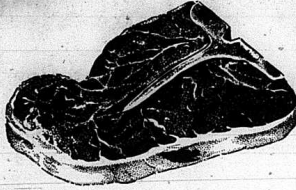

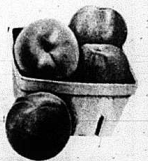

Brodhead again aims at eyesore

For the second time in as many meetings, the Brodhead City Council has taken steps to remedy unsightly and unkempt property in the city.

The council voted to send the owner of the property on U.S. 150 near the First Christian Church a letter advising them to clean up the property or the city will do it and send the property owner a bill. If there is no response, the city then will seek a lien on the property.

The property tax roll shows the property is owned by Anna Mae Lovett and lists her address as Brodhead. The property was once known as the Ed Reynolds property.

Mayor Billy Bussell said the house is deteriorating and the porch is about ready to fall down.

"It's about time we got these eyesores in the city cleaned up," one resident told the council. "I think we should, and I intend to come back to the council until that mess next to me is cleaned up."

His reference was to property listed on the tax rolls as belonging to Ray Alexander and located on the Sigmon/Pike streets area.

Mrs. Alexander attended the meeting and told the council she did not know her husbands whereabouts, but asked the council to give her until the end of the year to clear the property.

The council did not set a time limit, but told Mrs. Alexander she should start cleaning up the area as soon as possible and that the council would check before the July meeting to see if there was any improvement before taking further action or making a final decision.

Under State Statute 381.770 a city, county and unincorporated area can give a property owner a five-day notice by letter to clean up property or the city or county can clean it up and bill the property owner. Failure to comply, the city or county can file a lien on the property to recover the cost.

The letter sent to Alexander in Berea was apparently not claimed by Alexander. Post office officials in Berea said they had no address or forwarding address for Alexander.

City Attorney Jerry Cox said all that is necessary is to post the certified letter to the address listed on the property tax roll, then to continue with the cleanup after the prescribed time.

In another action, the council voted to take bids on cleaning and painting the city water tank.

The council also voted to make city elections nonpartisan.

Man rescued after fall from cliff

A Mt. Vernon man was found lying at the bottom of a cliff near Fairground Hill in Mt. Vernon Monday afternoon.

Eighth grader Jason Kirby was riding his bicycle near the cliff, which is on property owned by Kentucky Stone Company, when he heard someone yelling for help.

Kirby found Jack Abt, 24, lying in a rock pile at the bottom of the 30 to 35 foot cliff.

According to authorities, Abt had apparently been there overnight and had apparently jumped off the cliff.

After finding Abt, Kirby went to his home and got his brothers Doug and Stacey. Jason's older brother Doug called the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service.

Abt, who is listed in satisfactory condition at the University of Kentucky Medical Center, sustained a broken vertebrae in the incident.

Members of the Mt. Vernon Fire Department and the Rockcastle County Ambulance Service removed Abt around 12:45 p.m.

Vanhook was referring to the final plans for the new Mt. Vernon Elementary school which, if everything goes according to schedule, could see construction begin as early as Sept. 1.

Several members of the new school building committee were on hand to look over the final plans. The most noteworthy change from earlier plans of the facility was the reduction from a 900 student facility to a 800 student facility with three less classrooms and a scaled-down library.

Former school board chairman and member of the building committee, Dr. Rudolph Burdette, questioned why the facility had been reduced to a 800 student facility.

Supt. Bige Towery, Jr. explained that when the new school survey was completed in April it showed that the school system had several needs, such as Mt. Vernon Elementary, but also the facility at Livingston was listed as an interim facility. Since the

present enrollment at Mt. Vernon Elementary is about 800 the state department will not supply the funds for a 900 student facility when there are other needs in the school system that are very critical.

The final plans will be sent to Frankfort for final approval, Branscum Construction, construction manager for the project, will begin packaging of the bids in the near future. The opening of the bids could take place as early as Aug. 2.

Dupree and Company, a Lexington financial firm will be handling the sale and delivery of the bonds. A representative of the company was on hand to explain how the bond issue was going to work. Since Kentucky school boards can not issue bonds they must do either of two options. They can have the local fiscal court sell the bonds or they can create their own non-profit agency naming themselves, the board members as directors, and sell the bonds in this manner. Supt. Towery added that he had been in contact with members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and felt like that they were willing to help the school system in any way possible.

The employment of 12-month classified personnel took the board into executive session. Board member, Earl Cummins made the motion

Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation will celebrate 50 years of electrical service this year.

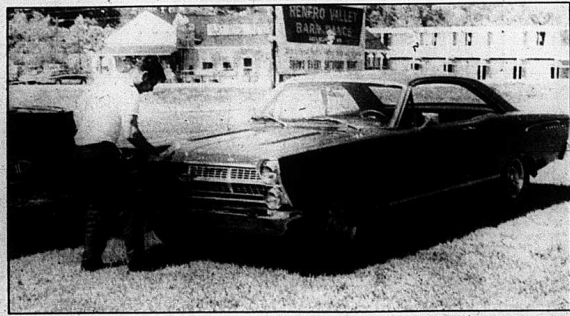

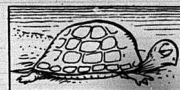
Glen Nicely, 18, a senior at Fairfield High School in Hamilton, Ohio, was one of 15 winners of a Scholastic Art Award in ceramics.

Members of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court

We have examined the statement of assets, liabilities, and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, as of June 30, 1987, and the related statement of cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in fund balances for the year then ended. We also examined the Sheriff's settlement - 1986 taxes for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1987. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards, the Single Audit Act of 1984, and the provisions of OMB Circular A-128, Audits of State and Local Governments, and the Audit Guide for County Governments, issued by the Office of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As recommended by the State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 68.210, the accompanying financial statements are prepared on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. This cash basis system does not require the maintenance of a general fixed asset group or general long-term debt group of accounts. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the assets, liabilities, and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County at June 30, 1987, and its cash receipts and disbursements and the Sheriff's 1986 taxes charged, collected, and distributed during the year then ended, in conformity with the accounting system described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

The accompanying additional information, provided on Schedule A through D, including the schedule of federal financial assistance programs, is not necessary for a fair presentation of the financial statements, but is presented as additional analytical data. This additional information has been subjected to test and other audit procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements mentioned above and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

As required by the Single Audit Act of 1984, we have reported on the county's financial statements (page 1), its system of internal accounting and administrative controls (page 23), and the county's compliance with laws and regulations (page 26). The following comments and recommendations were disclosed during our examination of the financial statements and our study and evaluation of the county's system of internal controls and its compliance with laws and regulations.

Prior Year Comments and Recommendations

In the prior year audit report, we reported several areas of noncompliance. Those that have not been corrected are commented on in the current year audit findings. The noncorrected findings are as follows:

- 1) An administrative code was not adopted.
- 2) County funds had deficit balances.
- 3) The former Sheriff, William Taylor, did not:
 - a) Settle all refunds due and amounts owed to the taxing districts.
 - b) Remit \$450 of advertising costs to the county.

Current Year Comments and Recommendations

Internal Accounting and Administrative Controls of All County Programs:

- 1) The Fiscal Court Should Adopt An Administrative Code
The county does not operate under an administrative code. KRS 67.710 requires the County Judge/Executive to prepare and submit an administrative code to the fiscal court, and KRS 68.005 requires the fiscal court to adopt an administrative code. We again recommend compliance with these statutes.
- 2) The County Should Obtain A Pledge Of Securities On Funds Deposited
KRS 66.480(1)(d) requires a pledge of securities from depository banks for all funds on deposit in excess of the legally insured amount (\$100,000). We recommend compliance with this statute.
- 3) The County Should Invest General Fund Surplus Monies
The county did not invest General Fund surplus during the fiscal year 1987. We recommend the county invest surplus funds in interest-bearing checking accounts or certificates of deposit.
- 4) All Jail Claims Were Not On File
There were 22 grocery and supply claims totaling \$6,919 that were paid by a statement only. We recommend each claim be accompanied by an itemized invoice for supportive documentation.

Compliance With Laws and Regulations - All County Programs

County Funds Should Not Have Deficit

At June 30, 1987, the General Fund had a deficit balance of \$13,034. KRS 68.110 does not allow the fiscal court to expend more money than is collected in a year. We recommend the fiscal court comply with this statute.

Other Comments and Recommendations - Sheriff's Settlement:

1) The Former Sheriff, William Taylor, Should Settle With Taxing Districts For All Taxes Owed And Refunds Due And Advertising Costs Due To County.

As reflected in the prior year audit reports, the former Sheriff (owing taxes on all districts and its due refunds from others for the 1982, 1983, and 1984 taxes). The total amounts owed and (refunds) due to the Sheriff for these three (3) years are as follows:

The former Sheriff also owes \$450 to the county for advertising cost.

We recommend the Library refund \$396 to the former Sheriff. We also recommend the fiscal court instruct the County Attorney to take appropriate legal action to collect the above liabilities.

2) The Sheriff Should Obtain A Pledge Of Securities On Funds Deposited

KRS 66.480(1)(d) requires a pledge of securities from depository banks for all funds on deposit in excess of the legally insured amount (\$100,000). We recommend compliance with this statute.

We are confident the above findings and recommendations will be useful to you in managing the operations of the county in a manner consistent with effective accounting and compliance controls.

Paul quoted scriptures to prove his point; for instance, in Rm. 15=9-12, he said "As it is written...again he saith...and again...and again Esaias saith...". Jesus used scriptures to turn away Satan in his temptations, Mt. 4=1-11 saying "It is written" which he did 3 times; vs. 4, 7, 10. Peter said "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God." I Pet. 4=11. Paul commanded "And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus." Col. 3=17. Thus we must have Bible authority for all we do and say.

Now to follow after the authority of men is to come short of divine standards, "for my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways saith the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts." Is 55=9. Jesus spoke very plainly of those who follow after the tradition of men or trust in human authority for what they do, Mt. 7=21-23, Mt. 15=1-14. Paul taught the same in Col. 2=8, "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men or the rudiments of the world and not after Christ." Thus human creeds, catholicisms, traditions, ideas and philosophies that come from human wisdom lead men away from Christ and not to him.

Friends, why not be satisfied with what Jesus has told us in the word of God? We are seeking to uphold, and stand on N.T. authority in all that we do at the Providence church, and not to go beyond that which is written. Let us know if we may study together.

Cooking with Herbs

Unlike years ago when only kings could enjoy the savory taste of certain herbs, we're free to choose any of these flavor enhancers to transform simple dishes into delicacies.

Health-conscious cooks know the benefits of herbs. Because of their flavors, herbs are excellent substitutes for salt and high-calorie season-

ings. According to Sue Barrier, foods and nutrition specialist with the Kentucky Cooperative Extension Service, the best way to find out which herbs you like with certain dishes is to experiment. To get started check the following list for suggestions.

*Herbs to use in meat dishes:

sweet basil, chervil, chives, dill, lemon balm, lovage, sweet marjoram, parsley, sage, French tarragon, thyme.

*Herbs to use in fish dishes: angelica, sweet basil, chives, dill, sweet marjoram, parsley, sage, French tarragon.

*Herbs to use in soups and stews: angelica, sweet basil, borage, caraway, chervil, chives, dill, lemon balm, lovage, sweet marjoram, parsley, thyme.

*Herbs to use in vegetable dishes: chervil, chives, dill, lovage, sweet marjoram, parsley, summer savory, winter savory, thyme.

Herb mixes make good replacements for salt. For an Italian herb mix, try the following:

- 3 T dried leaf oregano
- 3 T dried leaf marjoram
- 1 T dried leaf thyme
- 3 T dried leaf savory
- 3 T dried leaf basil
- 2 T dried leaf rosemary, crumbled
- 1 T dried leaf sage

Combine all ingredients and keep in tightly closed container. Use in meatballs, salad dressings, tomato sauces, eggplant dishes, and chicken and veal dishes.

For additional herb mix recipes and more information on herbs and spices as alternatives to sodium, contact your local Cooperative Extension Service office and ask for H.E. 3-229, Herbs and Spices.

Fire Fighter's Corner

Spring weather brings out the backyard chefs who insist that steaks, hot dogs, and hamburgers always taste better when they're cooked on a grill.

When you barbecue food, you may be enhancing its flavor, but you're also literally playing with fire. Being careless could cause serious injury.

Thousands of people are hospitalized each year for injuries they receive while using grills. Make sure you don't become one of them by following these rules:

Line the bottom of the clean grill with an inch of ash, gravel, or commercial charcoal base to absorb dripping grease and reduce flare ups. Set the grill on a level surface away from low branches, dry brush, or other combustibles-including the house or garage.

Follow package directions when using charcoal lighter fluid. Never substitute gasoline or other combustible liquids.

Never use the grill indoors. Burning charcoal produces carbon monoxide, an odorless, tasteless, lethal gas. Don't bring the grill in after using it, even if the fire appears to be out. Coals that are dry and cold to the touch can still be smoldering inside, giving off deadly carbon monoxide.

When you're finished grilling, don't empty coals into a cardboard box, toss them on the grass, or put them on any flammable surface. Charcoal has been known to re-ignite hours after it appeared to be out.

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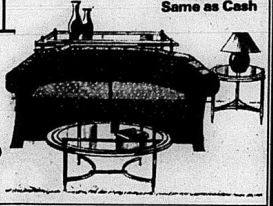

Your Child's Health

"Fever Blisters" or sores on the edge of the lips are a frequent source of pain and embarrassment for many children. Some children seem to have more problem with them in hot weather. Actually they are caused by

the Herpes simplex type 1 virus which usually infects children at one or two years of age. The child may have sores in the mouth which last a week or so until they build up antibodies to the virus. The virus then dies back and stays inactive in the edge of the lips and can be reactivated with stress such as a fever or other illness, or maybe even psychological stress. Then it comes out again as sores called fever blisters.

This virus is related to the more serious Herpes Type 2 virus which causes a bad venereal disease, but having fever blisters does not make you more susceptible to genital herpes.

Zovirax is an expensive ointment available by prescription which will slow the growth of the herpes virus if applied every 3 hours while awake for 7 days. A course of treatment will knock off a few days of the course of a bout with fever blisters, but will not make them go away immediately or forever. You will have to decide whether it is worth the expense and hassle of using this ointment. It is available over the counter in Australia, but it would be expensive to do there to avoid an office call with the doctor.

Benadryl, an antihistamine available over the counter will help the itching, and various over the counter drops and ointments may relieve some of the pain temporarily. Don't

use a cortisone cream on the sores. Longer or you are not planning a trip to Australia. Usually a bout last 7 to 10 days. See your doctor if it lasts much longer.

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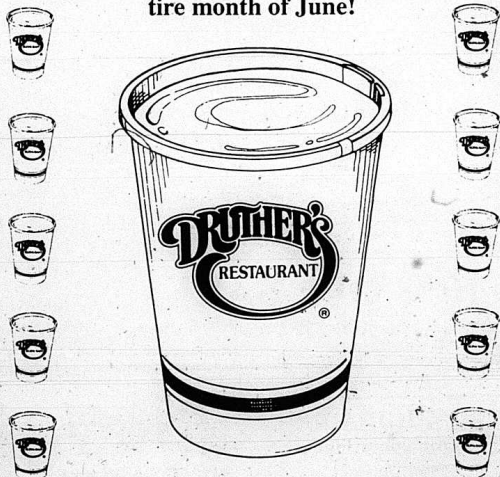

First, Anderson said, there is no need to pay any firm money to obtain any of the services provided by Social Security.

In return for the \$7 payment, this firm offers to provide a statement of a person's earnings covered by Social Security, a plastic Social Security card, and a guide to Social Security.

Any person can obtain a statement of Social Security covered earnings without paying anybody. All a person has to do is call any Social Security office and ask for a request for statement of earnings form. After completing the form and mailing it, the person will receive the statement in a few weeks. This firm can do no more.
