The Ford Motor Company in Cin cinnati, Ohio is a long way from Paul Blevins' dairy farm near Bee Lick in western Rockeastle County and according to Blevins that is just the way

western Rockeastle County and ac-cording to Blevins that is just the way-he wants to keep it. Paul and his wife, Janet, have lived and worked on their 100 acre farm since returning to Kentucky in 1972. Before returning, Paul worked for 14 years at the Ford Motor Company plant in Cincinnati on an assembly line. Paul laughed and said, "It 14 haud sayed at Ford up until now Worked stayed at Ford up until now Worked dairy business there is no retiring." Paul and Janetare both very realise that worked the state of the state of the dairy business there is no retiring, and working. In the city, Cincinnati, where Janet grew up, they realize that both the city and the farm have advantages and disadvantages and deciding where to live and work is up

decling where to live and work is up to the family and the individual. To life in the city and some are better suiced for life in the city and some are better suiced for life in the fami, it's just what you feel comfortable with. Paul said, Janet added, 'One of the biggest advantages to Irving and working on the dairy fami is that Paul and I can be together and raise our family together.'

The Blevins are very proud of the fact that they were able to rafse their family in an atmosphere of closeness and togetheress. Their three children, Emite, Paula, and Russy, all to, which are grown and out on their

which are grown and out on their

own, grew up on the farm.

"We feel like they turned out pretty good and we're glad that one of us didn't have to be away from the family because of a job." Janet said.

The Blevins' are also very realistic about their dairy farm. 'You have to look at it as a business just like owning a retail store or something like that' Paul stated. "A lot of people think you just work about three hours in the morning and three hours in the evening. What they fail to realize is the many other hours that are spent doing other things on the farm'. Currently, the Blevins are milking 38 head of cattle. They have a total herd of 56. In addition to the cattle they raise 54 acres of corn, a large portion of which they store in their

they faise 54 acres of com, a large portion of which they store in their silo. Their fields are constantly in use. When they're not raising corn they are raising wheat in the same fields. This enables them to feed their fields. This enables them to feed their

dairy cattle sileage year round.
"We feel like it is better and easier to feed our cattle the way we do instead of turning them out to pasture be-cause our farm is simply too small for that" Paul added.

that" Paul added.
This year's severe drought has not yet taken its toll on the Blevins farm. According to Paul be has an adequate supply of feed, hay and slleage, but if there is not some rain in the very near future is could become a problem. He added that he was lucky because some farmers have already started to feed their cautle.
Their water supply is also not in

Their water supply is also not in jeopardy since they use city water on their farm. They have two springs, which Paul says are still running. In order to keep good stock in his herd Paul has his cattle artifically

bred. He buys semen from a farm in Ohio which tries and tests all of its bulls for quality stock. Articifiat breeding is used by a large portion of the dairy/farmers. The dairy business is time consum-ing and ties farmers down but in the

winter months there is ample time for the UK Wildcats. Paul has been a basketball fan since the days when he lived in Cincinnati and used to watch the Cincinnati Gardens. He remembers watching al tot of the old greats such as Dob Cousy and Cliff Hagan. Paul agreed how that Bobby Knight needs a few lessons in manners. What suggestions would Paul and Janct offer to young people thinking of getting into the dairy business? It is a tremendous investment in time

is a tremendous investment in time and money and it takes several years for a dairy farm to pay off," Paul said. But as the Blevins had commented, ou have to do what makes you



Reynolds Wrap. The company has been pushing toward a more consumer-oriented products mix during the past year in an effort to offset the cyclical nature in the metals markets. In May, Reynolds completed the purchase of Presto Industries Inc., which makes plastic bags and food wrap.

Deal finalized Thursday

Reportedly, Reynolds is not ex-pected to make personnel changes at the plant. Jack Touratsos, the company's chief executive officer and principal stockholder, and other personnel, plan to remain with the company.

The plastics company was founded by Touratsos and others and founded by Touratsos and others and went into production in early April 1981. Since that time it has done well with gross sales last year of about \$25 million.

Clontz, the federal case between the

The case had been set for trial

Cornelius had filed suit against the Laurel County School Board in 1981 after he was fired from his

1981 after ne was their from his superintendent's position. At the time of his firing the board leveled 15 charges against Cor-nelius, who had served less than half-

nelius, who had served less than half-a-year of a four year contract, before he was fired. Cornelius asked for a hearing before the board to answer the charges which included: mishan-dling of school board books, over paying teachers and failing to pub-lish financial reports in the newspa-pers.

Clontz said Tuesday that the Laurel County School Board finally agreed to settle the case because there was no doubt that his client was

Clontz also said that all of the charges against his client were base-

Western water users complain

About a dozen water users from the Western Rockcastle Water Dis-trict told the Mt. Vernon City Council the district does not have enough water available and asked the council

water available and asked the council to do something about it.

The council called the special session at the request of the district and heard complaints of little water to no water at all despite the record that shows the district used 6,273,500 reallons in May.

water at all despite the record that shows the district used 6,273,500 gallons in Ma.

The council listened but did not offer a lot of hope for an immediate remedy. The plant at Renfro Valley is currently pumping 1,500,000 gallons ad day, about the capacity of the plant, and no major construction to increase the plant's capacity is forth-coming because of finances.

Jack Crawford, engineer for M. Vemon's water program, told the group a request for grant money to change over to a high velocity pump has been made, but no money has been made available to date.

Crawford told the group in order to find out why the district has water sometimes and little or none at other times, could only be determined by a complete survey of the entire system including Brodhead, and the Northern district as well as Mt. Vernon.

Crawford suggested a committee be formed with representatives from all the districts of secus the problem and make suggestions. No cost for survey was estimated, but it could be prorated among the towns and districts.

It was reported at the meeting that Western officials have applied for at Mestern officials have applied for at

It was reported at the meeting that Western officials have applied for at least two years for federal funding to construct a water treatment plant to serve the Western district, but have

serve the Western district, but have, been turned down. The latest rejection was Feb. 18 and came from Bob Leonard, manger of the Kentucky State Clearhinghouse which acts as a contact point for water service request. Leonard said in his letter to the district that the request had been scrutinized by the Kentucky Intergovernmental Review Process and again it had been determined that a new water treatment plant can't be instiffed.

Leonard did not reject the entire project, and said the 238 prospective Western customers should be served but with expanded water lines with Mt. Vernon continuing to furnish

Principal spokesman for the district was Denver Burton, president. Several others spoke, including Steve Owens who lives in the Mt. Vernon distribution area and who is having

water pressure problems.

In May, the Mt. Vernon plant treated 31,049,600 gallons of water.
Western district, as noted, used

6,273,500; Northern district used 3,640,500, and Brodhead,4,437,000. The remainder, about 16,800,000 gallons were used by Mt. Vernon





These illusions and more, greeted the teenagers and young adults that attended the annual May Dance at the Family Life Recreation Center in Mt. Verono. Smiling in wonder, they quickly joined their friends in the fun on the dance floor, Each young person wore their Sunday best to this formal affair. This was their prom. The lights of the statue were turned

n the United States e World War II in 1941, and w turned on again until D-Day, June 6.

After 100 years, the Statue of Lib-erty had deteriorated. It took millions of dollars to repair the leaking torch, the corroding iron support that Gus-tave Eiffel, the designer of the Eiffel Tower in Paris had designed, the weakened arm holding the torch, the rusted crown, and the unsafe stairs case leading to the crown. Again ordinary people contributed nickels ordinary people contributed nuckets and dimes for this much needed job of restoring the 100 year old beacon of freedom. This beloved statue, with the face of the sculptor's mother and a figure modeled after that of his wife will stand another 100 years or more to welcome everyone New York Harbon



Vernon, Kentucky, of a genral and permanent nature, as prepared by the American Legal Publishing Co. and copyrighted 19— and as attached hereto and made a part of this ordinance as if fully copied herein, are hereby approved, adopted and enacted as the Code of Ordinances of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky,

(2) A copy of the Code of Ordinances, as adopted, shall accompany this ordinance and shall be made a part of the permanent records of the City pursuant to KRS 83A.060(5).

(3) The Codified Ordinances contain all of the provisions of a general and permanent nature pertainings to the subjects therein enumerated and embraced. All prior ordinances and parts of ordinances are hereby repealed prospectively as of June 20, 1988.

(4) The repeal of ordinances as provided in section (3) herod, however, shall not affect:

(a) Any ordinance of a temlporary nature, or any ordinances praining to subjects not enumerated and embraced and embraced in the Code of Ordinances;

(b) Any offense or act committed or done, or any penalty or

(c) Any ordinance or resolution promising or guaranteeing the payment of money to or by the City, authorizing the issuance of any bonds or notes of the City, or any other oridence of City indebtedness, or any contract or obligation assumed by the City;

(d) Any right or franchise conferred by any ordinance or resolution to any person or corporation;

(e) Any ordinance levying or imposing taxes, assessments,

(f) Any prosecution, suit, or other Iproceeding pending, or any judgment rendered on or prior to June 20, 1988; or (g) Any ordinance which may be adopted by this City after June 20, 1988.

(5) This Ordinance shall forthwith be published in accordance with KRS 83A.060(9) and shall become effective as of June 30,

On July 1, EMS service will be available to, but not from, Trinidad and Tobago in the West Indies.

The weight limit is 4-4 pounds (20 kilograms) to all countries except Morocco where the limit is 33 pounds (1.5 kilograms).


