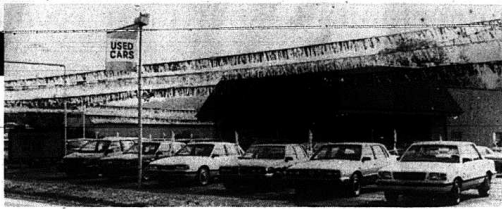
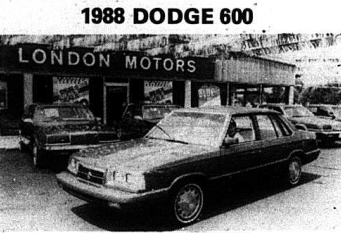

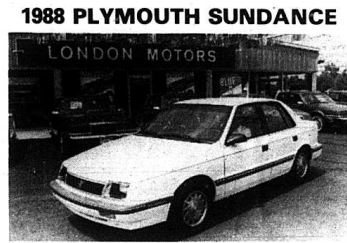

Cities have opportunity to spur more economic growth

The City of Mt. Vernon and the City of Brodhead have a rare opportunity to help the economic growth of Rockcastle County. That is if they only will.

When Reynolds's Metals purchased Mt. Vernon Plastics a few weeks ago, two towns were paid back to the cities.

Plastics paid the City of Brodhead, \$23,307 and the City of Mt. Vernon \$161,697.

The nearly \$400,000 could go a long way toward attracting another factory to Rockcastle.

And there is the \$43,000 in interest that the City of Mt. Vernon spent initially that could also sweeten the pot.

The \$43,000 was money that Plastics had been paying Mt. Vernon on the loan "they" received. A \$2,420 month payment was being used by the city to pay monthly bills, city payroll and payment on a lot purchased for a second fire station.

Kentucky Highlands Investment Corporation, a non-profit investment company, who built both the buildings that Mt. Vernon Plastics and Rockcastle Manufacturing now occupy in the Rockcastle Industrial Park, is in the process of trying to get another factory into the county.

There is no doubt that Plastics and Rockcastle Manufacturing have made huge impacts on the economic growth of Rockcastle County.

The two factories employ over 500 people and have annual wages of approximately \$6 million.

When the farming community has been hit as hard in this county it only makes sense that all of our governing bodies should be doing whatever it takes to get another factory in our community.

In April the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, at the request of Highlands and the local industrial authority agreed to buy 63 acres of land off 461, known as the Henderson property because there is actually only about 12 acres left in the Industrial Park that can be used for another factory.

New laws for vehicle registration in Ky.

Several changes have been made in vehicle laws in Kentucky that motorists should be aware of, according to Norma Houk, Rockcastle County Clerk.

They include:
Special plates will be available for issue for the 1989 calendar year for members of the military reserve, Pearl Harbor survivor plate, Purple Heart recipient, Collegiate license

The county, which doesn't have the greatest record in the world for doing good things, really took a step in the right direction when they paid \$200,000 for the property.

Local hospital administrator Wayne Stewart who has been chair-

man of the Kentucky Highlands Board for 14 years, said Tuesday that Highlands is making plans to get both sites ready for a new factory.

Stewart said that Highlands was looking for funding for landscaping, utilities, water and sewer and so on.

A veteran who has documentation from Veterans Administration certifying that he is 70 percent disabled may obtain a disabled veteran plate for \$13.50.

Temporary tags are valid for 30 days instead of 15 days.

A pickup truck or van which is used non-commercially may be is-

plate honoring universities, and personalized license plates for the 1989 registration year shall have the same design as the reflectorized passenger car plate.

Proof of insurance cards must be carried in the motor vehicle.
Wreckers weighing 14,000 pounds or less may obtain 10,000 pound plates for a fee of \$13.50.

The hospital administrator explained that when a factory gets ready to locate they don't want to start from the ground up.

Highlands is no doubt going to get something done on these projects very soon and with a little help from the two cities, they may be able to get it done very soon.

The money that Mt. Vernon and Brodhead have on hand, under grant regulations, can only be used for such things as business loans, for new business, by an industrial park for payment on utilities, railroad spurs and capitol equipment.

If the City of Mt. Vernon can set up a Task Force on the water situation surely they can get something going, to help get new industry to the county. Experts say that Rockcastle is going to grow at a rate of 11.8 percent by 1995.

If that happens and no doubt it probably will, more jobs will be needed.

The location of the industrial park and the Henderson property are prime because of the recent completion of

the Mt. Vernon By-pass, and factories like this area of Kentucky because of the labor force.

The cities have a chance to really help Rockcastle. The fiscal court has already made a good move and Highlands always works toward getting more jobs. Now it is the cities' turn.

A trip through the Daniel Boone

An early morning drive from the Berea Ranger District Station into the Daniel Boone National Forest is filled with reminders of tin roofs, wild-blackberry jam and grandma.

Nine country miles from Sand Gap, off U.S. 421, is the S-Tree Recreation Area of the Daniel Boone National Forest.

Inside the cool, shady boundaries of S-Tree is a stone and log shelter with a fireplace and picnic tables. Top people are asleep under the shelter, bundled in sleeping bags in the cool morning air.

On down the lane, large rocks line the edges of grassy, tree-filled fields that separate the roads and the camping areas. Forestry technicians and their crew sowed seed earlier in the year and now, take pride in the bright-green grass that is getting a strong start.

Campers are beginning to stir and Bob Bryant Sr. of Nancy, Kentucky, is cooking bacon on a portable stove outside a showy blue-and-white-striped tent.

The fancy tent is the first clue that images of grandma are not appropriate here. The cluster of praying-mantis-like vehicles is the next clue. This camp site -- and most of the others -- is filled with dune buggy enthusiasts.

Bryant is one of the original members of a group of dune buggy owners who come from Kentucky, Indiana and Ohio to enjoy the isolation and challenge of the Daniel Boone.

The youngest members of the group, Lisa and Mike Williams of Loveland, Ohio, are the first ones dressed, fed and ready to ride. Mike made some changes in the buggy he built and is anxious to try it out.

This is Lisa's first trip and her enthusiasm is not as obvious. "After you get out and drive a buggy just once -- you gotta have one," Mike says. "And this buggy is the place to come. It's so big here. The places we can go in Ohio and Indiana aren't restricted either, but they are so small."

"Here, we take a canteen and stay out all day," Bryant says. Sometimes we pass someone on the roads, but not out here. "I hope it rains," Tom Bullock of Logan, Indiana, says. Rain? You want it to rain? "Yes. It holds the dust down and gives better traction."

"We are just a bunch of mud-puppies," a friend says. One by one, the "buggers" strap themselves in the vehicles, adjust goggles and dust-masks, and pull into formation. Mike helps Lisa with the stubborn shoulder-harness.

And they are off. Even a non-believer would be impressed. As the vehicles roll single-file through the forest, the sense of adventure is strong.

Within 10 minutes, the buggies are out of sight and sound, leaving the campground quiet and almost empty.

Mike Gay, a Forest Service law enforcement officer, said that as a rule, dune buggy and other off-highway-vehicle users on the forest are not a problem.

"They have a right to be in there the same as anyone else, and riding the vehicles in the forest just happens to be what they enjoy doing," Gay said.

"We have miles and miles of trails out here they can ride. It can be very enjoyable to them and not cause any problems to the Forest Service," Gay said it is the responsibility of the Forest Service to let the riders know

what is expected of them. The Forest Service expects them to "be legal, be safe, be courteous, be aware."

District Ranger Rick Wilcox said off-highway-vehicle users are being encouraged to explore different areas of the forest.

"We have a Motor Vehicle Recreation Guide here on the Berea District," Wilcox said. "It shows the locations of trails all over the District. By getting this information out to the people, they can try new places every time they come, instead of going back to the same old places."

In addition to providing new ex-

periences for the riders, less frequent use of an area allows the vegetation, the wildlife, the vehicles and different forms of recreation to exist in harmony.

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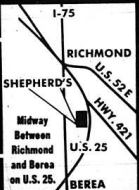

sued a re-reflectorized passenger car plate if owner prefers the re-reflectorized plate instead of plain truck plate.

Special plain decals are now available in County Clerk's office for those customers who object to the Churchill Down stripes on the passenger car plate. These decals are issued free upon request when renewing your license plates or will cost \$1 at any other time except renewal.

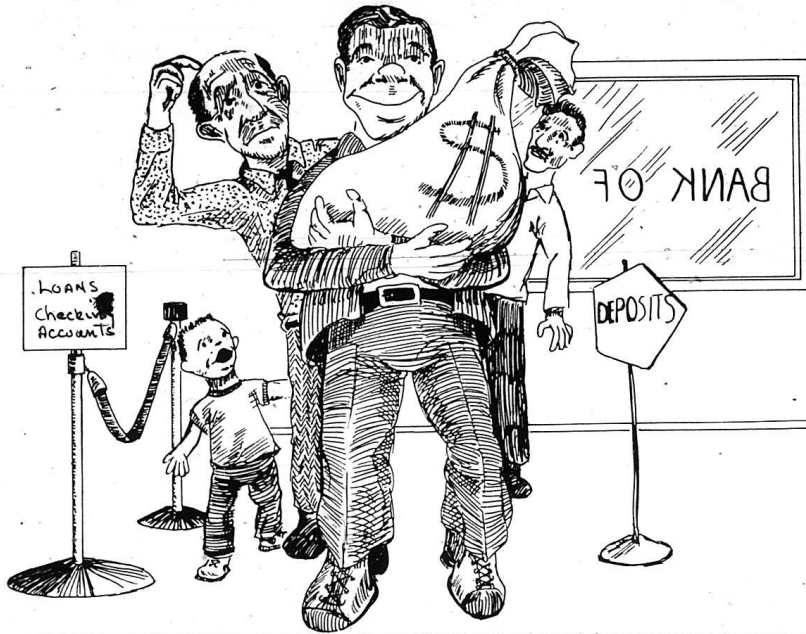
Registration fees on 62,000 lbs., 73,280 lbs. and 80,000 lbs. plates are increased. Also the registration fees on all limited plates are increased.

Allows a seller, when it comes to his attention after 15 days that the vehicle that he has sold has not been transferred out of his name, to submit an affidavit of incomplete transfer that he has transferred his interest in a vehicle. The Clerk will then enter a code in the AVIS computer system and the vehicle can not be licensed again until it is transferred.

There is also a change affecting marriage licenses. It allows the county judge/executive to issue a special one time license to a non-resident minister or priest to solemnize one marriage.

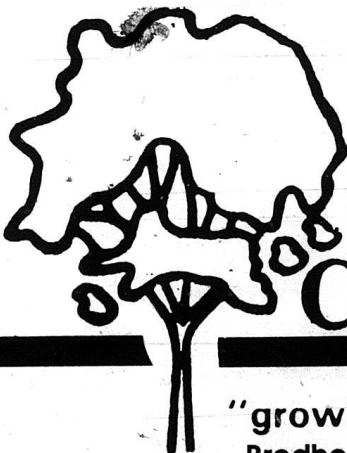

All in a days work

Sheriff recovers stolen truck

The call came into the Rockcastle sheriff's office and deputy Delno McClure answered it.

The voice on the phone said there was a truck in the pond and boys swimming around it thought they saw a body in it.

McClure went to the site off Brushy Ridge Road. That's off Climax Road and Johnetta Road. There wasn't a house in sight.

The deputy found the swimming hole in an old strip mine, and there, just under the water, was the top of a pickup truck.

Not inclined to take a swim, McClure decided the truck would have to wait. He did determine it was

pushed off the 200-foot cliff overlooking the water.

Shortly thereafter, Sheriff Clarence Hasty, deputies McClure, Darrell Doan and Phillip Chestnut, accompanied by Roger Evans and wrecker attendants David Ballinger and Bennett VanWinkle went to the site for the recovery.

A discussion followed their arrival. Who's going to dive in and look? All the trash thrown over the cliff looked very nasty to dive into. Are there any snakes lurking around?

Finally, it was Roger Evans who was chosen to take a look into the cab. He swam out, climbed on top of the cab but was unable to see inside. He dived in and took a look. Spitting and spewing, he came up to report to

the sheriff the cab was empty.

Next came the need to identify the owner of the truck, so Ballinger and VanWinkle took over along with Evans. The wrecker was moved into position above the steep incline and a chain brought down. Evans and VanWinkle finally got it hooked to the truck. After about 30 minutes the 1986 Ford F-150 with 4-wheel drive was on the shore.

Only the radio was gone, but the ignition was smashed and the wheels and tires had been changed.

School garbage bid goes to HSI

"I make a motion to accept the bid of Bee Garbage due to their past record, the location of the company and the small dollar difference in the two bids," said board member Earl Cummins.

Cummins was referring to the garbage pick up bids received by the board. The two companies that submitted bids were Bee Garbage System of Mt. Vernon and Helton Sanitation Inc. of Gray, Kentucky. Bee Garbage submitted a bid of \$742.65 and Helton Sanitation submitted the low bid of \$739. For a difference of \$5.65.

For the past two years Bee Garbage has been awarded the garbage

pick up contract and according to Supt. Bige Towery Jr., all the school principals and E.J. Smith, food service director, have all been pleased with the service.

Nonetheless, after talking with representatives from Helton Sanitation, Tommy Norman and William K. Bullens, some of the board members felt compelled to accept the low bid ignoring the past service record of Bee Garbage.

Cummins spoke by his motion to accept the local company but the motion failed to get a second. John Eaton, Jr. and David Ballinger from Bee Garbage were on hand at the meeting but did not voice their opinion and neither were they asked any question from the board.

Board member Willie Taylor felt that school law demanded that the board accept the low bid. Kenneth Adams and George Poyner concurred with Taylor's interpretation of the law. Supt. Towery then got out the Kentucky school law handbook and the board looked over the section regarding bids. Poyner then said that the Kentucky school board's attorney had instructed them to accept the low bid if a record of poor service had not been documented. In order to reject the low bid their must be a reason to do so such as poor service record. The board could find no such reason.

Still at an impasse Taylor motioned to accept the low bid of Helton Sanitation. It was seconded by Adams

Hefty fine faces Brodhead for polluting Dix River

The City of Brodhead was informed Monday night it will be fined \$5,000 for discharging pollutants into Dix River.

The United States of America (plaintiff) on behalf of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) will file suit in Federal District Court at London following a meeting Aug. 26 between the Kentucky Division of water in Frankfort and the attorney and engineer for the city. They have been told to be "prepared to discuss and reach a consent decree."

The Commonwealth of Kentucky is a defendant in the suit along with Brodhead since the office occurred

in the state and the state participates in various programs related to water pollution.

After the consent decree is worked out, Federal Judge Eugene Siler Jr., or his counterpart, will sign the documents that will officially levy the fine. There will be no trial.

Andy Meadors, public administrative specialist with the Cumberland Valley Area Development District, told the Brodhead City Council Monday night that the city cannot escape the \$5,000 civil penalty since it is past failure to comply with the EPA's National Municipal Pollu.

The first payment of the penalty, \$2,500 will be due Nov. 30. The

second \$2,500 will be due Nov. 30, 1989.

The city will also be required to submit a revised Municipal Compliance Plan by Oct. 31, and implement all operation and maintenance measures by Dec. 15.

Only Mayor Billy Bussett and Councilman Paul Owens were at the council meeting to hear the bad news. The meeting did not officially come over for lack of a quorum. However, the city agreed to meet officially for its regular monthly meeting Aug. 15 in the hope all councilmen will attend.

The city was told many times that its sewer plant was discharging pollutants into the Dix river, Meadors said. "But the city ignored correspondence and seemed unconcerned. I don't think the council realized the seriousness of the matter."

The city apparently has been under an EPA watch for some time, meaning on the list of communities that have failed to respond to EPA rules and regulations.

The EPA's National Municipal Policy requires all municipal wastewater treatment plants to be in compliance with their permit no later than July 1, 1988, or be placed under judicial order containing a construction schedule for new or upgraded treatment facilities.

The EPA accuses the city of violating the federal Clean Water Act in failing to report monitoring results and by failing to provide operation and maintenance necessary to operate the existing facilities at optimum efficiency.

The suit obviously caught the city

Post office site still same

Hope waned this week for downtown Mt. Vernon merchants and other when the Postal Service decided to keep its recently purchased property as the new post office site. Henry Hines, owner of Mt. Vernon Printing, had offered to exchange property he owns at Main and First Streets for the Postal Service-owned property on north Richmond Street, known as the Henderson property.

Hines reported he was contacted by a Postal Service executive in Louisville by telephone to tell him the exchange was unacceptable. The executive blamed the cost of site preparation he estimated at \$100,000.

"I told the man it will ruin the

downtown area to move the post office to Richmond Street," Hines related. "I told him they should get out from behind their desks and come down here and look at the sites."

"I also told him the Postal Service didn't care about the economy of our town," Hines continued. "He told me it would cost too much to get ready to build and that their engineers chose the site."

The Baker property, owned by Hines, is 26,000 square feet with a 172 foot fronting on Main Street. Hines purchased the property at auction for \$24,000.

Hines said he was told that the construction of a new post office is still on hold.

Court buys county road signs

Road signs for some of the county's estimated 300 roads were approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a meeting Tuesday.

The court agreed to purchase 100 signs, as a starter. They will be 6 by 18 inches, green with white lettering. The cost, including posts, is \$21.72 for each. They will be purchased through a state agency with a total cost of \$2,172.

Twenty signs will go to each of the county's five districts. The court will purchase more at a later date.

David Ballinger of Bee Garbage asked the court to issue garbage franchise as "insurance" for the company's investment in the garbage business.

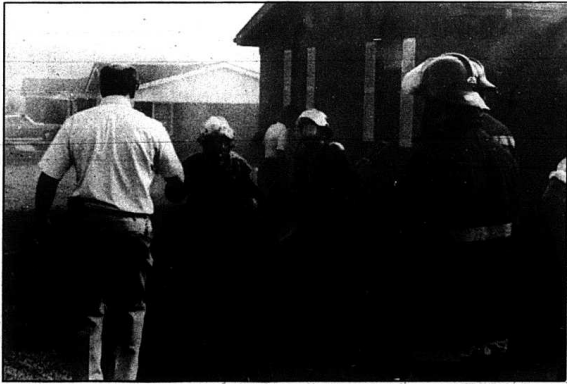
County Attorney James H. Lambert told the court the county has a garbage plan approved by the state

and the state should be advised before any changes are made in procedures.

The court voted \$2,550 to construct a new voting booth at Climax. The 14 by 12-foot building will be constructed by Alonzo McCollum. The present building is no longer available, the court was told.

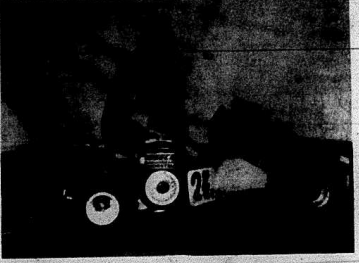

Crackdown on delinquent taxpayers

New Course Offered at UK

A crack down on delinquent taxpayers by the Revenue Cabinet produced over 5600,000 in a 14-week period this year.

The Revenue Cabinet conducted 13 seizures from March 7 - July 14 under its Distrant and Levy (D & L) Program. The D & L is a last resort measure against delinquent taxpayers. The program allows the Revenue Cabinet to seize financial assets of seriously delinquent taxpayers such as bank accounts, accounts receivable, unpaid salaries, and tangible property such as vehicles and real estate.

"We owe it to the taxpayers of Kentucky to collect delinquent taxes from those who will not pay," says Revenue Cabinet Secretary C. Emmett Calvert. "The Revenue Cabinet will use all the resources available to us to collect taxes due to the state."

Calvert emphasizes that the Distrant and Levy Program is a last resort.

The taxpayer is given every opportunity to pay before the D & L Program is applied.

Since taking over the Revenue Cabinet, Calvert has placed increased emphasis on collecting accounts receivable. The cabinet will even arrange payment plans for delinquent taxpayers.

"I'm not interested in punishment," says Calvert. "We're only interested in collecting the funds owed the Commonwealth."

The two-fold purpose of the Revenue Cabinet's increased emphasis on collections is to show the taxpayers of Kentucky that the cabinet is serious in its effort to collect all taxes legally owed the state and to exhaust every available opportunity to enforce collection from taxpayers who are habitually delinquent.

Following the seizure the taxpayer is given the opportunity to pay delinquent taxes. If no payment is made the cabinet is authorized to sell seized property at a public auction and apply the funds to unpaid taxes. The 13 seizures produced direct collections of \$653,696.50 and secured 24 nonfiled returns through July 14, 1988.

Grant Received for Public Transportation

Gov. Wallace Wilkinson has announced that Kentucky has received a \$2,005,081 federal grant to assist public transportation systems throughout the state during the fiscal year 1989.

The grant was approved by the United States Department of Transportation, Urban Mass Transportation Administration to assist public transportation in small urban and rural areas.

According to state Transportation Secretary and Commissioner of Highways Milo D. Bryant, approximately 25 public transportation systems across the state will apply for portions of the grant early next year. The cabinet Division of Mass Transportation administers the grant, which fall under Section 18 of the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1964.

Wilkinson said the grant will enhance small transportation systems throughout the Commonwealth to continue their services as well as upgrade their present systems.

The grant aids in the financing of three categories; capital assistance which requires 20 percent local matching funds, half of which comes from state matching funds; operating assistance, which requires 50 percent matching local funds; and administrative assistance, which requires 20 percent local matching funds.

off guard. City Attorney Jerry Cox said he did not know about the suit until copies were distributed at the council meeting.

The same situation can happen to any city, Meadors told those present. At Mt. Vernon, the city escaped penalties when it remodeled and enlarged its sewer plant at a cost of over \$2 million.

Brodhead has discussed improvements to the sewer plant, hoping for a grant to help with the estimated \$300,000 cost. However, the hoped for \$210,000 grant was never officially approved. At least it was never announced.

Meadors said grants are hard to come by these days, and would be more difficult to get as time goes by. "There is no reason to wait for grants any longer," Meadors said. "They are going to be virtually nonexistent."

One person who attended the meeting had a pointed comment:

The government tells these communities to clean up and meet requirements and instead they piddle around and comment that the government can come and get whatever it is. Here is a good example of how Uncle Sam can come and get you. It's going to happen one of these days with garbage. And you know when the fine is paid it's your tax money that will be used."

Incidentally, to date there is no national policy on garbage. It is left to the states. However, recent discoveries of garbage pollution of beaches in the northeast is likely to prompt Congress to adopt a national policy.

Last leg of 461 up for bids

The last section of Ky. 461 from the end of the new section south west of Mt. Vernon to the Rockcastle-Pulaski counties line is being bid by the Kentucky Department of Transportation.

Bids will be opened Aug. 19 at Frankfort.

The completion of the highway now under construction and the new section will complete the Ky. 461 reconstruction from U.S. 25 to Ky. 80.

No completion date for the road has been announced. One guess is late 1990 or early 1991.

Two other Rockcastle projects, much smaller, will be bid and opened on the same day.

Grade, drain and surface of 1.5 of a mile of Rockcastle Industrial Park Road from the Mt. Vernon bypass to the end of the existing road.

Also, 9 of a mile of shoulder seal on Carl Brown Road from 45 of a mile southwest of Ky. 1250 extending 9 of a mile.

Marijuana destroyed

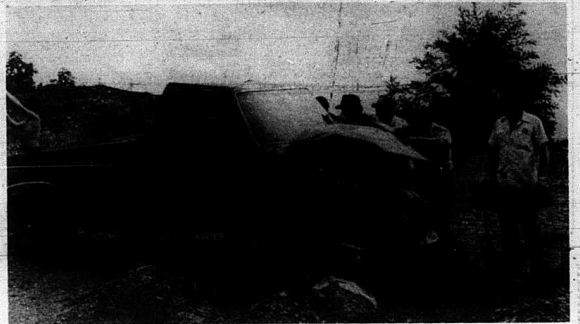
A total of 638 marijuana plants were located and destroyed Tuesday

Agricultural Fair Rules And Regulations


- The Brodhead Fair is planned and conducted according to Kentucky Department of Agriculture Regulations for use of state funds.
- All entries must be on grounds and remain on display to conform with regulations.
- All exhibits (except livestock) must remain on display until 10 a.m. on Saturday, August 13th, 1988. Premiums will not be paid for exhibits removed prior to that time.
- All exhibits (except livestock) are limited to residents of Rockcastle County. Open livestock classes, including 4-H and FFA, are open to all counties, except for lot #4, 5 and 6 in Dairy. Ribbons are presented in open classes only.
- 4-H and FFA members are eligible to show in all open division classes, with the same animals as shown in 4-H and FFA departments. All entries must be made prior to the show.
- The Fair Board reserves the right to combine classes when a class has fewer than three entries and/or two exhibitors.
- All livestock must be accompanied by an official health certificate in keeping with the State Department of Agriculture health regulations.
- No individual may take more than one entry in any one class, except that two may be entered in livestock classes. No more than five animals may be entered by any one exhibitor.
- The Fair Executive Committee reserves the right to interpret and resolve all matters connected with or incident to the fair.
- The Fair Board will not be responsible for losses, accidents, injury to persons, animals or other exhibits, but will take precautions to prevent any losses.
- Blue ribbons are not to exceed \$30.00 in livestock shows. Money not used in one division may be transferred to another division on the Danish System.
- Foods, fruits and vegetable entries are to be made on paper plates. Canned foods are to be exhibited in standard canning jars.
- When there is only one entry in a class, it is the discretion of the judges to determine the ribbon received.
- All entries in 4-H and FFA classes must have been produced in conjunction with an approved project.

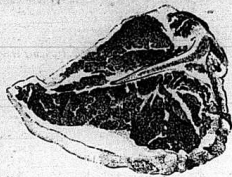

Can Tomatoes and Juice without Separating
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County Extension Agent
for Home Economics



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Even though the garden may not have as many tomatoes as usual, you can still can tomatoes and tomato juice without separating the solids and liquid.

Ordinarily, an enzyme present in tomatoes causes the solids and liquid to separate when they are cut and stand without heating.

But, when the tomato is cut into quarters and heated immediately, this separation can be avoided for either tomato juice or canned tomatoes.

To prevent separation of tomato juice, quickly cut one pound of fruit into quarters and place directly into saucepan. Heat immediately to a boil while crushing. Slowly continue to add and crush freshly cut tomato quarters to boiling mixture. Simmer five minutes after you add all pieces. Press heating tomatoes through a sieve or food mill to remove skins and seeds. Then, complete canning of tomato juice by United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) recommended method.

To can tomatoes without separation, the following method is recommended:

Wash tomatoes and dip in boiling water 30 to 60 second or until skins split. Dip in cold water and remove skins and cores. Trim off bruised or discolored areas, then quarter tomatoes. Heat about one pound of tomatoes quarters quickly in large pot, crushing them until some juice is formed. Continue heating tomatoes, stirring constantly to prevent burning. After tomatoes are boiling, gradually add remaining quartered tomatoes. Do not crush, because they will soften with heating and stirring. Once remaining tomatoes are added, boil gently for five minutes.

Again, follow USDA recommendations available from your County Extension Office (256-2403).

"What Saith the Scriptures"

In Luke 8:11, Jesus in explaining the parable of the sower, says "The seed is the word of God." The seed falls upon various kinds of ground which are the hearts of men. Now there is a very important and basic lesson to be learned from this parable. When the truth of the gospel is taught, the "pure" seed, what will it produce? Christians, and only Christians! Legislation will help farmers cope with severe drought

The U.S. House of Representatives has approved major legislation to help farmers cope with this year's disastrous drought. Fifth District Rep. Harold Rogers reported this week.

Rogers said the legislation will help all sectors of the farm economy by providing feed assistance for livestock producers as well as disaster payments to crop farmers.

"This legislation authorizes the sale of surplus grain and help in transporting feed for livestock producers who normally grow their own feed," said Rogers. "I am hopeful that in conference with the Senate, we can broaden that assistance to all livestock producers."

Rogers said the bill also provides disaster payments to any crop farmer who loses 35 percent or more of his crop, including tobacco.

"Farmers can be paid 65 percent of the target price for any losses over 35 percent," Rogers said. "For tobacco, growers would receive 65 percent of the national average loan rate or market price for losses in excess of 35 percent. In return, farmers must agree to buy crop insurance for the next two years."

Rogers said the legislation also allows tobacco growers to lease any portion of their fall 1988 quota which they cannot harvest because of the drought.

For dairy farmers, Rogers said the bill will block the 50-cent cut in milk price supports scheduled for January 1st of next year, and will raise price supports by another 50 cents between April 1st and June 30th.

Rogers said the bill will now go to a conference with the Senate, which passed similar legislation. Rogers said he expects a final compromise version of the drought relief bill to go to the President in the next week or two.

Harold Rogers misses key drought votes

U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers, after promoting himself as a strong supporter of legislation to help farmers fight the drought, last week missed crucial votes on the matter.

Rogers, R-Somerset, was absent last Thursday when the House voted to pass a \$4.4 billion drought relief package. The other six Kentucky members voted in favor of the bill.

Rogers also missed two votes on amendments to the bill, which is now in conference with a more generous Senate bill.

Yesterday, Rogers said he missed the votes because he was out of town on a commitment to appear at Eastern Kentucky University. Rogers left Washington on a 2:20 p.m. flight Thursday to receive an honorary degree and speak at EKU's summer commencement ceremony.

Rogers was paid \$500 for his appearance. Congressmen are allowed to receive up to \$2,000 for an appearance, as long as honoraria income does not exceed certain annual limits.

But Rogers said in an interview that he planned to return the money. "I didn't know I was going to be paid," Rogers said. An EKU official gave Rogers a check in an envelope. The congressman said he did not know what was in it until he had left the school.

EKU president Hanly Funderburk said yesterday that "nobody ever mentioned" to Rogers that he would be paid.

But Rogers waited until this week, after questions from a reporter, to tell

EKU he was returning the money. Last month, Rogers issued a press release touting his co-sponsorship of the drought relief legislation. "I support this legislation and am hopeful we will see quick action on it before

the end of July," he said at the end of a one-page statement.

Then, in a weekly report to constituents and newspapers in his 5th congressional district, Rogers said he was working in Congress to help

his region cope with the drought.

"I pledge my complete support to any and all efforts to help our people cope with what has rapidly become a national crisis," he wrote.

In the interview, Rogers said he "kept hoping the vote would come

earlier" than it did. In the end, he had to make a choice between voting and EKU.

"I really hated to miss that drought vote," Rogers said. But "it was either stay here and vote on an overwhelmingly passed bill or really screw up the works at Eastern."

The House bill passed 368-29.

Holley is part of theft ring

A tractor, bush-hog, truck tires and a generator are among items purchased in recent weeks by investigators working for Attorney General Fred Cowan. But the items were not bought out of a dealer's showroom.

The property belonged to the Kentucky Department of Transportation and was allegedly sold by three prison inmates assigned to a Department of Transportation garage in Frankfort.

"We had heard from sources of state property being sold and began an investigation about six weeks ago," Cowan said. According to the Attorney General, the probe led to a series of successful undercover buys by members of his Special Investigations and Special Prosecutions Divisions. After obtaining warrants for

three people, members of the Attorney General's team made an additional undercover purchase from the suspects of a Department of Transportation tractor and a quantity of marijuana.

A short time later, members of the Attorney General's Office arrested Denver E. Holly, 43, and charged him with three counts of theft by deception; Mike Billens, 37, charged with two counts of complicity to commit theft, and John Gardner, 36, charged with one count of complicity.

Holly pleaded guilty in Rockcastle Circuit Court in 1983 in the vehicular deaths on I-75 of three Rockcastle family members, Pam Burke and her two children, David and Cindy.

All three of the men reside at the

Frankfort Career Development Center and were apparently engaged by the Department of Transportation under the Work Release Program. Holly and Billens were arrested at the C-1 Transportation garage where they had been assigned to work. Gardner was arrested at the FCDC after failing to show up for work.

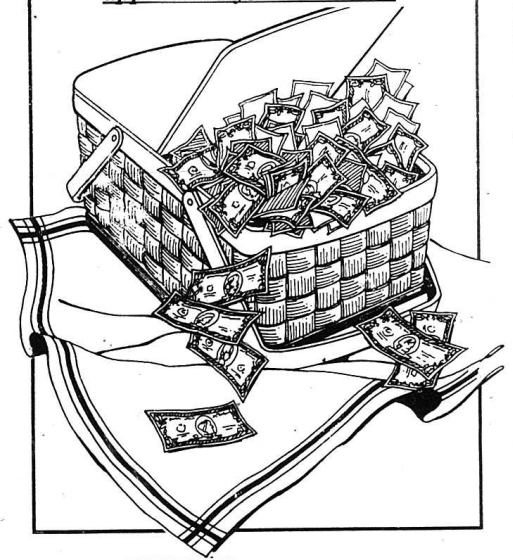
Cowan said it has not been determined to what extent other state materials might have been sold or to whom. "The work of my office in this case is not finished," Cowan said. "We are obtaining additional information from the Transportation Department and the investigation will continue."

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Parking Ordinance 542.0 -Amendment- For the Public

SECTION I
Parking on Main St. in the City of Livingston, Kentucky. No exceptions to be made at any time. There will be no double parking, no parking on the wrong side of the street and/or way. No vehicles shall be parked in yellow lines or by fire hydrants.

SECTION II
Parking on Back and/or Side Streets can be parked as always in the past - either side of the street and/or facing either way. This is to be allowed only if the vehicle is not blocking right-of-way to entrance of street or street itself. This is to allow for all emergency vehicles if and when needed.

SECTION III
Parking on Main Street for vehicles Loading and/or unloading will be excluded from Section I, except for blocking fire hydrants and emergency vehicles.

SECTION IV
Violation of Section I, II or III of this ordinance constitutes a misdemeanor with a penalty of a fine of not less than \$10.00 for each offense, except for parking beside, in front of or blocking a fire hydrant. This fine remains the same - \$25.00 for each offense. Also, all violators shall be responsible for towing charge of vehicles and storage costs, if applicable.

SECTION V
This ordinance shall be in full force and effective as of 7-20-88 at 7:00 a.m. As required by law on its adoption, approval, attestation and publication by law.
All fines payable and due 10 days from issue to City Clerk, or may be mailed to City of Livingston, P.O. Box 278, Livingston, Kentucky 40445.
