Youth found hanged in basement of home

A Mt. Vernon youth was found dead Saturday night in the basement of his West Main Street home. According to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, Robert Wayne Cromer, I7, died as the result of an accidental hanging. Cromer, who graduated from Rockcastle County High School only last month, was found by his younger sister Sherry about 7 p.m. Saturday. Dowell said that they outh had that by outh had her benedied for about 45 minutes and died as the result of sufficación.

the result of suffocation The coroner, who lives across the street from where the incident oc-cured, said that he and Dentist John

cured, said that he and Dentist John Parsons, who also lives on West Main Street, got to the scene about five min-utes after the youth's body was found. Speculation at first was that the youth had committed suicide, but Dowell said Monday that was not the case.

The coroner said that he had do complete investigation into the death and that it was an accident.

Dowell declined comment on how

the accident occurred.

Police said she struck her head on the pavement. She was taken to Berea Hospital and then transferred to Lexington.

A Rockcastle County man was pleaded guilty Monday in Rock-castle Circuit Court to murder and tampering with physical evidence. Gary Griffin, 26, of the Mt. Vernon

Mt. Vernon Mayor Elizabeth Baker resigned her position effective July 12, in a letter to the city council Monday night.

City Councilman Larry Burdette

followed suit with a letter resigning from the council.

The council accepted both resignations with regret.
The council will choose a mayor to

The council will choose a mayor to serve until the November election at which time voters will choose a mayor to fill the one year remaining on Mayor Baker's term.

The council will also choose a councilman to fill Burdette's seat for the remainder of his term ending on Dec. 31, 1989.

The mayor has served since Mayor Roland Mullins resigned in December 1986 at which time she was appointed to serve until the November 1987 general election. During that time, she defeated Jackie R. Renner in the May 1987 primary and ran unopposed in November for the two years remaining on Mayor Mullins' ever released to the proposed on November for the two

unopposed in November for the two years remaining on Mayor Mullins' term. She was to have served until Dec. 31, 1989. All elected city of-fices will be up for election in No-vember, 1989.

In her letter, the mayor said, "Due to the tilness of my husband (Bob Baker) I am no longer able to devote the time to perform the necessary duties of mayor of Mt. Vernon. Please accept my resignation, effec-tive July 12. This will give you ad-quate time to find a replacement. If a replacement is found during the in-terim, please feel free to go ahead with the appointment. I regret having with the appointment. I regret having to make this decision."

In his letter, Burdette said, "Due to my full time responsibilities at the local radio station WRVK, I must relocal radio station WRVK, I must re-locate outside the city limits. Ther-fore, Leann olonger (legally) serve as a member of the Mt. Vernon City Council, and regrefully submit my resignation effective July 12. Remaining on the council are Wayne Adams, Earl Nichols, Clarice Kirby, Billy Ray Doan and Tommy Bussell. The mayor did not suggest a suc-cessor to serve until the November election, but she apparently will. It won't be easy to find someone willing to take on the mayor's job.* a councilman said following the meet-councilman said following the meet-

Nursing Home Care Must Be Our Top Priority

This week, the House of Representatives voted not to consider legislat to provide long-term home health care for our elderly citizens. We reject the legislation because, despite its claims, the bill omitted the broader ne of long-term health care, in particular the need for nursing home care.

All of us in Congress agree that long-term home health care for our senior citizens is an important health need. And we in the Fifth District understand that, too. For years, our families have cared for elderly relatives who needed that attention they get at home. But this bill which was brought before us, while dealing with the needs of the homebound, carried with it a huge price tag and real potential for driving up our budget deficit higher and higher in the years ahead.

I voted against consideration of this bill for several reasons. First, the scope of the bill was far too narrow. It focused strictly on home health care, completely ignoring aursing home care, where many of our elderly must eventually be placed. It is the cost of nuising home care which often bankrupts our elderly and their families. To ignore this basic fact was wrong, and was a major reason for my vote.

Second, the bill eliminated options for families who have a chronically-ill person living with them. Home health care is viable for some elderly, but not all 1 Yet by loading all our federal benefits on home care only, we would give a strong disincentive to people who actually should be placed in a nursing home. We should not limit the options for senior dizzens to find the setting home. We should not limit the options for senior dizzens to find the setting

Third, the bill has serious budget problems. The Congressional Budget Office estimated that the bill would cost \$30 BILLION over the first five years, but that soon afterward, costs could rise astronomically. By creating another open-ended entitlement program at a time of budget crists, we would have bankrupted the Medicare trust funds which would have paid for this new program.

The rising cost of medical care, particularly for our elderly, concerns all of us. That is why the week before, I voted to support the Catastrophic Health Care bill approved by Congress. That legislation is self-financed and will help Medicare recipients stave off financial ruin by placing limits on their out-of-pocket expenses in a given year for medical care and hospitalization. But to make promises about long-term home health care that we might not be able to keep down the road is irresponsible and is unfair to our elderly. The legislation we voted down this past week simply had too many flaws in it to rush it through Congress.

We need to address the home health care issue, but we need to do so in concert with our budgetary constraints in mind. Williams convicted on 14 counts

Williams has been convicted on 14 counts of aiding and abetting, and conspiracy in a case involving the embezzlement of \$3 million from Northern Kentucky Bank & Trust.
Williams, who pled not guilty, was tried in U.S. District Court on charges stemming from a 1986 inted in U.S. District Court on charges stemming from a 1986 inted in U.S. District Court on charges stemming from a 1986 inted trust. The midciment named Williams, former Northern Kentucky Bank & Trust president Ervin Enzweitler of Melbourne, Ky. Thomas Rhein of Clearwater, Fla., and William Hoffman, a certified public accountant and general partner in Mineral Associates Limited Partnership of Baltimore, Md., as co-conspirators.

ship of Baltimore, Md., as co-con-spirators.

The '44-count indictment, said Rhein, Williams and Hoffman in-duced Enzweiler to misuse bank money for their personal gain. Rhein would get loans from Mineral Asso-ciates, using letters of credit the Enzweiler had issued on Northern Kentucky Bank & Trust. A letter of credit makes the issuer a co-signer for a loan.

credit makes the issuer a co-signer for a loan.
The indictment went on to say that Rhein subsequently defaulted on the loans. Mineral Associates then called on the bank to pay the loans, plus interest. The loans were paid by the bank; but Rhein did not pay back the money, which neared 53 million in various transactions. Williams was legal adviser to Triple A Coal Company.

The bank filed a \$13.5 million lawasii against the four men after the alleged scheme was uncovered in January 1983. The lawasii was settled out of court last year.
Last month in U.S. District Court, Enzweiler and Rhein pled guilty to one count of conspiracy and one count related to the issuance of a letter of credit that was not authorized by the bank's directors. Prosecutors agreed to dismiss remaining counts against Enzweiler and Rhein counts against Enzweiler and Rhein in exchange for their guilty pleas.
Williams and Hoffman, who pled

Williams and Hoffman, who pled not guilty, were tried together. Their trial, which lasted almost a month, ended May 26 in Lexington. Hoffman was convicted on all 36 of the charges brought against him. Williams was convicted on 14 of 15 charges lodged against him. According to Assistant U.S. Attorney John Compton, who prose-

U.S. Autorney same Granaum, villiams was convicted on two basic offenses. Compton said Williams had conspired with Enzweilier to issue letters of credit on behalf of Rhein's Triple A Coal Company without the approval of the board of directors; and that he had knowingly written behaven. \$100,000 and

directors; and that he had knowingly written between \$100,000 and \$122,000 in-checks on accounts held by Triple A Coal in which there were no funds. Enzweller, as bank president, honored the overdrafts. The case was heard by District Judge Eugene E. Silter Jr., who will also impose sentence. Sentencing is scheduled for July 29 in U.S. District Court, Lexington.

When something works, don't fix . That is a motto that many people, icluding Ed Linville, still believe

holds true.

Through the many changes that farmers have experienced in the past #0 to 50 years, Linville continues to use several of the older methods of working the land because "it works just fine."

Linville, 68, has seen many changes in farming since he first worked the land in Rockcastle County. He came to Berea in 1947

While Linville sits in the cool breeze blowing across his back porch, his mules Kate and Rodie stand ready near the gate at his barn. Linville said, "They know what to do, you just tell them and they'll do

it."

Linville trains the mules himself
and Kate and Rodic never seem to
give him any trouble while being
harnessed or hooked to the plow. The
mules even back up to the sled or
mower without instruction or coaxing to do se.

ing to do so.

Linville said he doesn't raise to-bacco anymore but has some corn, hay and a good garden. He also has a

few hogs.
"Once some guys wanted to get some wood from back up the hill and they took their four wheel-drive up there.... Me and Jack, a mule I used to have, had to go pull him, truck, wood

and all out of there," said Linville. Linville retired from the Army Depoi in 1977 and tends his 56 acre farm full time. Linville said," can't read, except the Bible. When I started following. the Lord he let me read the Bible. I only had a fourth grade education and back then my aunts and under were the teachers and they didn't make me to anythine."

were the teachers and they didn't make me to anything."

Tradition is not the only reason Linville uses mules on the farm. Cost has a lot to do with it. A new tractor can cost as little as a few thousand dollars one much as \$90,000.

"I have everything I need here to run a farm," Linville said. "I have the plows and rakes and sleds and my mules do whatever I need. I taught them what gee and haw and come-up means and I dom't even have to work the reigns much. They know what to do and I just let them do it."

Even in the 30 states and the District of Columbia where seat-belt use is mandatory, only half the môtiorists obey, In other states, seven out of ten, go belless. Some complain that seat-belts are uncomfortable. Others fedr being trapped during a crash. Still others simply don't want rule makers telling them what to do. The average motorist is virtually certain to have at least one injury-causing accident in his lifetime. Without a belt, he will be twice as likely to be killed or seriously in-jured. 

bites or stings, delay can be fatal.

Something in eye: Don't poke around in the eye. Keep child quiet and don't let him rub the eye. If tears don't wash out the foreign object, call parents or doctor.






