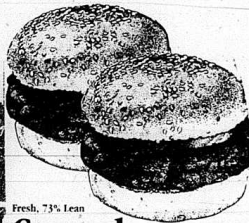
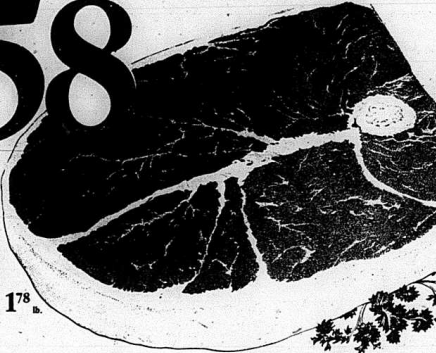

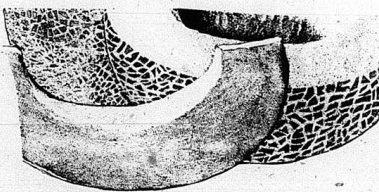

Youth found hanged in basement of home

A Mt. Vernon youth was found dead Saturday night in the basement of his West Main Street home.

According to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, Robert Wayne Cromer, 17, died as the result of an accidental hanging.

Cromer, who graduated from Rockcastle County High School only last month, was found by his younger sister Sherry about 7 p.m. Saturday. Dowell said that the youth had been dead for about 45 minutes and died as the result of suffocation.

The coroner, who lives across the street from where the incident occurred, said that he and Dentist John Parsons, who also lives on West Main Street, got to the scene about five minutes after the youth's body was found.

Speculation at first was that the youth had committed suicide, but Dowell said Monday that was not the case.

The coroner said that he had done a complete investigation into the death and that it was an accident.

Dowell declined comment on how the accident occurred.

Fall from truck injures girl

A 14-year-old Mt. Vernon girl remained in satisfactory condition Tuesday in the University of Kentucky Chandler Medical Center after she fell out of the back of a pickup truck Saturday near Berea.

Diane Griffin was riding in the back of the truck driven by Steve Griffin, 36, of Mt. Vernon, according to State Police at the Richmond Post. The truck was traveling east on Ky. 21 about a mile west of Berea. It rounded a curve, police reported, and the girl was thrown from the truck.

Police said she struck her head on the pavement. She was taken to Berea Hospital and then transferred to Lexington.

Housing grant

A grant for \$26,082 to the Mt. Vernon Housing Authority has been approved by the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The money is used to subsidize rent for low income families, general operations, and maintenance and utilities.

The housing is on Town Hill and on Lovell Lane. It is about the same amount grant as last year.

Woman dies in car crash

A Tazewell, Tenn., woman was killed last Thursday night in a single car accident on I-75.

According to Kentucky State Police at the London Post, Kathy Lynn Helton, 24, was apparently traveling at a high rate of speed when she left the road and struck a rock embankment two miles south of the Burr Exit near the 57 mile marker.

Miss Helton's body was found 18 feet from her 1984 Nissan Maxima, according to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell. Dowell said that Miss Helton, who was not wearing a seat belt, was thrown from her car upon impact.

Miss Helton was dead on arrival at the Rockcastle Hospital. According to Dowell, Miss Helton died from massive head injuries.

Miss Helton's death was the third fatality in Rockcastle County this year. All three accidents occurred on I-75.

Road funds

Gov. Wallace G. Wilkinson has announced the approval of 1988-89 Rural Secondary Program for Rockcastle County.

"This program provides funds for both maintenance and improvement projects on rural state roads," said Wilkinson. "This year Rockcastle County has been budgeted \$333,400 for maintenance of its 115 miles of state roads."

Wilkinson said the state will also resurface 2.1 miles of Kentucky

Group questions water pressure

A delegation of water users from the Western Rockcastle Water District complained of low water pressure, or none at all, at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

The city furnishes water to the district, as well as Brodhead and the Northern Rockcastle Water District. Bill Randolph told the council in the Sprio area of the county often times there is just a trickle of water or no water at all. He asked if the city is cutting down on the supply causing the pressure to fall, or knowing of some other cause.

Gary Allen also complained to the council reporting he has the same problem and had no water at all during the Memorial Day weekend. Denver Burton, president of the district, also voiced his opinion of the problem and asked the council to meet in a called session to exclusively discuss the water problem. The council agreed and set 7:30 p.m. June 28 at city hall.

Jack Crawford, engineer for the city water project, told the group the city has now completed renovation of the water plant and a new 600,000 gallon water tank on Town Hill has been put into service. He said he believed the water supply would be better now. The group agreed the pressure has been better since last Thursday.

"Councilman Tommy Bussell told the group the city contract with Western calls for furnishing three million gallons of water a month to the district. He said in May the city furnished over six million gallons. Crawford noted that he did not know precisely what problems were occurring in the district since he is not the district's engineer, but said he would attend the meeting and offer any advice he could.

In other council action, the council voted to install three new street lights. They are to be at S & T Store on Williams Street, on Liberty Street and on Ford Drive.

The council was told progress is being made on the T-hill Field at the park on old Brodhead Road.

Tabled until next meeting was a request from Kenneth Hopkins to buy a strip of land from the city for a driveway to the rear of Sears Store on East Main Street.

The council voted to continue to have Griffin and Co., of Mt. Vernon

do the annual city audit at a cost of \$5,195.

The council was told this year's Municipal Aid money for street repairs and a few other items will total \$28,000. The city still has \$25,000 left over from last year's Municipal Aid.

The council voted to amend the 1987-88 city budget to include a total of \$53,558 that was paid out over and beyond the amount budgeted last year.

The increase was caused by an increase in liability insurance, work on police cruisers, an increase in fire

department expense, and an increase in office supplies when the city converted to computer billing.

The first reading of the city's 1988-89 budget was held by the council.

The city budget for 1988-89 totals \$181,176.

The budget is only \$1,641 higher than last year's budget of \$179,533.

The Water Department budget is \$337,700 for 1988-89 compared to \$327,535 last year.

The Sewer Department budget is \$294,275 compared to last year's \$200,600 an increase due to an ex-

Griffin gets 30 years

A Rockcastle County man was pleaded guilty Monday in Rockcastle Circuit Court to murder and tampering with physical evidence.

Gary Griffin, 26, of the Mt. Vernon area, pleaded guilty to the gruesome murder of David Bralley, 19, of Livingston on Dec. 26, 1987.

Griffin along with Terry Miller and Billy Gene Hubbard, both of Mt. Vernon, have been charged with the murder.

David Bralley's body was found in a roadside garbage dump on the banks of Crooked Creek at Popular Gap by some hunters on Dec. 26, 1987.

According to police reports, Bralley was shot twice with a .30 caliber pistol while riding in a car with Griffin, Miller and Hubbard.

Police think the men had been playing cards the day of the shooting.

According to Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs, Griffin

was actually the one who shot Bralley. The other two allegedly assisted Griffin in disposing of Bralley's body and trying to destroy all of his identification.

Hubbard and Miller are scheduled to go on trial June 27 in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

Fires reported

Three fires, all on Saturday, kept Mt. Vernon firemen busy.

Firemen extinguished a fire in a farm tractor belonging to Kenneth Adams on Brindle Ridge. The fire damaged the wiring and front tires. It had been in use only a short time before the fire started.

Firemen extinguished a grass fire in a lot in Evergreen Subdivision at Mareburg.

Fire destroyed a van on I-75 near the 64-mile marker. The van was owned by Robert Peterson of Atlanta, Ga.

USDA changes grazing regulations

Because of extremely dry weather across the state this spring, the U.S. Department of Agriculture yesterday gave 31 Kentucky counties, including Rockcastle, approval to allow haying and grazing on land previously set aside under the federal feed-grain conservation program.

Other counties with approval to start allowing farmers to use the land are Adair, Christian, Clinton, Cumberland, Daviess, Edmonson, Grayson, Green, Hardin, Hart, Henderson, Hopkins, LaRue, Lincoln, Logan, Marion, Meade, Mercer, Monroe, Nelson, Nicholas, Oldham, Owen, Simpson, Taylor, Union, Warren, Washington, Webster and Woodford, the offices of U.S. Rep. Larry Hopkins, R-Lexington, and Sen. Wendell Ford announced yesterday.

Of all the applications submitted, only one — that of McLean County — was refused.

Applications by at least seven other counties — Butler, Boyle, Calloway, Ful-

ton, Garrard, Lewis and Livingston counties — still await department approval.

U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers who announced the U.S. Department of Agriculture decision, said the area has been "suffering drought conditions for several years in Kentucky, but it has become particularly severe this spring."

"Farmers already are dipping into

their hay supply and selling off animals because of the lack of grazing," Rogers said. "We have a real emergency on our hands and this action by the USDA will help some."

Rogers had contacted the USDA to urge the action.

Farmers should sign up for the program with their local Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service office.

Ford appointed to committee

Rep. Danny Ford, R-Mt. Vernon, has been appointed by Don Blanford, Speaker of the Kentucky House of Representatives, as an alternate member to the Fiscal Affairs and Government Operations Committee of the Southern Legislative Conference.

Ford, who has served in the General Assembly for four terms, said he is looking forward to working with the legislative members of the con-

ference from the other sixteen southern states which make up S.L.C.

Ford said the S.L.C.'s objective is to address mutual problems that the membership might share. "The conference provides issue information to the states on current national trends and pertinent statistics," he added.

The conference members often work to influence decisions made in Washington by lobbying legislators

Nursing Home Care Must Be Our Top Priority

This week, the House of Representatives voted not to consider legislation to provide long-term home health care for our elderly citizens. We rejected the legislation because, despite its claims, the bill omitted the broader needs of long-term health care, in particular the need for nursing home care.

All of us in Congress agree that long-term home health care for our senior citizens is an important health need. And we in the Fifth District understand that, too. For years, our families have cared for elderly relatives who needed the attention they get at home. But this bill which was brought before us, while dealing with the needs of the homebound, carried with it a huge price tag and real potential for driving up our budget deficit higher and higher in the years ahead.

I voted against consideration of this bill for several reasons. First, the scope of the bill was far too narrow. It focused strictly on home health care, completely ignoring nursing home care, where many of our elderly must eventually be placed. It is the cost of nursing home care which often bankrupts our elderly and their families. To ignore this basic fact was wrong, and was a major reason for my vote.

Second, the bill eliminated options for families who have a chronically-ill person living with them. Home health care is viable for some elderly, but not all. Yet by loading all our federal benefits on home care only, we would give a strong disincentive to people who actually should be placed in a nursing home. We should not limit the options for senior citizens to find the setting that best suits them.

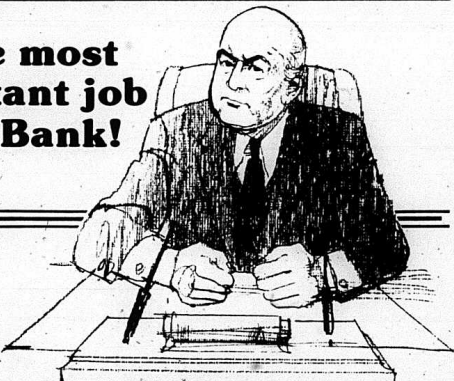
Third, the bill has serious budget problems. The Congressional Budget Office estimated that the bill would cost \$30 BILLION over the first five years but that soon afterward, costs could rise astronomically. By creating another open-ended entitlement program at a time of budget crises, we would have bankrupted the Medicare trust funds which would have paid for this new program.

The rising cost of medical care, particularly for our elderly, concerns all of us. That is why the week before, I voted to support the Catastrophic Health Care bill approved by Congress. That legislation is self-financed and will help Medicare recipients stave off financial ruin by placing limits on their out-of-pocket expenses in a given year for medical care and hospitalization. But to make promises about long-term home health care that we might not be able to keep down the road is irresponsible and is unfair to our elderly. The legislation we voted down this past week simply had too many flaws in it to rush it through Congress.

We need to address the home health care issue, but we need to do so in concert with our budgetary constraints in mind. We need to create a system that can help people stay at home if they want, while not creating huge new federal obligations. We need to find ways to involve insurance companies in helping provide home health care coverage for the elderly. Most important, we need to help the elderly avoid having to lose their life savings when they go into a nursing home. I intend to push for such legislation as the House continues to work on this issue in the months ahead.

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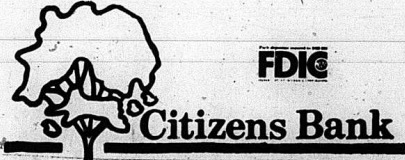

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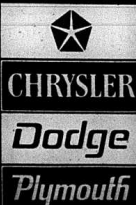

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Artist finds fulfillment in painting

When you look at the paintings of Mabel Davidson, you know you are seeing the work of a talented artist.

Mabel not only accurately reproduces her subjects, but she displays an innate sense of balance and movement.

Mabel has not spent a majority of her 48 years painting. In fact, she only began doing what she had for many years secretly desired to do in 1981, after she had been laid off from a job and after her two children—Anthony and Judy had both "left the nest". It was in 1981 that she took eight to ten oil painting classes in Richmond.

Those classes were Mabel's start on an adventure that has meant fulfillment for her. Although Mabel always felt she could do art, she was hesitant to attempt art work because of some unfortunate experiences as a school girl.

Mabel feels that her inspiration for, and love of, art came to her as a young child from a little scrap book her mother (Addie Dooley Martin) made. Mabel and her brothers and sisters "played with that little art

book until it wore out and it stayed in my mind".

Addie Martin is thrilled by her daughter's work. "It's almost like she got to do it," Mabel said. Addie and Mabel's daughter Judy are Mabel's two biggest fans. Mabel's father Henry C. Martin died in 1973.

Because of her love for farm life and the beauty of nature, most of Mabel's paintings are of Eastern Kentucky's hills and valleys, old homesteads and things that relate to the mountain heritage. The Davidson's farm in Three Links provides excellent opportunities for seasonal views of the surrounding hills. Mabel was born and raised in Three Links and she and her husband Arnel have lived there 24 years. Arnel has been a machinist at Parker Seal in Berea for 29 years.

In 1983, Mabel started exhibiting her paintings in Homemaker exhibits. She has been an active member of the Jackson County Homemakers since its inception in 1970. She serves on the Extension Council and the Berea Arts Council.

In 1985, Mabel "got serious" about

painting but of course she found it difficult to make much money at it. She does make enough now to cover her "expensive" painting habit by producing paintings of home places for customers. Mabel charges \$4 per hour for her work. Home place paintings take her 20 to 50 hours to paint depending on the size and details.

Eventually Mabel would like to make a profit with her painting and as her work becomes better known, she gets more customers. Recently her painting, "Uncle Hobert's Old Blondie" was chosen to be exhibited in the Second Annual Regional Art Exhibition at the Greenwood Mall in Greenwood, IN. The same work was selected to be published in the Third Edition of the Encyclopedia of Living Artists in America.

Mabel exhibited her work in the recent Jackson County Art Show and has entered various exhibits in surrounding counties and area, state and regional exhibitions. She presently sells art supplies and prints of "Old Blondie" and "Pioneer Homestead", —her two paintings which have been made into prints—at the Mini-Mall in Berea on 25N.

With every painting she produces, Mabel attaches a Bible verse. Each time she works on a painting, a verse comes to her. Mabel's life as a Christian and her faith in God is very important to her and she ascribes her artistic ability to God-given talent.

She and Arnel attend the Three Links Christian Church. Mabel worked for 20 years as a bookkeeper and still does bookkeeping part-time and also does cake decorating. But painting is her passion and she hopes soon to be able to devote two to three full days per week to her art. With continued success and the continued encouragement of Arnel and the rest of her family, Mabel may realize that dream sooner than expected.

Williams convicted on 14 counts

Berea attorney Nicholas (Nick) Williams has been convicted on 14 counts of aiding and abetting, and conspiracy in a case involving the embezzlement of \$3 million from Northern Kentucky Bank & Trust.

Williams, who pled not guilty, was tried in U.S. District Court on charges stemming from a 1986 indictment. The indictment named Williams, former Northern Kentucky Bank & Trust president Ervin Enzweiler of Melbourne, Fla., and Thomas Rhein of Clearwater, Fla., and William Hoffman, a certified public accountant and general partner in Mineral Associates Limited Partnership of Baltimore, Md., as co-conspirators.

The 44-count indictment said Rhein, Williams and Hoffman induced Enzweiler to misuse bank money for their personal gain. Rhein used loans from Mineral Associates, using letters of credit that Enzweiler had issued on Northern Kentucky Bank & Trust. A letter of credit makes the issuer a co-signer for a loan.

The indictment went on to say that Rhein subsequently defaulted on the loans. Mineral Associates then called on the bank to pay the loans, plus interest. The loans were paid by the bank; but Rhein did not pay back the money, which neared \$3 million in various transactions. Williams was legal adviser to Triple A Coal Company.

The bank filed a \$13.5 million lawsuit against the four men after the alleged scheme was uncovered in January 1983. The lawsuit was settled out of court last year. Last month in U.S. District Court, Enzweiler and Rhein pled guilty to one count of conspiracy and one count related to the issuance of a letter of credit that was not authorized by the bank's directors. Prosecutors agreed to dismiss remaining counts against Enzweiler and Rhein in exchange for their guilty pleas.

Williams and Hoffman, who pled not guilty, were tried together. Their trial, which lasted almost a month, ended May 26 in Lexington. Hoffman was convicted on all 36 of the charges brought against him. Williams was convicted on 14 of 15 charges lodged against him.

According to Assistant U.S. Attorney John Compton, who prose-

cuted the case with fellow Assistant U.S. Attorney Jane Graham, Williams was convicted on two basic offenses. Compton said Williams had conspired with Enzweiler to issue letters of credit on behalf of Rhein's Triple A Coal Company without the approval of the board of directors; and that he had knowingly written between \$100,000 and \$125,000 in checks on accounts held by Triple A Coal in which there were no funds. Enzweiler, as bank president, honored the overdrafts.

The case was heard by District Judge Eugene E. Siler Jr., who will also impose sentence. Sentencing is scheduled for July 29 in U.S. District Court, Lexington.

In an unrelated case, Williams has

been indicted by the U.S. District Court grand jury on two counts of making false statements to the Social Security Administration about client fee. That trial will begin July 17.

"What Saith the Scriptures"

In Mk. 7:7-8a Jesus said "Howbeit in vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men, for laying aside the commandment of God, ye hold the tradition of men." What was true of those of Jesus' day is just as true of many today. People will set aside the commands and teachings of Jesus to follow their human traditions.

A perfect example of this is: When people substitute sprinkling and pouring for baptism (i.e., an immersion in water). The reason I know Bible baptism is an immersion is because Paul said in Rm. 6:4 "Therefore we are buried (emphasize mine) with him by baptism into death: That like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." Again in Col. 2:12 "Buried with him in baptism." Only an immersion; completely going under the water, can one be buried with Christ in baptism. How many bury their loved ones in a cemetery by pouring or sprinkling a little dirt over them? Why, of course, they are buried, "six feet under." Christ was buried in a solid rock tomb that had been hewed out, Mt. 27:60. They did not sprinkle or pour a cup of gravel on him to bury him. Surely every honest soul can see that baptism is a burial that requires an immersion.

In Lk. 7:30, we learn of those who refused the baptism of John, "But the Pharisees and Lawyers rejected the counsel of God against themselves, being not baptized of him." John's baptism was forth heaven, Mt. 21:25, and thus rejecting his baptism was to reject the counsel of God. Friends if you have been sprinkled or poured thinking you have obeyed God, why not repent and obey God's truth? There is no longer any need to set aside the command of God any further. Reject the tradition you have followed and accept the word of God in your hearts, and obey Christ's truth in your life.

Only those who obey Jesus will be saved, Hebs. 5:8-9, Mt. 7:21-27, and I Cor II Thess. 1:7-9 warns that those who "obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ" shall be "punished with everlasting destruction." 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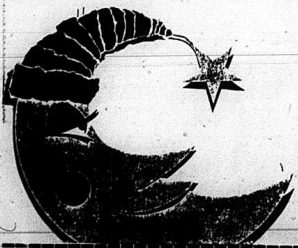

Tractors are nice, but Kate and Rodie are family, Linville says

When something works, don't fix it. That is a motto that many people, including Ed Linville, still believe holds true.

Through the many changes that farmers have experienced in the past 40 to 50 years, Linville continues to use several of the older methods of working the land because "it works just fine."

Linville, 68, has seen many changes in farming since he first worked the land in Rockcastle County. He came to Berea in 1947

and was employed at the Richmond Army Depot for 26 years while tending his farm at night and on weekends.

"I just love to work those mules. I enjoy working them and they kind of like it too," said Linville. "I've got a rough farm and a man would get

killed on one of those tractors."

While Linville sits in the cool breeze blowing across his back porch, his mules Kate and Rodie stand ready near the gate at his barn. Linville said, "They know what to do, you just tell them and they'll do it."

Linville trains the mules himself and Kate and Rodie never seem to give him any trouble while being harnessed or hooked to the plow. The mules even back up to the sled or mower without instruction or coaxing to do so.

Linville said he doesn't raise tobacco anymore but has some corn, hay and a good garden. He also has a few hogs.

"Once some guys wanted to get some wood from back up the hill and they took their four wheel-drive up there... Me and Jack, a mule I used to have, had to go pull him, truck, wood

and all out of there," said Linville. Linville retired from the Army Depot in 1977 and tends his 56 acre farm full time.

Linville said, "I can't read, except the Bible. When I started following the Lord he let me read the Bible. I only had a fourth grade education and back then my aunts and uncles were the teachers and they didn't make me to anything."

Tradition is not the only reason Linville uses mules on the farm. Cost has a lot to do with it. A new tractor can cost as little as a few thousand dollars as much as \$90,000.

"I have everything I need here to run a farm," Linville said. "I have the plows and rakes and sleds and my mules do whatever I need. I taught them what gear and how and come-up means and I don't even have to work the reins much. They know what to do and I just let them do it."

Linville has trained his own mules throughout his farming years and sometimes uses other mules to train his.

Many area farmers over 60 may remember when horses and mules were the only means of transportation and the only way to pull the plow through the fields. Since the coming of the car and the tractor, mule work has become a rare sight but there are still a few locals who have a firm grip

on the lessons they learned as children.

There are still some who prefer water from a well, and fresh meat instead of preserved foods. Hand made quilts and wooden crafts are very popular in the area.

Like Linville, there are several people who still hold to that old tried and true expression... "when something works, don't fix it."

State Transportation Secretary Milo D. Bryant said the Rockcastle County program and projects are estimated to cost \$246,365. He added that projects are expected to be accomplished by contract and advertised for bids as soon as possible.

panded sewer plant which saw depreciation jump from \$18,557 last year to \$92,500 this coming year.
Expenditures for the general fund shows: police salaries \$65,000; city attorney \$600; treasurer, \$64; city clerk, \$2,917; fringe benefits, \$6,000; health insurance, \$18,000; life insurance, \$400; dispatcher, \$1,500; street cleaning, \$6,919, and administrative costs, \$2,400 for a total of \$103,800.
Operating expense total \$77,376 include: Printing, \$3,000; professional fees, \$3,000; gasoline for police, \$6,700; fire department, \$1,500; boat dock, \$500, vehicle maintenance, \$5,000; utilities, \$15,000; telephone \$4,000; postage \$200; insurance, \$30,000; office supplies, \$1,500; Kentucky Municipal League dues, \$376; Cumberland Valley Area Development District dues, \$600; street improvement, \$5,000 and sidewalks \$1,000.
Revenue to finance the budget includes money from property tax, vehicle tax, municipal aid, parking meters and other and totals \$181,176.

face mayors and councilmen these days.
Mayor Baker did not attend the Monday meeting. Her husband was reported to be extremely ill. Councilman Burdette read both letters. He also served as mayor after appointed by the council to serve at the one meeting. Councilwoman Clarice Kirby did not attend the meeting.
