Court Clerk, local board of education or the Kentucky School Boards' Association in Frankfort.

State laws stipulate the following requirements of school board mem-

bers:

*minimum age of 24

*state citizenship for at least three years before election

voters registration in the district represented

*high school education.

Besides the statutory requirements, effective school board membership requires a considerable commitment of time and energy and a desire to work for the benefit of all school children in the community. Board members have a responsibility to the entire community not to be overly influenced by or obligated to any special interest groups.

Other important qualities school

board members should have are deci-sion-making skills, having the ability to judge people well, public speaking skills, creative thinking skills, organ-izational and planning abilities and

izational and planning abilities and positive thinking.

In this fall's election, there will be nearly 500 school board positions open in 170 femulcy's 178 school districts (all districts except Jefferson County). For information about school board elections in your community, contact your local school superintendent.

"Skunks and raccoons have be-come city dwellers. They stay hidden in the daytime, coming out to hunt for food after humans have gone to bed. If you feed your dog outside, and the

dog leaves any food in the dish, there's a good chance a raccoon will be along to finish it off before morn-ing." Servello said. Usually, though, it's the animal that gets hurt when children find them.

gets hurt when children find them.

"Young birds often leave the nest before they are accomplished flyers. Children will find them flapping about in the yard and conclude that they are either injured or have been abandoned by their parents. Neither is the case," Servello said. The result is that the young bird is brought into the house and installed in a shoe box which has been converted into a bird hospital. Altempts to feed the bird are generally unsuccessful, and it dies within a few days. It's difficult to raise baby birds even when you know what you are doing and have the proper equipment. The baby birds are much better off if left

alone. If children want to be of help they can watch from a distance at protect the young bird from dogs a cats," Servello said.

Safety in and on the water depends upon a number of things. It begins, of course, with the ability to swim well enough to care for once's self under ordinary conditions. It does not, however end there. Real water safety is also based upon such far gas as the ability to recognize and avoid harardous water conditions and paradicus sability to recognize and avoid harardous water conditions and paradicus sability to use self-rescue skills to get oul of dangerous situations is a factor. Finally, skill in rescuing or assisting persons in danger of drowing is a means of preserving that of someone else. The three major persons own life as well as saving that of someone else. The three major causes of drowing are, and always have been, failure to get out of dangerous situations, and lack of knowledge of safe ways in which to aid persons requiring assistance in the way. water. When Commodore Wilbert E. Longfellow started the Life Saving Service of the American Red Cross in 1914, he concentrated wisely on the organization and training of volunteer lifesaving corps throughout the country to supervise otherwise unguarded beaches. It soon became evident, however, that this was not the final solution to the problem of drownings, and changes in methods were reflected in the slogan coined by the Commodore: "Everyone is a swimmer, every swimmer is a life-saver." The slogan reflects the philosophy that the best kind of lifesaving is being able to swim well, and the next best way to cope with the acunteer lifesaving corps throughout

ACP cost share program starts June 1

The sign up period for the ACP cost share program will begin June 1st and will run through July 15 at the Rockeastle County ASCs office. Practices eligible for cost share will include new grass seedings, grassed waterways, critical area treatments, ponds, and other specified conservation measures.

tion measures. Eligible practices will be cost shared on a variable rate depending on the amount of soil erosion. The rates can run from 50%-70% of the total estimated cost.

The practices, following approval, may begin after contacting the coal Soil Conservation Service. SCS will also provide plans and specifications. SCS will also be available during construction to insure practices will meet specifications.

Blue Mold

Already blue mold is rampant in wild tobacco in Southeast Texas. And already the Kentucky Blue Mold Network officials are monitor-

Mold Network officials are monitor-ing its activity.

"So far we have not found any blue mold in Kentucky tobacco, but we will continue to monitor the situation throughout the growing season," said Don Hersgman, University of Ken-tucky Extension plant pathologist who is coordinating Kentucky's alert system.

system. The fungal disease has probably been present in the state for a long time. However, in 1979 the disease exploded and the state's producers lost some \$50 million. Subsequent infections were less damaging because farmers were better prepared for the disease. Hershman said. The blue mold network was set up, Hershman said, lo keep growers alert to its development and to advise them about how to lessen the chances of an outbreak in their field.

of an outbreak in their field.
"If we find blue mold activity in Kentucky, or in states adjacent to Kentucky, we will issue a watch to growers to tell them to watch out for


Kentucky, we will issue a watch to growers to tell them to watch out the disease. If widespread outbreaks seem imminent, we will issue about mold warning. Hershman said.

Both watches and warnings will be issued through the Department of Agricultural Communications of Lominersity of Kentucky. That department will issue statements to the media concerning the situation as it develops. Hershman said.

Farmers should monitor their fields and plant, beds for signs of the disease. Any suspected cases should be reported to their county Extension agent for agriculture at once for positive identification. The agent will aller the network of the disease can appear in plant beds. Plants become stunted and will have distorted, yellowing leaves, the said. In the field, the disease first appears as small, roughly circular patches of placy yellow tissue on leaves. As the disease progresses, the patches turn bright yellow and finally they turn bluish as the fungus sporulates, Horshman said.

Herbs are easy to grow and require much less attention than vegetables. Once you plant them you can practi-cally forget about them until harvest

time.
Herbs are classified into two

Herbs are classified into two groups, annuals and perennials, which is a clue to planting them. Generally, annual herbs are started from seed sown in the spring and harvested in the fall. They complete their life cycle in one year. Perennial herbs usually are started from rooted cutings and dividions of the plants' roots. Because the seed coats of most perennial herbs are hard, they germi-nate slowly. Some of the most popular annual herbs are aintse, sweet basil, borage,

herbs are anise, sweet basil, borage, chervil, coriander, dill, geraniums, sweet majoram, sweet savory and

lemon verbena. When sowing seeds, make sure the seedbed is level and has fine soil. Sow the seeds in rows by distributing them on the soil surface and lightly covering them with fine sifted soil. Firm the area carefully and moisten the bed with a fine spray of water. Keep the soil moist, not soggy, until germination occurs. germination occurs.

Transplant herbs on a cloudy day or late in the afternoon since tender seedlings wilt rapidly. A cup of starter fertilizer around each transplant will encourage rapid root growth.

If you plan to use cuttings, select ones from healthy, well established plants. Cuttings may be taken any time during the spring, summer or fall

Either snap the cuttings from the plant or use a sharp knife, stick them into three inches of rooting medium such as a mixture of one-half sphag-
