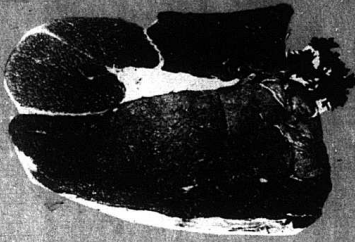

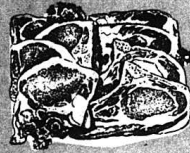

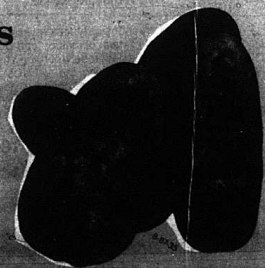

## Mayor, councilman appointed; water plans approved

### Gary Cromer new mayor

Gary Cromer, businessman and owner of a medical supply firm, was chosen mayor of Mt. Vernon at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

William E. (Red) Swinney, an employee of Okonite, a Richmond cable manufacturer, was chosen city councilman.

Cromer, 41, is owner of Appalachian Medical Supply Inc. and has had other business in the city over the years. He will serve until the November election at which time voters will choose a mayor for the one year remaining in the term of Mrs. Elizabeth Baker whose resignation became effective Tuesday. To continue as mayor, Cromer will have to be a candidate in November, and win.

Cromer and his wife, Janie, are the parents of two children, Zachary and Michell.

Swinney, 47, will serve until the 1989 election at which time all councilmen and a mayor will be elected. He replaces Larry Burdette who is moving outside the city and cannot serve.

The Swinneys are the parents of four children. They live on Owens Street.

Several names were mentioned as possible mayor and councilman before the vote was taken. Councilman Tommy Bussell made a motion to nominate Cromer, seconded by Earl Nichols. Clarice Kirby and Billy Ray Doan voted "yes." Acting mayor Wayne Adams did not vote since he was serving as acting mayor. Larry Burdette abstained since it was his last meeting as councilman.

The choice of Swinney came on a motion by Billy Ray Doan, seconded by Tommy Bussell. Clarice Kirby voted "yes." Earl Nichols abstained. Wayne Adams and Larry Burdette did not vote.

The new mayor and councilman will not find their job an easy one. The council is strapped for money because of a loss of Revenue Sharing funds that amounted to several thousand dollars annually, and saddled

with a low tax rate.

In fact, the city owes \$43,000 to the federal government, money borrowed from an Urban Development Action Grant, a grant awarded to the city specifically to loan to Mt. Vernon Plastics to expand the Mt. Vernon plant.

Mt. Vernon Plastics was paying the city \$2,420 a month in interest and principal on the loan. That money was being used by the city to pay monthly bills, city payroll and payment on a lot purchased for a second fire station on east Main Street.

When Reynolds Metals purchased Mt. Vernon Plastics the remaining money on the loan was paid off, a total of \$161,697. That money belongs to the city but under grant regulations it can only be used for such things as business loans, for new business, by an industrial park for payment on utilities, railroad spurs and capital equipment, and not for general city expenditures.

The money borrowed by the city from the grant must now be repaid to the grant fund, a total of \$43,000.

City Clerk Kay Radert told the council there is very little money available to even pay monthly bills that totaled \$6,979 in June/July, but the council approved payment, apparently hoping to find the money somewhere.

Other city funds have money. But water and sewer money are tied up in loans made for renovations and improvements to the water and sewer plant. That money can only be used for water and sewer department expenses and loan payments that in June/July totaled \$14,247.

Police Chief Joe Howard told the council there is continuing trouble in the Lake Linville area and that the city police are doing their best to control it but it is not enough.

The chief did not describe the trouble, but reports by residents have indicated there is drinking, use of drugs, noise and general mischief at the lake at night.

Chief Howard asked the council for

## School board reviews projects

With the beginning of school more rapidly approaching than students and teachers care to think about, the Rockcastle County School Board met in a special session Tuesday night to discuss badly needed repair and construction projects for area schools.

The Board approved bids for the partial re-roofing of Broadhead Elementary School. Weather Systems, Inc. of Broadhead had the low bid, however, the materials included in their bid did not meet the specifications

of the architect for this project, Ross Feldman, so their bid was withdrawn. AB Roofing of Lexington was awarded the project with a total cost of the roofing \$54,750.

Another construction project that may be on the horizon could have a positive impact upon the residents of Mt. Vernon. David Edwards from the Soil Conservation Service was on hand at the board meeting to give an update on a conservation project at the Mt. Vernon Elementary site.

The conservation project was proposed two years ago and basically

consists of cleaning out the sinkhole behind the school, removing the trees from the area, and placing a 36" vertical drain to take care of the water drainage in the area.

If completed the project could solve a variety of problems such as clearing about four acres of trees that provide a nesting place for black birds, assurance that the water that drains from the nearby hills does not become a problem, providing more playground space for the elementary school and a much better looking

## Brodhead council discusses funds

The Brodhead City Council went into a closed session Monday night to discuss how it will spend \$238,307, a payback from a loan the city made to the Mt. Vernon Plastics.

The only actions taken on the money was to authorize Brodhead Mayor Billy Bussell to deposit the check received from Reynolds Metals in the Citizens Bank and the Bank of Mt. Vernon and to allow Mayor Bussell to sign the mortgage and deliver the documents to City Attorney Jerry Cox who will then make sure the amount is correct concerning the Urban Development Action Grant, (UDAG) through which the money came to the city.

For the time being the \$238,307 will be deposited in the two banks until Cox is satisfied that the amount is correct.

There are certain restrictions attached to UDAG grants. The money can be spent for development purposes such as loans to businesses using the money to induce factories, or creation of jobs. However, as the city of Mt. Vernon has recently discovered the money can not be used for general purposes such as salaries, payment of bills and payroll.

The council also reached no decision regarding the duties of night watchman Joe Bussell. Bussell, who a few months ago had his arresting rights taken away by the council, felt

that he needed the right to arrest if he was to be safe and effective in his capacity of night watchman. Following a motion by Johnnie Wilcox to restore Bussell's arresting power, the council split 2-2. Wilcox and D.A. Robbins voted in favor of the motion while Paul Owens and Mayor Bussell voted against the motion.

In a related matter City Attorney Jerry Cox told the council that Joe Bussell could not legally hold the job of deputy sheriff and continue to work for the city of Brodhead. The council then told Bussell that he must resign one of the two jobs. Bussell questioned Cox's comments and said that he was only a volunteer for the

## Task force set

Faced with a possible water shortage problem in the future, the Mt. Vernon City Council voted to form a Water Shortage Management Task Force to monitor future water use and make suggestions for conservation.

With new Mayor Gary Cromer at the helm, the council decided it best not wait until there is a serious problem but to act now.

The council was told there is plenty of water in Lake Linville at the present time. The lake has only dropped about two inches since last week, putting the level about seven inches below the overflow.

Water Superintendent Matt Powell Jr. said lots of water is good, but it is in the water plant that the problem exists. The plant is running continually, Powell said. "In fact, we're running the plant to death and we're being using all the water we can pump," he added.

The plant is set up to produce 1,500,000 gallons of water a day. Last Thursday, 1,587,000 gallons was pumped, a record.

"We've had a hard time keeping the tanks full," Powell related. "If it gets worse we'll not have enough water. Last week we thought we were going to run out."

The rain this week has helped the lake, and less water was used by customers, but the Weather Service says the hot weather will return by the end of the week.

The council set up the task force of seven representatives of various water districts and major users. Asked to serve on the task force, or alternate, were the following:

Henry Hines, representing the Western water district; Lee Gabbard, Northern district; Johnny Wilcox, Brodhead; Gary Asher, Rockcastle Hospital; Richard Bray, schools; Delmer Vanzant, Mt. Vernon Plastics; and Lottie Sayers, Rockcastle

## Hay Orders

Drought-stricken Rockcastle County farmers will have an opportunity to purchase hay from Oregon that has been ordered by the Kentucky Department of Agriculture.

The Department is asking each county to coordinate ordering and that will be done in Rockcastle jointly by the Extension Service and the ASCS office.

Hay available includes: Horse quality hay at \$15 a ton, dairy quality alfalfa at \$12.5 a ton, beef quality fescue hay at \$110 a ton and rye grass hay at \$110 a ton.

The hay will be in 120 pound bales and will arrive by rail car with 33 tons for each car. Orders must total at least 33 tons for each carload.

Farmers need to be willing to place the order and deposit the money on Thursday (today) and Friday morning between 8 a.m. and noon.

Officials are unsure when the hay will arrive, but estimate between 10 and 14 days.

## Health fees

Some services performed at the Rockcastle County Health Center in the future will have a fee attached, as of July 1.

The charges were the result of spending cutbacks in the state budget. However, no one will be denied due to inability to pay.

Some of the services to be charged a fee include blood pressure test, sugar test, immunizations and others. Some that are not charged for include pregnancy test, family planning, WIC service, and well-child examination.

For a detailed schedule, a list of fees is posted in the health department building.

To get rid of oven odors place a few large orange peels on the rack and heat at 325 degrees F. for ten to 15 minutes.

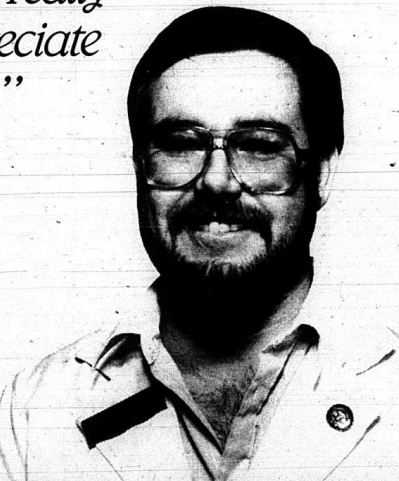

**Dear Editor,**  
Last week Wayne Stewart said the longest they had ever kept anyone for a snakebite was five days. This was because the man he was talking about had been drinking.

I was in the hospital for a snakebite 12 days. (I was in the intensive care unit for three days and out on the floor for nine days).

When I got hit I was picking strawberries and it got me on my right middle finger. This was on May 20, 1987 and I didn't get out till June 1, 1987.

The doctor couldn't find any poison pockets so he was just going to keep me overnight and by the end of the week I would be back in school. Well, I never got to go back to school. They put in an IV and put me in a room. I was in this room for about 15 to 30 minutes and my arm had swelled 1 1/2 inches, so they put me in I.C.U. At 3 a.m. they said that I almost died. They had started me on horse serum and the doctors had ordered the strongest shot they had for the pain I was having.

They gave me three little bags of serum and three shots. After three days they moved me out on the floor but I still had to take pain pills for the pain.

I had to keep my hand on a heating pad with a plastic bag around it and not move my hand. There were blisters on my finger where the snake bite was and my fingers were spread as far apart as they could be. When the blisters burst I had to take therapy for five or six days.

On the second day they started to pull the dead skin off my finger. By this time I had quit taking pain pills but when they started removing the skin, I had to start taking them again.

I just wanted to correct Wayne Stewart about the longest they had ever kept anyone for snakebite. It was 12 days as far as I know. He also said that they give people the serum and send them home, well, they don't because they might be allergic to it - I was but they didn't know it until I started to break out the last two days I was in the hospital. He said they have snakebites every year, but the doctor I had had to read up on it, when my sister called them to tell them that I was on my way with a snakebite.

The Fish family purchased the property in the late 1800's from the Buford family. The cemetery is now kept in beautiful condition by members of the Bostic family and Mable Reppert Burdette. Mrs. Burdette holds title to the cemetery.

William Buford, born 1745, served in the Revolutionary War. He settled first in Kentucky in Garrard County. According to a bronze plaque on the front of the Lancaster courthouse he gave the land for the town square and furnished water to the courthouse until his death. He is the ancestor of those from the area who descend from Eliza Kirley, Abner Baker and others.

William Buford, born 1794, served in the War of 1812. As most school children realize, the freedom from England was not assured until that war was won for our citizen "Uncle Bill and Aunt Becky Buford" were still remembered and discussed by George Cook and Lura Hiatt Fish, the parents of Miss Margaret Fish when Miss Margaret was a child.

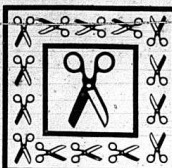



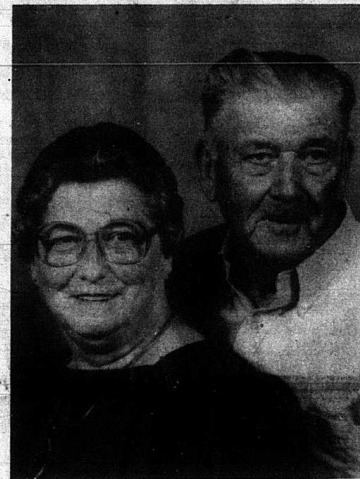

### Farm Field Day is July 15 at Bullen's farm

The Seventh Annual Farm Field Day will be held Friday, July 15 on the farm and Joyce Bullen's farm in the Seaford Cane Community. Keeping with a tradition of visiting farms throughout the county, Steve's commercial vegetables, tobacco and beef farm will provide an excellent site for this year's field day.

Programs will start at 5:30 p.m. with homemakers lessons on home drying foods and at 6:00 on local dry ingredients. At 6:00 wagons will load for two hour stops on tobacco. The first will be tobacco management for current market trends with U.K. Extension Tobacco Specialist Gary Palmer. The second stop will be discussing the Agriculture Engineering Departments Economy Riding Sprayer system. Tours will be held to a minimum due to the expected warm temperature.

This years speaker will be Com-

missioner of Agriculture, Butch Burnette. The Commissioner will be discussing the steps taken in developing Kentucky's hay market. With drought conditions cutting this years hay crop even local farmers may be needing information on locating hay. #### For Kids - The Microwave's a HIT

Summer is here! Now is the time to show off your cooking skills by preparing a "meal of champions". Before getting the "line up", be sure to get permission to cook. Also, for a "solid hit", don't forget to clean up afterwards.

As you "step to the plate", remember to use correct cooking containers and utensils. Glass and many plastic containers work best. Don't use metal pans, bowls and spoons. And, don't "run the bases" without asking for help, when necessary, to get ingredients ready.

When "scouting out" recipes, remember to plan a well-balanced meal that includes milk, cheese or meat, fruits and vegetables.

We know you will enjoy preparing the following recipes that are sure to "score" whether served alone or as part of a meal.

**Dugout Bars**  
1 package (10 oz) marshmallows  
1/4 cup butter or margarine  
5 cups toasted oat cereal

1/2 cup (4 envelopes) real fruit snacks (Fruit wrinkles or Fun Fruits or use raisins)

1. Combine marshmallows and butter in 2-quart glass min'n pour bowl.  
2. Microwave (high), uncovered, 1 1/2 to 2 minutes or until melted, stirring once. Stir in cereal and fruit snacks until evenly coated.

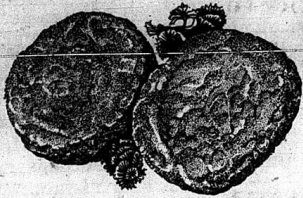

**Strategies for farmers with cattle!**

While many farmers are hauling cattle to market as pastures deteriorate and water becomes scarce, it may be better to keep cattle as long as possible, said University of Kentucky livestock marketing specialist Lee Meyer.

"The sudden increase in selling, along with other factors, has led to a drop in prices," Meyer said. "However, this drop is expected to be temporary. The longer-term price outlook is favorable."

Cattle prices had been high earlier this year because of a drop in production. The number of cattle in the United States has been declining since 1982.

Most analysts had expected the cattle inventory to begin increasing this year. However the drought is changing the ability of farmers to hold cows and heifers.

As a result, cattle numbers are likely to continue their decline this year, given a favorable price outlook for the next couple of years.

On the negative side for Kentucky producers will be feed costs. Not only will the higher feed costs hurt the cow-calf operation, it will also lower feed lot margins, Meyer said, causing them to bid lower for feeder cattle.

"This has probably had a greater impact on our feeder cattle markets than the larger number of marketers," Meyer said.

Unless cattle producers had been planning on reducing the sizes of their herds for other reasons Meyer

grow in the shade where cattle spend more time," he said. "Wild cherry trees may have limbs broken during summer winds or cattle may eat leaves from low limbs while they rest in the shade."

"Cattle are attracted to wild cherry leaves, but they are very toxic and can kill cattle. Hungry cattle may reach across fences to eat ornamental yew or cherry laurel."

"A mouthful of ornamental yew might kill a cow," he said.

Miksch said farmers also unwittingly cut grass "wherever they can find some green" to make hay. If the chopped hay or silage contains jimson weed or nightshade, it will poison their cattle. Sweet clover hay, if it becomes moldy, may contain a substance called "dicoumarol" which prevents blood from clotting. Cattle being fed sweet clover should not be dehorned or otherwise caused to bleed, nor should they be fed used near calving time.

Stressful growing conditions increase the potential for nitrate and prussic acid poisoning, Miksch said. Fertilizing with nitrate increases the risk because stressed plants fail to convert properly the nitrate to protein. When cattle trample the plants, they release prussic acid.

Preventing toxic poisoning requires careful management. Miksch offered several tips.

• Graze sorghum or sorghum cross plants only when they are at least 15 inches tall.

• Do not graze plants during or shortly after drought periods when growth has been severely reduced.

• Do not graze wilted plants or those with young tillers.

• Have suspect forages tested for nitrate.

• Delay feeding silage six to eight weeks following ensilage. Silage normally loses its prussic acid and 40 to 60 percent of its nitrate content.

• Do not allow access to wild cherry leaves whether they are wilted or not. After storms always check pastures for fallen limbs.

• Supplement feed with grain and vitamin A which allows cattle to tolerate more nitrates over time.

**WIC Program Available**

Beginning July 1, more low-income Kentuckians may qualify for the Special Supplemental Food Program for women, infants and children (WIC), the Cabinet for Human Resources announced.

The federal government annually revises the income levels that define poverty. Because WIC eligibility is based on these figures, families with incomes near the current maximums may become eligible.

For example, the annual maximum income for a family of four increased from \$20,720 to \$21,553. The average increase per family size is between four and five percent.

WIC provides nutrition education and specific foods high in protein, iron and vitamins A and C to low-income pregnant women, new mothers, infants and children up to five years of age who have health problems that can be improved through better nutrition. The goal of WIC, which is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is to improve the health of children through proper nutrition.

Almost 73,000 Kentuckians now receive WIC benefits monthly, according to the state Department for Health Services. In June 1987, approximately 69,000 Kentuckians receive monthly WIC benefits.

For more information on WIC eligibility, interested persons may contact their local or district health department.

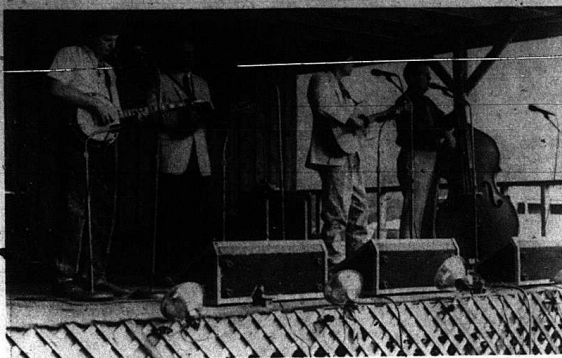

**Thousands attend Bluegrass Festival**

Even with temperatures of 110 in the sun and almost that much in the shade, hundreds of visitors braved the heat to applaud and yell as top bluegrass bands performed Thursday through Saturday at Old Joe Clark's Bluegrass Festival.

According to Edwards total cost of the project is estimated at \$21,700. The Conservation Service provides these projects on a cost share basis 65-35. The cost to the school board would be about \$6,500. At this time the Mt. Vernon site is third on the Conservation Service's list of priorities. The London Airport site is of immediate concern. Edwards recommended that the school board wait until after Oct. 1, to see if the money was going to be available.

The board also hired a math teacher. He is Ed Peterson of Richmond to teach at RCHS. Peterson will be taking the place of Roger VanZant who has been moved to industrial art instruction. The series of moves at the high school came about because of funding for an alternative discipline center was approved and Coach David Perkins will be working with the unit. Not so, the Western district where the district is exceeding its contracted amount. For example, Western's contract calls for use of 4,202,638 gallons a month. In May the district used 6,273,500 gallons.

A letter will be sent to Western to advise them not to extend district water lines beyond the present system.

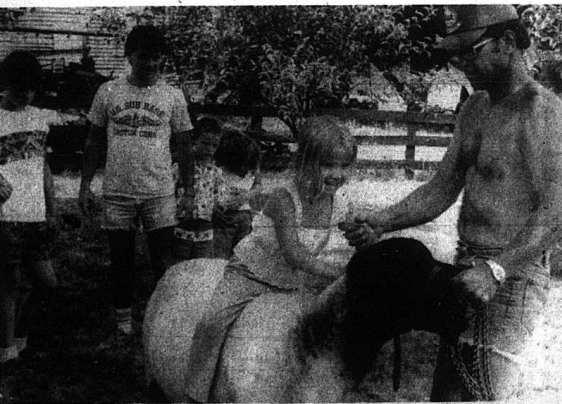
