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## Political music comes alive on KET

## Public Service Announcement

Notice to persons served by Mt. Vernon Water Works, Broadhead Water Department, Northern Rockcastle Water District, Western Rockcastle Water Association and Livingston Water Works pertaining to lead in drinking water.

Since 1976 lead consumption by humans has been reduced significantly. Your water company is cooperating in the effort to further reduce human consumption of lead.

Lead can occur at potentially harmful levels in tap water if the plumbing fixtures through which the water travels, including the solder and fluxes used to connect them, contain lead. The EPA has recently mandated that all newly installed plumbing materials be essentially lead-free.

Your drinking water meets the lead standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm) as required by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

\* Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:
 

- \* if your home or water system has lead pipes, or
- \* if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
- \* if the home is less than five years old, or
- \* if you have soft or acidic water, or
- \* if water sits in the pipes for several hours.

To find out which types of plumbing you have, look at it and perform the following simple tests:

- \* Lead pipe is most often found in very old homes and buildings. Lead pipe is gray, relatively soft, and can be easily scratched to shine with a screwdriver, coin, or key. Some iron pipe is very hard and usually black.
- \* Copper pipe usually has a characteristic copper color. Until very recently, most copper pipe was installed using lead-based solder. Lead solder is also gray, soft, and can be scratched shiny. Copper pipe that has been soldered with lead usually contributed less lead to the water as time passes because the solder gets coated with minerals from the water. After being installed about five years, lead solder usually contributes very small amounts of lead to the water.

\* Iron, steel and "plastic" pipe have not been associated with any health effects from lead since they contain very small amounts of lead or none, and are assembled without lead solder.

\* To reduce the possibility of consuming water with high lead concentrations by following these simple precautions:

- \* If the water has not been used for several hours, flush the cold water pipes before using the water for human consumption. Turn on the faucet and let the water run until the water temperature cools and get no cooler. If there has been recently been major water use, such as showering, bathing, flushing toilets, or cold water laundry, flushing pipes may take only 5-30 seconds. If there has been no recent major water use, flushing the pipes may take several minutes.
- \* Use only cold water for drinking, cooking, or preparing baby formula.
- \* If new plumbing is installed or repairs are made, insist that lead-free materials be used.
- \* Lead pipes and service connections can be replaced.
- \* The only way to be sure of the amount of lead in your water is to have the water tested by a state certified laboratory, or a lead test kit or the water run by the Water Branch of the Kentucky Division of Water for information about testing.

The Mt. Vernon Water Works, and Livingston Water Works produces non-corrosive water that is less likely to dissolve lead from plumbing.

The Broadhead Water Works, Northern Rockcastle Water District, and Western Rockcastle Water Association purchase water for distribution from Mt. Vernon Water Works. The managements of these water systems are working together to provide water that is non-corrosive and less likely to dissolve lead in plumbing.

Basic fundamentals will be taught with no contact involved.

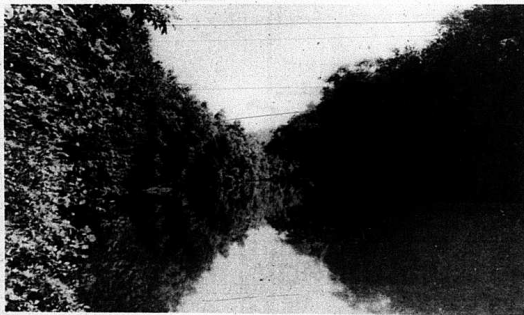

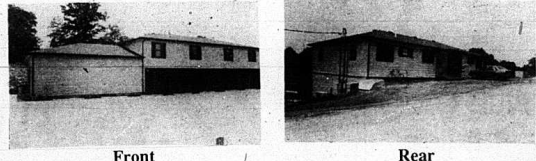

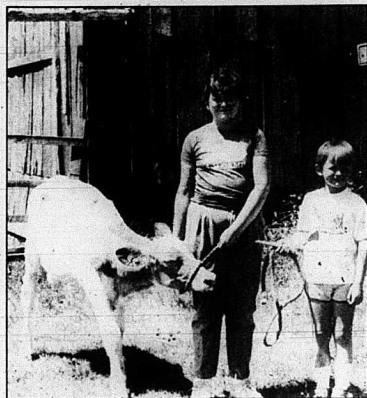

## At the Hayes Dairy Farm



### Larissa, Melissa and Matthew help out Mom and Dad

Dairy farming is a way of life for the Hayes family.

Henry and Rita Hayes own and operate a 100 acre dairy farm on old Brodhead Road. Henry and Rita have three children, Larissa, who is 15, Melissa, who is 10 and Matthew, who is 6.

The Hayes farm has been a family farm since 1926 and a dairy farm for the past 15 years. Henry and Rita have owned the farm since 1982.

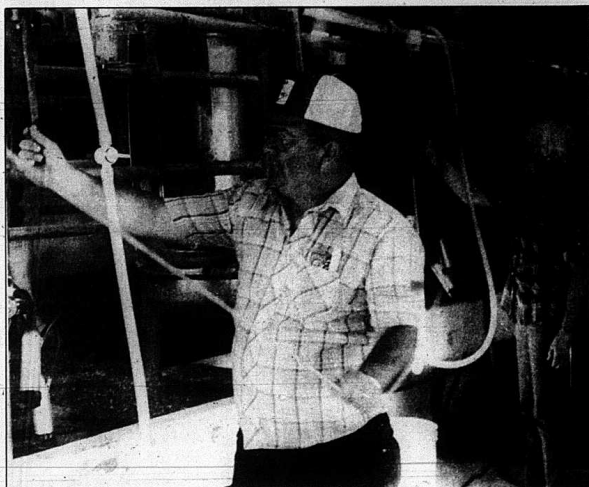
Henry and his family milk 37 cows and have 25 heifers they raise for replacements for their milk products.

4-H has been a part of the Hayes' family for the last six years. Larissa and Melissa are 4-H members. Larissa has been active in 4-H for the past six years, and Melissa for the past two years. Matthew has been a bystander because of his age, and will be on his way in three years. Larissa, Melissa and Matthew have a big responsibility on their family farm because they are in charge of feeding all the calves, and heifers' bottles, hay and grain. They have been helping their parents feed and work on the farm as long as they can remember.

Larissa and Melissa show their dairy heifers (Gierney and Holsteins) at local and surrounding shows. They show about 10 heifers which range from a junior calf to a four year old cow. They start leading their calves in May and June to get them ready for all the dairy shows. They open up showing at the District Show in Harrodsburg, then the Lincoln County Fair, Pulaski County Fair, Jackson County Fair, Laurel County Fair, and the Boyle County Fair. They also show locally here at the Little World's Fair at Brodhead.

Larissa said what she liked about showing was getting Grand Champion ribbons. Melissa said she liked the money. Matthew started by just liking to lead his animals, but all agreed they enjoyed meeting new friends and making friends that would last a life time.

Larissa and Melissa are involved in other 4-H events besides dairy. Their other projects are sewing, Demonstration contest and the Fashion Review. Larissa has been outstanding 4-H'er at Brodhead Elementary for several years and Melissa has also been outstanding 4-H'er for two years. Larissa and Melissa also participated in dairy quiz bowl and dairy judging teams. These two girls have done extremely well in all they have attempted. You might say they have made a great impact on the 4-H program in Rockcastle County.

## Blevins enjoy dairy farm near Bee Lick

The Ford Motor Company in Cincinnati, Ohio is a long way from Paul Blevins' dairy farm near Bee Lick in western Rockcastle County and according to Blevins that is just the way he wants to keep it.

Paul and his wife, Janet, have lived and worked on their 100 acre farm since returning to Kentucky in 1972. Before returning, Paul worked for 14 years at the Ford Motor Company plant in Cincinnati on an assembly line.

Paul laughed and said, "If I had stayed at Ford up until now I would have been able to retire, but from the dairy business there is no retiring."

Paul and Janet are both very realistic about their lives on the farm, since both have experienced living and working in the city, Cincinnati, where Janet grew up, they realize that both the city and the farm have advantages and disadvantages and deciding where to live and work is up to the family and the individual.

"Some folks are better suited for life in the city and some are better suited for life on the farm, it's just what you feel comfortable with," Paul said. Janet added, "One of the biggest advantages to living and working on the dairy farm is that Paul and I can be together and raise our family together."

The Blevins are very proud of the fact that they were able to raise their family in an atmosphere of closeness and togetherness. Their three children, Ernie, Paula, and Rusty, all of which are grown and out on their own, grew up on the farm.

"We feel like they turned out pretty good and we're glad that one of us didn't have to be away from the family because of a job," Janet said.

The Blevins are also very realistic about their dairy farm. "You have to look at it as a business just like owning a retail store or something like that," Paul stated. "A lot of people think you just work about three hours in the morning and three hours in the evening. What they fail to realize is the many other things that are spent doing other things on the farm."

Currently, the Blevins are milking 38 head of cattle. They have a total herd of 36. In addition to the cattle they raise 54 acres of corn, a large portion of which they store in their silo. Their fields are constantly in use. When they're not raising corn they are raising wheat in the same fields. This enables them to feed their dairy cattle silage year round.

"We feel like it is better and easier to feed our cattle the way we do instead of turning them out to pasture because our farm is simply too small for that," Paul added.

"This year's severe drought has not yet taken its toll on the Blevins' farm. According to Paul he has an adequate supply of feed, hay and silage, but if there is not some rain in the very near future it could become a problem. He added that he was lucky because some farmers have already started to feed their cattle.

"Their water supply is also not in jeopardy since they use city water on their farm. They have two springs, which Paul says are still running."

In order to keep good stock in his herd Paul has his cattle artificially bred. He buys semen from a farm in Ohio which tries and tests all of its bulls for quality stock. Artificial breeding is used by a large portion of the dairy farmers.

The dairy business is time consuming and ties farmers down but in the

winter months there is ample time for the UK Wildcats. Paul has been a basketball fan since the days when he lived in Cincinnati and used to watch the Cincinnati Royals play in the Cincinnati Gardens. He remembers watching a lot of the old greats such as Bob Cousy and Cliff Hagan. Paul agreed how that Bobby Knight needs a few lessons in manners.

What suggestions would Paul and Janet offer to young people thinking of getting into the dairy business? "It is a tremendous investment in time and money and it takes several years for a dairy farm to pay off," Paul said. But as the Blevins had commented, you have to do what makes you happy.

## When is milk no longer safe

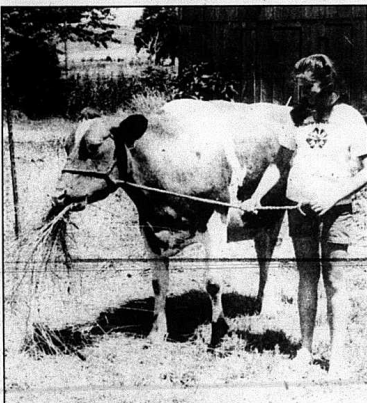
It is a dilemma everyone faces. You go into your refrigerator for a glass of milk on Saturday morning and yesterday's expiration date is stamped on the carton. Is the milk still safe to drink or should you throw it out?

If the product has been properly stored and transported from the dairy processor to your supermarket and then to your home, it should be good for another five to seven days past the date stamped on the carton.

That means that the temperature in your refrigerator must be about 38 degrees Fahrenheit and you must not have left the milk out on the counter for an extended period of time.

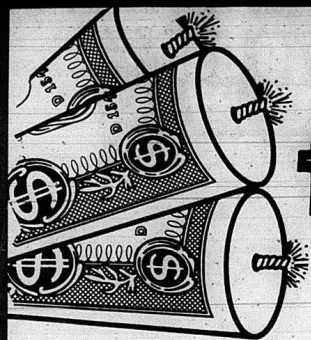

# Mt. Vernon Plastics sold to Reynolds Metals

Mt. Vernon Plastics, one of two factories in the Rockcastle Industrial Park, has been sold to Reynolds Metals Company of Louisville and Richmond, Va.

Final negotiations and inventory checks were expected to be completed Thursday. Terms were not reported.

Reynolds Metals, a multi-million dollar corporation, was reportedly one of "several" companies bidding

on the plastics firm.

Reynolds makes various household items including the familiar Reynolds Wrap. The company has been pushing toward a more consumer-oriented products mix during the past year in an effort to offset the cyclical nature in the metals market. In May, Reynolds completed the purchase of Presto Industries Inc., which makes plastic bags and food wrap.

## Deal finalized Thursday

Reportedly, Reynolds is not expected to make personnel changes at the plant. Jack Touratsos, the company's chief executive officer and principal stockholder, and other personnel, plan to remain with the company.

The plastics company was founded by Touratsos and others and went into production in early April 1981. Since that time it has done well with gross sales last year of about \$25 million.

During its existence the company

has received several loans one each from Rockcastle County and the cities of Mt. Vernon and Brodhead. It was reported the company will repay Brodhead and Mt. Vernon for their loans, that the cities obtained through an Urban Development Grant and in turn loaned to the company. But the company has apparently not decided whether to repay the county at this time.

The company has about 300 em-

ployees and has a line of over 700 products that include injection-molded plastic overcaps for canned coffee, margarine tubs, canned nuts and tennis ball cans. The company also makes thermoformed plastic containers for margarine, yogurt and deli products and microwave baking trays. It has contracts with Pillsbury, Nabisco, Proctor and Gamble and Shedd's Spread.

## Laurel board settles case with Cornelius

One of the oldest cases on Federal Judge Eugene Siler, Jr.'s docket has finally been settled.

According to local attorney Carl Clontz, the federal case between the Laurel County School Board and local teacher Kenneth Cornelius is off the docket.

The case had been set for trial Tuesday. As part of the settlement the Laurel School Board will pay all of Cornelius' retirement for the four years just as if he had been working as superintendent. Other details of the settlement were not disclosed.

Cornelius had filed suit against the Laurel County School Board in 1981 after he was fired from his superintendent's position.

At the time of his firing the board leveled 15 charges against Cornelius, who had served less than half a year of a four year contract, before he was fired.

Cornelius asked for a hearing before the board to answer the charges which included: mishandling of school board books, over paying teachers and failing to publish financial reports in the newspaper.

Clontz said Tuesday that the Laurel County School Board finally agreed to settle the case because there was no doubt that his client was not given due process in his dismissal.

Clontz also said that all of the charges against his client were baseless.

## Local men plead guilty

Two Rockcastle County men that had been charged with murder pleaded guilty Monday in Rockcastle Circuit Court to lesser charges.

Terry Miller, 27, of Mt. Vernon and Billy Gene Hubbard, 28, also of Mt. Vernon, had been charged in the homicide of David Lee Beasley, 19, of Mt. Vernon, who was found shot to death last December.

Gary Griffin of Mt. Vernon had already pleaded guilty to murder in the case.

According to Commonwealth Attorney Benny Hamm, the indictments for murder against Hubbard and Miller will be dismissed.

An indictment of persistent felony offenders will also be dropped against Miller. Miller pleaded guilty to theft by unlawful taking over \$100 and tampering with physical evidence.

Hamm said that he would recommend a sentence in the state penitentiary of five years on each charge.

Hubbard pleaded guilty only to theft by unlawful taking over \$100. He was recommended a sentence of 2 years on the charge and he said Tuesday that other charges against Hubbard would most likely be dropped. Both men will be sentenced Sept. 9.

## Rescue Squad drags for body

A report of a body in the Rockcastle River sent the Mt. Vernon Rescue Squad to the scene Sunday.

The squad reportedly found the remains of an animal.

The scene was near Science in the Public Interest near Ft. Scogovah.



The body of Dorothy Morris, 72, of Georgetown, lies beside the truck in which she and her husband were riding when the trailer being pulled started swerving and overturned in the median Sunday on I-75 about seven miles south of Mt. Vernon. Her husband Mart Morris, 68, died later in a Lexington hospital. Mrs. Morris was ejected from the truck. She was not wearing a seat belt.

## Western water users complain

About a dozen water users from the Western Rockcastle Water District told the Mt. Vernon City Council the district does not have enough water available and asked the council to do something about it.

The council called the special session at the request of the district and heard complaints of little water to no water at all despite the record that shows the district used 6,273,500 gallons in May.

The council listened but did not offer a lot of hope for an immediate remedy. The plants at Renfro Valley is currently pumping 1,500,000 gallons a day, about the capacity of the plant, and no major construction to increase the plant's capacity is forthcoming because of finances.

Jack Crawford, engineer for Mt. Vernon's water program, told the group a request for grant money to change over to a high velocity pump has been made, but no money has been made available to date.

Crawford told the group in order to find out why the district has water sometimes and little or none at other times, could only be determined by a complete survey of the entire system, including Brodhead, and the Northern district as well as Mt. Vernon.

Crawford suggested a committee be formed with representatives from all the districts to discuss the problem and make suggestions. No cost for the survey was estimated, but it could be prorated among the towns and districts.

It was reported at the meeting that Western officials have applied for at least two years for federal funding to construct a water treatment plant to serve the Western district, but have been turned down.

The latest rejection was Feb. 18 and came from Bob Leonard, manager of the Kentucky State Clearinghouse which acts as a contact point for water service request.

Leonard said in his letter to the district that the request had been scrutinized by the Kentucky Inter-governmental Review Process and again it had been determined that a new water treatment plant can't be justified.

Leonard did not reject the entire project, and said the 238 prospective Western customers should be served but with expanded water lines with Mt. Vernon continuing to furnish water.

Principal spokesman for the district was Denver Burton, president. Several others spoke, including Steve Owens who lives in the Mt. Vernon distribution area and who is having water pressure problems.

In May, the Mt. Vernon plant treated 31,049,600 gallons of water. Western district, as noted, used

6,273,500. Northern district used 3,640,500, and Brodhead, 4,437,000. The remainder, about 16,800,000 gallons were used by Mt. Vernon

area and to back wash the plant pumps and filters. Largest water users in the Mt. Vernon area are Mt. Vernon Plastics and Cedar Rapids Recreation Center, the latter during the summer months.

As the meeting came to a close, Burton received a telephone call reporting there was no water in the Western district.

## Month ending hot, dry

Dry weather continues to plague areas across the district, and although there has been only 1.43 inches of rain in Rockcastle during June, water supplies and crops still appear better than in many other areas of the state.

Most of the rain this month fell early in the month with .57 of an inch on June 9, .65 on June 10, .05 on June 17, .09 on June 24 and .07 on June 26, according to statistics at Cox Funeral Home weather station.

Lake Linville still remains in good shape, city officials report, but the water level has dropped to about two inches below the overflow opening since last week, and still normally dries July and August.

Water used from the Mt. Vernon plant from noon Saturday to noon Sunday was 1,420,000 gallons. Water used Monday was 1,500,000 gallons and that rate will likely continue for the remainder of the week. The highest used last year was a day in August when 1,366,000 gallons were used. Mt. Vernon supplies water to the Western and Northern Rockcastle districts and Brodhead.

Although it was the driest June in four years, it was also dry in June 1986 when only 1.88 inches fell and in June 1987 when there was only 2.52 inches. It was wetter in June 1985 with 4.35 inches.

To date in 1988, a total of 17.88 inches of rain/snow has fallen compared to the normal 25.82 inches.

Some areas of the county may have had more rain than Mt. Vernon, but all rain has been spotty and has not lasted very long.

It's also been hot during June with 10 days of over 90 degree temperature. The hottest days were June 22 and 23 when it was 97.

There has not been 100 degrees registered officially in Rockcastle since 1983. It was 102 on Aug. 22, 1983 and 100 on Aug. 21, 1983. It was 102 on July 16, 1980 and 101 on July 17, 1980, the only hundreds in the decade.

Incidentally, there was at least some cool mornings in June with the lowest on June 9 when it was a pleasant 40 degrees.

## Brodhead budget up

A 1988-89 city general fund budget of \$92,506 will be discussed by the Brodhead City Council at its July 11 meeting.

The new budget is about \$50,000 more than last year because of a \$72,000 payment from Mt. Vernon Plastics on a loan to the Plastics company by way of an Urban Development Grant.

The 1988-89 budget shows estimated total revenue available at about \$156,200 leaving an excess at the end of the year after appropriations of about \$40,000.

The exact figures will appear in a public notice on another page of this issue of the Signal.

The new general account budget shows \$15,000 carried over from last year's budget. It also shows \$20,000 to be appropriated for general expenses; \$30,000 for streets and sidewalks, and \$10,000 for police and fire department operations, among the higher expenditures.

Total estimated revenue in the Municipal Aid and Road Fund is \$15,166 with \$15,000 appropriated. The Coal and Mineral Severance Aid Account shows income of \$2,680 and appropriations of \$2,500.

The city rent account has estimated revenue of \$6,627 and appropriations of \$5,050.

Total estimated revenue on the Water Works account is \$152,375 and appropriations of \$118,210, leaving \$34,165 above appropriations.

Resources available in the Water Works Bond and Interest Account totals \$25,174 with \$19,000 appropriated.

In the Water Works Operation account, revenue totals \$99,400 and expenditures estimated at \$96,050 leaving \$3,350 in this account at the end of the year.

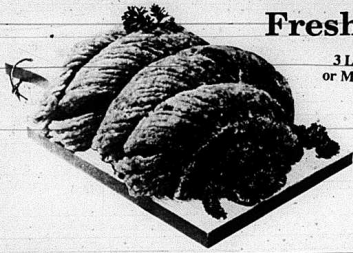

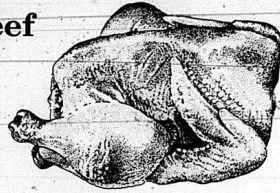


## Be a blood donor July 6

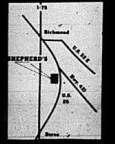

**Your Child's Health**

A recent alert by the Kentucky State Health Department points out the dangers of keeping a ferret as a pet. The European ferret, a relative of the skunk, otter, mink, and weasel has become very popular for sale as a

pet in recent years. It is estimated there are 400,000 now being kept as pets in this country. They are easily litter-box trained and may live 5 or 6 years in captivity.

Unfortunately, these animals can become unpredictable vicious and inflict severe and mutilating bite wounds on infants and young chil-

dren. They are especially attracted to babies, whose odors may resemble those of natural prey. Infants are usually attacked while sleeping. The ferrets often will not release their victims until killed. They have been

Let your microwave help you stay cool while preparing foods for your summertime holiday entertaining. Serve sliced deli ham or turkey for a cool buffet or use the outdoor grill to prepare your favorite meats. To accompany them choose cool and nutritious salads such as frozen fruit squares, Italian Pasta Salad, or Pear Salad. Add dips such as chili cheese dip or zippy egg dip for fresh vegetables or chips. Try spicy cherry punch for a different drink.

All of these foods would be great for a gathering of family or friends for a summer barbecue or bring to a family reunion. Be sure to pack into coolers on your trip to and from any picnic or while traveling.

- 1. **Zippy Egg Dip**  
2 hard-cooked eggs  
2 tablespoons chopped onion  
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper  
1 cup sour cream or plain yogurt  
2 tablespoons chili sauce  
1/2 teaspoon prepared horseradish  
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
1/8 teaspoon garlic powder  
2 tablespoons chopped radish  
Stripped fresh parsley  
Cool covered with cold water.
- 2. Combine onion and green pepper in microwave-safe serving bowl.

# Your Child's Health

Did you know that more children are killed or disabled by accidents than by drugs, kidnappings and all childhood diseases combined? The major risks to your child's

safety are car accidents, drowning, burns, fall, choking, and poisoning according to the National Coalition to Prevent Childhood Injury. Follow these tips to ensure safety:

Teach your children how to cross the street safely. Always buckle up. Kids are not safe riding on a parent's lap. Never leave your child unsupervised near water. Install smoke detectors in sleeping areas and on every floor of your home. Check them monthly and re-

place batteries as needed. Plan two fire escape routes from your home to an outside meeting place. Then have a fire drill at night. Lower the hot water temperature to a maximum of 120 F. Hot liquids - not fire - are the most frequent cause of burns to youngsters. Install window guards, then open

windows from the top only or keep them locked. Trapped heat will exit faster from an open window since more heat is at ceiling level. Install safety gates at the top and bottom of stairs. Remember: safe kids are not an accident.

The Statue of Liberty. By Elizabeth F. Mullins. America's most famous citizen arrived in America, with much controversy, as well as celebration in October, 1886.

The Americans were to build a pedestal for this symbol of freedom. When wealthy people did not contribute enough for this \$270,000 pedestal, Joseph Pulitzer, a Hungarian immigrant, and publisher of the "New York World" started a collection from ordinary people. They heard his plea! The word "nickels and dimes sent to him totaled enough to start work on the pedestal for "Miss Liberty."

On October 28, 1886, the symbol of this colossal statue of a woman, the ceremonies started with a big parade down Broadway in New York City, in the rain. Fog dimmed the view of the statue from the Hoilla of boats in the harbor to see the unveiling of this colossal statue of a woman.

Women suffrage advocates yelled their disapproval as 598 men and only two females had been invited to this event. They were wife of sculptor Frederic Augustus Bartholds, and a French friend's small daughter. More than 17 million immigrants have passed Liberty's torch over the past century.

The lights of the statue were turned off when the United States entered World War II in 1941, and were not turned on again until D-Day, June 6, 1944.

After 100 years, the Statue of Liberty had deteriorated. It took millions of dollars to repair the leaking torch, the corroding iron support that Gustave Eiffel, the designer of the Eiffel Tower in Paris had designed, the weakened arm holding the torch, the rusted crown, and the unsafe staircases leading to the crown. Again ordinary people contributed nickels and dimes for this much needed job of restoring the 100 year old beacon of freedom. This beloved statue, with the face of the sculptor's mother and a figure modeled after that of his wife to hold another 100 years or more to welcome everyone coming into New York Harbor.

But are we attending the liberty itself? Let us not take liberty for granted!

It can deteriorate also! Barbara Jordan, a former congress woman agrees. "The greatest threat to America, is the unattention of the people to liberty. If we don't attend to it, if we take it for granted, and let people trample on it, it can suffer an erosion. You have to attend to liberty."

Another quote by President John F. Kennedy, who dedicated a nation "to pay any price, bear any burden, meet any hardship, support any friend, oppose any foe, to assure the survival and the success of liberty."

I agree with these quotes. The only thing I would add to this is that "In God We Trust."

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office has announced the second 1988 ACP sign-up period as being June 1 through July 15, according to D. G. Albright, chairman of the

Rockcastle County ASCS Committee. Albright stated that practices available to the farmers of this county include cover crops, new

seedings, renovations, water conservation, critical areas, and forestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices available for this period is available in the county office.

Seeding practices, both new seedings and renovations must first have a current soil sample in the County Extension Office before signing for cost-sharing.

Rockcastle County is now under the variable cost-sharing method. Requests are evaluated at the end of the sign-up period according to soil erosion. ACP practices which result in the highest saving of soil may receive up to 75 percent of the actual cost of completing the practice.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASCS Committee prior to the starting of work pertaining to the practice.

Albright urges Rockcastle County farmers interested in applying for ACP cost-sharing practices to bring their soil samples to the county agent's office as soon as possible. A soil sample must be turned in to the county agent's office before signing up for a cost-share practice.

WHEREAS, the City of Mt. Vernon is authorized by KRS 83A.060(5) to adopt a codification of local legislation by reference; and  
 WHEREAS, the City of Mt. Vernon has created a codification of legislation covering the following subjects:

Title III	: Administration
Title V	: Public Works
Title VIII	: Traffic Code
Title IX	: General Regulations
Title XI	: Business Regulations
Title XIII	: General Offenses
Title XV	: Land Usage
TSO	: Tables of Special Ordinances

Now Therefore, be it ordained by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

(1) That the ordinances of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, of a general and permanent nature, as prepared by the American Legal Publishing Co. and copyrighted 19 and as attached hereto and made a part of this ordinance as if fully copied herein, are hereby approved, adopted and enacted as the Code of Ordinances of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky.

(2) A copy of the Code of Ordinances, as adopted, shall accompany this ordinance and shall be made a part of the permanent records of the City pursuant to KRS 83A.060(5).

(3) The Codified Ordinances contain all of the provisions of a general and permanent nature pertaining to the subjects therein enumerated and embraced. All prior ordinances and parts of ordinances in force on June 20, 1988 which are incorporated in or pertain to the subject enumerated and embraced in this Code of Ordinances are hereby repealed prospectively as of June 20, 1988.

(4) The repeal of ordinances as provided in section (3) hereof, however, shall not affect:  
 (a) Any ordinance of a temporary nature, or any ordinance pertaining to subjects not enumerated and embraced in the Code of Ordinances;

(b) Any offense or act committed or done, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any contract or right established or accruing before June 20, 1988;

(c) Any ordinance or resolution promising or guaranteeing the payment of money to or by the City, authorizing the issuance of any bonds or notes of the City, or any other evidence of City indebtedness, or any contract or obligation assumed by the City;

(d) Any right or franchise conferred by any ordinance or resolution to any person or corporation;

(e) Any ordinance levying or imposing taxes, assessments, or charges;

(f) Any prosecution, suit, or other proceeding pending, or any judgment rendered on or prior to June 20, 1988; or  
 (g) Any ordinance which may be adopted by this City after June 20, 1988.

(5) This Ordinance shall forthwith be published in accordance with KRS 83A.060(9) and shall become effective as of June 30, 1988.

SECTION FOUR: This ordinance becomes effective immediately upon passage and publication as required by law.

Five countries joining the U.S. Postal Service's Express Mail International Service (EMS) network this summer will bring the number of participating nations to 80.  
In Africa, Swaziland, Morocco and Zambia are already receiving fast delivery service to and from the U.S. Madagascar begins service on July 15.  
On July 1, EMS service will be available to, but not from, Trinidad and Tobago in the West Indies.  
Rates for all countries start at \$18 for a half-pound shipment. A one-pound package costs \$21.  
Size limits for most of the new nations are 36 inches (900 millimeters) in length and 79 inches (2 meters) in combined length and girth.  
Trinidad and Tobago will accept items as large as 59 inches (1.5 meters) in length.  
The weight limit is 44 pounds (20 kilograms) to all countries except Morocco where the limit is 33 pounds (1.5 kilograms).  
Express Mail International Service offers On Demand service for customers who do not maintain a regular shipment schedule. Customers may take shipments to local post offices or drop prepaid shipments

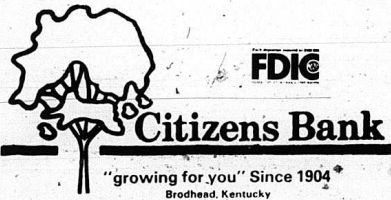

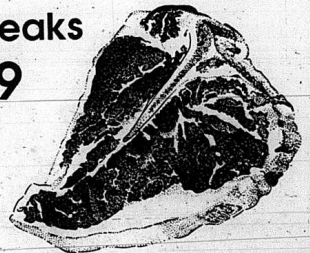
