



Microwaving for one or two

With smaller families, many of you are interested in recipes for one or two. Even those of us who usually cook for more, often find we are cooking for one or two as family members have various commitments each evening. And lunch is becoming a popular microwaved meal both at home and on the job. So, whether you cook for one or two frequently or occasionally, refer to these recipes for new ideas for better utilizing your microwave oven. Fats, sugar and salt can often be reduced or omitted.

We have based our serving sizes on average servings. Someone with a larger appetite may find two servings are just what her or she needs. Others with smaller appetites will probably find that two servings is actually more like three for their particular needs.

Steak Roll-Ups
 3 green onions, sliced
 1 small carrot, shredded
 1/2 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
 1/2 cup sliced celery
 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 1/2 cup herb-seasoned stuffing mix
 2 cube steaks (8 oz.)
 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 Salt and pepper

1. Combine onions, carrot, mushrooms, celery and 1 tablespoon butter in 1-quart glass mix'n pour bowl.
 2. Microwave (high) uncovered 4 to 5 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Stir in stuffing mix. Divide mixture evenly between steaks. Roll up, with stuffing inside, fasten with toothpicks or string. Set aside.
 3. Preheat microwave browning dish 5 to 8 minutes or as directed by manufacturer for cooking meat. Melt 1 tablespoon butter in dish. Quickly add steaks to hot dish.

4. Microwave (high) uncovered, 1 minute. Turn meat over. Then, microwave (high) uncovered, 4 to 5 minutes or until meat is desired doneness. Season with salt and pepper.

TIP* If a browning dish is not available, prebrown meat in pyroceramic casserole on surface unit of range. Then, microwave 4 to 5 minutes to complete the cooking.

Pasta, Ham and Zucchini
 4 ozs. uncooked fettuccini noodles
 1 small zucchini
 1/3 cup shredded carrot
 1/2 small onion, sliced
 1 clove garlic, minced
 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 3/4 cup cubed cooked ham (about 4 ozs.)
 1/3 cup half and half
 1 egg, slightly beaten
 2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese
 Dash nutmeg

1. Cook fettuccini as directed on package. Drain, rinse and set aside.
 2. Cut zucchini into 2-inch lengths; cut each into thin strips. Combine with carrot, onion, garlic and butter in 1 quart microwave-safe casserole. Cover with casserole lid.
 3. Microwave (high) uncovered 3 to 5 minutes or until just about tender. Add ham and cooked fettuccini; mix lightly. Cover.
 4. Microwave (high) 1 1/2 to 2 minutes or until heated through. Beat together half and half and egg; pour over hot fettuccini. Sprinkle with cheese and nutmeg; mix lightly.

Beef Chow Mein
 1/2 lb. ground beef
 1 cup sliced celery
 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
 3 green onions, sliced
 1/2 cup water
 1/2 teaspoons cornstarch
 1 teaspoon instant beef bouillon
 2 teaspoons soy sauce
 Dash pepper

1. Crumble ground beef into 1-quart microwave safe casserole.
 2. Microwave (high) uncovered 3 to 1 1/2 minutes or until no longer pink, stirring once. Drain. Stir in celery, mushrooms and onions. Cover with casserole lid.
 3. Microwave (high) 5 to 6 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Combine water and cornstarch until smooth. Stir into vegetables. Mix in bouillon, soy sauce and pepper.
 4. Microwave (high) uncovered, 2 to 3 minutes or until mixture boils and

thickens stirring once. Serve over rice or chow mein noodles.

Garden Fresh Potatoes
 8 ozs. new potatoes (about 4)
 1 tablespoon water
 1/2 cup snapped sugar snap peas
 1 oz. light cream cheese
 1 tablespoon milk
 1 teaspoon stripped or dried chives salt and pepper
 1. Scrub and rinse potatoes. Cut each into 4 wedges. Place in 1 quart microwave-safe casserole. Add water; cover with casserole lid.
 2. Microwave (high) 4 to 5 minutes or until just about tender, stirring once. Drain. Add peas cream cheese, and milk. Cover.
 3. Microwave (high) 3 to 4 minutes or until peas are tender, stirring once. Sprinkle with chives; season to taste with salt and pepper.

Chicken Breasts Oie
 2 tablespoon dry bread crumbs
 1 tablespoon Parmesan cheese
 1/2 teaspoon chili powder
 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 8 ozs. skinned and boned chicken breasts
 2 tablespoons taco sauce
 1/4 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese
 1. Combine crumbs, cheese and chili powder on waxed paper. Set aside.
 2. Microwave (high) butter in uncovered 9 inch pie plate 30 to 45 seconds or until melted. Coat pieces on both sides with butter, then roll in crumbs.

Return to pie plate. Cover with paper towel.
 3. Microwave (high) 3 minutes or until partially cooked. Divide pica-cante sauce and cheese evenly between chicken.
 4. Microwave (high) uncovered, 1 1/2 to 2 minutes or until chicken is done and cheese is melted.

 2 teaspoons butter or margarine
 2 slices bread, cubed (about 2 cups)
 1 cup milk
 1 egg
 3 tablespoons sugar
 1/4 teaspoon vanilla
 Nutmeg or cinnamon

1. Microwave (high) butter in 16-oz. or 2 cup uncovered microwave-safe bowl 30 to 45 seconds or until melted. Add bread cubes; toss to coat evenly.
 2. Beat together milk, egg, sugar and vanilla. Pour over bread. Sprinkle with nutmeg.
 3. Microwave (medium-50%) uncovered, 8 to 9 minutes or until center is just about set, rotating dish once. Serve warm or cold.
TIPS* With full power, place bowl in 8 inch round-microwave-safe baking dish. Add 1 cup warm water. Microwave 8 to 9 minutes or until center is set.
 * If desired, add 1 tablespoons raisins with bread.
 * To lower cholesterol, use egg substitute for whole egg.

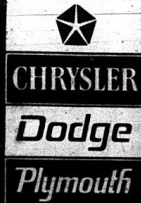

New laws on traffic soon to be in effect

Beginning July 15 four new traffic laws go into effect that call for fines ranging from \$20 to \$500.

Children who measure 40 inches or less, generally younger than 4, must be confined in a child restraint seat in a vehicle. The exception is if all seats in a pickup are occupied by adults. Failure will cost a \$50 fine.

Motorists with tinted glass will have six months from July 15 to bring it into compliance. The new law requires 35 percent light transmission on front windows and 18 percent on rear passenger windows and rear window. Penalty: \$20 to \$100. Estimated to have the windows comply: \$50 to \$80.

If a vehicle illegally passes a school bus, the driver will be presumed to be the owner and subject to a fine of \$100 to \$500, 30 days to six months imprisonment or a six-point addition to his driver's license, depending on the frequency of the violation.

Passing a stopped bus on a two-lane road is illegal. On a four-lane road, passing is illegal on the same side as the bus, but is allowed for traffic going in the opposite direction. Bus drivers will take license plate numbers.

On a four-lane highway, the left lane is for passing or yielding to oncoming traffic. Anyone driving along in the passing lane is subject to a \$20 to \$100 fine.

Concerning the child restraint law, a fine can be avoided if a parent shows proof of obtaining a child-restraint seat within 10 days. They cost about \$30.

Randy Kirby, 27, of Mt. Vernon, has been charged with assault in the first degree following an incident in which a Mt. Vernon man was stabbed with a switch blade knife.

Treated and released from Rockcastle Hospital, and later from a Lexington hospital, was Lewis Cox, 23, of Mt. Vernon. He was at the residence of Tammy Shepherd in Mt. Vernon Saturday night when the stabbing occurred, according to authorities.

Kirby was released on \$10,000 property bond for his appearance in district court July 13. According to court records, the case will be presented to the grand jury Friday.

Drought brings woes to crops, people

Water watch in effect

City officials are keeping a close eye on Lake Linville as water usage stays at a high 1,200,000 gallons a day, more or less, and no relief in sight from the deepening drought. Mayor Elizabeth Baker issued a "water watch" Tuesday, meaning residents should begin thinking of water conservation. Gov. Wallace Wilkinson issued a statewide water watch last week. It still continues.

"We can now tell a difference in the lake from day to day," Matt Powell Jr., water superintendent at Mt. Vernon said. "The lake has dropped about five inches below the overflow. You can see a little less water every 24 hours."

Powell said the mayor's announcements were made because the city wants to get an early start on conservation in order to head off a major water problem if the drought continues, and if there is no appreciable amount of rain. None is expected through the coming weekend.

"We want to advise everyone to slow down on water use and to ask their help in doing so," Powell added. "The more water we save, the longer the lake will last."

At Livingston, which gets its water from the "boils," an outcrop of water beside Roundstone Creek, the water supply is "holding up." Water Superintendent Bobby Wilson said.

"It's hard to determine how much longer we'll have enough water," Wilson said. "It looks good now, and we went to Sinks and water was running there, which is where the water to the boils comes from, we think."

Wilson said the department is pumping about 30,000 gallons a day. Roundstone Creek is no longer running almost along its entire length. The Rockcastle River is down to a small stream and a few more days of no rain could end the flow.

"It's mighty low," Wilson said. "I've never seen the river this low that I can remember."

Just south of Livingston at a ford across the river there was just a trickle of water running and the river could be walked across on rocks.

Livingston has been trying to obtain grant money to install a water line from Woods Creek Lake, but to date the request has not been approved, according to Mayor Billy Medley. He said the city would keep trying.

Broadhead and the two water districts get their water from Mt. Vernon and Lake Linville, so how the drought affects the lake will also affect water users in those areas.

All public water suppliers have been asked to measure their supply immediately and notify the Ken-

Mayor issues statement

The City of Mt. Vernon would like to ask all water customers to consider water usage so we will have enough water to last through the dry summer.

We do not have a water shortage now, but if we do not save our water usage and the dry weather continues several problems can arise in the future.

If customers do not conserve water now, restrictions might have to be placed on water usage later.

ucky Division of Water in Frankfort if they are storing less than 30 days of normal water use or if more than 50 percent of the supplying streams flow is being consumed. That is the case presently with Lake Linville where streams have dried up.

In Rockcastle, crops and livestock continue to suffer from heat and the dry conditions.

According to Harold Ballinger, ASCS director, each day of dry weather drops a bushel of corn per acre.

Ballinger said ponds and springs are now drying up. He reported Henry Lear, who lives in the Scaffold Case area, has a dry pond and is now hauling water for his cattle. Many farmers are using hay to supplement their cattle feed.

Ballinger noted pasture is down about 35 percent and hay about half. Tobacco needs a good general rain, he said. If there is rain in the next 10 days, tobacco will be a fair crop. Bell peppers, a major crop, are not pollinating and the blooms are dropping off.

Wild animals also suffer from the heat and dry weather. Some are dying. Birds also are in need of water. All birds and animals are hunting for water.

The Kentucky Department of Agriculture has established a toll-free drought hot line in Frankfort.

Court postpones work program

A request by Sheriff Clarence Hasty to allow persons owing court fines to work off the fine instead of staying in jail was put off by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a meeting Tuesday.

Under the sheriff's request, persons with fines, but not in jail, could volunteer to work off the fine at \$4 an hour doing such work as clearing roadides, gathering trash along roads, and clearing trash dumps.

Assignment to the work would be done by district judges and supervised by the sheriff's department. The workers would pay their own insurance that will be available at \$3.50.

The court decided to talk with Judge Cain before finally agreeing to the Court Referral Work Program.

The court approved a request by State Forester Stephen Bullen to pass an ordinance setting a \$50 fine and costs for persons burning during no-burning restrictions, and after the county Judge/Executive proclaims no burning. The ordinance will be enforced only when conditions are such as to make burning dangerous.

The court approved a television cable franchise for Stella Burke who, along with her husband operates a cable company in the northern area of the county.

The Burkes now operate 11 miles of

cable from Renfro Valley to Roundstone, Conway to the Madison County line, excepting an area served by a cable owned by Bill Patrick also in the northern county area termed Little Clear Creek.

The Burkes have been in the cable business for several years. The franchise is for 10 years.

Dry weather brings out snakes

With the unusually dry weather, picnickers and persons out for a walk in the woods should be especially alert for snakes that are out in search of water, biologists say.

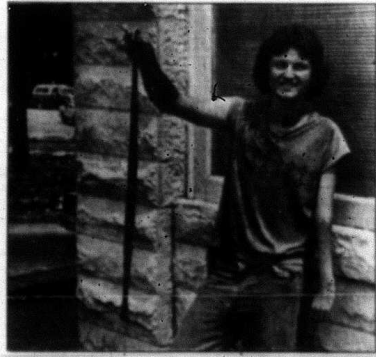
"And, they advise everyone to steer clear of all snakes they see. If they don't kill you, which most won't, they can make you mighty sick."

"We have several snake bites to treat every year," said Wayne Stewart, Rockcastle Hospital Administrator. "Most of them are copperhead bites. In fact, we had one a few days ago."

"Most of our snakebite patients are given serum and not hospitalized," Stewart continued. "The longest we have kept anyone here was five days and he had wanted a day or so before he came and had consumed a large amount of whiskey, the worst thing to do for snakebite since whiskey is a stimulant. You could almost see the black creeping up his arm from the poison."

"Most doctors now agree a person should not drink alcohol after a snake bite."

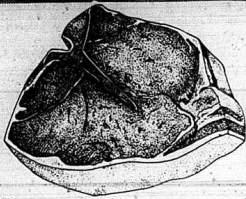

"What Saith the Scriptures"

You see both Jesus and Paul knew the truth of God, they knew the facts of the situation, and they had a right attitude, thus they made these "righteous judgements."

chise is for 10 years with a renewal option at a cost of \$150 a year.

The motion for the franchise was made by Magistrate Gary Scott, seconded by Jack Bradley. Judge Hubert Thacker voted "yes." Amos Burdette voted "no" and Donald Bullock abstained. Glen Ellison did not attend the meeting.

The franchise covers up to two miles west of I-75 and two miles east of U.S. 25.

Jailer Billy Kirby asked the court to fund his salary to the amount prescribed by the state, \$34,861 a year. He now makes about \$28,000.

The court approved the amount that was included in the 1988-89 budget but at that time did not fund the salary. None of the salary comes from county tax money.

Deputy Sheriff Delno McClure asked the court to appropriate \$400 a month for purchase of gasoline for deputy sheriff's cars. The money will be allowed from July to October when tax revenue becomes available for the sheriff's department.

The telephone can be used to: Make an appointment with Social Security; apply for Medicare; find out how to change a name or address

in Social Security records. Others include: Report change in marital status; report starting or stopping work; report a lost or stolen check, or delayed payment; find out how to replace a lost Social Security or Medicare card; get information about direct deposit of checks; request a statement of Social Security earnings record; get help in having claims decision reviewed. Ask any question about Social Security or obtain a free publication.

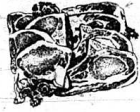

School board moves one step closer to beginning construction of Mt. Vernon school

The Rockcastle County School Board gave final approval to plans, specifications and contract documents of the new Mt. Vernon Elementary School Tuesday night. The board, which brings the school system one step closer to the actual construction of the two-story facility.

Carl Vanhook, architect from Jefferson/Romanowicz, was on hand at a meeting of the Rockcastle Board of Education, with the final drawings of the project. Vanhook went through the plans for the 71,000-sq-ft facility with the board. Unlike the previous plans Vanhook had brought, these drawings were in great detail and will be used by contractors bidding on the project.

Steve Branscum of Branscum Construction, project manager for the Mt. Vernon Elementary School, took the board how the bidding will take place and how his company will save the school system money by serving in the project manager capacity. One such savings will be the utilization of direct purchase orders

by the board for such large items as bricks, mortar, metal shelving. By using direct purchase orders the board will avoid paying the 5 percent sales tax.

The school plans must now be approved by the state at which time they will authorize the school system to advertise for bids. According to Branscum the bidding will be broken down into 33 bid packages which his company will be handling. All the negotiating with the contractors will be handled by Branscum so the school board will not be burdened by such an awesome task.

In other business not related to the new construction project the board hired a new teacher and placed another teacher in a newly created position. Roy Reynolds, a 1979 graduate of RCHS, was hired as Vocational Agriculture teacher replacing the retiring Russell Parsons. Reynolds has

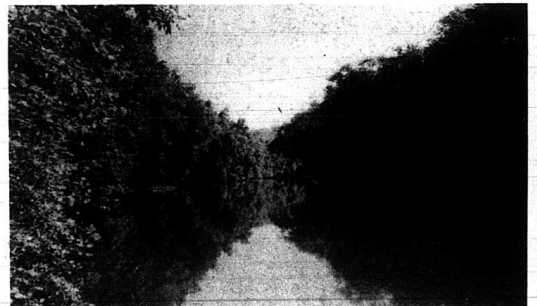
