"What Saith the Scriptures"

In Mk. 7:7-8a Jesus said "Howbeit in vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men, for laying aside the commandment of God, ye hold the tradition of men." What was true of those of Jesus' day is just as true of many today. People will set aside the commands and teachings of Jesus to follow their human traditions.

A perfect example of this is: When people substitute sprinkling and pouring for baptism (i.e. an immersion in water). The reason I know Bible baptism is an immersion is because Paul said in Rm. 6:4 "Therefore we are buried (emphazize mine) with him by baptism into death: That like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." Again in Col. 2:12 "Buried with him in baptism." Only an immersion; completely going under the water; can one be buried with Christ in baptism. How many bury their loved ones in a cemetery by pouring or sprinkling a little dirt over them? Why, of course, they are buried, "six feet under." Christ was buried in a solid rock tomb that had been hewed out of Mt. 27:60. They did not sprinkle or pour a cup of gravel on him to bury him. Surely every honest soul can see that baptism is a burial that requires an immersion.

In Lk. 7:30, we learn of those who refused the baptism of John, "But the Pharisees and Lawyers rejected the counsel of God against themselves, being not baptized of him." John's baptism was from heaven, Mt. 21:25, and thus rejecting his baptism was to reject the counsel of God. Friends if you have been sprinkled or poured, do believe you have obeyed God, why not repent and obey God's truth? There is no longer any need to set aside the command of God any further. Reject the tradition you have followed and accept the word of God in your hearts, and obey Christ's truth in your life.

Only those who obey Jesus will be saved, Hebs. 5:8-9, Mt. 7:21-27. Crops feeling drought; lake water plentiful

Things could get worse before they get better. Weather Service and agriculture officials agree when they talk about the hot, dry days that continue to linger across Kentucky.

In Rockcastle County, crops are beginning to feel the effects of the drought conditions. Harold Ballinger, ASCS director in Rockcastle, said this week the county is now "beginning to get quite a bit of retarded growth in crops."

However, Ballinger noted that the county is "still a little better off than other counties." Some areas of Rockcastle have had over an inch of rain in the past several days that has helped. At the least it settled the dust.

To date this year, a total of 16.50 inches of rain has fallen in the county. The normal through June is 25.82 inches, meaning a deficiency in the area of 9.32 inches. Those figures vary some since only 21 days of June are figured in this year's rainfall.

To point up the problem, the Central Kentucky area is 70.12 inches short on rain during the 1980s, or nearly two full years short of annual rainfall.

Locally, Mt. Vernon's water supply is in "great shape right now," according to Matt Powell Jr., water superintendent.

"Lake Linville is still high," Powell said. "We've got worlds of water even though we're using an average of 1,250,000 gallons a day."

The overflow valve of the lake is still overflowing and creeks that feed the lake are still running. "So right now we don't have a water problem," Powell stated.

How are crops faring in Rockcastle?

Tobacco looks good, but tobacco is considered a dry weather crop, Ballinger reported.

Not so, corn. Ballinger said corn is beginning to suffer, and he predicted a reduced yield in the county of about 10 percent even if it starts raining now.

The hay crop is also beginning to feel the stress. Alfalfa is down about 25 percent and mixed hay about 50 percent. Pasture is about gone or down about half depending on a given area. It is being eaten off and it is not coming back, Ballinger said.

Last week, because of the dry weather, the U.S. Department of Agriculture gave 31 counties, including Rockcastle, approval to allow haying and grazing on land previously set aside under the federal feed-grain conservation program.

The dry weather is beginning to take its toll on gardens. Potatoes are particularly hard hit unless they have been watered. The crop will be cut in fall unless there is watering or rain-fall.

Ballinger predicts half-a-crop of green beans, a summer staple. Trees and shrubs are also hurting for moisture. The usual sub-soil moisture is depleted retarding growth. Watering will help, but it can be costly.

"If you start watering the yard, you'll have to keep it up," a Mt. Vernon resident said. "Personally, I think I'll wait until it rains, although I might not have any yard left by that time. You know, July is usually our driest month."

Ballinger reported livestock production is also affected by dry weather, meaning the rate of weight gain in cattle is down. It also can cause a reproduction problem in cattle.

Statewide, things are not in good shape except in Northern Kentucky where there were rain showers Tuesday morning. London also had a shower Monday but less than half an inch. There was a sprinkle last Thursday in Mt. Vernon, but some other areas of the county got some rain. To the south, Pulaski and Laurel counties both had over an inch of rain.

Surfacing for local road

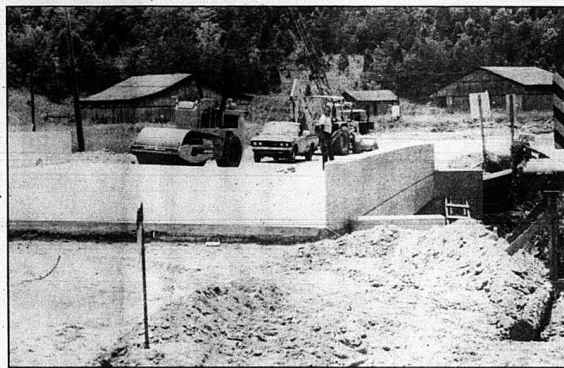

Letters go out to councilmen

Mayor Elizabeth Baker, in one of her last actions as mayor of Mt. Vernon, will veto a revised ordinance that will allow water skiing on Lake Linville.

It will be the first veto of a city council action by a Mt. Vernon mayor as far as anyone can remember.

In a letter that was handed to all the councilmen personally by Police Chief Joe Howard, Mayor Baker explained that the ordinance "that has been delivered to me for approval is being vetoed"

The mayor said in her letter she had three objections to the revised ordinance.

She wrote: "The recent survey of city residents indicates that 60 percent of our city residents (who responded) are opposed to (water) skiing on Lake Linville. I firmly believe in abiding by the majority of city residents' wishes."

She continued: "To allow skiing on Lake Linville is in conflict with city ordinance 9-87 which prohibits swimming and wading in Lake Linville."

She added: "In my opinion Lake Linville is much too small to accommodate skiers."

Her veto was not unexpected. She had voiced her disapproval of water skiing at the lake on several occasions.

County will grow, study says

With a growth rate of 11.8 percent between 1985 and 1995, Rockcastle is expected to rank 15th in the state in growth, according to a recent survey by the University of Louisville Urban Studies Center.

The projections are figured on trends since the 1980 census and come from Medicare records, income tax reports and birth and death rates. The trend began to show up in the 1980 census.

The survey shows southeastern Kentuckians who left the hills for factories and other jobs in northern states are returning home in retirement to help bring about the surprising growth in some southeastern counties.

Said one observer: "Maybe they got tired of city living and want back here in the hills where it is safer, or a lot of these are welfare people con-

ing home. Right now we don't know for sure. We only hope they love us and want to be with us."

Counties surrounding Rockcastle also have remarkable gains in the next seven years. Laurel has an expected growth rate of 19.5 percent ranking fourth; Jackson with 15.6 percent; Pulaski with 8.8 percent; Lincoln with 9 percent and Madison with 4.5 percent, the lowest of the group.

It should be noted that smaller populated counties with just an increase of about 1,000 persons could bring a high percentage rate. Rockcastle, for example, with a population now of 14,495 will grow to 16,201 in the period or by only 1,706 persons. Jackson would only go from 12,505 present population to 14,455 on 1,950 persons.

McCreary County, ranked seventh

in the state in projected growth, would only see 2,937 more people during the period.

Number eight, Owsley County, will see a growth rate of 16.7 percent but will add only 929 people during the period.

Oldham County is expected to be the fastest growing at 25.7 percent, most likely because of its nearness to Louisville, which is expected to lose population.

Other major growing areas are Boone at 19.8 percent; Scott at 24.4 percent; Powell at 16.3 and Whitley at 15.5. Whitley's population is expected to jump from the current 35,132 to 40,567. Pulaski County's population is expected to jump from the present 48,859 to 53,180.

Projections show that Fayette County, with a 5.1 percent expected

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
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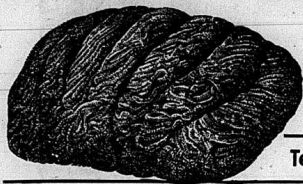

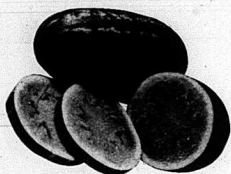

John Wiggs, Director of the Health Careers Program at UK, is the program director for PEPP.



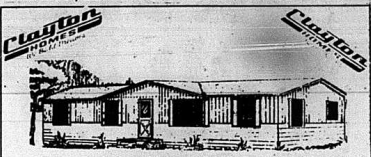

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Making Pickled Cauliflower

Pickles and relishes have a tart, spicy flavor which adds zest and variety to the meal. Cauliflower is one of the many vegetables you can pickle.

Here are instructions:
Break two large heads of cauliflower into small florets and cook in unsalted boiling water for 5 minutes. Then drain them. Combine 2 1/2 cups of distilled white vinegar, 1 1/2 cups water, 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar, 3 tablespoons pickling salt, 1 tablespoon mustard seed, 1 table spoon celery seed, and 1/4 teaspoon ground turmeric (optional) in a saucepan and heat to boiling. (The turmeric will add a spicy flavor and give a yellow product).

Add the cauliflower and let simmer for 2 minutes. Continue simmering while quickly packing one clean hot jar at a time. Fill to within 1/2 inch of top, making sure vinegar solution covers the mixture. Cap each jar at once. Process 5 minutes in boiling-water-bath canner. This makes 3-6 pints.

How To Make Glass-Jar Sauerkraut

You don't need a big wooden tub or crock to make sauerkraut. You can put up a small batch in quart jars.

This is a good way to do it if you have a few sauerkraut lovers in the family. It calls for 5 pounds of shredded cabbage.

Here is a recipe for 3 quarts or 6 pints of sauerkraut:

Select firm, mature heads of cabbage. Remove outer leaves. Cut into halves or quarters and remove the core. Wash and drain cabbage. Use a shredder or sharp knife to cut the cabbage into thin shreds. Weigh shredded cabbage and thoroughly mix 5 pounds with 3 tablespoons of pickling salt. Let the salted cabbage stand to wilt. Pack solidly in clean glass canning jars to within 1/2 inch

of top by pressing firmly with a small potato masher or wooden spoon. If there isn't enough juice to cover the cabbage, fill the jar with cold water.

Wipe rim, put on cap, screwing band firmly tight.

After about 10 days, when the bubbling stops, wash outside of jar, remove lid and wipe rim clean. Wash lid an replace on jar. Tighten lid and process in boiling-water-bath -- 15 minutes for pints and 20 minutes for quarts.

including resurfacing projects of \$159,000 and rural road money of \$89,000.

Also noted was \$8 million for Ky. 461 and over \$7 million for I-75 work now going on between Berea and the Laurel County line.

The project from the present site near Conway to Laurel County will not be completed until the end of 1989.

Looking to the future, Dr. Poore saw additional projects of \$7 million of Ky. 421 in Madison, Rockcastle and Jackson counties; \$2 million to complete work on I-75 to the Laurel county line; about \$11 million for completion of Ky. 461, and planning for four laning of U.S. 150 from Stanford to Mt. Vernon.

before she leaves office," a councilman said. "She is just following through on the wishes of the public."

In the next step, the mayor will verbally veto the ordinance at the next regular meeting of the council on July 11.

To override her veto, the council must have one more vote than a majority. In Mt. Vernon's case, five votes would be needed. Since Councilmen Larry Burdette and Billy Ray Doan have always voted against skiing, the council does not have the five votes needed to override.

Both Burdette and Doan voted "no" Monday night on the second reading of the skiing ordinance at a called meeting of the council at which time Tommy Bussell acted as mayor. Bussell voted yes for skiing along with Wayne Adams and Earl Nichols. Councilwoman Clarice Kirby did not attend the meeting.

Although the ordinance would appear dead for the moment, the council could again bring the measure to a vote if the council can muster four votes, or again, five to override.

Mayor Baker has resigned effective July 12 due to the illness of her husband. Burdette has also resigned because he is moving outside the city and cannot legally serve.

The council will choose a mayor to serve until the November General Election at which time a mayor will be elected to serve the remaining one year on Mrs. Baker's term. The council will choose a councilman to replace Burdette until his term ends on Dec. 31, 1989 following the November election.

All elected city offices will be up for election next November. City offices are non-partisan.

3. Purchaser(s) shall be responsible for the 1988 property taxes.
4. Purchaser(s) shall have possession of the premises upon complying with the terms of sale and risk of loss of improvements shall thereafter be on the purchaser(s).
5. This sale shall be made subject to all easements, set back lines, restriction or covenants of record or otherwise.
